The Nebraska-British Institute is scheduled for July 13 and features five to six days in Edinburgh, capital of Scotland; three days in York, capital of northern England; five days free travel in the United Kingdom on a Britrail pass, and 18 days in London.

The institute includes visits to palaces, castles, courts, museums and churches, trips to the home of Sir Walter Scott, the Royal Palace at Holyrood, the ancient castle of Edinburgh, Stonehenge, Hampton Court by way of Thames riverboat, Canterbury Cathedral and Stratford, home of William Shakespeare. Participants will also be provided with tickets to two performances by the Royal Shakespeare Company. The lecture series will be held at the University of London. Information regarding application or pertaining to those scholarships which are available should be directed to James Pflifer or Sayre Anderson, codirectors of the Nebraska British Institute at Wayne State. 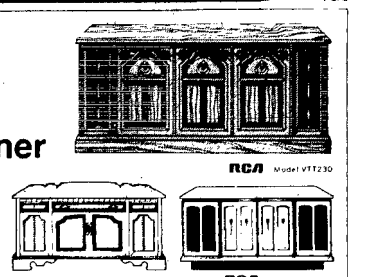

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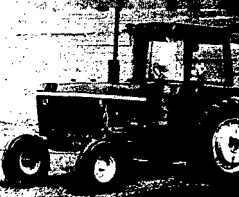
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**CROPPING PLANS FOR 1975?**

Many farmers and landowners in the Lower Elkhorn NRD are making plans and management decisions for the 1975 crop year.

A low yield in the 1974 season with disastrous hog and cattle prices have made the profit picture for most operation bleak indeed.

Anything or anyway that may be employed to reduce cost of operation or inputs should receive hard-nosed scrutiny for 1975.

Reduced Tillage is one of those management practices that can help the profit picture for many operations.

1) A savings of time: Additional time to farm more land, raise more livestock or spend more time with your family.

2) A saving of money: You don't have to be a mathematician to figure out that fewer trips through the field takes less fuel and equipment which means more dollars to spend where they are really needed.

3) A saving of soil: On a long term basis, you, the operator, will have a farm with improved soil structure, higher water intake and the capabilities of increased yields.

If it is your operation, your profit picture, your farm. It's all up to you!

Irrigation development has shown a dramatic upturn in the last year in Nebraska according to Dan Jones, State Department of Water Resources.

In the last ten years, slightly over 1600 wells per year were installed but, last year, over 2,200 wells were drilled following the severe drought this past summer.

The push on irrigation is likely to increase with the subsoil moisture levels which are extremely low going into the winter season.

Very little moisture has fallen to replenish the subsoil moisture supplies for the upcoming growing season.

Consequently, water needs for the '75 growing season will likely be higher than normal.

Nebraska now has more than five million irrigated acres from forty thousand plus well will be putting an unprecedented strain on the groundwater supplies especially in those areas of high irrigation concentration or low groundwater levels.

Efficiency of water application and use will be more and more a necessity with limited water supply.

Several things can be done to increase efficiency, re-use pits, reduced application rates and reduced tillage methods.

Reduced Tillage Methods are gaining more and more attention as ways to improve water usage under both dryland and irrigated conditions.

The rough appearance of mulched fields has several advantages over bare land farming.

Fewer tillage operations reduce the chances for evaporation losses yet leave the soil in shape to make the best possible use of rainfall and irrigation water with a bare minimum of run-off.

The livestock program includes 130 head of cows and calves and 150 head of hogs.

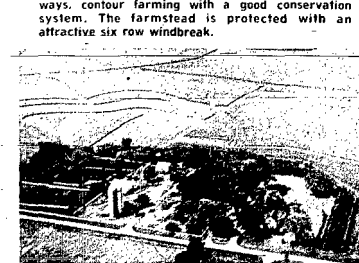
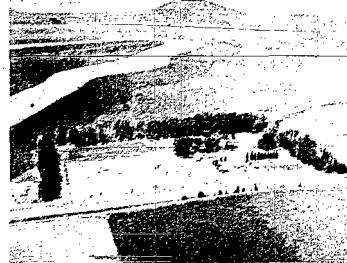
The Pippitts have two sons, Allen, who has graduated from high school and Greg, a junior in Laurel High School.

His farm is terraced and under a complete conservation program. This includes grassed water ways, contour farming with a good conservation system. The farmstead is protected with an attractive six row windbreak.



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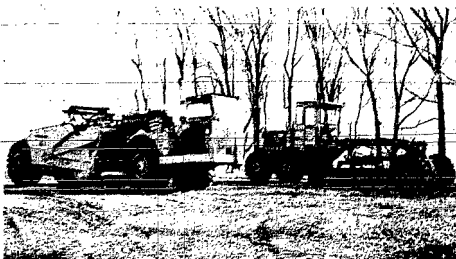
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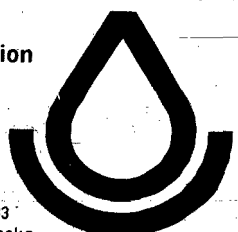

The Postal Service is paying its Madison Avenue advertising agency a couple of million dollars a year just for preparing its advertising.

The Postal Service has more high paid executives than any other federal agency, paying about \$30,000 per year to "lobby program officers" and around \$25,000 per annum to "social priorities specialists."

For reclassifying all of its employees, the Postal Service paid \$3 million to Westinghouse Corporation, a firm with

little experience in this field. As a result of this reclassifying, there were several instances of assistant postmasters being assigned higher pay grades than the postmasters they worked for and at least one instance of a superintendent of mails (No. 3 person in a large postoffice) being assigned to higher pay than his postmaster.

The Postal Service is spending about \$1 billion on regional centers to handle parcel post packages. There is serious doubt whether the system will work.

In Rockport, Me., where the post office serves 420 customers, the Postal Service plans to discontinue using the present building from the general store and build a new building out in the country.

To end the unbelievable arrogance — to end the waste of the Washington Postal Service posthubs, we must make the agency accountable for its actions to Congress.

— Another thought picked up by Stull's committee during its hearings across the state is legislation which would increase motor vehicle registration.

— Some suggested abolishing the present property tax on motor vehicles (based on value) and establishing a fee system

geared to weight or base price.

— Another possibility is a county option where tax so counties in a real bind could find a source of additional revenue.

— Also proposed was a relaxation in the standards of new highway construction. This would make construction cheaper.

**Don't Get Cows Too Fat**  
Dairy cows that become too fat before or during their dry period are susceptible to a metabolic disorder—the fat cow syndrome. The disease is on the increase because of the trend toward more high energy forages such as corn silage and high quality grass and alfalfa silages.

Although the disorder is not yet fully understood, the liver is evidently involved. When any stress occurs, such as calving, mastitis or ketosis, the liver apparently becomes filled with fat and cannot handle metabolic functions.

The cow will appear to have milk fever, but will not respond to treatment. Displaced rumen, stomach and inflammation of the uterus are sometimes associated with the disease.

To avoid the problem, dry cows should be fed little or no grain. They should be fed some long hay or pasture. Separate feeding of dry cows to limit energy intake is recommended for most herds that experience the fat cow syndrome.

**Spray Thistles in Winter?**  
You weren't having illusions if last week you saw some pasture thistles being sprayed on the Ralph Beckenhauer farm. It's all part of an experiment that Northeast, Station and Wayne County Noxious Weed Board are cooperating on together.

According to some experimental work that has been done in western Nebraska, kill on weeds sprayed with 2,4-D in February was almost as effective as normal spring or fall spraying. This work was done with mustard so we don't know if it will be equally effective on pasture thistles.

So if you see some weeds being sprayed in February don't be alarmed. It will just be a part of an experiment.

**Corn Root Worm Control**  
Evidence of rootworms in corn fields last August could mean damage to next year's crop. And I've seen lots of evidence of rootworm damage in Wayne County.

A revised bulletin on insect control for corn and sorghum has just been published. This bulletin is a guide to proper and effective use of insecticides for the 1975 season. It may be obtained by asking the Wayne County extension office for bulletin EC75 1509, "Insect Control Guide for Corn and Sorghum."

## ASC Director Announces Changes In Loan Program Maturity Dates

The 1975 wheat and feed grain loan program will not have identical maturity dates as in the past. It will mature 12 months from the first day of the month in which the loan is made, reports Ray Butts, executive director of Wayne County ASCS office.

This change in the loan program should assure farmers more flexibility in marketing crops under loan, according to Butts.



### 4-H Congress Representative

Last Wayne County representative at the Congress was Linda Baier, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Merrill Baier of Nebraska Lincoln. The youths at the Congress took part in rap sessions, educational tours, visits with executives of national agribusiness concerns and news conferences. Among those making an appearance at the Congress was Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butts. Steve, an alternate winner in the sheep project, joined the delegation when the original state trip winner was unable to attend. He is a senior at Wayne High School.

Oats and rye which do not have target prices will be resold at \$0.78 and \$1.28 per bushel averages, respectively, also plus carrying charges, which make the resale prices comparable to those commodities which do not have target prices, he adds.

Butts also announced the 1975 national feed grain allotment will be 89 million acres, the same as for 1974. The allotment represents the number of harvested acres of feed grains, based on the estimated national average yield, needed to produce the quantity of feed grains (less imports) that will be used domestically and for export during the 1975-76 marketing year.

Projected 1975 per bushel feed grain yields on which the allotment is based are 93.0 for corn, 60.0 for grain sorghum and 45.5 for barley. The allotment does not represent a limit on acreage but is computed only for the purpose of distributing payments to producers should such payments be required, he said.

The average loan rates in effect in 1974 for wheat and feed grains will be continued at the same levels for the 1975 crops, according to Butts. Present per bushel loan rates are \$1.37 for wheat, \$1.10 for corn, \$1.05 for grain sorghum (\$1.88 per hundredweight), \$0.90 for barley, \$0.94 for oats and \$0.89 for rye.

Target prices must remain unchanged for 1975. Target prices per bushel are \$2.05 for wheat, \$1.38 for corn, \$1.31 for sorghum and \$1.13 for barley. Oats and rye do not have target prices.

There will be no loan programs for soybeans, dry edible beans, flaxseed, gum, naval stores and honey for the 1975 crops.

Butts said little use has been made of the loan program for these permissive support commodities in recent years because market prices are two to three times loan levels. Continuation of loan support on these commodities when not needed would require unnecessary administrative expenditures, Butts said.

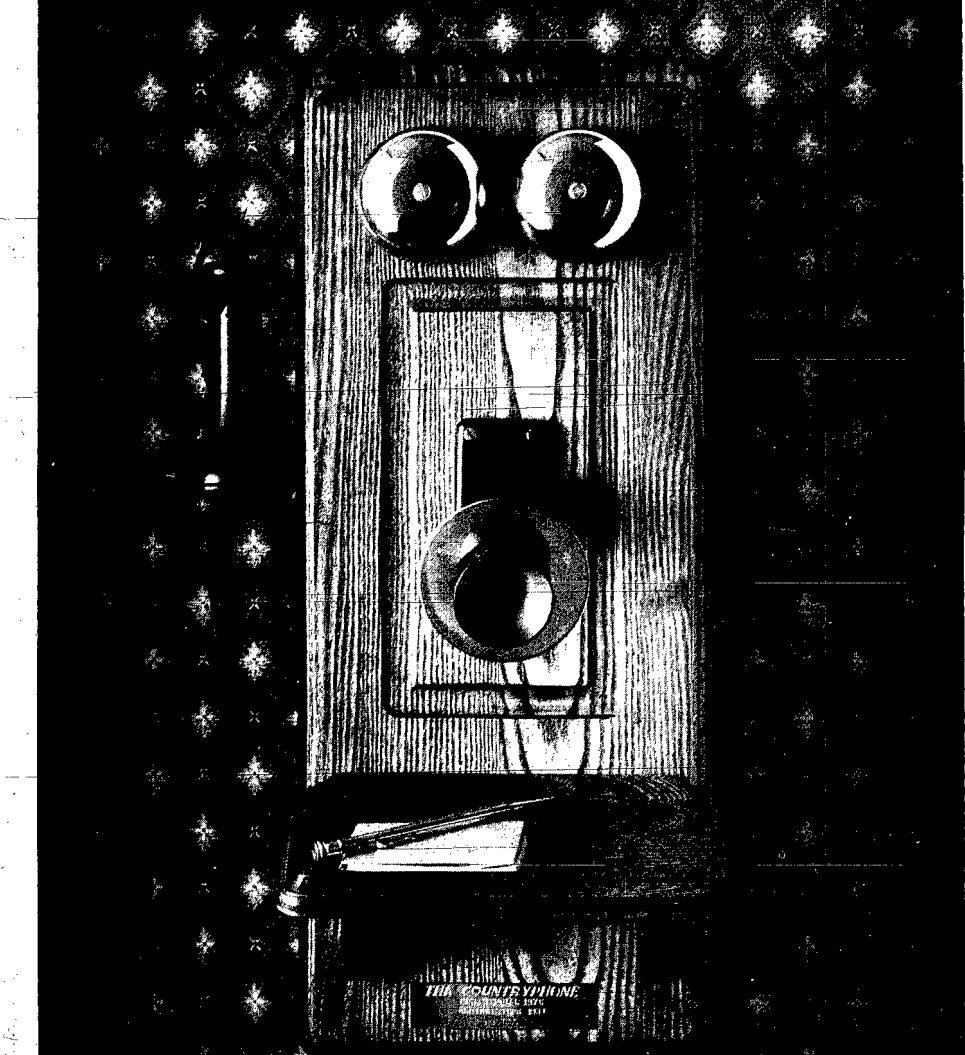

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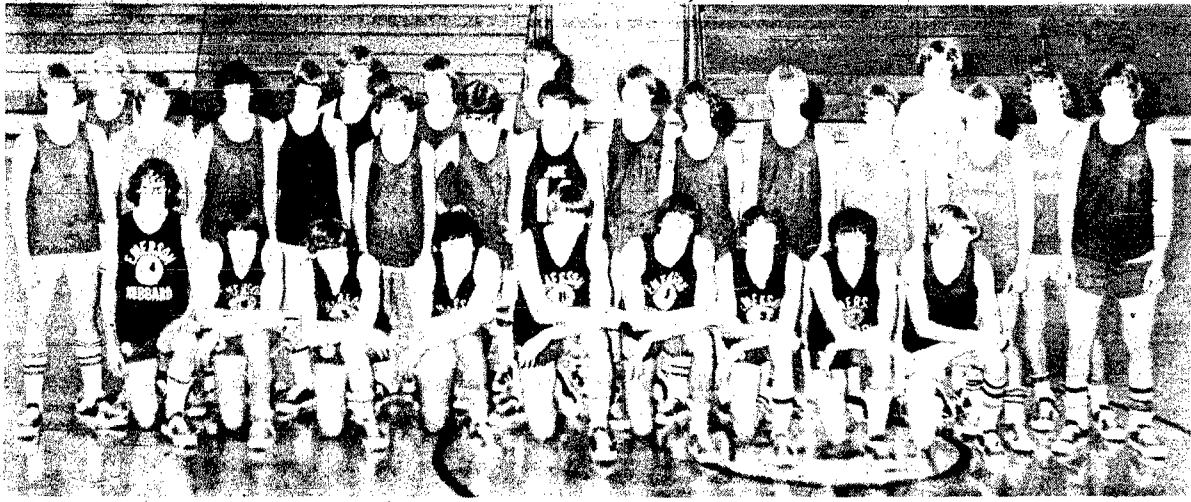

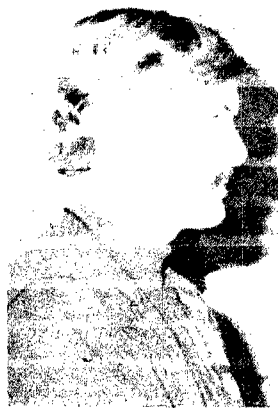
the school record of thirty rebounds in one game.

The Dragons last year had a record of ten wins and nine

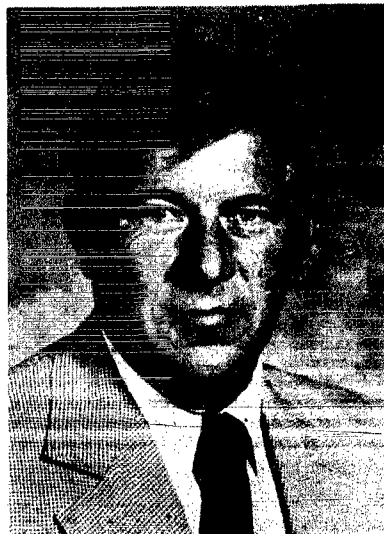

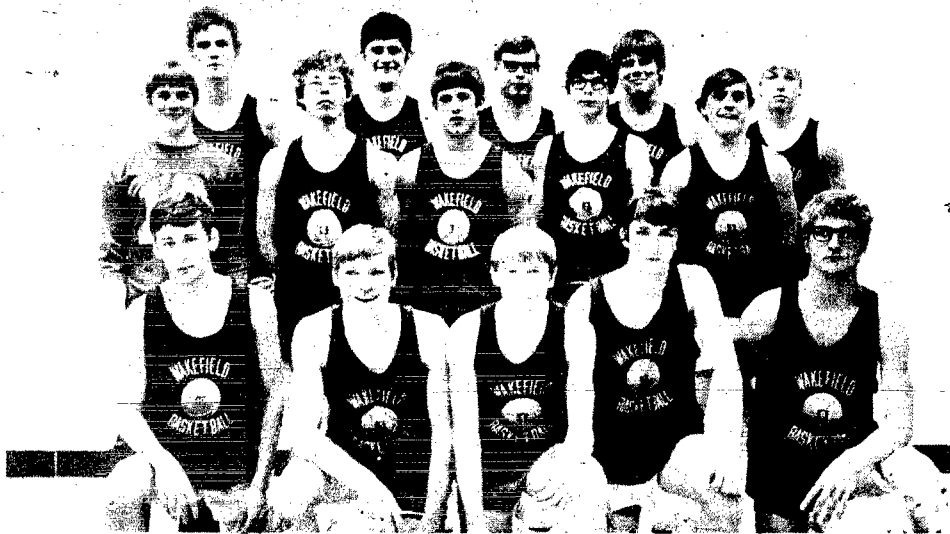

## 4 Lettermen Return to Lead WHS in Rebuilding Year

With the loss of eight lettermen Wakefield coach Joe Coble knew he would have his work cut out for him in preparing the 1974-75 edition of the Trojans. Injuries and illness have compounded that problem.

Wakefield returns four lettermen from Coach Coble's 15-7 District finalists of a year ago. Only one of them, Chuck Lindstrom, is a senior. Three juniors are Scot Keagle, the Trojan's tallest cager at 6'5", Mike Soderberg, and Scott Mills.

All four have lost practice time due to injuries. Soderberg, with a cast protecting his right hand broken in the final football game of the season, will likely miss most of the December campaign.

Keagle and Lindstrom are not at top efficiency after football leg injuries. Mills, with a hip pointer from football just healed, twisted an ankle last week before the season's opener with Winside.

The Trojans have gained some experience via the transfer route. Don Myers, a 6'3" senior from Verdigré, while still adjusting to the Trojans brand of basketball, promises to provide rebounding strength and some scoring punch to the attack.

There are two other transfers

working with the junior varsity. Brook Myers, brother of Don, and Jeff Peterson, formerly of Mason City, Ia. Both are sophomores.

Although Lindstrom is the Trojans only senior letterman, two seniors move up from the junior varsity and another has returned to the sport after one year's absence.

Joe Wirth, 6'4", and Lee Echtenkamp, 6'2", have good size but lack varsity time. Tony Peters, 6'1", could help once he removes the rough edges due to a year away from the game.

How the Trojans do during the year, and especially in the early tests, will depend upon six untried, but promising juniors.

Coming off a successful JV slate of a year ago, Tim Rouse, Kerry Bressler, Al Johnson, Gary Munter, Garry Roeber and Don Berry may hold the fate of the Trojans in their hands.

Rouse was likely headed for the role of play-making guard, until he was recently slowed by illness. The extent of his availability is unknown at this time.

Bressler, a slender 5'10", is another considered play-maker, while Johnson is perhaps the best shooter on the squad. Munter, Roeber, and Berry all show promise, but may benefit from some JV action.

With 14 varsity athletes, two above the limit which may suit for each contest, Coach Coble intends to rotate some of the juniors during the season so that all may, at one time or another, be available for varsity experience.

Mark Kober, another junior who had worked with the varsity through November, dropped from the squad last week.

The junior varsity will again be handled by Ernie Kovar. Dennis Chipman will be coaching the junior high. Doug Fischer, a 1974 graduate, has been helping out as time permits.

With 6-5 senior Gordon Emry and 6-3 senior Bob Keating, coach Bill Sharpe's team should have strong inside shooting as well as good rebounding.

Along with those two top shooters from last year's 15-7 team will be Jack Froehlich. Although the senior stands 6-1, he likely will be one of Sharpe's top picks to fill the front court slots.

Wayne will miss guards Tod Bigelow and Scott Ehlers. Sharpe pointed out. "I doubt if there's anyone who could match their speed," the head man said.

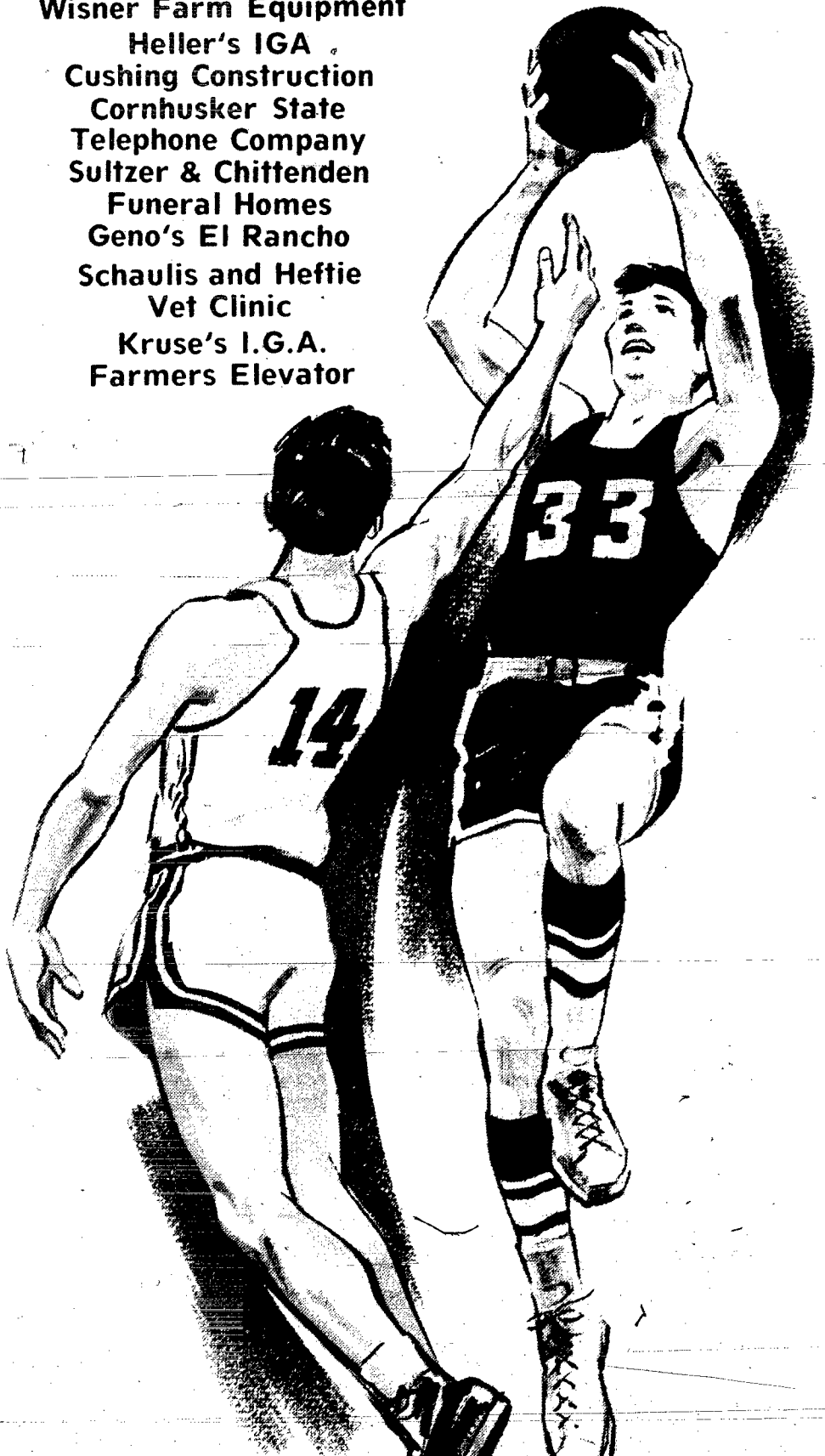

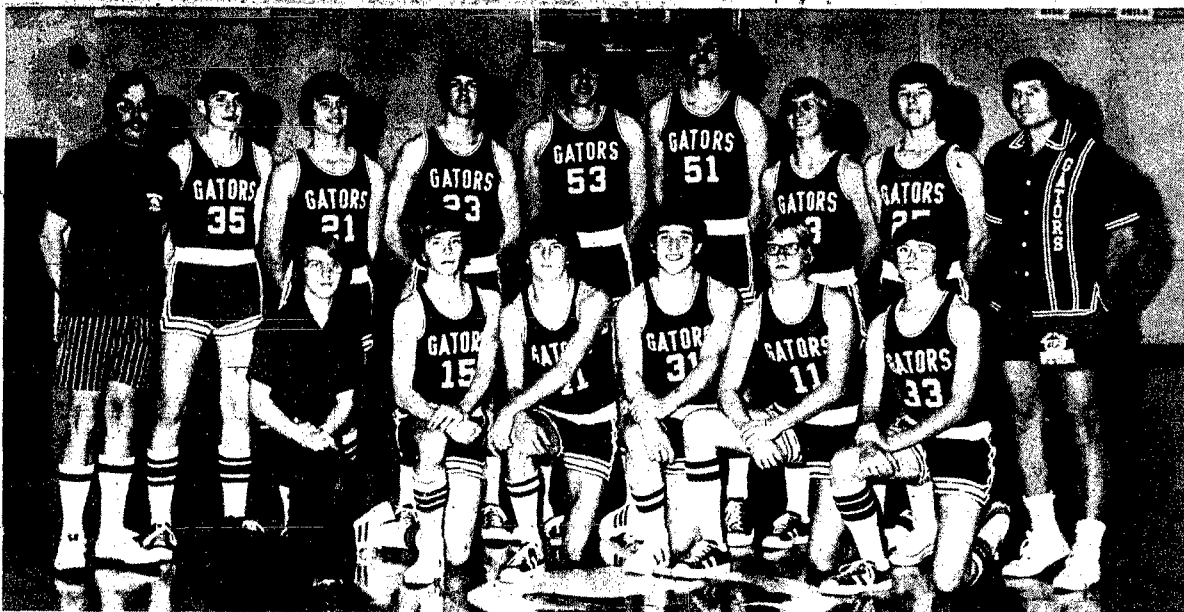

# Gator Cage Hopes Bright; Team Aims for Record

Wisner Pilger basketball hopes appear to be bright for the 1974-75 campaign, coming off a 13-7 record a year ago and posting the best record in the school's history.

Coach Gerald Kassin, who is in his second year as head mentor, has four returning lettermen to bolster the green and white varsity.

Probably the most versatile of the returning lettermen is Danny Kane, a 6-2 senior who is the only starter returning from a year ago. Kane is a smooth left hander that is quick on defense and strong in the scoring column. He will see action at both the guard and forward positions, depending on the situation according to Coach Kassin. But, wherever he plays, his savvy for the game will be known on the hardwood.

The Gators hope for a successful season hinge on how well the backcourt players — Kevin McClure and Steve Heller — develop through the season. Both seniors and measuring a strong 6-5, neither have much varsity playing experience. McClure was used as a spot player late in the season a year ago, spelling now graduated Steve Hornback.

McClure has since matured and could be the key for the Gators inside scoring punch. He is, possibly a little over-reactive on defense. Heller, on the other hand, is probably the best rebounder on the squad. He is a strong player and will be called to play both forward and center. Heller and McClure are seniors and are both lettermen.

The strongest position on the club is at guard although Coach Gerald Kassin has only one

returning letterman guard — that being 5-9 Jay Fisher, another senior. Fisher is a quick and alert player that is strong on defense and likes the shots from around the key. He is a very good shooter, too.

Rod Kindshuh will probably be the other starting guard. A 5-9 senior, Kindshuh has a deadly outside shot that will be most effective against a zone defense. He possesses good speed and, next to Fisher, is probably the best ball handler. Kindshuh gained valuable playing experience on the junior varsity last year and has little big time playing experience, although through early practices he has shown the desire and hustle to fill that fifth spot.

The sixth man on the green and white squad is Mike Raabe.

A strong defensive guard, the 5-9 senior is a smooth ball handler and could be a scoring punch coming off the bench.

In the event that McClure isn't in the lineup, Heller would shift to center and Brad Gralheer, a 5-11 forward, would be in the lineup. Gralheer became a team leader this fall when he led the Gators to a 7-2 football season record at quarterback. The fiery junior is known for his hustle and ability to rebound.

Other varsity players include Brad Breikreutz, George Korbel, Terry Bohnenkamp, Mark McGill, Burton Pflueger, Bob Wolverton, Jeff Heinhold, Jeff Beckman and Danny Ludwig.

Assisting Coach Kassin again this year is Doug Nollette.

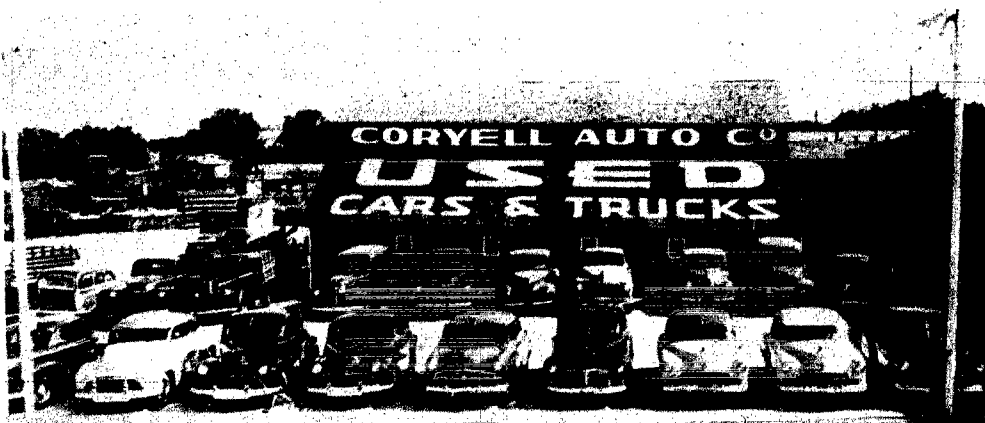
