as well as the characteristics of the occupants who move in and out over the years.

For the survey, a sample of 60,000 housing units out of the nation's total 68 million has been scientifically selected to represent a cross section of all housing. The sample was selected from 1970 census records and has been updated to include new construction.

The survey is expected to take about three months. Each household in the sample will be mailed an introductory letter prior to the interviewer's visit. For unoccupied units, information will be obtained from neighbors, landlords and rental agents.

All information obtained is kept confidential and the results are used only to compile statistical totals in which no household or housing unit can be identified.

Interviewers are locally hired and trained for their work. Each carries an official identification card with the bearer's photograph and signature.

## NU Students Start Tour This Week

Nineteen University of Nebraska agronomy students and three faculty members will be touring south central and south western Nebraska, Colorado and southern Wyoming during the annual Agronomy Club tour this week.

Club advisor Dr. Lowell Moser said the purpose of the trip is to show club members agronomic practices in the field and to expand learning much further than can be accomplished in the classroom.

Leaving Lincoln early today, the group's first stop will be at Homestead Monument at Beatrice. Another morning stop will be the Electrograter Center Pivot Factory in Deshler. The afternoon will be spent examining work being done in the University's South Central Station and the U.S. Meat Animal Research Center at Clay Center. Another stop will be made at a nearby farm to look over research being done there. The final stop of the day will be at the Tri County Irrigation Project at Holdrege.

The tour will make one last stop in Nebraska Tuesday, before entering Colorado. Computerized irrigation scheduling will be examined at Agricultural Technical Services in McCook. The afternoon will be spent in Denver visiting the U.S. Mint and a local amusement park.

Wednesday's schedule begins with a morning tour of the Coors Brewery in Golden, Colo. and a drive to Estes Park to visit the Montfort feedlot. The group will spend the night at Colorado State University in Ft. Collins.

The fourth day of the tour will be spent at Frontier Days in Cheyenne, Wyo. Before returning to Lincoln Friday, the group will examine work being done at the High Plains and Sandhills agricultural laboratories in Sidney and Tryon.

The NU students participating in this year's tour include Layne Mann of Wayne, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Mann, Ed George, Waco, Ramazan Kohistani, Afghanistan, and Marin Capizizu, Romania.

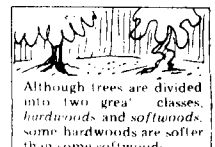
