Area Residents To Be Quizzed For Survey

A sample of households in the Wayne area will take part in a new nationwide survey of housing to be conducted annually by the Bureau of the Census, according to Walter A. Freeman, Jr., Director of the Bureau's Data Collection Center in Denver.

The 1973 survey, which begins this week, will initiate a tederal program, the annual housing survey, jointly planned by the Bureau and the Department of Housing and Urban Development. The program is in response to a need for Irrequent and up to date on U.S. housing, considered a prime indicator of the nation's economic health. Heretofore, housing data have come only from the decennial censuses, irregular sample surveys and one-time special studies. With regular spreys it will be possible to compare from year to year the number and types of housing, changes resulting from demolitions and new construction, vacancy rate, frequency of mechanical and utility breakdowns and other indicators of the physical condition of residential structures See Survey, page 5



A shortage of doctors exists in much of Cedar and Dixon Counties, and parts of Wayne County are considered "under served" by virtue of living more than a convenient driving distance from a doctor.

doctor

The shortage is the same, only less severe, than the shortage which exists over much of the Sandhills area, part of the extreme southwest corner of the state and in isolated spots around the state.

and in isolated spots around the state.

The study revealed that 80,000 persons in the state do not live a convenient distance from a physician.

According to the study, a good number of those persons live in this part of the state.

Although areas around Wayne, Wake field. Laurel and Hartington are served by doctors, almost all the rest of this corner of the state is inadequately served.

served.

The study was based on the assumption that one "physician is able to serve a population of 1,500.

population of 1,500.

When the new hospital is constructed in Wayne, this situation may change a little if new doctors and professional health people are affracted to the community. Also, the new hospital will in time be able to serve a greater area than is now being served by the municipal hospital.






