Local Councilmen Postpone Vote On Sunday Beer Sales

Wayne city councilmen are expected to vote later this month on whether to permit Sunday beer sales.

Tuesday night councilmen voted against going away with a required third reading of the ordinance which would permit taverns to sell beer on the Sabbath.

Voting against suspending the rules and taking a vote on the ordinance Tuesday night were Keith Mosley, Darrel Fuelberth, Ivan Beeks and Harvey Brasch. Vernon Russell, Jim Thomas and Ted Bahe voted in favor of suspending the rules so the subject could be put up to a vote then rather than waiting until the council's next meeting on May 14. Not present for the voting was councilman Pat Gross.

The ordinance, if passed, would permit taverns to sell beer seven days a week. They are now prohibited from opening on Sunday.

Waiting to vote on the ordinance until it has been read at three separate council meetings will permit councilmen to get a better idea of how the public feels about the proposal, according to mayor Kent Hall.

In other action, councilmen turned down by a 6-1 vote a proposal from a public engineer for doing a complete electrical rate study for the city and for studying how the city could best use power from Nebraska Public Power District now that the city's power lines are tied in with the NPPD's.

Gail, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arl Grone, talked on "Soybeans — An American Interest." She is a member of the Modern Misses 4-H Club.

Title of Michael's speech was "Hey — Watch Where You're Walking." He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Duane Rethwisch and a member of the Hi Raters 4-H Club.

Those two youths received purple ribbons in the judging. The other two senior division contestants, sisters Cindy and Lynette Gnirk, received blue ribbons. Cindy talked on "Depression in the Teen" and Lynette talked on "Cultivating Leadership." Parents of the two members of Kid Power 4-H Club, are Mr. and Mrs. Ed Gnirk of Hoskins.

Dr. Robert Johnson, speech instructor at Wayne State, judged both the senior division and junior division contestants.

That study would have cost the city \$4,500.

Russell, councilman from the first ward, objected to paying for a study until the city has had an opportunity to use NPPD power for a while.

"We just hooked into NPPD, and I would like to see what our problems are (before spending money on a study)," he said.

Thomas agreed in part with Russell, but he noted that a rate study is probably necessary since the city shouldn't be making a large amount of profit on its electrical rates. "But we shouldn't lose money (either)," he noted.

Thomas cast the lone vote in favor of authorizing a study, immediately rather than waiting several weeks or months.

In other action, the council heard objections from Mrs. C. F. Maynard, 802 Douglas, about being ordered to install sidewalks on her property. She said it was discriminatory to order her to put in sidewalks without ordering others in that area of the town to do the same. Council took no action on her objections.

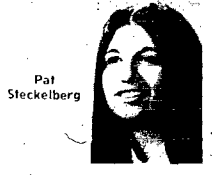
Learned from Miron Jenness that the First United Methodist fellowship hall is available as a third ward polling place, for the general election if the council decides to change the polling place from the present courthouse. He said Villa Wayne is available in the first ward in place of the present city library. Jenness had asked the council previously to change the polling places for the primary election because of difficulties for elderly and handicapped to climb steps at the present polling sites. The city attorney told the council it was too late to change the sites for the primary but that they could be changed for the general election.

Approved granting a razing permit to Henry Warrelman for tearing down a house at 108 S. Lincoln. A \$250 bond will have to be posted by Warrelman.

Tabled action on a proposal from a Columbus firm which would have resulted in construction of a temporary lagoon near the city's industrial park east of town. Councilmen decided to wait to see what other developments take place in that part of the city before doing anything further with the city's sewage system.

Authorized city administrator Fred Brink to obtain preliminary plans and specifications for extension of water lines in the industrial site. Voting against giving him that authorization were Russell, Fuelberth and Mosley.

Selection, Use Of Appliances Study Subject

How to select, use and maintain modern household appliances will be the topic of a weekend workshop Friday evening through Sunday afternoon at Wayne State College in the applied arts building.

Mrs. Eena Adams of the WSC home economics faculty will direct the course, assisted by two women. One is Pat Steckelberg of Norfolk, home service advisor for the Nebraska Public Power District, who will talk about lighting at the 10 a.m. session Sunday. She graduated from the University of Nebraska at Omaha in 1972 with a degree in interior design.

The other visiting speaker is Lynn Raasch, staff home economist for the Maytag appliance firm at Newton, Ia., who will talk Friday evening from 7 to 9 on the subject of laundry equipment, dishwashers and detergents.

The workshop is intended especially for home economics teachers, but open to others interested. For those wanting to earn two hours credit, the class requires an outside project and tuition of \$31.

Condition of Injured Worker Is Unchanged

An electrical lineman for the city of Wayne injured a week ago when he came into contact with a 7,400 volt line remained in fair condition at a Sioux City hospital Wednesday morning.

George Henderson, 49, was seriously burned on his right shoulder and both thighs when he came into contact with the line while working near the National Guard Armory about noon last Thursday.

Henderson, an employee of the city's electrical department since the fall of 1969, was taken to the Wayne Hospital and then transferred to St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Sioux City.

He and two other electrical department employees, Al Grashorn and Don Nelsius, were working on the line in preparation to boosting its voltage so it can serve the industrial site east of the city limits.

A Wayne woman, Mrs. Vern Jacobmeier, has been named to the board of directors of the Prairie Hills Girl Scout Council.

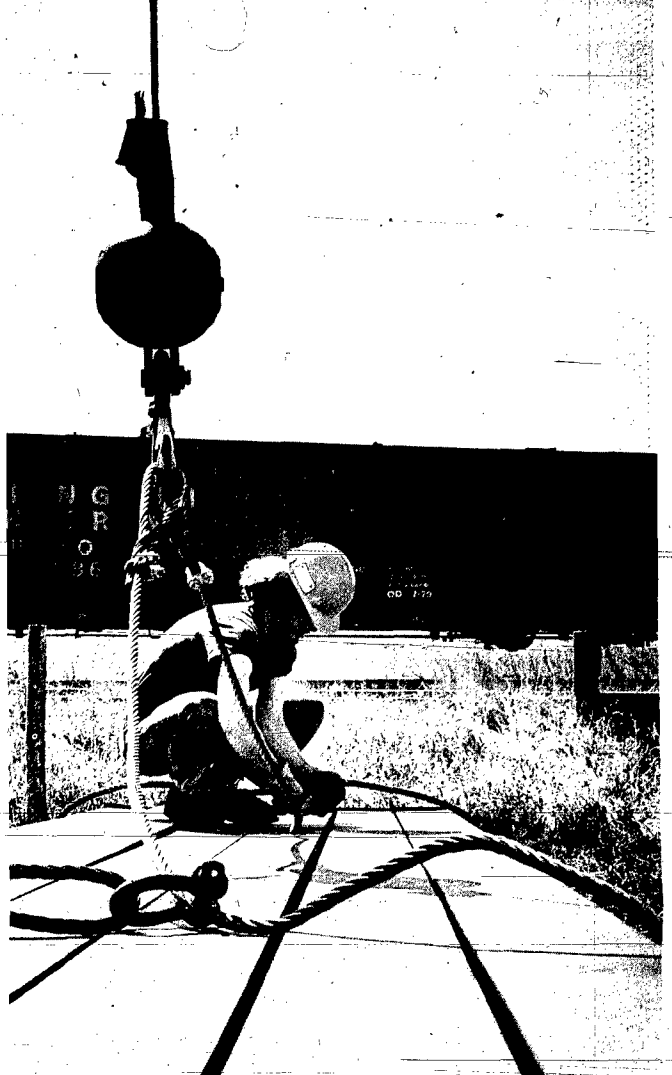
Mrs. Jacobmeier was elected along with other board members and new officers during the business session of the group's annual meeting last week at Laurel.

Herald Named 1st in Use of Photographs

The Wayne Herald has won first place for best use of photographs by weekly newspapers in Nebraska in a contest sponsored by the Nebraska Press Photographers Association.

The newspaper was cited in a contest judged by Morris Bernan, president of the National Press Photographers Association and a photographer for the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette; John Edgecombe, editor of the Geneva Signal, and Fran Zablouin, Lincoln photographer.

Earning second place in the contest was The West Point Democrat. The Crawford Tribune came in third.

The Herald entered several photographs and photo displays in the contest, including full-page displays of last spring's Scout O-Rama at Wakefield and last summer's steam threshing show near Allen as well as a photo display of a young child at Winside getting his first taste of wrestling.

The award recognizes the quality of the newspaper's photographs, their use and display in the newspaper, and the quality of reproduction.

The honor comes on the heels of the newspaper's winning three first place awards in the state press association's annual contests — for best front page, best personal column and general excellence — and one of two awards given away annually by the Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben — for service to the community by a weekly newspaper. The Herald also won second place for best advertising idea in the press association's contests.

Exon: Carpenter Lacks Rudder... Whelan's My Choice

Gov. J. J. Exon pulled few punches in criticizing state senator Terry Carpenter and his bid for the Democratic nomination for lieutenant governor during Exon's campaign stop in Wayne Monday.

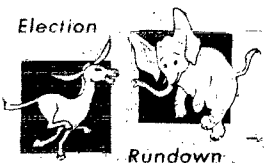
"Terry Carpenter has done some good in the state of Nebraska, but he doesn't have any rudder," answered Exon in reply to a question about whether he could work well with Carpenter if the senator defeats Exon's choice for his running mate as lieutenant governor, Gerald Whelan of Hastings, in the May 14th primary election.

"I think chaos would reign if Carpenter gets the nomination and wins in the fall with Exon) anytime the governor had to leave the state," noted Exon.

The governor said he could work with either of the other two Democratic candidates for the lieutenant governor's post — state senators Jules Burbach of Crofton and Frank Lewis of Bellevue — but he said he could "see no way" he and Carpenter could function together.

Carpenter, said Exon, is an "old-school politician" who thinks that "if you say something here and something else over there, it won't catch up with you." The voters are starting to realize that, he noted.

Exon's criticism of Carpenter came in a talk to approximately 100 people at the



El Toro Monday afternoon, one of his last before a tour of the business district and a talk Monday night at the annual Kiwanis scholarship banquet at Wayne State College.

Present for part of that talk was Whelan, who Exon described as being somebody who could be a strong right arm to the man who runs "the biggest business in Nebraska."

"He (Whelan) would not only be an aide and an advisor, but he would take and active part in government," said Exon.

Exon also said:

"During the next 10 years the axis of the world will be greased with food, not with oil — as in past years — I can see nothing but the brightest prospects" for the state, which can play a major role in meeting this nation's "responsibility to produce food" for starving countries.

This another in a series of articles on major political candidates who visit the Wayne area during their campaign. Comments made by the candidates should prove helpful when voters go to the polls on May 14.

Agriculture "will be the name of the game" in coming years and Nebraska would be able to play a major role as a food-producing state.

"The school aid bill (passed by the last legislature over Exon's veto) is a tax increase bill and not a school aid bill." The bill may result in smaller taxes for some property owners, but it will result in higher taxes for the "little guy."

"If we continue the bankruptcy of the cattle industry, we're going to kill off all the small producers." The federal government has people in agricultural positions who don't know what is best for the small farmers in the Midwest.

"Taxes can be kept from rising without sacrificing services to the people "if you (don't) give everybody all the money they want to spend." The state has come a long way in the past three and a half years without tax increases, but state income taxes are going up 40 per cent and sales taxes are going up about 40 per cent the first of the year regardless of Exon's opposition.

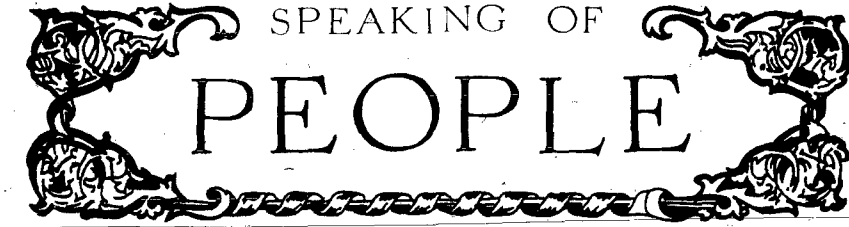

SNAPPY TOMATO BALLS

- 1 pound finely ground beef
- 1/2 cup fine bread crumbs
- 1 minced medium onion
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 cup tomato juice
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 5 tablespoons butter
- 1/2 cup catsup
- 2 tablespoons chives
- Parsley sprigs

In a large bowl combine beef, crumbs, onion, tomato juice, salt, garlic, salt and pepper. Using a teaspoon, shape mixture into balls in a large frying pan cook balls in butter until brown. Remove balls. Set in flour, tomato sauce and chives. Heat cook down for 3 minutes. Return balls to pan. Cook 20 to 25 minutes. Serve immediately in a bowl covered with pan sauce. Serve with toothpicks, garnish with parsley. Yields 20 to 25 appetizers.

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Wausa Clips Winside Girls For L-C Conference Title

Winside High girls were squeezed out of first place in the Lewis and Clark Conference track meet Monday.

The Wildkittens, scoring 64 1/2 points, fell four points short of beating Wausa for the title during the second annual event at Wausa.

Couch Jim Winch's girls picked up one first-place finish, but Wausa flexed its power in both relays and 80-yard hurdles.

Wausa was favored to win the meet. Winch said because of its depth. "But I'm not disappointed at all in our girls placing second," he added.

Sophomore Sheryl Petersen of Winside had a pair of fifths and a fourth. She took fourth in the 50-yard dash and fifth in the long jump, tying Allen's Lori Erwin and 100-yard dash.

Next in line for Winside was sophomore Patty Mann, third in the 880 and fourth in the 440.

Allen's JoAnne Roberts paced her club with two seconds 220 and long jump — and a fourth in the 100.

Four of the conference's five individual favorites lived up to expectations. Besides Stenwall's first in the discus, Rose Clayton of Osmond captured the 50 while Natalie Zerbe of Newcastle took the 220 and Diane Pearson of Homer finished first in the long jump and 100-yard dash.

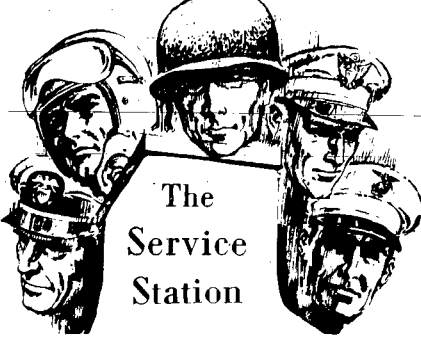

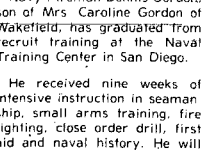

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'Supplies of Soybeans Up,' Official Says

Soybean supplies in the nation may be up one-tenth for the 1974-75 marketing season, according to Ray Butts, executive director of the Wayne County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

The increase is due to bigger beginning stocks, Butts said. "USDA's Economic Research Service reports that the 1973 crop could hit 1.54 billion bushels, versus 1.57 bushels last year. Add to this the 240 million bushels likely to be carried over this August and total supplies could reach almost 1.8 billion bushels," Butts stated.

Reports also indicate that soybean exports, which this year are expected to increase to 525 million bushels, will go even higher in 1974-75, reaching \$75 million bushels. "Domestic use will be up, too," he said. Overall soybean use next season could rise to about 1.5 billion bushels, leaving a carryover in August 1975 of about 300 million bushels.

"Soybean farm prices aver aged \$5.75 per bushel during September-March, compared with \$4.19 for this same period last year," Butts said.

Soybean oil prices reached an alltime peak of 36.5 cents per pound in February, but declined to about 30 cents in March and have continued to fall in early April. Butts reported.

He added that soybean meal prices in March averaged around \$149 per ton, down sharply from the \$412 of last June and the lowest since November 1972. Meal prices have declined further in early April. The decline reflects increased soybean meal production and a more ample supply in relation to demand, Butts said.

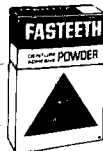

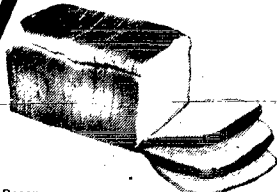

Constitution change would hike senator's salary to \$8,100

CAPITOL NEWS

LINCOLN — There will be a pair of constitutional amendments along with all those potential nominees on the primary election ballot May 14.

One asks the voters to increase legislative salaries and the other asks that the lieutenant governor be relieved of his duty as presiding officer of the Legislature.

The lawmakers haven't had a salary increase since the voters in 1968 agreed to double the pay — from \$200 to \$400 per month. Now, the state senators are asking for \$675 monthly, which would mean an annual raise from \$4,800 to \$8,100.

With annual sessions and interim studies taking up a lot of between-sessions time, lawmakers contend legislative service is a financial drain.

Under the state constitution, senators don't get any expense money for time they spend in Lincoln during

sessions. Most of those who don't come from Lincoln or somewhere in commuting range find it necessary to rent hotel rooms or apartments for four or five months every year they are doing business in the Capitol.

The Constitution permits expenses

Senator's pay: \$4,800 plus expenses for one round trip each session

for a round trip — once — each session. That means the state picks up the tab when the lawmakers come to town and when they go home. Any trips in between and all expenses in Lincoln are paid out of the senatorial pockets.

It's difficult to make improvements on the salary because the dollar amount is written into the Constitution and it takes a formal amendment to make an adjustment.

In 1972, there were two amendments on the ballot to change the system and the voters rejected them both. One would have allowed the Legislature to set its own salary level (it sets those for every other state employee). The other would have permitted per diem payments for work done between sessions.

So, this election the senators decided to go the old route and ask for a specific raise. Although some of them wanted to make a significant increase — say, to \$12,000 or more — the consensus was that \$8,100 was about as much as could be expected to get voter approval.

The other primary election amendment would take the presiding offi-

cer's gavel away from the lieutenant governor, who has held it since the state began having legislative sessions. (The vice president is the presiding officer of the U. S. Senate as well.)

In 1970, Nebraska voters approved a new system of electing lieutenant governors. Instead of having them run separately, the nominees chosen in the primary elections would join the nominees for governor and run in the general election as a joint ticket. One "X" would elect the pair.

On that same 1970 ballot, there was a proposal to let the lieutenant governor operate as a genuine assistant to his chief. He could serve on boards or commissions in the governor's place, for example.

That amendment was adopted, but the voters rejected the third part of the governor lieutenant governor amendment package. That was the

one which repealed the assignment of the lieutenant governor as the presiding officer of the Legislature.

This is a second try for that change. There are three amendments due for voter consideration in the November general election.

One would permit students to sit on the University of Nebraska Board of Regents. Under the provisions of the amendment, the presidents of the student bodies at the Lincoln, Omaha and Medical Center campuses would serve as non-voting regents.

The board now is composed of eight elected regents.

Also on the fall ballot are proposals to change the starting date of the legislative sessions and to scratch what the legislators say is obsolete wording from the constitution.

The lawmakers now are required constitutionally to convene on the first Tuesday in January, which is okay

most of the time. But 1974 was one of those years when the first Tuesday was also the first day of January — New Year's Day.

That meant the session — one of the 60 days allotted — lasted 11 minutes. The senators formally convened and then scampered for television sets and the Texas-Nebraska football game.

The proposed amendment would change the starting date to the first Wednesday after the first Monday in January and that can't ever be New Year's Day.

The other amendment facing voters in November would remove present constitutional language specifying that all "orders, resolutions and votes" be transmitted to the governor.

The senators say that's a leftover from the early days and doesn't have any meaning any more. Still, the only way to change the Constitution is to ask the voters.

In a further attempt to better inform the public about the candidates who have opposition — two county officials, school board hopefuls, city council and mayor candidates — this newspaper is offering to let those people speak out on issues they think the voters should be aware of when they go to the voting booth the middle of May. All 27 of those candidates have been sent letters asking them to

comment on things they consider important. Those comments will be run in coming issues of the newspaper at no charge to the candidates.

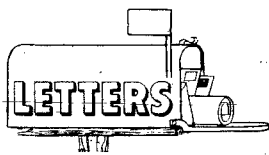
We had at first considered sending out lists of questions tailored to the positions the candidates are seeking on the county, school and city level. We decided against that and in favor of giving candidates a free hand in discussing things which they consider important.

We're not sure how many of the candidates will take advantage of our offer. We hope all of them make use of it, but if they don't, the newspaper will have played its public service role in trying to better inform the voters about what the candidates stand for.

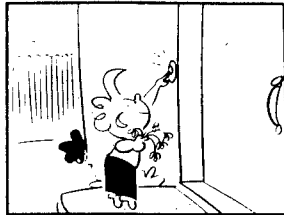
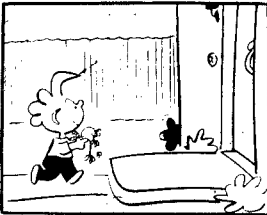

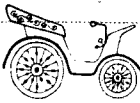

Milkweed
Common milkweed can be a problem in cropland. One method of control is rotating an infested field to alfalfa. Alfalfa competes with it and the frequent cutting eventually depletes root food, reserve of the milkweed.

Several different chemicals can be used for control. Pre-emergence applications of atrazine, Lasso plus atrazine, Ramrod plus atrazine and preplant applications of Sutan plus atrazine satisfactorily control common milkweed seedlings in corn.

You can control established stands of common milkweed on non-cropland with amitrole when plants are in the late bud

to early flowering stage.

Weeds in Strawberries
Mulches of straw or black plastic can help with the weed battle. Plastic works best when the strawberries are maintained as bushes in rows. Pinch off runners to develop large healthy bushes.

Dacthal does a good job of controlling annual grass weeds in strawberries. It can be used on established beds or new plantings. Make certain it is used before weed seed germinates. Use one ounce of Dacthal 75 W per 250 square feet. This would be 4 1/2 level tablespoons of Dacthal 75 W Mix with a half gallon to one gallon of water and apply to the 250 square feet.

Garden Weed Control

As mentioned above, chemicals can be used in weed control. But weeds near nut and fruit trees, vines, bushes and strawberry plants can be controlled with mulch.

Compost, leaves, grass, well rotted barnyard manure, straw, hay, bark and similar organic materials will control weeds.

Mulch is inexpensive, improves the soil and conserves moisture. But watch out for rodent damage to plants. Mulches often become a nesting or feeding site for mice and moles. Damage can be avoided by keeping the mulch at least a foot away from the trunk or base of the trees, bushes or vines.

Decomposed mulch materials should be applied two inches thick, while more bulky materials should be four inches thick. A combination of old leaves on the bottom with freshly mowed grass or sawdust on top helps keep leaves in place.



Important Items Curtains and draperies are important items in the furnishings of a home.

Besides controlling privacy, light and heat, they soak up noise in proportion to the area they cover, thickness of the fabric and depth of the folds.

White they take quite a "bite" out of the furnishings budget, they also cover the bareness of rooms, making them seem more comfortable even though they may not be completely furnished otherwise.

When structural changes cannot be made in a room, curtains or draperies can come to the rescue. They can conceal architectural eyesores. Small rooms look larger if curtains and draperies blend with the walls; low rooms look higher if the draperies reach from the ceiling to the floor.

A gloomy room can be made cheerful if gay color or spirited patterns are used near windows. Walls chopped up with windows or logs can be unified by generous draperies and under draperies and glass curtains.

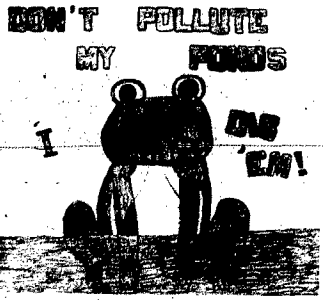

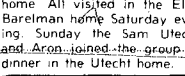

Mother Seeking \$1 Million Plus For Son's Death

A Sioux City woman recently filed a \$1 million plus lawsuit in Dixon County against the state and a private contractor in connection with the death of her son in July last year.

Filing the suit was Mrs. Vera Brown, whose son, Steven Lee, 21, died in an accident on Highway 20 three miles north and three miles west of Allen.

Mrs. Brown is asking for \$1,004,566, the amount denied by the Nebraska Claims Board after she filed a claim citing negligence as the cause of her

Son's death. She is seeking \$1 million for the "life worth" of her son and the rest for medical and funeral expenses and damage to the car.

Named as defendants along with the state was Norfolk Bridge and Construction Co., which was working on Highway 20 at the time of the accident.

Mrs. Brown contends there wasn't sufficient warning signs posted for the highway construction project.

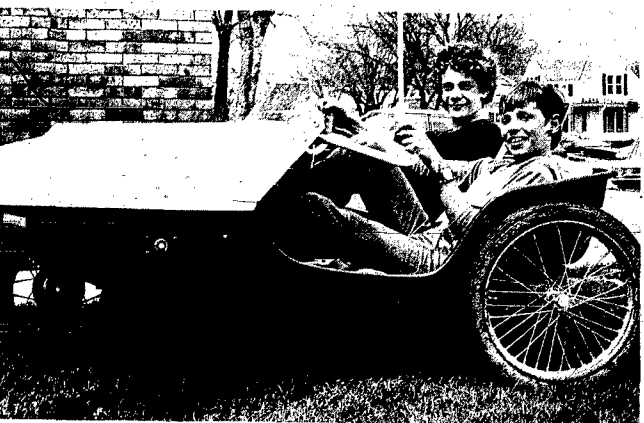
Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

Section 1. That at the primary election in May, 1974, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval the following amendment to Article III, section 7, of the Constitution of Nebraska, which is hereby proposed by the Legislature:

TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

Section 1. That at the primary election in May, 1974, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval the following amendment to Article III, section 7, of the Constitution of Nebraska, which is hereby proposed by the Legislature:

IT'S NOT QUITE like riding down the road in your merry Oldsmobile, but those People Powered Vehicles — PPV's for the uninitiated — can be a ball, according to some of the young people who have been renting them for a few spins around the block. Danny Ahlvers, left, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chuck Ahlvers and Mike Niemann, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Niemann, Jr., were giving the unique machines a test Saturday afternoon, and finding out that the machines are a lot of fun. Wortman Auto Co. got two of the PPV's in last week, one of them complete with a canopy, and is now in the business of renting or selling them. A Michigan firm produces the muscle-powered machines, which sell for about \$450. Two people can get the little car going as fast as 30 mph — if they work hard.

Sec. 7. At the general election to be held in November, 1974, one half the members of the Legislature or as nearly there to as may be practicable, shall be elected for a term of four years, and the remainder for a term of two years, and thereafter all members shall be elected for a term of four years, with the manner of such election to be determined by the Legislature. Provided, that when the Legislature is reconstituted the members elected prior to the redistricting shall continue in office, and the law providing for such redistricting shall where necessary specify the newly established district which they shall represent for the balance of their term. Each member shall be nominated and elected in a nonpartisan manner and without an indication on the ballot that he is affiliated with or represents any political party or organization. Each member of the Legislature shall receive a salary of not to exceed six hundred seventy-five dollars per month during the term of his office. In addition to his salary, each member shall receive an amount equal to his actual expenses in traveling by the most usual route once to and returning from each

regular or special session of the Legislature. Members of the Legislature shall receive no pay not perquisites other than said salary and expenses, and employees of the Legislature shall receive no compensation other than their salary or per diem.

Proposed Amendment No. 2

A vote FOR this proposal will remove the Lieutenant Governor as the presiding officer of the Legislature, and provide that the Legislature shall choose, in addition to the Speaker, such other presiding officer as it will determine in lieu of the Lieutenant Governor.

A vote AGAINST this proposal will retain the Lieutenant Governor as the presiding officer of the Legislature.

"Constitutional amendment to remove the Lieutenant Governor as presiding officer of the Legislature and remove his right to vote in case of ties therein; and to provide for presiding officers.

Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

Section 1. That at the primary election in May, 1974, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval the following amendment to Article III, sections 10 and 14, of the Constitution of Nebraska, which is hereby proposed by the Legislature:

Sec. 10. Beginning with the year 1971, regular sessions of the Legislature shall be held annually, commencing at 12:00 o'clock (noon) on the first Tuesday in January of each year. The duration of regular sessions held shall not exceed ninety legislative days in odd-numbered years unless extended by a vote of four-fifths of all members elected to the Legislature, and shall not exceed sixty legislative days in even-numbered years unless extended by a vote of four-fifths of all members elected to the Legislature. Bills and resolutions under consideration by the Legislature upon adjournment of a regular session held in an odd-numbered year may be considered at the next regular session, as if there had been no such adjournment. A majority of the members elected to the Legislature shall constitute a quorum; the Legislature shall determine the rules of its proceedings.

ings and be the judge of the election, returns, and qualifications of its members, shall choose its own officers, including a Speaker and such other presiding officer as it may determine. No member shall be expelled except by a vote of two-thirds of all members elected to the Legislature, and no member shall be twice expelled for the same offense. The Legislature may punish by imprisonment any person not a member thereof who shall be guilty of disrespect to the Legislature by disorderly or contemptuous behavior in its presence, but no such imprisonment shall extend beyond twenty-four hours at one time, unless the person shall be guilty of disorderly or contemptuous behavior.

Sec. 14. Every bill and resolution shall be read by title when introduced, and a printed copy thereof provided for the use of each member and no bill or amendment thereto shall be printed and read at large before the vote is taken upon its final passage. No such vote upon the final passage of any bill shall be taken, however, until five legislative days after its introduction nor until it has been on file for final reading and passage for at least one legislative day. No bill shall contain more than one subject, and the same shall be clearly expressed in the title. And no law shall be amended unless the new act contain the section or sections as amended and the section or sections so amended shall be repealed. The Speaker or other designated presiding officer shall sign, in the presence of the Legislature while the same is in session and capable of transacting business, all bills and resolutions passed by the Legislature.
