Reed Speaks to UPWA Members

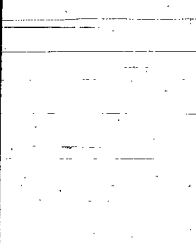

Yearly VA Forms Out

Many pensioners who live in Nebraska will not have to submit annual income questionnaires to the Veterans Administration starting next year.

C. W. Nixon, VA director, said a recent law permitted the VA to drop the requirement for veterans, widows on VA pension and parents receiving VA dependency and indemnity compensation (DIC) payments, who have attained age 72. The law affects recipients who

have been on the VA rolls during two consecutive years. However, these beneficiaries must continue to report changes in income to VA, he said.

Pension and DIC payments are adjusted on information the VA receives on questionnaires mailed to beneficiaries each year with their Nov. 1 checks.

Nixon said VA pensions are paid on the basis of need to veterans totally and permanently disabled from non-service causes. Dependent parents of veterans who die of service-con-

nected disabilities may be eligible for indemnity compensation.

He urged veterans, dependents and survivors who think they may be eligible for pensions or other VA benefits to contact the VA Regional Office, 220 S. 17th St., Lincoln, Neb., or their local veterans service organization representative or nearest county service office.

Fox squirrels may grow as big as 3 pounds in Nebraska, but the average weight for an adult is somewhere around 1 pound, 12 ounces.



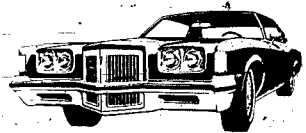

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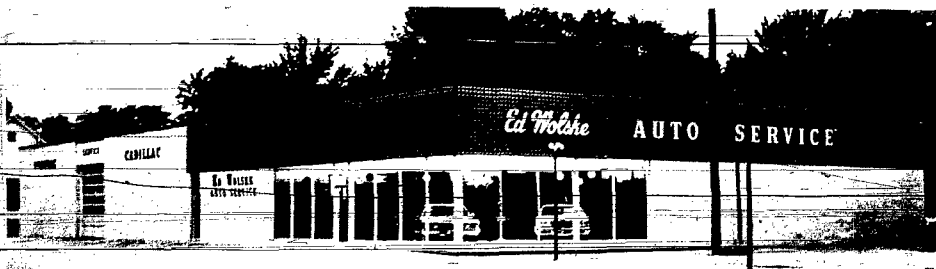
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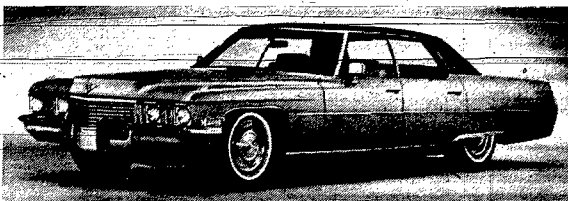
