Cost of the project will be about \$2,500, according to vil-lage chairman John Young, with the entire cost to be paid with federal revenue sharing funds. federal revenue sharing funds. Wayne will be one of several communities in the state which will have clinics to help conduct a cervical cancer screening program in Nebraska.

program in Nebraska. Creighton University School of Medicine and the University of Nebraska Medical Center have been awarded contracts to con-duct the program throughout the state. state

state. Money for the program — \$498.301 over a three year period — has been awarded by the National Cancer institute to the Nebraska State Health Depart-ment, which in turn subcon-tracted with the two schools.

Creighton University's obstet-rics gynecology department and Dr. Joseph C. Scott, professor of obstetrics-gynecology at the NU Medical Center, who developed the proposal, said goals of the program being undertaken by the two universities are consis-tent with the goals of the American Cancer Society. They said all such programs being conducted in the state will be coordinated with the state health department in an effort to avoid duplication. Dr. Robert Messer, chair-Clinics also will be established in Scottsbluft, Tecumseh, Fair-bury, Loup City, Kearney, Alli-ance, Fremont, Lincoln, Has-tings, North Platte and Teka-mah. 

Lincoln on by the Memorial Park ceme-tery. Page was born in 1882 in Friend and spent his childhood and school days there. He then began a seven-year span as an advertising salesman with the Nebraska Farmer and for six years an auctioneer in southeast Nebraska. In 1913 ine became an automobile dealer. About 1920 he moved to Lincoln and entered the aviation filed, then just beginning to make an impression on the American transportation industry. Always a sportsman, Page was promi-nent in wrestling promotion in Lincoln, and on reliferement from his firm in 1929 due to III health, he became Increasingly interested in greyhoud racing. Page died at his Lincoln home on March 10, 1933. Burla was at Friend. Recently his widow made available to the Nebrask State Historical Society a scrapbook containing articles and photos of the Ray Page years in Lincoln. The aviation history for Nebraska Fremains to be written in full detail, but Ray Page and his wife Ethel are certain to be further recognized by historians for their pioneer efforts in this important industry.




