Sievers Keep On Winning

Sue Sievers continued on Friday her family's tradition of making its mark each time 4-H beef were pitted against each other in the Wayne County Fair.

Daughter of LeRoy Sievers of rural Wakefield, she showed both the overall champion and overall reserve champion market steer in this year's contest. A year ago she showed the reserve champion market steer, coming in just behind her sister, Jacquelyn.

Sue's two market steers earled in the day were named champion and reserve champion steers in the crossbred class.

Huck Jager, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wall Jager of rural Wayne, showed the champion overall market heifer, placing just ahead of reserve champion Cindy Jorgensen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Jorgensen of rural Pender.

Showing the champion market beef club group of five was the Coon Creek 4-H Club. The Hoskins Hustlers showed the group of five named reserve champion.

Taking top honors in showmanship were Sue Sievers, champion senior showman, and Brad Brummels, reserve champion Brummels is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Brummels of Hoskins.

Those two youths were the only ones to receive purple ribbons in showmanship, for no junior showman received a top ribbon.

Friday's show was held in the new steel show ring constructed in recent weeks at the fair grounds. The show ring also was the site of Thursday night's dairy show.

Main attraction of the first two days of the fair — at least if attendance is used as a guide — was the free barbecue Friday night. Approximately 5,000 persons were served during the free feed.

Also Friday night, several officers and board members of the Wayne County Fair and Agricultural Association were honored for their nearly two centuries of service in the association. The men were given special plaques, presented by state agricultural director Glenn Kruetscher, and were commis-

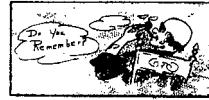

Cattle Truck Tips Over Near Carroll

A Carroll man and a Beiden man escaped serious injury when a truck loaded with cattle tipped over on a county road about three miles northwest of Beiden during a rain storm Wednesday afternoon.

Don Nettleton, the driver, said he was hauling 37 cows and calves when the weight in the trailer shifted as he turned a corner. A passenger, Ed Sauser, was not hurt, but Nettleton suffered bumps and bruises.

None of the livestock was injured, Nettleton said. However, the tractor-trailer truck belonging to Kavanaugh Feed and Trucking of Carroll sustained extensive damage.

Feeders Queen To Be Named At County Fair

Named during the final night of the Dixon County Fair will be a queen to represent the Northeast Nebraska Livestock Feeders Association.

The queen, to be named Aug. 21, will be a candidate at the state association's annual convention to be held in Norfolk on Dec. 3.

To be eligible, a candidate must be at least a senior in high school but not over 21 years of age. She must be a daughter of a bonified livestock feeder who is currently a member of the Northeast Nebraska association.

Contestants will be judged on their beauty, neatness, personality, poise and awareness of the red meat industry. Also, the candidates must be able to meet the public easily.

Contest preliminaries will be held in the afternoon on Aug. 21, with the selection being announced following the annual livestock parade that evening.

Deadline for entries is Aug. 15. Girls interested in entering the contest may obtain additional information from Leon Bruns at Pender.

AH Budget Up \$69,000 Over '73-74

The 1974-75 budget for Allen consolidated schools is expected to increase about \$69,000 over last year's budget of \$390,232.91, superintendent Gail Miller said last week.

The main reason for the increase is the federal grant of \$35,000 for implementing career education this year, he said. "While the money for this project will not come from local property taxes, it does have to be counted in our budget," Miller noted.

Ninety per cent of the remaining increase in the budget reflects salary increases, he said.

Although Allen will have a considerable increase in its overall budget, Miller expects only a slight change in the mill levy. He explained that increases in federal funds, valuation of the district and free high tuition are the main factors for a small levy increase.

The exact mill levy will not be known until the Dixon County board of supervisors sets the levy sometime in September or October, Miller said. Currently, property owners living in Allen pay 45.44 mills while those in the surrounding area pay 42.24 mills, he explained.

On Aug. 12 the board will hold its budget hearing prior to the regular monthly meeting at 7:30 p.m. in the high school. During the meeting, members also will decide the salary for Mrs. Diane Kludver, who was hired recently as secretary-bookkeeper for the career education program.

Pre-Fair Events Set At Concord

The Dixon County 4-H dress revue and clothing judging will be held at the Northeast Station, east of Concord, on Aug. 14, starting at 8:30 a.m., reports county agent Roy Stoher.

All sewing and knitting exhibits are to be brought that day, with special occasion and sleeping and lounging clothing being judged first.

The 4-H demonstration contest will be held in the afternoon and evening at the Northeast Station on Aug. 12, starting at 1:30 and 7:30 p.m.

The 4-H song contest and music identification contest will be held at the Northeast Station on Aug. 15. The music identification contest will start at 7:15 p.m., followed by the song contest.

The bicycle rodeo will be held at the Concord park on Aug. 15, starting at 9 a.m.

The fair begins with the annual vesper services in front of the grandstand at Concord on Sunday, Aug. 18.

Activities continue through Wednesday night, with the free barbecue slated to begin at 5:30 on Monday afternoon.



Dixon Board Gives Okay To Additions

The Dixon town board has approved building a village clerk's office and new rest room facilities onto the present village auditorium. Action came during a special board meeting Thursday night.

Cost of the project will be about \$2,500, according to village chairman John Young, with the entire cost to be paid with federal revenue sharing funds.

Young said the Neighborhood Youth Corps would fund down the front section of the auditorium before volunteers would rebuild the front and install rest rooms on the east side of the auditorium and a clerk's office on the west side.

"I'm hoping we can stimulate community spirit so we don't have to hire to have the job completed," Young pointed out.

Tonight (Monday) the board will meet in its regular monthly session to adopt a budget for the 1974-75 fiscal year.



Swine Raiser Named Officer Of SPF Group

Dick Sorensen, swine producer two miles north and a mile west of Wayne, has been named vice president of the Nebraska Specific Pathogen Free (SPF) Swine Program.

Currently a member of the board of directors of the SPF organization, he replaces Guy McReynolds of Ashland.

President of the organization, named along with Sorensen and the other officers during the group's July 22-23 meeting in Lincoln, is John Volk of Battle Creek. He replaces Willard Waldo of Dewitt.

The SPF organization, which promotes disease-free swine, has about 75 members across the state. It has been in existence since 1961, and Sorensen has been a member since 1963.

Wayne to Help Conduct Cervical Cancer Program

Wayne will be one of several communities in the state which will have clinics to help conduct a cervical cancer screening program in Nebraska.

Creighton University School of Medicine and the University of Nebraska Medical Center have been awarded contracts to conduct the program throughout the state.

Money for the program — \$48,301 over a three year period — has been awarded by the National Cancer Institute to the Nebraska State Health Department, which in turn subcontracted with the two schools.

Clinics also will be established in Scottsbluff, Tecumseh, Fairbury, Loup City, Kearney, Alliance, Fremont, Lincoln, Hastings, North Platte and Tekamah. Other testing locations will

be the Creighton Health Center, University of Nebraska Medical Center and the Creighton and Nebraska Family Practice Outreach Clinics in Omaha.

Dr. Robert Luby, chairman of Creighton University's obstetrics-gynecology department and Dr. Joseph C. Scott, professor of obstetrics-gynecology at the NU Medical Center, who developed the proposal, said goals of the program being undertaken by the two universities are consistent with the goals of the American Cancer Society. They said all such programs being conducted in the state will be coordinated with the state health department in an effort to avoid duplication.

Dr. Robert Messer, chairman of obstetrics-gynecology at the NU Medical Center, said it is hoped all women 16 years of age and older will receive a papapanicolaou (pap) smear test. The test is painless, easy to administer and takes only a few minutes of the patient's time, he said.

While the test will be available to all women, specific programs will be developed in an effort to screen effectively low income and indigent residents as well as migrant women.

Patients who show positive results to the pap smear will receive further follow-up testing and treatment as needed.

The high school job has been vacant since former principal Deryl Lawrence left that job to accept one at Wayne State College.

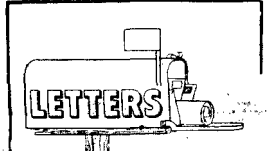

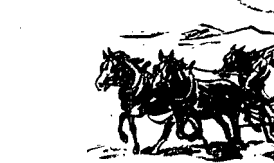

Out of Old



Ray Page, Pioneer Lincoln Aviator, Plane Manufacturer. The Lincoln Standard Aircraft Co. plant at 2409 O Street in the 1920's was then considered "the third largest manufacturer of aircraft in America." Its president was Ray Page, who was associated in the venture with his wife Ethel, model for his advertising and even plant manager when her husband was ill.

One of Standard's machines was the "Lincoln L-52 Sportplane," a one-place, 20-foot wingspan biplane weighing 370 pounds. Powered by a three-horsepower Anzani motor, it attained 90 miles per hour and got 35 miles per gallon of gasoline. It cost \$1,495 complete, or the parts could be purchased for home-building at \$147 (less motor, cloth, and instruments, but including blueprints).

The firm also built more elaborate planes. One was the five-passenger "Lincoln Standard," which in November, 1925, carried "Link Up with Lincoln" civic boosters to Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, and eventually the west coast. Page was with pilots Robert Cochran and Augie Pedlar, who handled the aircraft. The latter airman lost his life in the Pacific with Villus Khop and Mildred Doran during the famous Dole Pineapple Co. promotional flight to Hawaii in 1927.

Midwestern cities booked the "Page Aerial Pageant," a show featuring Lincoln planes and fliers. Advertising listed the performers — Eyer Sloniger, Kathryn Hardin, Lieutenant Hardin, Beeler Blevins, Pete Hill, and Earl Barnes — as the "world's greatest aerial stars." Charles Lindbergh trained for an aviation career in Lincoln under Page in 1922. Their acquaintance resulted in this cablegram from Paris in 1927, soon after Lindbergh had landed at the end of his historic ocean flight: "Please accept thanks, your kind message. Regret

DON LIND, one of 19 astronauts selected by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration in 1968 and backup science pilot for Skylab 3 and Skylab 4, will visit Plainview Tuesday during the community's third annual Tri-County Farm, Home and Auto Show.

Lind will field questions at a special space booth during the second day of the two-day show, arriving in Plainview late Tuesday afternoon from the Lyndon B. Johnson Space Center at Houston. Lind, who holds the rank of commander in the U.S. Naval Reserve, has logged more than 3,260 hours flying time, 2,780 of them in jet aircraft.

Schmitl is leading plaintiff in a class action suit against two major food market chains. He alleges they have conspired to fix prices.

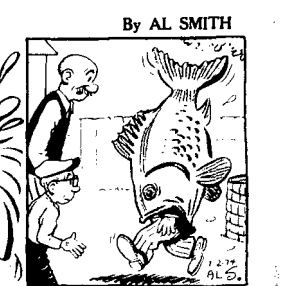

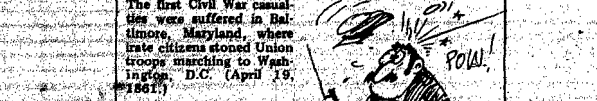
One more step

I didn't take the time to count, but I bet there were close to 100 people involved in just getting the 4-H booths judged, running the junior rodeo and judging the 4-H dairy show on the opening day of the fair. That's not many people, you say? No, it isn't, but those are just four of several events going on during just one day of the fair. Take a moment to consider how many other events take place from the time the fair opens until it closes. Then the numbers start to get staggering.

At times it looks like there's more confusion than organization, but the more I become familiar with how a fair operates, the more I realize the whole thing is probably the best organized and smoothest run event that goes on in the county all year long.

I don't know who should get the compliment for planning, organizing and putting on an event which involves hundreds of youths and adults, some of them from outside the county lines, but the secretary-manager, Marilyn Koch, and the fair board are probably the best place to start. From there you can branch out in almost every direction — the county agent and his secretaries, the 4-H club leaders, the superintendents of the numerous contests, the volunteers who are almost always handy to help out when something goes wrong and on and on and on.

Sometimes it seems to me to be too much work, too much worry, too much bother to put on a county fair similar to the one held in Wayne each year. But that's probably only because I sometimes forget the major purpose of this or any other county fair. And that purpose is to give the youngsters in 4-H a chance to show others what they have learned and accomplished during the past year. And in doing that, those youths will take another step in growing up. That's probably what makes the whole thing worthwhile. —Norvin Hansen.

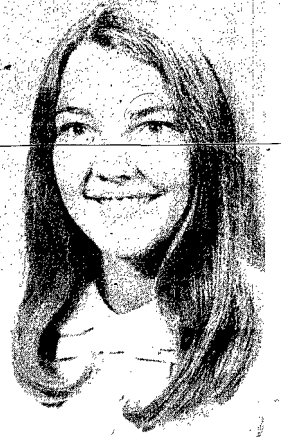

Nearly two centuries of membership on the Wayne County Fair and Agricultural Association were recognized in a special ceremony Friday night during the 1974 fair.

Glenn Kruescher, director of the state department of agriculture, presented plaques to board members Leland Herman, Marty Willers, Bill Peters, Bill Fredrickson and Ray Langemeier. He also presented a plaque to David Ley, who accepted the award for his father, Henry.

On top of that, five of those six men were officially commissioned as Admirals in The Great Navy of the State of Nebraska, an honor bestowed by the governor when special occasions call for it.

Kruescher said Gov. J. J. Exon will commission Henry Ley in the mythical navy at a later date. Ley is recovering from an operation earlier this year.

Although Wayne County certainly qualifies as a landlocked area, Kruescher told the crowd watching the ceremony, "Wayne

County will have more admirals on the fair board than any other county in the state."

Overin's Strikeouts, Double Beats Wahoo

When Wayne pitcher Earle Overin walked off the mound Friday night, he left behind a cloud of smoke. And peering through the haze were 17 Wahoo batters who struck out as Wayne scored its first win in the Area A American Legion tournament, 3-1, at Wayne.

But it took nine innings for the local Legion club to put away a strong Wahoo team which came gunning for a first-round victory, carrying a 19-5 record into the double elimination tourney.

Overin's fast balls plus his two-run double in the last frame sent Wahoo to the loser's bracket to face West Point, which fell to Arlington, 6-4, in the other opening game Friday.

Wayne was scheduled to meet Arlington at 8:30 p.m. Sunday after the West Point-Wahoo tilt. Wayne and Wahoo were tied at 1-1 after seven. The first three loaded the bases, and then first baseman Bill Schwartz knocked in the tying run in his first of three hits in four at bats. Schwartz doubled in the seventh, only to be stranded, then singled in the ninth.

Schwartz's single in the ninth turned out to be the turning

point in the game. He belted the ball to pitcher Rick Wagner, but the ball glanced off Wagner's ankle. Wagner then walked second baseman Charlie Roland to set up Wayne's two scores.

Overin ripped a fly to left center, then advanced to third on an interference call by the umpire as Wahoo's catcher, Scott Houfek, tried to block home plate without having the ball in his possession.

That same call might have prevented the locals from having to go two extra innings if the team had been alert in the fourth, said coach Hank Overin. After Schwartz singled to center, third baseman Randy Nelson scored, leaving time for shortstop Kim Baker to hustle from second and tally the team's second run, Overin said. However, Baker hesitated before pulling into third. He then attempted to steal home, but was caught in a chase-down.

Houfek fired to third, opening the way for Baker to run into the catcher on the way home. Overin interposed off. If Baker had done so, interference might have been the call, allowing him to score.

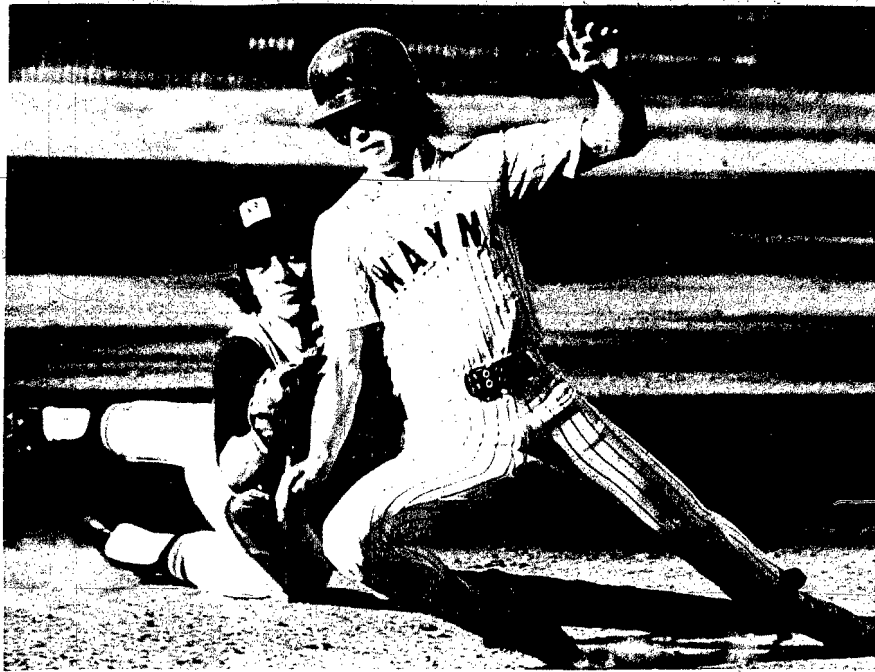

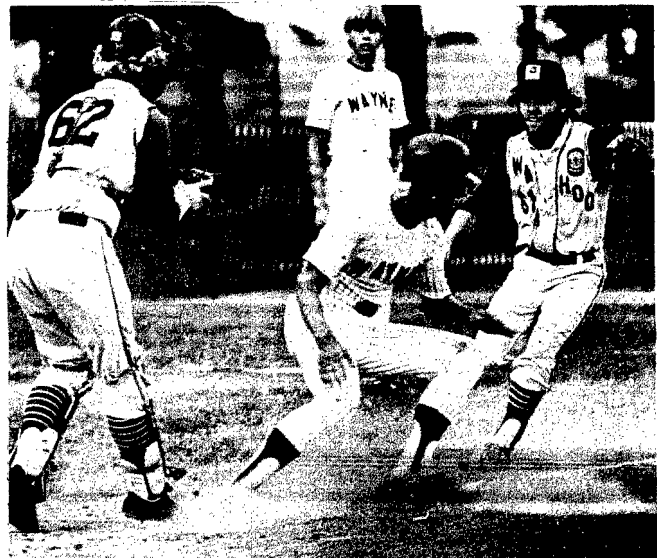

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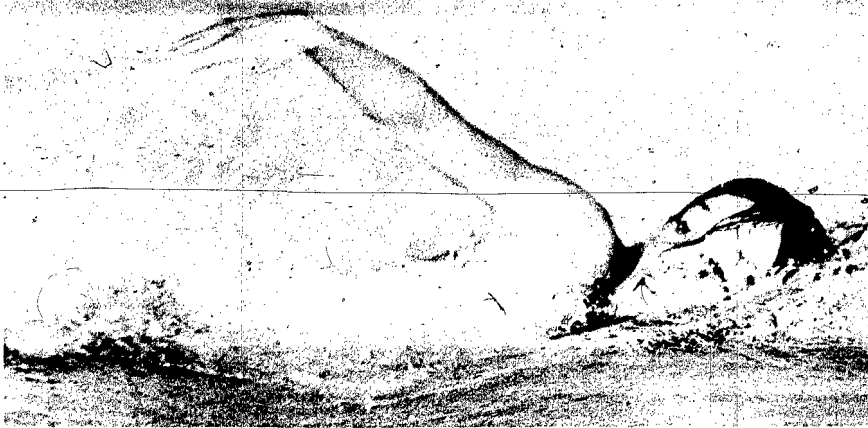

Farm Incomes Fall

Farm incomes declined each month of the first quarter of 1974. During the same period, consumers' per capita disposable incomes rose from \$4,350 to \$4,402. Pork was up almost 2 per cent from a year ago, but was down more than 10 per cent from the beginning of this year.

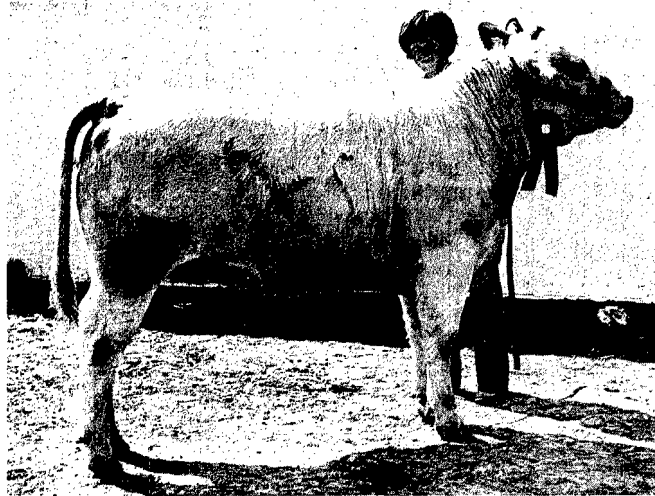

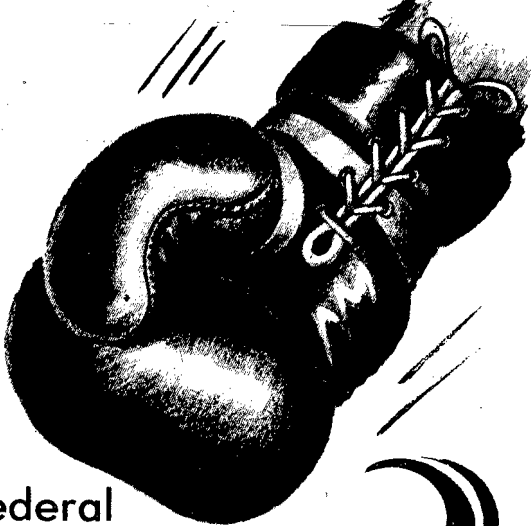
Uncle Sam — Meat Packer

The meat packing industry gave the United States the nickname "Uncle Sam." According to legends, two brothers, Sam and Ebenezzer Wilson, operated a slaughter house in the early 1800's. Sam later became a meat inspector for the U. S. Army, approving meat supplied by Elbert Anderson. Barrels of meat shipped by Anderson were marked "E. A. U. S." When some soldiers asked what the letters stood for, they were told "The E. A. stands for the man who supplies the meat, while the U. S. stands for the man who accepts it, Uncle Sam." News papers picked up on the nickname and began drawing cartoons in which "Uncle Sam" resembled Sam Wilson.

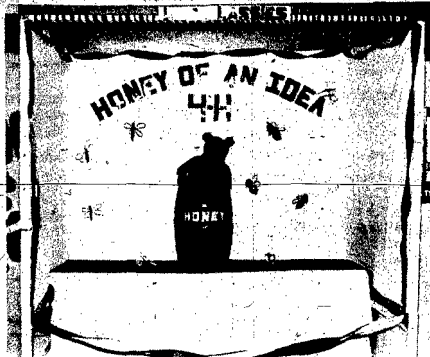
