Registration Set at WS

Registration for Wayne State's winter term is scheduled Monday, Jan. 6, for all who did not register in advance. Hours are from 12:30 to 4:30. The enrollment time applies mainly to regular students. For those taking only evening courses, enrollment can be done up to class time on the first or second meeting. Students should arrive at the Hahn Administration Building by 6 p.m. to finish paper work before 6:30 class time. The evening curriculum includes courses in every academic department, many of them designed for inservice teachers and others wanting to gain business or professional skills. Some courses are intended mainly for personal enrichment. Evening classes scheduled Monday nights will begin Jan. 6, but will not meet March 31 because of Easter recess. Day classes will begin Tuesday, Jan. 7. The late registration fee becomes effective Jan. 8, and the last day for late enrollment is Jan. 13, except for night classes starting that week.

Henry Ley Is Exon's Choice For State Job

Henry Ley of Wayne has been named to a six-year post on the Board of Trustees of the Nebraska State Colleges. Ley, currently in his last days as state banking director, fills a spot left vacant by the completion of J. Alan Cramer's term on the board. Cramer, also of Wayne, goes off the board officially at the end of this month. Chairman of the board of directors of the State National Bank and Trust Co. in Wayne, Ley, 71, has resigned as state banking director effective Jan. 9. He has served in that post all four years of Governor J. J. Pelt's term as well as during the term of Frank Morrison. Gov. Exon announced the appointment of Ley to the state college board on Thursday. He also named Muri Mauser, Big Springs farmer-rancher, to replace Ogallala attorney James Lane on the board. Lane declined reappointment after serving on the board for many years. Named by Exon to replace Ley as state banking director was Grand Island banker William Riley.

Local Woman Wins \$25 in Weekly Drawing

A Wayne woman, Lora Dion, won the Dec. 19, 1974, Birthday Bucks drawing in Wayne, collecting \$25 in coupons which can be spent just like cash in any participating business. Her winning the consolation prize boosted last Thursday night's drawing to \$800. She was shopping at Sav Mar Drugs in Wayne when the winning date, Oct. 16, 1936, was announced. Her birthday was closest to that date, which was drawn at random and announced in all sponsoring stores at 8:15 p.m. Local and area residents may participate in the weekly drawings by simply being in one of the stores taking part. No purchases are necessary, and there are no restrictions on the number of times a person may win.

Drivers for Ambulance Are Needed

Hospital and city officials in Wayne are seeking drivers who would be able to drive the ambulance during the next several months until the new hospital opens in Wayne. Discussing hiring drivers in a meeting Friday were mayor Freeman Decker, city administrator Fred Brink and hospital board chairman Lyle Seymour. Brink noted during the meeting that beginning the first of the year Charles Thomas of Wayne will no longer serve as an ambulance driver. Thomas, administrator of the local hospital for several years, has resigned that post beginning Jan. 1. He will spend all his time as associate administrator of the Our Lady of Lourdes Hospital in Norfolk, a post he has held in addition to his job as administrator of the local hospital. Thomas is expected to be named administrator of the new hospital once it is completed this spring in Wayne, according to the Missionary Benedictine Sisters of Norfolk, operators of the Our Lady of Lourdes Hospital. They also will operate the new hospital in Wayne. Thomas' resignation as his hospital administrator in Wayne leaves the city with one ambulance driver, Myron Jenness, according to Brink. Local policemen can drive the ambulance when necessary, however, but Brink said he would not like to see that develop into a permanent situation because the police force is now one man short. Decker, Brink and Seymour agreed that at least one other person and possibly more should be hired to stand by as drivers until the new hospital is completed and in operation. Persons interested in the job may contact any one of them, they said. What will happen to the ambulance operation once the new hospital is open will likely be worked out in coming meetings with the Missionary Benedictine Sisters, they said. The city still anticipates some agreement—being worked out whereby the Sisters staff and operate the ambulance while the city—and possibly the county—contribute to its maintenance and replacement, the three noted.

The 1975 license plate tags will go on sale in the Wayne County treasurer's office on Thursday, reports treasurer Leon Meyer. Meyer said about 6,000 of the small license tags will be sold in coming weeks, and about 8,000 will be sold by the end of 1975. Deadline for purchasing the reflectorized tags is March 1, he noted. The license tags—the fourth year for them in Nebraska—cost \$15.50 for automobiles, \$18.50 for pickups and varying amount for trucks. Red and white with a picture of the state capitol building on them, the tags are to be placed over the top of the 1974 tags in the lower left-hand corner of the license plate. This will be the last year for the tags since new license plates will be issued next year, according to Meyer. Vehicle owners in the county may pick up their tags at the county treasurer's office or they may receive them through the mail. Before they can be issued, however, a motor vehicle owner must pay the taxes on his vehicle. Tax statements are scheduled to be mailed out in the next few days and should be received by most vehicle owners by Thursday, Meyer noted. The vehicle registration, tax statement, tax payment and tag fee have to be presented at the treasurer's office in order for the new license tags to be issued, the treasurer noted. People ordering tags through the mail should make sure they send along all four items, he emphasized.

Fluoridation Topic for City Council

City administrator Fred Brink will ask Wayne's city council Monday night for authority to purchase fluoridation equipment. Brink said he wants the council to tell him to purchase the equipment because there is a possibility local fluoridation opponents will continue their fight to keep fluoridation out of Wayne. Wayne voters gave a narrow 703-687 approval for fluoridation in the November general election. Brink said the equipment for four wells in the city will cost about \$4,200. The city had originally planned to install fluoridation equipment on five of the city's seven wells, but Brink said it is necessary to install it on only four of the seven. It will cost about 20 cents per person per year to fluoridate the city's water, according to Brink. That is the industry average, he noted, and it is unlikely to cost Wayne much more or much less to fluoridate its water. Also scheduled for Monday night's meeting, being held a day early because Tuesday night is New Year's Eve, is approval of an ordinance setting the salary of the city clerk. That salary is \$750 a month. City clerk-treasurer Dan Sherry will officially retire at the end of this month, being replaced by Bruce Mordhorst, 22, of Wayne. Mordhorst, who graduated from Wayne State in August with a bachelor of science degree in business administration, has been working with Sherry for the past several days to make the transition easier. Land Use Is Canada Problem

One of the biggest problems facing Canada is land use, said Gary Lentz during Monday's Kiwanis luncheon. About eight million people live in Ontario, which creates a problem in deciding what land should be used for agriculture, industry or housing, said Lentz, one of Canada's governmental coordinators of statistics and methodology. Lentz, who works in the Ontario ministry of agriculture and food, said the land use problem is growing as current problems in trade relations between Canada and the United States continue. The U.S. has limited importing Canadian beef, creating a hardship on Canada's economy, he pointed out. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Lentz of Wayne, he is a former Wayne State student who transferred to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln where he received his doctor's degree in 1971. That same year he took his present job in Canada.

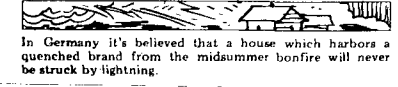

Devils' Man-to-Man Defense Stops CC

Most teams that have faced West Point Central Catholic know a man-to-man press won't stop the fall and speedy Class B club. All that is, except Wayne high.

The Blue Devils Friday night stayed with their man-to-man defense that has worked in past games and produced an upset in the Wayne State holiday tournament by dropping the previously undefeated team, 60-58.

As a result, the Devils were to meet Plattsmouth Saturday night at 6:45 for the championship—the first time they have made it to the finals since the high school portion of the tourney began in 1968.

"We had to go with our best defense," said an elated Bill Sharpe after his team's fourth win. "And that's man-to-man."

During the first period Sharpe's decision to stay in a man-to-man defense appeared wrong as CC, behind seniors Glenn Randel and Robert Reeson with six points each, took a 22-10 lead.

The momentum stayed in Central's favor until midway in the second period when Wayne's full-court press started working. Junior Paul Mallette, coming off the bench, scored 10 or his 16 points in the second period to put the Devils within striking range at the half, 40-33.

"Paul did a great job to-

night," Sharpe pointed out, adding that Mallette and senior Marty Hansen did well on defense by applying pressure on Central.

"We had 18 pressure men because of their speed, and that paid off," Sharpe said.

Wayne was down 46-39, with about three minutes left in the third quarter when baskets, by senior Jack Froehlich, Hansen and Mallette put the Devils within one. Then Hansen sank one from the inside with just under 30 seconds left in the quarter to put Wayne in the lead for the first time.

Although both clubs had 11 turnovers for the night, West Point gave up the ball two crucial times late in the fourth period.

"Following Rick Mitchell's basket that cut CC's lead to 52-51, Mallette and senior Bob Keating high man with 18 points, scored on CC's turnovers, pushing Wayne to a 55-52 lead with about two minutes left.

"Our bench strength was another big factor. We have bench strength and they (West Point) don't," Sharpe said.

Mitchell's six rebounds in the second half along with senior Rob's defensive work helped turn the game in Wayne's favor. Sharpe said. The coach praised senior Gordon Emry for his "aggressive" play both against CC and Lyons Thursday night.

Both clubs shut out even, Wayne 27 of 58 shots for 47 per cent and Central 27 of 61 for 44 percent. In the first half West Point ripped the nets for 59 per cent.

The Devils' second half rebounding was the difference in their 64-57 opening round win over Lyons, said Sharpe.

Although both teams collected 28 rebounds, the Devils stopped 20 on the offensive boards.

The second half after the club garnered 11 the first half.

Led by seniors Bob Keating and Jack Froehlich with 11 and 10 rebounds, Wayne pulled down 11 on offense and 27 on defense.

Keating and Hansen each scored 16 points in the Devils' third win in five games. Keating hit 40 the first half and Hansen eight as Wayne took a slim 30-28 lead going into the dressing room.

The Devils, leading by as much as 10 the first period, saw their margin dwindle when they went from a zone defense the first period to man-to-man the second quarter.

"If it hadn't been for (Mike) Gustafson, our press would have eaten them alive," Sharpe pointed out. Gustafson, had 27 points that night—the bulk of them coming in the second period when he broke loose for five buckets—two in the closing seconds to narrow Wayne's lead before the half. In the fourth period Gustafson scored nine to bring Lyons within five.

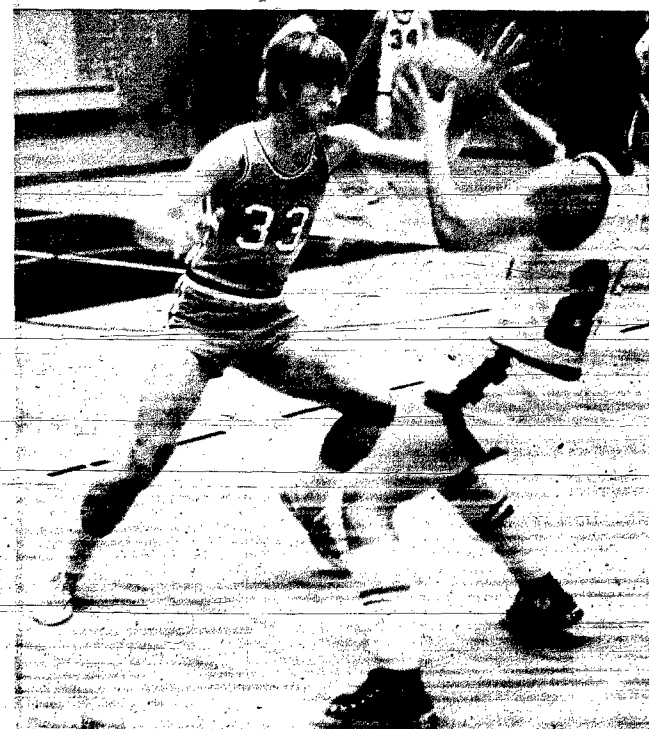

Demand, Prices Drop for Pelts

The optimism felt by Nebraska trappers early in the season has been tempered recently with news that demand for furs has not developed as expected, and prices on many species have fallen.

It's not that the bottom has dropped out of the fur market. Trapping and hunting for pelts still should be worthwhile. But the time of skyrocketing prices appears to be over, at least temporarily, according to the Game and Parks Commission.

Coyotes, for example, are running in the neighborhood of \$10 to a top of perhaps \$15, and fur buyers have been grading the pelts closely. Last year an average coyote pelt was near \$25. Buyers also seem interested only in big, high-quality beaver pelts, and the \$15 price they are paying has not yet reached last year's level. Only muskrat and raccoon prices seem to be holding up well.

One probable reason for the drop in demand could be bad economic conditions in Italy, a major buyer of furs in recent years. This year, orders from Italy have been difficult to obtain.

Now — each depositor insured to **\$40,000**

Pursuant to a recent Act of Congress which was signed by President Ford on October 28, 1974, the general limit on federal deposit insurance has been raised from \$20,000 to \$40,000 for each depositor in banks insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, a U.S. Government agency.

Q. When is this increase effective?
A. It is effective Wednesday, November 27, 1974, at all FDIC-insured banks.

Q. How can I tell whether my deposit is insured by FDIC?
A. Each of the 14,500 FDIC-insured banks in the United States has an official sign at each teller's window using the FDIC logo that appears at the bottom of this ad.

Q. Can I get more than \$40,000 insurance at the same bank?
A. Yes, if you hold accounts in different legal ownership capacities. For example, if you are married, you can have an account in your name insured up to \$40,000; your spouse can have an account in his or her name insured up to \$40,000; and you and your spouse can have a joint account insured up to \$40,000. If you hold several accounts in the same ownership capacity, however, the maximum insurance to which you are entitled is \$40,000—even if the total amount in all of the accounts is more. The new law has not changed the rules—only the dollar amount of insurance has been changed.

Q. How frequently do FDIC-insured banks fail?
A. In the past ten years, five or six FDIC-insured banks on the average have failed each year—about four-one hundredths of one percent of all insured banks in the country. The year 1974 will probably be no different in this respect than past years.

Q. What is the record of depositor protection for insured banks that have failed?
A. To date, in all failed banks insured by FDIC, over 99 percent of all deposits, insured and uninsured combined, have been paid or made available to their owners.

Q. If an FDIC-insured bank fails, when and how will I get my deposit back?
A. If an FDIC-insured bank is closed and liquidated, FDIC will start to pay insured depositors up to the statutory limit within ten days after the closing. As the bank's assets are liquidated, owners of claims in excess of the \$40,000 insurance limit will share in the proceeds with other general creditors. In cases where the deposit liabilities of a failed bank are taken over by another sound bank with financial assistance from the FDIC, depositors have the use of all their funds to the same extent they had in the failed bank before it closed.

Q. How good is FDIC insurance?
A. Since its creation in 1933, the FDIC has never failed to honor its deposit insurance commitment.

The federal deposit insurance fund, which has been built up from insurance premiums paid by FDIC-insured banks and the investment income on such premiums, now stands at more than \$6 billion, and is increasing each year by about \$400 million. In addition, the FDIC, by law, can borrow from the United States Treasury an additional \$3 billion if it finds this necessary for deposit insurance purposes. The FDIC has never found it necessary to borrow any money from the Treasury, however. In fact, although the deposit insurance fund has never been much larger than 1% of all insured deposits in the country, the FDIC has never had to use more than a small amount of the fund at any one time, even when very large banks have failed.

Q. How large have the insurance losses of FDIC been over the years?
A. Putting to one side for the moment the nation's two largest bank failures (United States National Bank, San Diego, in 1973 and Franklin National Bank, New York, last month) the FDIC's net loss in 506 bank failures since 1933 has been approximately \$75 million.

Q. Most of those must have been very small banks. What about the \$1 billion United States National Bank and the \$3.6 billion Franklin National Bank?
A. The FDIC laid out about \$370 million in connection with the failure of United States National Bank, but it expects to recover a substantial portion of this amount as the receivership of that bank progresses. In the case of Franklin National Bank, the FDIC's only outlay so far has been \$100 million for a capital note of European-American Bank & Trust Company and a small amount for initial liquidation expenses (since repaid). Further outlays are possible, but the FDIC's net loss, if any, will probably be very small. No depositor, of course, lost a nickel in either failure.

Q. I thought the FDIC agreed to pay \$1.7 billion to the Federal Reserve System to retire the liquidity loan Franklin needed before it closed. A. It did, but it has the right to collect assets carried on Franklin's books at more than \$2 billion in order to pay off this loan.

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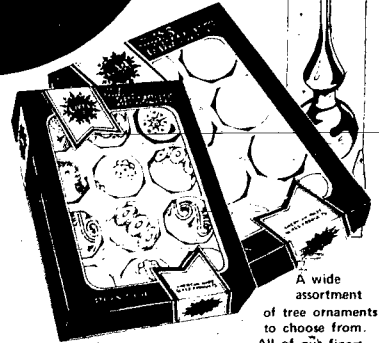
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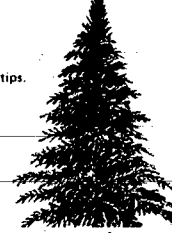

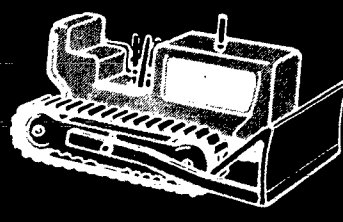
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
