## Gas Company to Start Restricting Its Service

Keith Mosley, manager of Peoples Natural Gas Co. in Wayne, has announced that a revised gas connection policy will go into effect next month. The new policy, which also applies to Peoples' customers in Wakefield, Emerson, Jackson and Bancroft, provides that all new gas customers and all new gas-heating customers will be required to obtain a connection permit. Peoples also announced that it has no main new extensions or service to new subdivisions will be provided unless already agreed and committed to by the company.

## Livestock Man At NE Station Leaving Post

Phil Menke, livestock development specialist at the Northeast Station near Concord, has announced he will resign, effective April 1. Menke, who started at the station in 1972, said he, his wife and their two children, plan to farm near Covad. According to station director Cal Ward, the position will not be filled since funds to continue the position are due to expire next year. Ward explained the state and private livestock industries donated funds to establish the office for a three-year period beginning in 1972. As it looks now, he said, the funds will not be renewed. Before coming to the station, Menke, of Laurel, was the county agent for Hitchcock County from 1968 to 1972. In 1965 he earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Nebraska before getting his masters' in 1968 from the University of Wyoming.

## Voter Forms Sent Out

Voters in Wayne County who have moved from one precinct or ward to another should receive a short voter registration form in the mail this week. County clerk Norris Weible said he mailed the forms Saturday morning. He emphasized that although most of the people who have moved and will have to re-register to vote in the coming elections should receive the forms, there are possibly many people who will not receive them. Those people who do not know have moved and will consequently not receive the forms should call him at his office so they can be mailed the forms. Those people may also stop in at the clerk's office and fill out their forms. The forms are simple and take only a few minutes to complete, according to Weible. Those who do receive the forms in the mail should fill them out and return them to Weible as soon as possible. Voters incorrectly registered will not be able to participate in coming elections, Weible warned.

## Training for Farm Youths Is Planned

Youths 14 to 16 years of age are restricted from doing many jobs on farms other than their parent's farm under restrictions made by the Department of Labor, included in the restrictions is operation of a tractor of over 20 pto horsepower. However, with special training youths can receive exemption certificates which will exclude them from these restrictions, says Dixon County agricultural agent Ray Stohler. As part of the 4-H Youth Program, county agents in Dakota, Thurston, Cedar, Dixon and Wayne Counties in Nebraska will present a training program on March 9, 16 and 23, which will meet these requirements, Stohler said. The course will be given at the Northeast Station near Concord from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day. Those interested in receiving this training or needing more information should contact their local County Extension Agent. Prior registration is necessary. The \$4 registration fee is payable in advance. Boys and girls who will be 14 this summer are eligible to take the training. Those completing the sessions will have an opportunity to obtain the Nebraska tractor driver license as part of the training.

## Local Youths May Apply For 'Anytown'

Wayne High School sophomores and juniors are being given a chance to apply for the Anytown Program this summer. Anytown is a camp held near Louisville, bringing together students from all cultural, ethnic, racial, religious and economic backgrounds for a few days of informal sessions, discussion groups, recreation, workshops, panels, role playing and the like. Through the activities, the program directors hope to help young people better understand themselves and others. Cost of taking part in the program is \$50 per student, but sponsoring organizations such as churches may help with financing students, Carlson notes. Staff members at Anytown include teachers, businessmen, clergymen and other resource people. There will be one adult advisor and one college age counselor for every 10 students, Carlson explains.

The Helgren family awoke about 7 a.m. in the morning and could smell and see some smoke in their home four miles west and three miles north. The Wayne volunteer firemen who were called to the scene could find no fire. Cliff Pinkelman, fire chief, said he suspected that low voltage caused an electrical motor to get hot and create the smoke. No damage was done, he noted.

## Music Teacher at WS To Perform at Midland

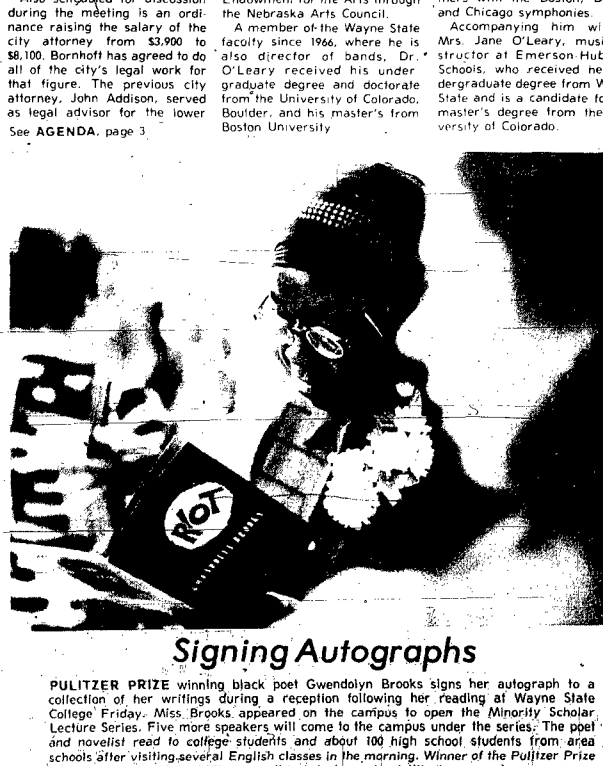

Top Seniors Can Apply for Scholarships

Wayne High School seniors in the top quarter of their class may apply to guidance counselor Ken Carlson for the Board of Trustees scholarships to Wayne State College next fall. Each scholarship is for full tuition and is renewable for each of the eight semesters up to satisfactory maintenance of college grades, he noted. Financial need is not a requirement for scholarship consideration, he said, but students must graduate from a Nebraska high school, live in the state, rank in the upper quarter of their graduating class, attain high performance on either the ACT or the SAT college entrance examination, and be recommended for the scholarship by at least one high school administrator or teacher. Data on Fuel, Efficiency Of Tractors Is Available

Farmers looking for a tractor make and model with peak fuel and operating efficiency to fit their particular situation can explore some alternatives by consulting the University of Nebraska tractor testing summary. An annual summary of all reports for a testing season is published in booklet form, with single copies free to Nebraska residents. The report for the 1973 testing season is now available, and orders should be sent to Department of Agricultural Communications at UNL. There were 37 tractors tested at NU in 1973, compared to the usual 25. Last season, the lab installed new computers and new electronic instrumentation in the test car. The 1973 total included 12 foreign-made tractors. About 20 tractors are scheduled for testing in 1974, according to L. F. Larsen, engineer-in-charge of the NU facility. 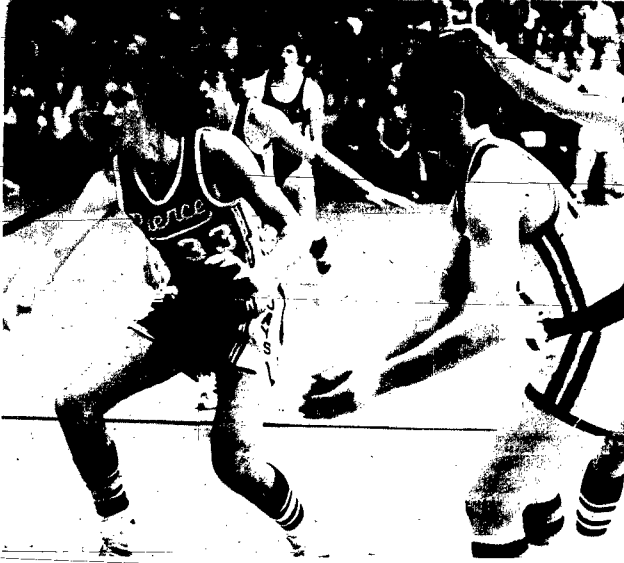

After both clubs made seven points in the third frame, Team 4 managed to cut another point off the lead with the help of Charlie Schnepf's seven points in the last frame.

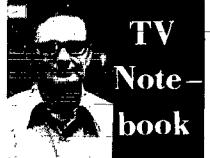

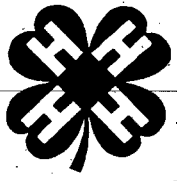
**FFA Judging Event Set for March 29**

# A closer look.

REMEMBER that guy former police chief Robert Evers whipped over to the side of the street, jerked out of his car and ushered over to the police station after getting foul-mouthed with him?

Well, he was part of a criminal investigation brought into town by Evers to help find out what kind of drug problem there is in the community. That's why he never went to court on charges stemming from speeding through town and carrying such interesting things as a revolver and marijuana.

He was to come into town and get arrested publicly by the police to get his foot in the door with the drug people. Evers said it was just coincidence that it actually worked out that Evers pulled him out of his car at Second and Main, frisked him and shoved him into the waiting police car for the trip to the police station for questioning. Evers said something like that had been planned, but the guy came into town without his knowing about it and just happened to get arrested about the same way Evers wanted it to happen in the first place. Coincidence, you might call it.

The newspaper got taken for a ride on that one for a few days before Evers told us the bad guy was really a good guy who just happened to get stopped in Wayne on his way through. After we found that out, we decided we didn't want to get blamed for blowing his cover, so we let the incident fade away without reporting anything further.

Later, however, we learned the whole thing was part of a setup. We had been taken advantage of just like the public. Since then, we've been wrestling with the problem of whether the whole thing should be explained. We think it should. The public can decide what it thinks about it.

ALLEN HIGH GRADUATE George Koester accomplished quite a few things before his death earlier this year.

He was working on planning the \$4.5-million expansion of the Art Building and the \$3.5 million expansion of the Humanities Building at San Diego State University, where he was executive dean. Those were just a couple more expansion projects he had taken under his wing while SDSU. He was responsible for planning the greatest expansion program in the school's history, school officials note.

Koester, 61 years old at his death, graduated from Midland College in Fremont and the University of Minnesota, where he received his doctorate in educational psychology. He was the brother of Allen residents Paul and Oscar Koester and Mrs. Percy Lockwood. Other brothers and sisters include Mrs. Martha Olson and Mrs. Dale Anderson of Wakefield, Mrs. Wallace Isom of Seattle and Herbert Koester of Caldwell, Idaho.

MIGHT REMIND you to save your used mercury batteries so they can be recycled in an attempt to help reduce mercury pollution.

The "button size" batteries, the ones that power hearing aids and other small devices, can be dropped off at either Mines, Jewelry or Dale's Jewelry in Wayne. Telephone Pioneers of America, a service club of long-time telephone employees, has organized the collection drive in Wayne and other area communities.

Mercury batteries are used mostly for hearing aids, but they also are used in such things as cameras, wrist watches and walkie talkies. More than 10 million are sold in this country each year.

MIGHT ALSO REMIND you to plan on attending the Wayne High fine arts festival tonight (Monday). The event, slated to start at 7:30 at the high school lecture hall, will include a short play by the school's drama buffs, a medley of several Beattle songs by the stage choir and a performance by the stage band. During intermissions, visitors will be able to browse through the art students' pottery and crafts display in the commons. Should be interesting.

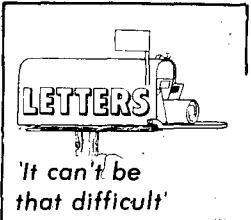
## Worth commending

Those two recent filings by young persons for elective positions on local governing boards should be good for the community of Wayne and the Wayne Carroll school district.

How do I know all these things? Simply because the communists have said so in their Manifesto and have done all of these things in the many countries they have taken over.

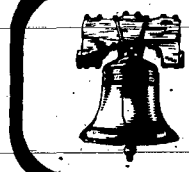
I know I want no part of such a life. I know there will be no Abraham Lincoln to free us. If we fall to communism:

Now is the time to arm for the greatest battle of our lives. Throw off your cloak of apathy and complacency and help save this nation so it can celebrate its 200th birthday!

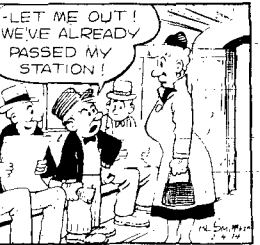

## Thone writes: 'Postal advertising wasteful, unnecessary'

By Congressman Charles Thone. Propriety of advertising by the U. S. Postal Service will be the subject of hearings soon in the House of Representatives. Dates of the hearings will be announced by the House Committee on Post Office and Civil Service. I have been seeking such hearings since September, 1973.

Wasteful and unnecessary advertising by the Postal Service is one of the reasons postage rates are scheduled to go up by excessive amounts on March 2nd. The rate for postcards will go up from six to eight cents, a 33 per cent increase; for first class letters from eight to 10 cents, a 25 per cent increase, and for airmail letters from 11 to 13 cents, an 18 per cent increase.

Publishers of newspapers, magazines and books will suffer rate increases on March 2nd and will be facing another round of rate increases on July 6th. Publishers are faced with scheduled increases every year for five years. Last

year, I was a co sponsor a bill that would have stretched these raises out over a 10-year period and would have required the Postal Rate Commission to take into account in setting rates the "educational, cultural, scientific and informational value to the recipient of mail materials." When this bill was killed on the House floor last summer, I felt that the United States was contradicting the nation's 200-year commitment to making educational materials readily available to all our citizens.

The March 2nd increases were scheduled originally by the Postal Service for January. The U. S. Cost of Living Council ordered the Postal Service to reduce them by 15 per cent. The Postal Service's means of compliance is by delaying the increases by two months and then putting them into effect by the amounts scheduled. This will probably result in a 15 per cent reduction in revenue for the Postal Service for the calendar year 1974, but it will result in those who use the mails being saddled with the excessive increases from March 2nd until eternity. The rate increases will be "temporary," subject to action months in the future by the Postal Rate Commission, which will probably make the rates permanent.

One object of the Congressional hearings on Postal Service advertising should be to determine just how much the agency is spending in this area. Hard answers are hard to come by from the Postal Service, and the advertising isn't even all under the control of the service's director of advertising.

Here, however, are some of the cost elements in Postal Service advertising. The principal advertising agency for the Postal Service will probably receive about \$1.9 million dollars for its services this fiscal year. This amount includes the purchase of advertising space or time. The Postal Service will spend about \$0.9 million this fiscal year on advertising various products and services in test markets.

In cities where sectional mail centers are located, the Postal Service is spending \$2.8 million dollars on newspaper advertising. One of these ads promotes direct mail advertising. If this ad is successful, it will result in an arm of the federal government influencing businesses to use one form of advertising over all the other forms.

The Postal Service will probably embark on a \$5.0 million per year advertising campaign concerning commemorative stamps and stamp collecting. The Postal Service claims this campaign will bring in five times as much revenue as it costs.

About \$0.7 million has been spent on a campaign to promote buying of stamps through the mail. The Postal Service claims this campaign is paying for itself. On campaigns to promote the use of zip codes and mailing early for Christmas time, the Service is spending \$1.0 million.

The Postal Service in the near future will probably solicit proposals for some new contracts in the advertising and market promotion areas.

Hopefully, the House hearings on Postal Service advertising and other matters will influence members of Congress. I hope a majority will conclude, as I have, that the cure for postal matters is to return the now independent Postal Service back to control by Congress.
