## Farmers Aren't Reporting Fuel Shortages to ASCS; One Station Out of Gas

Although farmers in other parts of the state are feeling the pinch of the fuel shortage, farmers in Wayne County reportedly are having no trouble getting fuel. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office in Wayne said Tuesday that no farmers in the county had asked for help in obtaining fuel. ASCS offices across the state have been designated to field requests from farmers for help in obtaining fuel. State director of the ASCS, Paul Sindt, said a few days ago that more and more farmers are starting to call ASCS county offices to ask for help. He said most of the calls have been in counties where there is a large number of center-pivot irrigation systems. Ten farmers in Kimball and Banner Counties in the western part of the state were without diesel fuel several days and had to wait until earlier this week for the first delivery of July fuel to continue farming operations, according to Sindt.

Sindt noted, however, that the biggest problem is in obtaining gasoline. In a related development locally, Merl's Econ O Way in Wayne ran out of gasoline Sunday morning and had to quit selling to customers, according to Merl Marshall. Marshall, who operates the service station with his brother Denny, said the district representative for his fuel supplier said gasoline would be available the first of July. The district representative told Marshall that refinery troubles in April were the cause of the present fuel shortages, which also is hitting other company stations in the state. Marshall noted that this is the first time he has ever run out of gasoline since he has been in business in Wayne. He has been operating his station for 11 years. "I guess it's something we'll just have to learn to live with," he said.

## Drive Near Goal for 4th Display

The Wayne County Jaycees are over the halfway point in collecting \$400 to fund the annual Fourth of July fireworks display at the Wayne ball park. As of Tuesday, the group had collected \$274.50 from 42 Wayne businesses. Project co-chairman Bill Workman hopes that by the end of the week the entire amount will have been collected. As it stands, the JCs, along with the Mrs. JCs and the City of Wayne have donated \$275 of the \$675 needed. That combined with donations already collected leaves \$125.50 to be raised. "We're aiming for a bigger and better display this year," Workman pointed out, "but we do need the help of other businesses and those who wish to donate to make this year the best yet in our displays." # Council Postpones Action To Acquire Land for Park

Wayne city councilmen Tuesday night tabled further action on plans which could result in acquiring just over 12 acres of land for a park near the new hospital site in northeast Wayne. Council voted 7-0 to take up the subject at its July 10th meeting rather than act on a resolution which is needed before governmental officials can continue processing Wayne's request for federal and state financial assistance in buying the land. Councilman Pat Gross was absent from the meeting.

The park would be located east of the new hospital under construction on the northeast side of Wayne State College. State officials have already given approval for participating in purchasing the land, agreeing to pay 75 per cent of the estimated \$38,000 the approximate 12.5 acres of land would cost. State officials need the city's resolution to participate in joint purchasing of the land before the request can be forwarded to the U. S. Bureau of Outdoor Recreation.

According to mayor Kent Hall, if the land is appraised at approximately \$38,000, the city would contribute about \$9,500, or 25 per cent of the purchase price. The federal government would contribute the rest, 50 per cent.

Councilman Frank Prather urged postponing passing the resolution, which could possibly bind the city to go ahead with acquiring the land, until councilmen can investigate exactly how much land is involved and what the land is worth.

Killed on a 7-0 vote was

further action on annexation procedures which would have brought two plots of land on the southwest edge of the city into city limits.

Council tossed out the subject after listening to an attorney representing the two property owners, Ralph Beckenhauer and Dean Pierson.

The attorney reminded council that about nine years ago the district court took the same Pierson land out of the city after the council had annexed it. The court ruled that the land was agricultural in nature, too low for development and was receiving no benefits from the city. The situation is the same today, he said.

Council had taken up annexation procedures after receiving a request several months ago from property owners along Grantland Road for paving. Since the council did not want to pave the road without being able to assess the two plots of land on the south side of it, it was decided to annex the land.

Council did agree, however, to meet with property owners and Wayne County commissioners to see if some agreement could be worked out whereby the county would help hard surface a short strip of the road to make it usable in wet weather and keep dust at a minimum.

Councilmen approved on a 7-0 vote annexing a plot of land belonging to Steve Schumacher on the west side of the city. The land is along Third Avenue, the road leading into the fairgrounds.

Also approved on a 7-0 vote was an ordinance creating the

office of city administrator and changing the administrative setup of the city.

The ordinance, when it becomes effective after publication in The Wayne Herald, will separate the duties of the city clerk and administrator, a dual post now held by Dan Sherry.

It also will do away with standing committees of the council, putting that responsibility on the shoulders of the city administrator.

The administrator will have other duties, such as acting as purchasing agent for the city, preparing the annual budget, serving as a public relations officer, recommending to the mayor and council the appoint-

ment and dismissal of all department heads under him, and supervising use of public buildings.

The administrative change was recommended after an extensive efficiency study was conducted for the city during the past several months. The study was completed earlier this year.

In other action the council: —Set a public hearing on the proposed budget for the coming year for July 10 at 8 p.m. The proposed budget calls for a levy of just over 25 mills, up more than three mills from the present levy.

—Voted 4-2 against giving an exclusive franchise for hauling. See Council, page 5

## Doors to Close Soon at County Draft Board Office

Wayne County's Selective Service board will close its office in Wayne on Thursday, July 12, and transfer records to Norfolk where they will be kept with records from Madison, Pierce, Stanton and Knox Counties.

The closing is the result of the national reorganization of the Selective Service system which began in December.

The reorganization is nearly complete in Nebraska, according to state Selective Service director Lee G. Liggett.

The end of the draft and the cutback in funds has resulted in a reduced number of Selective Service offices to be maintained in each state. Nebraska will maintain 23 area offices rather than 93 county offices as has

# 'May mean drop in mill levy... Hearing on School's Budget Scheduled Monday Night

A public hearing on a proposed budget which may result in a drop of up to one mill for residents of the Wayne-Carroll school district will be held at 8:30 p.m. Monday.

The hearing, which is required by law before the budget can be adopted, will be held at Wayne High School.

Francis Haun, school superintendent, said it is impossible to tell what the mill levy for the school district will be next year because property valuation has not been determined.

But he noted that if the valuation does not drop from its present figure of \$12,320,990, the mill levy may dip slightly. The drop could be up to one mill, he noted.

The school district's present levy is 67.53 mills.

Reason for the expected drop in the mill levy, according to Haun, is the increased state aid the school district can expect for the coming fiscal year.

The state legislature this spring approved increasing state aid to education from \$35 million to \$55 million.

According to estimates by school officials, the Wayne-Carroll school district should receive \$154,793.60 in state aid. That would be an increase of \$37,969.90, or just over 32 per cent more than the school district received for the present fiscal year.

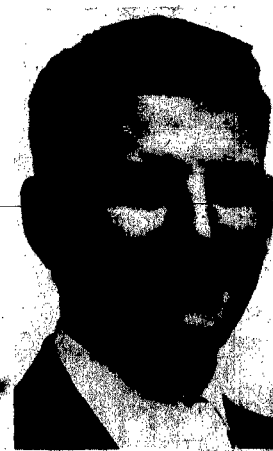
The proposed budget calls for raising approximately \$838,400

through local taxation, about \$16,000 more than last year's budget called for.

Total expenditures budgeted for during 1973-74 comes to \$1,029,415. That includes such things as salary for teachers and administrators, fuel and plant operation, teaching supplies, insurance and the like, but it does not include transfer of state and federal funds and reimbursement to the school for its hot lunch program.

Some 83.75 per cent of the \$1,029,415 budget—or \$862,115—will go toward salaries and related expenses such as insurance and social security for school district employees, according to Haun.

A 36-year-old Fremont policeman will become Wayne's new chief of police Monday.

He is Bob Evers, hired for the job on a 5-2 vote by the city council Tuesday night.

Evers replaces Vern Fairchild, fired by mayor Kent Hall earlier this year. With his hiring, acting chief E. L. "Pat" Hailey returns to his job as assistant chief.

Volting against hiring Evers were Vernon Russell and Frank Prather, Jim Thomas, Harvey Brasch, Ivan Beeks, Darrel Fuelberth and Keith Mosley voted in favor of naming him to fill the post. Councilman Pat Gross was absent from the meeting.

Russell said he questioned the qualifications and experience of Evers, noting that "we have three younger men (on the force) who are equally qualified for the job."

"I don't think it will be workable among the men... and I don't think it's in the best interest of the taxpayer," he added.

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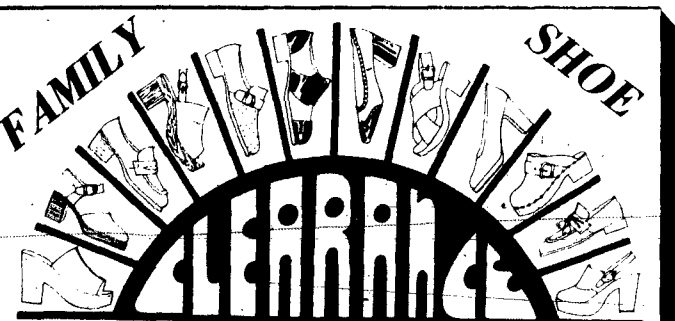

fewer than the previous year. Three years ago the fire department answered 32 calls, he added.

Pinkelman said he was unable to give a reason for the reduced number of calls, but he did note that local and area residents "have been pretty fortunate." Of the 23 calls, three were false alarms and three were for mutual aid to other departments, he said.

Pinkelman said a total of 325 man hours were spent by the volunteer firemen during the past year, with an average of just over 17 men answering each call. The firemen spent 769 hours in training, he added.

Although fires destroyed nearly \$40,000 in property, firemen saved approximately \$147,000 worth of property by controlling fires once they broke out, he added.

been the case in the past. The position of executive secretary for the Wayne County board, held the past three and a half years by Mrs. Robert Bergt of Wayne, has been eliminated, along with the jobs of other county board executive secretaries.

Most registrants will be put in a 1 H or holding classification, she said, but those who receive the lowest lottery numbers during the year they turn 19 will be classified 1 A in order for the country to have the necessary back up capability should it be required. Congressional action would be required before these men would be subject to induction.

Registrars have been named in each high school and at other area points for 18-year-olds who do not wish to go to the area offices to register.

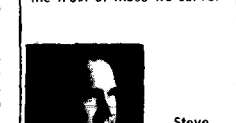
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Winside Baseball Group In Process of Dissolving

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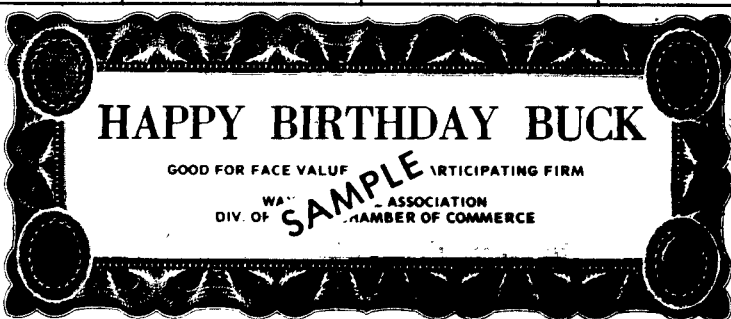

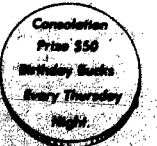

## Efficiency of College Setups Report Subject

Dr. Aaron Butler of Wayne presented a report to college and university presidents of Missouri in Jefferson City Tuesday following passage by the legislature there of a reorganization bill which put all such institutions under one super-board.

Comparisons of the efficiency of the systems in Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa and Missouri are in the report. Each state has a different organizational structure.

"Missouri, with the most population, has had an uncentralized system which defies audit or analysis," Dr. Butler said. "Kansas, on the other hand, with the former teachers' colleges and the two state universities under a single board, is third in population among the four and yet has the totally centralized system. The other three states are moving toward complete centrality of control," he said.

One of the measures devised by Dr. Butler for efficiency analysis is an index of the so-called "brain drain" whereby good students find it desirable to go outside the state for their colleges and graduate education. "Nebraska is especially blessed culturally with the science-oriented student, but he leaves the state for scientific training. So far as Wayne is concerned, there is a marvelous opportunity to fill the vacuum in medical services training when the new hospital is completed," he concluded.

# Electricity Produced at Record Rate

Wayne residents used electricity at a record pace Monday, according to power plant superintendent Norbert Brugger.

The plant produced 100,200 kilowatt hours of electricity in a 24 hour period starting midnight Sunday, equalling the second largest amount ever generated by the plant, he said.

The record high production occurred on Sept. 19 last year when 100,700 kwh were produced.

Monday's production equals the amount generated on Aug. 17 last year, Brugger added.

The large number of air conditioners being used and the large amount of water being pumped for such things as watering lawns were major reasons for the high production, according to Brugger.

Monday's production is two and a half times the amount of electricity generated at the plant exactly 10 years earlier.

On June 25, 1963 a total of 40,600 kwh were produced, Brugger noted.

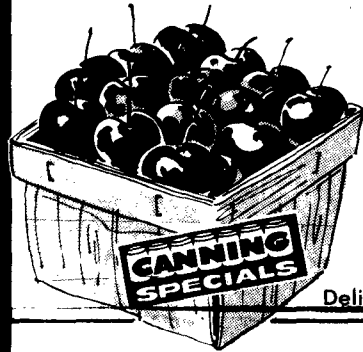

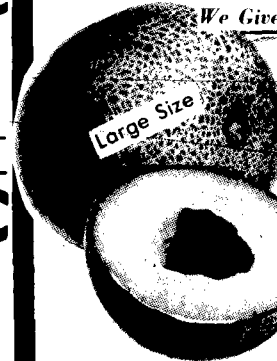

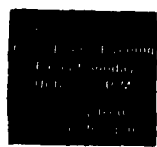

## Capitol News — Most wage earners can expect large tax refunds from state come next year

LINCOLN — There was a brief period of uncertainty about whether Nebraskans would get their 1973 income tax rate cut after all.

But questions raised with the attorney general about the validity of the bill which contained the retroactive tax cut were resolved in such a way that they don't affect the rate reduction.

Last week, Gov. J. James Exon directed the State Revenue Department to issue instructions to the Nebraska employers to begin July 1 withholding for state income tax purposes at the 13 per cent level.

The rate set last November for 1973 was 15 per cent, and withholding has been made at that pace the first half of this year. That means most Nebraska wage earners can expect some significant refunds after they file their 1973 returns next year, because they will have been overpaying for six months.

Tax commissioner William E. Peters said he considered setting the withholding levels even lower than 13 per cent to help equalize the payments for the year.

He said, however, that could put some new entries in the job market at a disadvantage because they would have less than

necessary withheld and would owe the difference when they file their 1973 returns.

Peters said it was considered better to have most Nebraskans receive refunds than to force some to make large payments.

The question which went to the attorney general concerned language contained in LB 10 which had first appeared in LB 529, which fell to an Exon veto. That language ordered the State Board of Equalization to consider not only appropriations for the current fiscal year but also obligations the state incurs it will have to meet two years down the road.

Bill drafters said they wrote that provision into the amendments which became LB 10 (the bill originally dealt with Omaha school taxes) because the income tax reduction affected the same section of the statutes involved in LB 529.

They say they had to assume that LB 529 would pass because if they didn't and LB 10 was adopted later it would have had the effect of repealing LB 529.

Exon took the position that the obligation language in LB 10 wasn't valid since he had vetoed the same language in LB 529.

That was the issue which went to the State Justice Department for an opinion. The opinion, requested by Sen. Jerome Warner

of Waverly, wasn't completed early last week, but the Justice Department informed Exon and Peters that whatever the decision was on the LB 10-LB 529 conflict, it wouldn't affect the tax cut.

### Penal Reform Evaluated

An incident several days ago in Fremont has caused state officials to take another look at penal reform programs.

An inmate who had been considered a model prisoner and had been given privileges was involved in a shooting.

But Gov. Exon and warden Charles Wolff Jr. both said the incident shouldn't be allowed to derail progress in penal reform.

"We have instituted progressive penal reform policies and rehabilitation," the governor said, "and the results have been excellent until this inmate committed the crime last week. That's two years of many successes and now one tragic failure."

Exon said there would be a reevaluation of the programs. "Out of mistakes often times comes better awareness and results," he said.

The warden also plugged for continuation

of programs which include skill development for inmates, work release, community involvement plans and other "resocialization" efforts.

"The whole program," Wolff said, "must be judged on its merits, all the good it's done for so many, rather than on this one incident. Otherwise, we might just as well lock everybody up, throw away the key and warehouse human beings."

The State Building Commission has narrowed the field of architects seeking to design the new state office building to two firms.

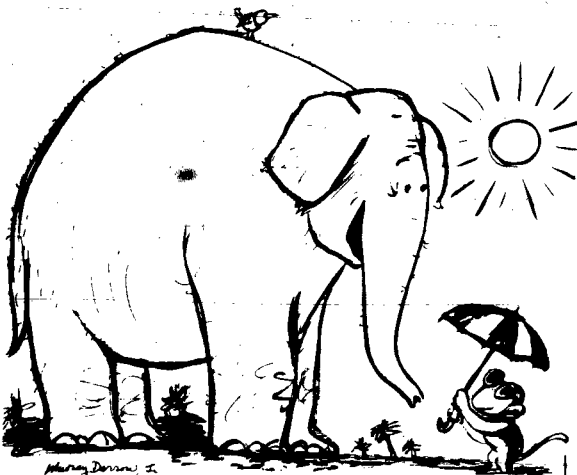
They are Davis Clark and Associates of Lincoln and Henningson, Durham & Richardson of Omaha.

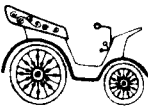
and to be considered worthy of replication and adoption by other school systems."

### Let's start conserving

We would like to see city officials in Wayne and surrounding communities take a bold step forward in ordering employees to conserve resources in as many ways as possible.

Conserving fuel, electricity, paper products and the like is really nothing more than simple economy, something which too many of us have forgotten about in these recent years of prosperity.

### 'Red Ball' worthwhile

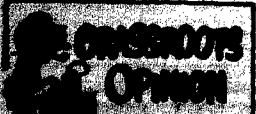
The Wayne County Jaycees deserve a word of thanks for their efforts in undertaking "Operation Red Ball," an effort with an aim of saving lives in case of fires.

## YOU AND YOUR CAR

If You're Pulling A Trailer Millions of Americans double their vacation pleasure by taking along all the comforts of home, including the kitchen sink. Trailer travel is comfortable, convenient, safe and economical if the car's towing capacity and the equipment needed for maximum safety and durability are properly matched.

You can go in either of two directions. Select the trailer, then find a car with the towing capacity to handle it, or pick the car first, then choose a trailer to fit the car's capabilities.

Car makers specify the maximum gross (loaded) trailer weight for each vehicle and the maximum permissible tongue load (the load exerted on the hitch by the trailer). A properly loaded trailer has a tongue load of about 10 per cent of its gross weight. In some cases the maximum allowable frontal area of the trailer is included, since wind resistance increases power requirements.

With a small car like a Chevrolet Vega, maximum trailer weight is 1,000 pounds. A Ford Maverick or other compact can haul a 2,000-pound trailer. A typical intermediate car, a Dodge Coronet, can handle a 4,000-pound trailer. Some large model cars can pull trailers up to 7,000 pounds. For your requirements, check with your car dealer.

All car makers offer factory-installed trailer towing packages. Components may differ, but usually include heavy-duty springs and shock absorbers, extra capacity radiator and engine cooling fan, heavy-duty automatic transmission with larger cooler, power brakes and steering, larger tires, extra capacity alternator and battery, and a higher ratio (lower speed) rear axle. Trailer hitch and wiring harness are usually packaged separately.

Auto manufacturers consider these items compulsory for any car hauling a trailer of over 1,000 pounds. Without this equipment, the car warranty may be void.

Car makers often recommend non-sensational options, such as a more powerful engine or a limited slip differential. Whatever route you take, making the right equipment will make vacation time more enjoyable and trouble free.

# 'Gas Situation Worrisome, Not Serious This Summer'

Among Wayne County residents who will be taking vacation trips by automobile this summer, there is a new concern — whether they will be able to get gasoline whenever they need it.

Are they liable to get stuck somewhere along the line? Should they cancel their plans?

The U. S. Department of Transportation says: "No, the situation is worrisome but not that serious."

The American Automobile Association agrees. It states that there may be a few localities where gas will be in such short supply that it will be doled out, but it will be obtainable.

Confronting the travelers also will be higher costs for just about everything they need. They will have to pay more for food, for lodging, for gas and oil and for tolls in some places.

The findings are based upon a general survey of vacation travel costs throughout the country, released by the AAA.

Its figures indicate that a Wayne County couple will be spending approximately \$52 a day this year, traveling on an average scale. That is about \$6 more than in 1971, when a similar survey was made.

Thus, a two-week trip will cost the local couple a minimum of \$728. This assumes that they

travel at the rate of 300 miles a day and get 13 miles to the gallon.

The \$52 daily budget includes \$18 for meals and snacks, \$19 for hotel and motel accommodations, \$10 for gas and oil and \$5 for tips and miscellaneous expenses.

The AAA report also answers, for Wayne County car owners, the all-important question of how much it is costing them per year to own and operate their cars.

The current average is now \$1,447 a year for a standard size car in the medium price range, equipped with automatic transmission, power steering and

power brakes, driven 10,000 miles annually.

The total includes fixed and variable costs. The fixed ones — for depreciation, insurance, license fees and such — add up to \$1,172, or \$3.21 per day, regardless of the amount the car is used.

The other costs are for gas, oil, tires and maintenance. For 10,000 mile operation they come

to \$475, or 4.75 cents a mile.

On this basis, Wayne County residents are spending some \$7,724,000 a year on the 4,690 cars in use locally.

**Bloat on Pasture**  
Poloxalene (Bloat-Guard is one of the trade names) added to grain and hand-fed each morning and evening will control bloat if each animal consumes his share of the poloxalene.

Self-feeding a grain — salt — poloxalene mixture also will be effective in controlling bloat if cattle can be encouraged to eat enough early in the morning and again in the evening.

Self-feeding molasses blocks containing poloxalene reduces risk of death loss to a rather low level when grazing alfalfa pasture. Some death losses do occur occasionally because the block is not consumed uniformly enough and there are times the rumen does not contain enough poloxalene to prevent foam formation.

Here are some other management practices that will be helpful in controlling bloat when grazing bloat-producing legumes:

1. Seed and manage pasture for no more than 50 per cent alfalfa forage.
2. Feed dry hay or mow strips and leave in the field for a source of dry roughage.
3. Provide grass pasture along with the legume pasture.
4. Feed grain or a grain

## Gardening Tips

**Why is grass dying?**  
Turfgrass could be dying for many reasons. A careful inspection and past history is required to determine the cause; however, some possibilities could be explored.

Insect damage, fungus disease, chemical or fertilizer burn, gasoline spill or dog injury are all possible reasons for the turfgrass to turn brown and die. A suggestion for control is not possible until the correct diagnosis is made by inspecting the area. Contact your county extension agent for help in diagnosing your problem.

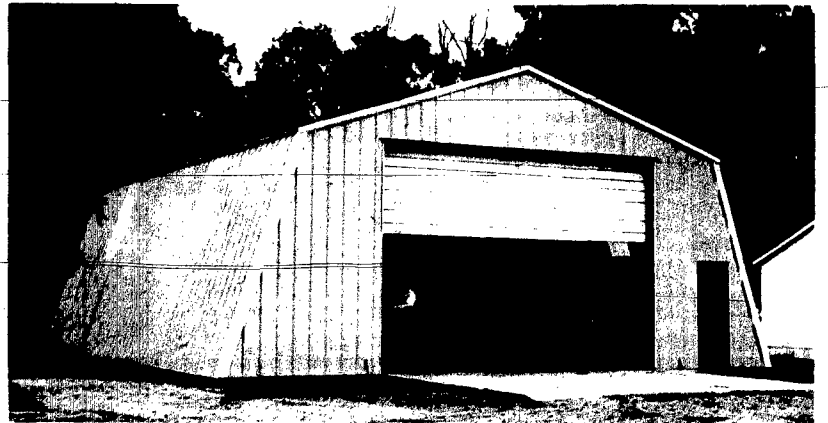

## Gardening Tips

Good survival of trees in Nebraska depends on doing everything about right. This includes planting quality trees, a proper job of planting, good land preparation, control of weeds and protection of the trees from livestock and rodents. Chances are if you let down on any one of these practices, your survival will drop from 90 per cent to 50 per cent and in some cases even more.

It will be next spring before you can again plant trees for a windbreak, a woodlot or a wildlife habitat. If the site in which you will be planting is sod, start preparing the ground in July. Thoroughly work the area to destroy the grass cover — work it the rest of the summer as needed to control weeds. This is a good system and necessary when trees are to be planted on sod land.

It is next to impossible to delay plowing the sod until spring and obtain satisfactory planting conditions for trees. Summer tilling also conserves the moisture which may be very important in getting the trees off to a good start next spring.

Use of a crossbow to take any species of fish or wildlife in Nebraska is illegal.



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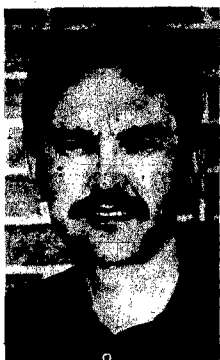
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# Kiwanians Relive 2-Gun Hart Era



MONTE MCLAWS

Two-Gun Hart lives again! At least he does in the memories and notes of Homecoming Kiwanians who lived in the Prohibition era.

Richard Joseph Hart — actually James Capone, brother of Al "Scarface" Capone — came alive Monday afternoon during the Wayne Kiwanis meeting.

Monte McLaws, who is conducting an oral history of Prohibition in Northeast Nebraska, regressed part of the history of the former Nebraska state deputy sheriff during the meeting.

The associate professor of history at Wayne State College explained that an oral history permits a person studying a certain period of time to talk with the people who actually lived during it, giving the history a grassroots flavor.

McLaws pointed out that the need for such local history is apparent. "Many people feel that they have to go abroad to find history or uncover some exciting facts," he said, "but there is plenty of history locally if you look for it."

Hart, he went on, earned a prominent name as a "stern" federal prohibition official, cracking down on illegal sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages on the Winnebago and Omaha Indian Reservations.

Even in South Dakota as he had a strong reputation as an officer who would track down his man, according to McLaws.

It wasn't until the mid-twenties that Hart became a bad word in the eyes of South Sioux City and Sioux City residents. About 1923 he was accused of manslaughter when he and another agent were tracking down what they thought were bootleggers.

Both men shot at an escaping

car and it was later discovered the driver had been shot in the head. Although evidence produced eight years later proved him innocent, McLaws said, Hart still carried the bad reputation with him.

The Wayne State professor, conducting the first oral history in Nebraska, has further sketchy stories of the Northeast Nebraska lawman but is hoping to have more information from at least 100 people.

"Right now I have talked to about 20 people," he noted, "but there's still plenty of information to uncover."

President-elect Harland Pankratz, substituting for Kiwanis president Bob Carhart, told the members that next Monday's meeting will feature Gordon Nuernberger of Wayne, state district director of the ASCS, who will address the group on agriculture.
