WS Offers New Degree

A master's degree major in school administration will be new in the Wayne State College curriculum this fall, President Lyle Seymour said Friday. The major's requirements include a Practicum in Administration, with students spending time either in an elementary or a secondary school selected by the college faculty. While administration majors can specialize in elementary or secondary, they will take a course called Fundamentals of Curriculum, K-12. This is designed to give a complete view of curriculum from kindergarten through high school, according to Dr. Lyle Skov, chairman of the Department of Education. Interested students can get further information from Dr. Skov or Dr. Ed Elliott, dean of special studies. The administration major receives, with some changes, a program Wayne State offered several years ago.

Allen Board Sets Budget Hearing

The Allen school board tentatively set its 1973-74 budget hearing for Aug. 13, said superintendent Gail Miller. Miller explained that board members will take a preliminary look at the budget about the end of July before the public hearing. As yet, he said, the budget has not been completed for the coming fiscal year. During its regular monthly meeting last week, the board voted to keep the free high tuition rate at its present level of \$1,700 per pupil. Also, the board accepted George Saunders' resignation as social science and German instructor at the high school. Board members agreed that the U.S. and Nebraska flags at the school should not be flown the remainder of the summer months after Miller told them the new flags were stolen on July 25. Cost of the flags was about \$25. In a letter from the Nebraska State Department of Education, Allen was notified that it would remain on the list of accredited schools for the upcoming school year, according to Miller.

Office Closing in Wayne Is 'Sad Time'

Mrs. Shirley Bergt admitted Thursday she was sad to see all the records and files being moved out of the office in the basement of the post office building in Wayne. She had reason to feel sad—it marked the official closing of the Wayne County Selective Service office and the end of Mrs. Bergt's service as executive secretary of the county board. The office records were loaded up and moved to Norfolk where they will be kept with records from Madison, Pierce, Stanton and Knox Counties in the new area office. On hand during the day were Mrs. Bergt, of Wayne, and board members Phil Olson of Carroll, George Farran of Winside and Mert Hilton of Wayne. Also present were Mrs. Rita Rehling of West Point, Mrs. Bergt's area supervisor, and Mrs. Marie Larson of Norfolk, who will be executive secretary of the area office. Closing of the Wayne County office is the result of the national reorganization of the Selective Service system which began last December. The end of the draft and cutback in funds has resulted in replacing the 93 county offices in Nebraska with 23 area offices. It marks the first time Wayne County's office has not been in operation since after World War II when the office closed for about a year and a half. Mrs. Bergt said she was not sure when the office opened, but she noted some classification records date back to 1929. Reorganization also means that the three-member draft board will no longer meet

NRD Board To Meet In Wayne

Board members of the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District will hold a regular meeting Thursday, June 26, in Wayne. The meeting is scheduled for 8 p.m. at the Birch Room in the Student Center at Wayne State College. Members will attend from across the district, which covers five full counties and parts of several others in a large area of Northeast Nebraska. The district covers an area roughly from Schuyler to Laurel and Norfolk to Fremont. Area members of the executive board are Verne Mills of Wayne and Werner Mann of rural Winside.

Students From Concord Get UN-L Degrees

Two students from Concord were among a record number of students who received baccalaureate and graduate degrees from the University of Nebraska Lincoln Friday at the close of the first summer session. They are James Erwin and Douglas Witte, both recipients of bachelor of science degrees in agriculture. About 500 students, more than a quarter of them graduate students, completed their work toward degrees at the end of the session. Several hundred more will graduate at the close of the second session on Aug. 17. Since only one formal commencement is held each year at UN-L, diplomas were distributed at the Administrative Building. All of the graduates have been invited to take part in the commencement ceremony in May.

Wayne Student Earns Honors At St. Paul

Susan Hepburn, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Charles M. Hepburn of Wayne, has been named to the Dean's List of the College of St. Catherine in St. Paul, Minn. The list honors students who achieved an outstanding academic record during the second semester of the 1972-73 school year. In order to be named to the list, a student must have earned a grade point average of at least 3.7 (B-plus).



Hoskins Man Faces Trial in District Court

A Hoskins man charged with sodomy has been bound over to Wayne County district court for trial. He is LeRoy Poessnecker, charged by county attorney Budd Bornhoff of Wayne following an incident which allegedly occurred July 5. Poessnecker is being held in Wayne County jail pending posting of \$5,000 bond set by associate county judge Luverna Hilton Wednesday. District court judge George W. Dittrock Wednesday appointed Wayne attorney Ken Olds to represent Poessnecker. Poessnecker waived preliminary hearing in county court Thursday and was bound over for trial on the felony charge.

Fattening Cattle On Pasture 'Looks Good'

Pasture fattening of cattle looks more favorable this year than in a long time, beef specialist Walt Tolman of the Northeast Station remarks. Green growing pasture will furnish all the protein needed with a grain feed this year he said. Pasture will replace more grain in a finishing ration than generous hay or silage feeding will. Last year Purdue University proved this with a saving of about 100 pounds gain. Also whole grain will not blow out of self feeder trough or feed bunks like ground feed and will "stand up" better in damp weather, Tolman commented. "Who Cares About Jamie?" is the title of the film shown by Dr. Stanley Reiss as part of his discussion on child management held recently at the Northeast Station near Concord. The film showed behavior problems of the young child and adult reactions to the problems. Dr. Reiss, director of children's services at the Norfolk Regional Center, stated, "Discipline is to teach, not to punish. Punishment does not teach the child what to do the next time

the same situation presents itself, nor does punishment prevent behavior problems from repeating themselves." 'Cool homes, green lawns major factors'

There is one business in Wayne which continues to operate at a record-setting pace this summer. It is the municipal power plant, which has been grinding out huge amounts of electricity to keep people cool and lawns green. Six times in the first 12 days in July the plant broke the previous record for electricity produced in a 24-hour period established late in June. And Wednesday last week was the biggest day, with the plant producing 112,100 kilowatt hours in 24 hours. That is 11,400 kwh more than was produced on June 24 when the last record was set. If production continues at such a high rate, the plant could produce three million kwh this month, a total never attained in any single month since the plant has been in existence, according to plant superintendent Norbert Brugger. The highest monthly production in the past was in December last year when 2,440,500 kwh were produced. In the first 12 days of this month, production totaled 1,206,000 kwh—nearly half of that produced during all of December. Another record set last Wednesday was peak load at the plant when the engines were grinding out 6,800 kilowatts at 5:20 in the afternoon. That is 200 KW more than was being produced when the old record was set last September. Kilowatts refer to the amount of electricity being produced at one point in time, much like miles per hour refer to the speed of a car. Kilowatt hours refer to the amount of electricity produced during a period of time, much like miles traveled by a car indicate the distance covered in an hour or day. It takes about one and a half horsepower to produce one kilowatt, Brugger explained. Reasons for the record-setting production at the plant this summer are not hard to come up with, according to Brugger. "People are keeping more air conditioners on for longer periods of time," he said, "and they are watering their lawns more." Although he is not sure how much electricity is being used to pump that water, he said it is a factor in plant production. If temperatures remain in the 90's and 100's and if there is no rain, plant production could well continue its record-setting ways, Brugger said.

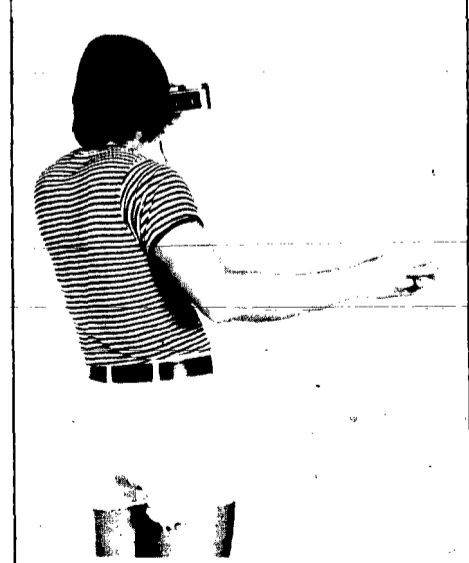
Fifteen Tour Wayne

Most Colleges to Participate in New Educational Grant Program

Most colleges and other post high school educational institutions in Nebraska, including Wayne State College, Northeast Nebraska Technical Community College and the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, will be participating in a new Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Program this year, says Ken Carlson, Wayne High School guidance counselor.

The student financial aid program, authorized by the federal government in 1972, allows for basic grants which are unaffected by existing sources of student financial aid.

Students should check with the school of his choice to discover how involved that particular school will be in the program if

it is not a two or four-year college, Carlson explains.

Unlike other Office of Educational Programs for student financial aid, the grant does not depend on availability of funds at any particular institution. Attendance costs at the student's choice of institutions will be considered, however, in computing the amount of the grant.

The maximum basic grant award under the program is \$1,400 less the amount the student and his family will be expected to contribute. The grant may not exceed half of the amount the student needs to pursue post secondary education and is dependent on the amount of funds appropriated by congress for the program (\$122.2 million for this year).

Students eligible for financial assistance through the program may expect between \$50 and \$400 for the 1973-74 school year, Carlson explained.

For the first year of operation, eligibility will be limited to full time students who will be enrolling as freshmen.

Anticipation forms can be obtained at Carlson's office, the WSC financial aid office and should also be available at other post secondary institutions, high schools, state employment offices and post offices.

The application form should be completed according to instructions which are provided in the application packet. It should be submitted to the Iowa City processing agency which will compute the amount the application will be returned within four weeks and can then be submitted to the institution of the applicant's choice.

The school will calculate the amount of the preliminary award and notify the applicant. Amount of the award will be disclosed at the time of enrollment and will be distributed by the institution.

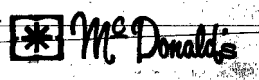
