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Easter Egg Hunt Slated

Wayne area youngsters are reminded to start planning for the annual Easter egg hunt scheduled later this month in Bressler Park in Wayne. Council Tackles Wages at Pool, Power Plant Losses

Pay for the manager, assistant manager and hourly workers at Wayne's municipal swimming pool this summer will be the same as paid last year. The city council Tuesday night voted 6-0 to keep the same wages for the manager and assistant manager — \$400 and \$375 a month — and the same hourly wage for the other workers — \$2. However, the council is con-

sidering a suggestion by city administrator Fred Brink that an older person or couple be hired "to oversee the whole operation" at the pool. He told the council it is difficult to find a manager each year who is familiar with the mechanical operation of the pool, forcing city employees to make almost daily trips to the pool to fix and adjust the equipment. An elderly person might be hired

who would be able to take on those duties each year, becoming familiar enough with that job to free city employees, he noted. Similar setups exist at pools in other small towns in the area, he added. Voting to keep the same pay scales as last year were Ted Bahe, Jim Thomas, John Vakoc, Darrel Fueberlin, Leo Hansen and Vernon Russell. Carolyn

Filler and Ivan Beeks were not present for the meeting. Also Tuesday night, the council agreed to permit Brink to begin publicizing problems resulting from the city's municipal generating plant losing money as it is currently being operated. Brink told the council that he earlier had suggested a 15 percent hike in the electrical rates as a way of offsetting those See COUNCIL, page 7

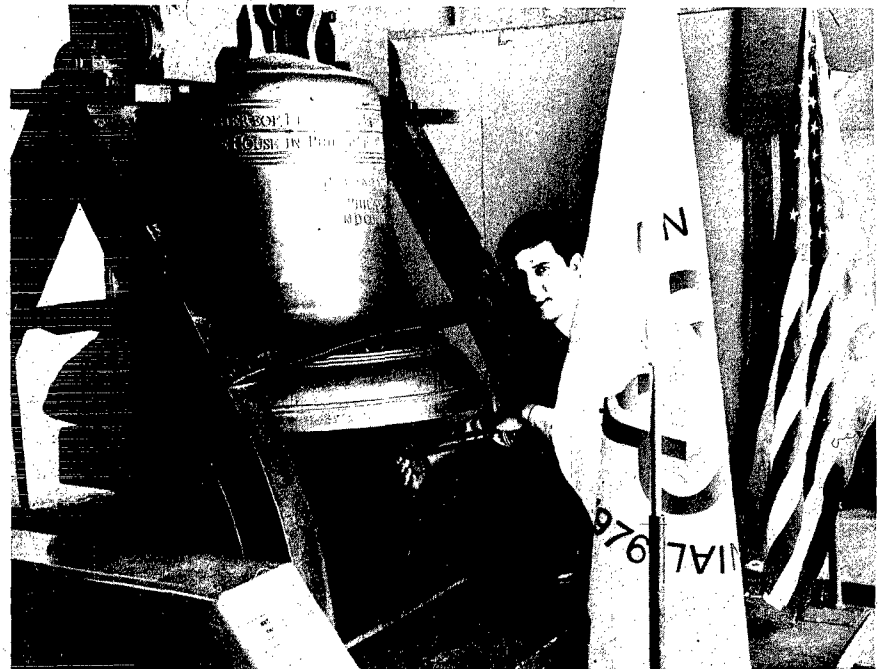
Senior at WSC Is Scholarship Winner

Regardless of Your Cup of Tea, Expo Place to Be

Regardless of your tastes, Wayne's Spring Expo '75 is the place to be this Friday and Saturday.

The two-day exposition, which opens at 6 p.m. Friday in the city auditorium, will have everything from a replica of the original Liberty Bell to a style show offering suggestions on what to wear to be in the swing of things this spring.

All in all, the show should be one of the most successful of its kind held in the city in recent years, according to co-chairmen Darrell Moore and Jack Mancke.

In addition to the nearly 50 booths and tables which will be

on display during the exposition, a total of more than \$2,300 will be awarded in prizes and gift certificates by the exhibitors and the Chamber of Commerce, sponsor of the event.

The total includes \$200 in Birthdays Bucks will be awarded at the close of the show at 9 p.m. Saturday.

Persons who register at the show will be eligible for all drawing, and you need not be present when the drawings are held to win.

Helping kick off the exposition Friday night will be a style show beginning at 7:30. Local residents will model clothes from Swan's Women Apparel, McDon-

ald's, Swan McLean Clothing, Gibson's Discount Center, Surber's and Kuhn's Department Store. Directing the style show is Mrs. Lois Hall.

The exposition opens again Saturday morning at 10 o'clock and features a cooking school at 2 p.m. A home service advisor for Nebraska Public Power District will conduct the school, offering tips on everything from using a microwave oven to outdoor grilling. Mrs. Janice Thayer is in charge of that event.

The Liberty Bell replica, brought to the city by the local National Guard, is 12 feet tall and weighs 2,080 pounds. With

the platform, frame and yoke, the bell weighs more than 4,000 pounds.

One of the 53 cast in France in 1950, the bell is being displayed throughout the state by the Nebraska Bicentennial Commission and several other organizations in order to spur interest in the national observance of the American Bicentennial.

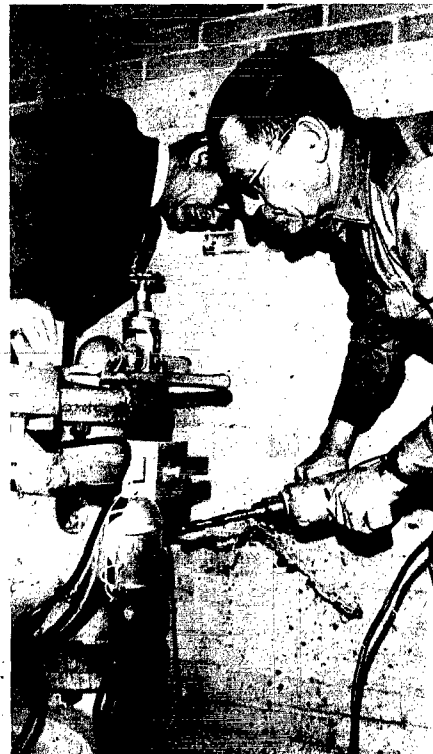
In addition to the 33 booths which will be set up in the city auditorium, several non-profit and civic organizations will have displays in the Women's Club room on Saturday only.

The End Is Near for City's Fluoridation Story

Within the next few days all Wayne residents will be drinking water containing levels of fluoride higher than in past years.

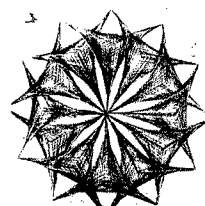
John Redel, city street department employee, and Burt Spicer, a representative of a Lincoln firm which sold the city its fluoridation equipment, began installing the injecting and metering devices on four of the city's seven wells Tuesday morning.

Installation was expected to take less than a day, but the equipment would not go into operation immediately, according to city administrator Fred Brink. He estimated that it may take a week before all water being pumped through those four wells — the only ones the city is required by law to adapt for fluoridation — contains higher levels of fluoride than exists naturally as the water is pumped from the earth.

Installation and operation of the equipment will climax a long story which began several months ago in Wayne when opponents of fluoridation petitioned the city council to put the issue on the November general election ballot. It was, and voters narrowly approved fluoridation in the city.

Wayne was one of a handful of Nebraska communities to approve fluoridation last year. Most rejected fluoridation at the polls rather than comply with a law passed by the 1973 legislature which said all communities in the state would have to boost the fluoride level of their water if it fell below a certain level.

Also approving fluoridation in this area of the state was Laurel, but voters in Concord, Dixon, Wakefield, Carroll, Winslow and Hoskins voted against. See FLUORIDATION, page 7

87 Could Vie In 2nd 'Bee'

A total of 87 seventh and eighth graders in rural schools in Wayne County are eligible to participate in Friday's second annual county spelling contest.

The contest will be held in the north dining room of the Student Center on Wayne State campus. Registration will be held from 9:30 to 10 a.m., followed by the written examination in the morning and the oral examination in the afternoon.

Winner of the contest will receive a \$25 savings bond and the right to compete in the April 12th state spelling bee sponsored by the Omaha World-Herald at Boys Town. The winner there advances to the national spelling bee scheduled for Washington, D.C.

Other prizes which will be awarded in the county contest include a dictionary for second place, \$5 in cash for third place and several \$1 prizes. Some businesses in the city may also award prizes.

Winside Okays Girls' Basketball

Winside High School will offer girls' basketball during the 1975-76 school year, board members agreed Monday night.

During the first year, the girls' team will play six games, but as yet no opponents have been scheduled, according to superintendent Don Leighton.

Board members also issued teacher contracts for the 1975-76 school year. Teachers have until April 7 to return the contracts, either signed or unsigned, Leighton said.

The board voted to accept land belonging to Leland Anderson and Dennis Bowers northeast of Winside into District 95R since District 40 is dissolving.

Clothing Specialist Says Sew Your Own Bicentennial Costume

If your involvement in upcoming Bicentennial activities means sewing a historical costume, there are a number of sources you can go to for help.

According to Gail Skinner, extension clothing specialist at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, pattern books in many fabric shops now carry a section with historical patterns.

The Nebraska State Historical Society, 1509 R. St., Lincoln, 68508, can also offer information for the seamstress set on developing an historical costume.

Gail DeBuse, in charge of historic textiles and costumes at the Historical Society, will answer individual requests for information.

Persons wishing information should specify years of costumes, whether they want everyday wear, dressy costumes, children's wear, shoes, accessories or hairstyles, and indicate if they are interested in Nebraska pioneer clothing or in Eastern fashions of a particular period.

Ms. Skinner also noted that

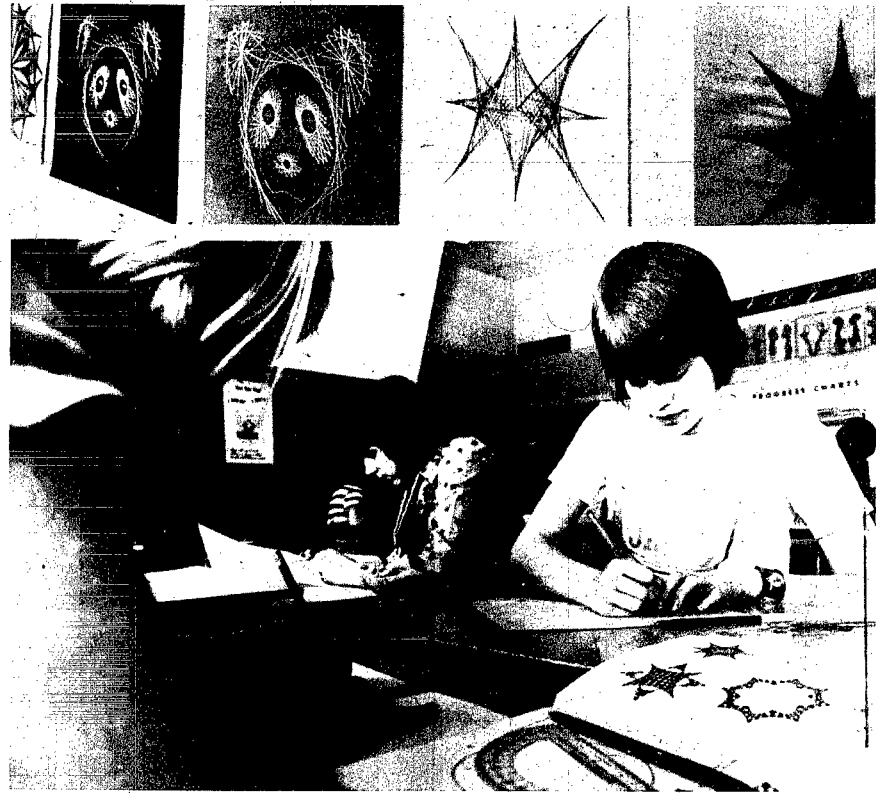
the Wisconsin State Historical Society will have historical patterns available this year in sizes 10, 12 and 14 for a range of 30 styles from 1835 through 1899.

The four styles available in 1975: 1856 visiting dress; 1865 afternoon dress; 1876 walking dress and 1895 suit.

The patterns will sell for \$10 or less and will include the dress pattern and sketch, construction and sewing instructions, fabric and trim suggestions and specific directions for making understructures such as hoop skirts or bustles.

There will also be a booklet of fashion for the year of the particular pattern which will give descriptions and quotes on the popular colors, fabrics, hats, jewelry and fads of the era.

Theme was "Become Perfectly One."

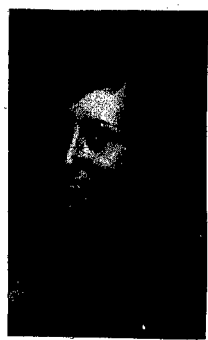

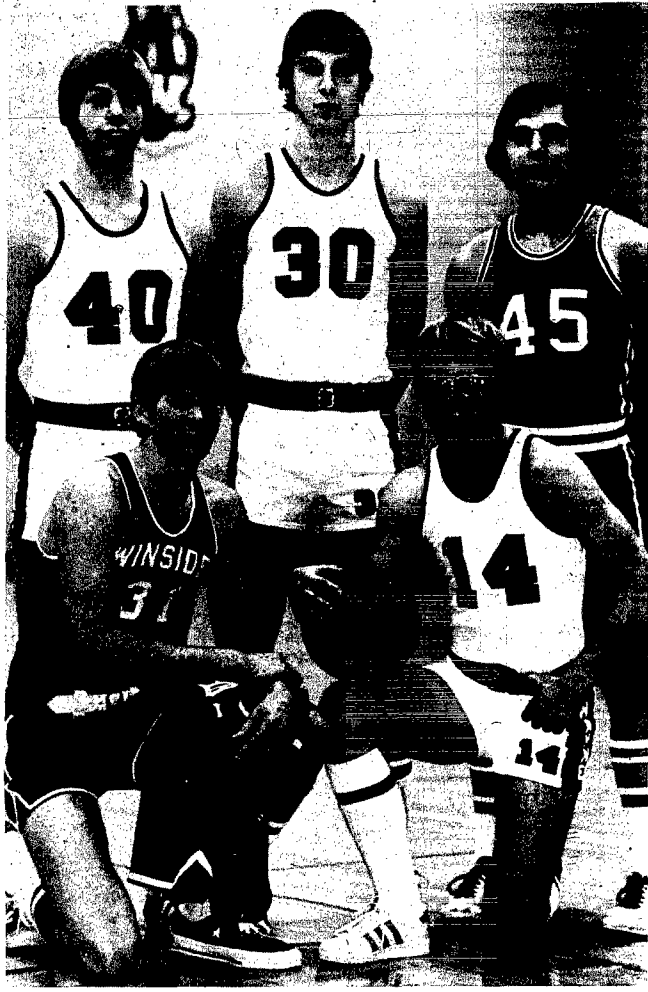
High scorer for Dixon was Kenny Strivens with 10.

Herald's All-Area Club Has Shooters, Lacks Height

A characteristic of the players on this year's third annual Wayne Herald All Area Basketball Team is double-figure scoring. That's expected, but what's not expected is the players' lack of height.

Only Wayne High senior Bob Keating fills the bill for the height requirement. He stands 6-5. As for the other four players, they range from 5-10 to 6-3.

However, height isn't the primary measure of the other four players. Their scoring and leadership on the court are. That's how seniors Jack Froehlich and Marty Hansen of Wayne High, Junior Bob Hoffman of Winside and senior Sterling Stolpe of Laurel earned berths on this year's squad. The team was chosen by the Herald staff and area coaches.

Both Hansen, 5-10, and Froehlich, 6-2, contributed leadership that helped Wayne to an 18-5 record this season, said coach, Bill Sharpe. Hansen had an 11.6 scoring average, led the team with 136 assists and collected 56 interceptions and steals. Froehlich, labeled "an exceptionally good rebounder" by Sharpe, averaged about 10 rebounds and 10 points an outing.

Although Froehlich and Keating were about even in rebounding this season, Keating's late surge gave him a 15-rebound average per game. In addition, he averaged just over 10 points a game. "He also played well on defense, clogging up the middle for us," Sharpe reflected.

Laurel coach Joel Parks had a tough time choosing the player he thought deserved a spot on this year's quint. Laurel was a balanced club, but the 6-0 Stolpe got the nod because he led the team in scoring with 13 points a game while grabbing about eight rebounds per outing.

Like the rest of the top five, Stolpe had the leadership, to make his team a winner. Laurel, which finished with a 17-8 record, won the Class C district title the second year in a row. Helping make that possible was Stolpe's season high 25 points against Harrington High in the district finals.

Winside's Bob Hoffman, 6-0, wasn't the leading scorer on coach Korin Luff's squad this year, but he did a good job rebounding, helping the Wildcats almost break the 300 mark this season.

Hoffman, who averaged about 16 points a game, cleared 178 rebounds during the season. "Bob has good jumping ability which makes him one of the league leaders," Luff said.

Throughout most of the season Hoffman was ranked fourth in the Lewis and Clark Conference in rebounding, one reason Hoffman was named to the all conference team the second straight year.

Not to be forgotten: All three Wayne players on this year's all area team were named to the West Husker all tourney team. The Northeast Nebraska Activities Conference, of which Laurel is a member, hasn't named its all tourney team. Scoring punch also is a trademark of the second team, but even more important is its defensive ability. On the second unit are Wakefield's Don Myers and Scott Mills; Laurel's Mark Anderson, Winside's Tyler Frevert and Wayne's Earle Overin.

Leading the quint on defense are Myers and Mills. A 6-3 senior transfer from Verdigris, Myers was instrumental on the boards, clearing about 14 rebounds a game. When Myers was out of the game, Wakefield's rebounding and fast break suffered, admitted coach Joe Coble.

In keeping with Coble's philosophy that defense and rebounding are important keys for a winning team, Mills, a 5-10 senior, often put the clamps on his opponent's scoring. "Scott would guard players who were 6-3 and get the job done," Coble reflected.

As expected, both Myers and Mills were strong shooters, averaging about 10 points a game.

Anderson, 5-11, also was strong defense. Playing guard, the senior didn't allow many to score from the outside. Parks noted, but his biggest contributions were his 93 rebounds for the season and almost 10 points per game.

Turning to the scoring both Overin and Frevert fit the mold. Frevert, a junior, ended the season with a 17 point average. Although he lacked size (he's 5-10), he made up for it with talent, Luff said.

Overin, who finished with a 12.5 average, got most of his points from the outside, in addition to scoring the 6-0 senior was the team leader in assists with 60.

A Frustrated Jim Meyer Still Flashes Smile

At first there was frustration. Jim Meyer came off the mat feeling disconsolate after time ran out on his consolation finals match in the NAIA national wrestling tournament Saturday night at Sioux City.

There was frustration perhaps not so much that he placed fourth instead third — but that a cagey opponent played defensive strategy the last two rounds. Meyer pursued throughout his adversary, Alan Betcher of Southern Oregon College, was warned for stalling at one point. But is ended at 3:2, without enough riding time to change the score. Haayer recalled that senior Meyer would have been in the championship finals had the clock allowed six more seconds to give him a tie breaking point on riding time in a Friday match. Instead the scrap went into overtime, and Meyer lost 4-1 to Glenn Guerin of Taylor University. The fifth seeded Guerin lost later and had to settle for fifth.

By the time awards were presented to the 126-pounders, Meyer's typical smile beamed. The Wayne High graduate could enjoy a record-breaking number of wins, 34 with 7 losses, more victories than any Wayne wrestler ever managed in one season.

The previous high belongs to

Ken Monroe, who went 26-2 a couple of years ago when he won this third national championship at 167 pounds. Monroe's career mark of 92-9-2 remains Wayne's best.

Meyer also kept a string of Wayne State national placings alive at eight years consecutive. In fact, WSC wrestlers have earned at least one place in 11 of the 12 years in national competition.

Meyer earned all of Wayne's 12 1/2 team points. The four other Wildcat entries lost in first round matches.

Bud Froehling of Peru won the 150 pound championship for Nebraska's only first, and Peru's first national title in any sport.

Peru placed fifteenth with 28 points. Adams State claimed an unprecedented, fifth team championship with 61 points. A record 110 teams competed

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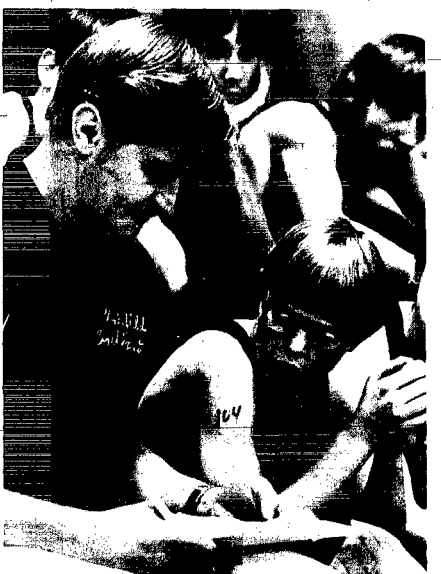



With this there was widespread disagreement, evidenced by a standing ovation after what was announced as the final number. Then followed two lively pieces by Gershwin.

Next week the music department will present the concert choir's performance Thursday evening at 8 in Ramsey Theatre. Conductor Cornell Runestad will lead the choir in Mendelssohn's "The Elijah," which Dr. Rune stad calls the "world's second best oratorio after 'The Messiah'."

Also on the calendar: the college stage band concert Wednesday, March 26, and the orchestra concert Wednesday, April 9.

Allen Okays Buying New Water Meters

The Allen Village board last week okayed purchasing 30 readout meters and 130 readout meters for installation June 1 in houses and businesses.

losses, but now a 20 per cent rate hike is "more likely."

The problem is not being caused by salaries paid at the generating plant, according to Brink, but apparently stems from repeated hikes in fuel costs.

During discussion of the subject, Keith Mosley, manager of Peoples Natural Gas Co. in Wayne, informed the council that natural gas for the power plant will be curtailed 50 per cent this year, 80 per cent next year and 100 per cent in 1977, forcing the plant to burn fuel oil exclusively for electrical generation. These curtailments are being dictated by federal guidelines, according to Mosley.

Electrical generation at the power plant is more expensive when burning fuel oil than when burning natural gas, according to local officials.

Mayor Freeman Decker noted during the discussion that he tells people asking about the problem that "we're going to have to do something because we're losing money month after month." It does not make sense, he said, to hang onto a "sacred cow" if it is costing local residents money.

The city for the past several months has been purchasing electricity from Nebraska Public Power District (NPPD) at times when it is offered at low rates.

In other action Tuesday night, the council:

Heard a proposal from a representative of the Nebraska League of Municipalities that the city band together with other communities which generate their own power in order to form a block of negotiating with large power producers such as NPPD and Omaha Public Power District. The city's bill for joining the group would be \$1,895 a year.

Learned that the city's planning commission will hold a special meeting on March 24 at 7:30 p.m. in the city auditorium. Present for the meeting to answer questions on planning and development will be the city's planning consultant, and films will be shown, according to commission chairman Merv Mordness. The meeting is open to the public.

Postponed action on recommendations by Decker for persons to serve on board of appeals for those having questions about the city's building codes and for persons to serve on the Wayne County Selective Localized Accident Prevention (SLAP) committee. The committee exists to help reduce traffic accidents and hazardous conditions.

Approved on a 50 vote increasing the bond for the city treasurer from \$25,000 to \$100,000. Bahr abstained, noting that the action had already been taken.

Approved the application of Bob Malsen as manager of the Vet's Club; the application will be forwarded to the state liquor commission for approval.

Vote 4-3 to have the city attorney draw up an ordinance which would do away with the ordinance prohibiting smoking during council meetings. In favor of drawing up the proposed ordinance were Russell, Bahr, Thomas and Decker. Voting against it were Vakoc, Fuelberth and Hansen. The council will have to vote on the ordinance before it could go into effect.

Unicameral in Action: Corporate Farms? They're Like UFO's — Sen. Murphy

By IVY HARPER Sen. John Murphy of South Sioux City says he thinks corporate farms are like UFO's. "Everybody always talks about them," he said, "but no one has ever seen one."

Murphy was referring to three bills before the Legislature this week, all dealing with Nebraska's farms.

LB 363, LB 203, and LB 214 were introduced by Sens. George Burrows of Adams, Jules Burbach of Crofton and Douglas Bereuter of Ulster.

The hearing on the three bills Thursday drew an estimated 500 persons and lasted six and one half hours.

Murphy said Sen. Loran Schmitl of Bellwood, chairman of the agriculture and environment committee, told Murphy he didn't think testimony at the hearing was in the subject of corporate farms, which is what the bills were about.

At the end of the hearing, Schmitl told the introducers that none of the bills could be advanced in their original form.

"There was very little factual support," Murphy said about the hearings.

None of the persons testifying could relate instances where corporations had come in and taken over farms, Murphy said.

What people don't understand, Murphy added, is that a family can be a corporation and still maintain the family farm structure.

Several witnesses said the proposed legislation could hurt the farmer more than it would help him.

Murphy said that, in effect, farmers who oppose corporate farms are cutting their own throats. He stressed that a farmer can only borrow up to five per cent, but a corporation can borrow any amount.

He added that there are other problems that farmers cannot cope with which could be solved if the family farm was incorporated.

Murphy said he will vote against outlawing corporate farms if and when such a bill comes before the Legislature.

Sen. Bereuter explained that the purpose of his bill is to limit the further intrusion of large corporations into farming operations and to propose that every corporation

engaged in farming file a report with the secretary of state.

Most supporters and opponents testified that a good reporting system for corporations is necessary so Nebraskans will know if there is conglomerate intrusion.

Bereuter said his bill closely parallels legislation enacted in Minnesota in 1973.

Sen. Burrows said the goal of his bill is "to reduce the flow of rural people to the urban areas where employment is already a problem. The human impact of our policies must be considered as well as technological advancement."

LB203's purpose, according to Burbach, is to permit "the continuation of family-sized farms and to abolish large corporations. It would still permit smaller corporate farming when it is confined to 10 members or less as incorporators."

He said the bill also provides for a reporting system of agricultural corporations with certain details spelled out and provides for a penalty to those who don't.

Under his proposal, authorized farm corporations would mean shareholders can not exceed 10.

Under this plan possibly a man and a student helper will be employed on community improvement projects for a period of twenty six weeks.

Possible selection of a man and student helper will be made at a later date.

There being no further business a motion was made by Dennis Rohde and seconded by Ken Eddie that the meeting be adjourned. All members voted yes. The next regular meeting will be at 8:00 p.m. on April 1, 1975.

Burbach's bill would outlaw vertical integration for any corporation with assets over \$5 million.

Outlawing vertical integration would mean that no one business entity could control production from raw material or animals to what finally reaches the consumer. Vertical integration, according to Burbach, results in one entity controlling the market, thereby hurting the individual farmer.

The Nebraska Stock Growers, Society for Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers, Livestock Feeders Association, Nebraska Grange and Nebraska Farm Bureau spoke in opposition to the three bills.

The passage of Burrows' bill was urged by the Rural Action Group, and both the Nebraska National Farmers Organization and Nebraska Farmers Union urged passage of legislation regulating large corporate intrusion in Nebraska's farms.

Sen. John DeCamp of Neligh suggested that a task force be formed to study the entire farm structure so necessary legislation can be drawn up.





Some Taxpayers Taking Extra Deductions

Taxpayers are entitled to deduct \$750 for each dependent, but some taxpayers are trying to do it twice, according to Everett Loury, IRS district director for Nebraska.

Many returns show taxpayers deducting \$750 for each dependent and then using the tax table which already has this amount for each dependent figured in, he said. This means that taxpayers making this mistake are claiming \$1500 for each dependent.

Loury asks all taxpayers using the standard deduction tax tables not to also deduct separately an additional \$750 for each dependent. These errors require additional computation and may delay a refund check for as much as two weeks longer, he said.

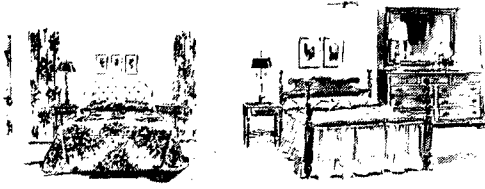

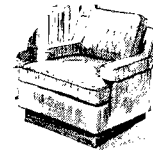

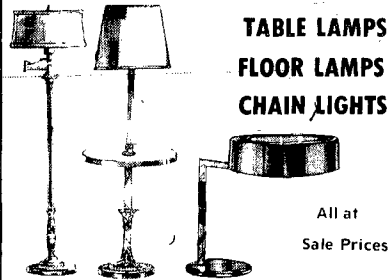

Exon's 'lump sum' budget plan has its critics

CAPITOL NEWS
Lincoln — Governor J. J. Exon's proposal to give the University of Nebraska \$71.6 million with no strings attached appeals to some university officials — but not all of them.

Medical Center chancellor Robert Sparks, testifying before the Legislature's budget committee last week, said the lump sum approach made it difficult for him to comment because he didn't know how much of the lump the Medical Center could expect to get.

Criticism of the Exon plan was offered also by spokesmen for the agricultural industry who said they wanted to be sure that the Institute for Agriculture and Natural Resources received an amount adequate to its needs.

The Exon plan was unveiled in his budget message. He said he was cutting the university funding to the

point so close, in fact, that he decided NU regents and administrators should have maximum flexibility in deciding how to spend it.

The first critic — and a loud one — was senator Richard Marvel of Hastings, chairman of the budget committee. He said the Exon plan was unworkable and probably unconstitutional.

The constitutional reference, he said, was to the legislative function of appropriations, something Marvel said couldn't be delegated to the regents, let alone the administrators, of the university.

Even though the Exon budget recommendations for the university, which the Marvel committee had under review last week, were described by the governor as high, one of the executive branch's budget analysts said NU was in line for better fiscal

treatment than some higher education systems.

Jon Oberg said tax support is being cut two per cent in Michigan, and Wisconsin higher education institutions have been told they'll have to live two more years on the same tax dollars they got this year.

Oberg said it should be noted that the Exon recommendation for the university represents a 41 per cent — or \$20 million — increase over the 1973-74 appropriations.

Speaking to the committee in a briefing before university officials arrived to testify, Oberg said it is reasonable to demand that demonstrable progress toward excellence be shown with that kind of additional financial support.

One of the budgetary techniques launched by the 1974 Legislature was the areas of excellence program — which was aimed at showing just how

additional dollars would help specific areas improve.

Each campus chose areas of excellence and then evaluation teams representing experts from other universities, Nebraska laymen and senators would visit the campus and see how the money was being used.

Senator Harold Simpson of Lincoln, a budget committee member, said the idea wasn't of any value to him because the reports from the evaluators were coming in after the university made its request for a new budget and after the executive and legislative fiscal staffs had done their analysis.

But journalism professor Neale Copple of the Lincoln campus, who has been coordinating the UNL areas of excellence, said the program was designed to work over a three year period and there would be cumulative

benefits for the budget-writers as well as the university.

Copple said the visitation teams had been very tough in their reviews of the programs. He said the program, based on the initial year, has been a "phenomenal success."

Special Ed Aid Passes
A bill its sponsors said would keep special educational programs for handicapped children going until a long range solution is found to financing problems was passed by the Legislature.

LB 555 got 40-7 approval, which means school districts which have programs — or are contracting for them — to serve mentally or physically handicapped youngsters need to list the children, the nature of the handicap and the services provided and get the report in to the state education department

Within four weeks, the department is to distribute up to \$2 million to help the districts with their special education financing.

The money is part of the \$8.6 million appropriated for this year to fund a program in which the state agrees to pay 90 per cent of the extra costs a school district encounters in providing special education.

The financing got tangled in all kinds of red tape when the first two of the quarterly payments were to be made and there was a danger that some special education programs would be disbanded because state dollars that had been expected weren't being distributed.

LB 555 was designed to get some money out so programs wouldn't wither.

Education chairman Frank Lewis of Bellevue said more permanent answers to the red tape tangle would be worked out soon.

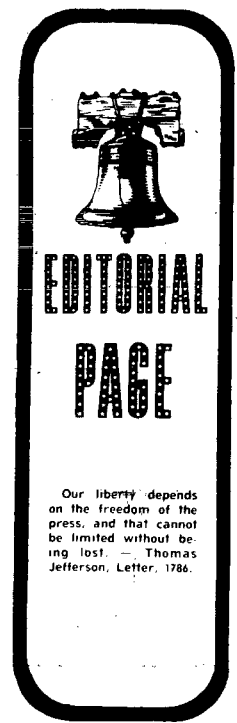

Thousands excluded from President's clemency program

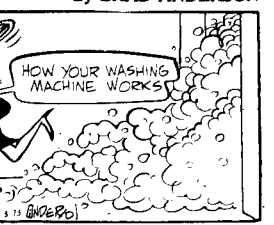
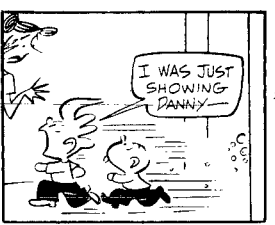

WASHINGTON — Some 7,500 Americans in Canada, together with smaller numbers in other countries of Europe and Asia, may be excluded from participating in the President's amnesty program by the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS).

These men are primarily Vietnam war resisters who have been in their host countries long enough to have become naturalized citizens (in the case of Canada, five years), and who are deemed in INS to be aliens "who have departed from or who have remained outside the United States to avoid or evade training or service in the armed forces."

The President's clemency program specifically excludes from participation persons whose situation fits that quote, which is from a section of the immigration and nationality law.

And although the law and case history are hazy, leaving plenty of room to help

There's good news as well as bad news concerning the American economy.

I think we've been reading and hearing too much of the bad news. More emphasis needs to be placed on the good news. America's economic recovery depends very much on the attitudes of its citizens. For that reason, it is important that Mr. and Mrs. John Q. Public be aware of some of the good news about the economy.

Stock market prices are up more than 20 per cent since the beginning of the year. That means millions of small investors are gaining more confidence in the future.

The interest rate that banks charge their best commercial risks has gone down 31 per cent in five months. That means that the cost of borrowing is going down for everyone, making more money available for an expanding economy.

Wholesale prices have gone down in each of the past three months — the first time that has happened since 1967. Those wholesale prices will have to be reflected in lower retail price tags in the months

just ahead. This development means that we are curbing runaway inflation, at least temporarily.

New car sales in February exceeded those of the same month last year. That means that the industry that has been hardest hit by the current recession is getting rid of its backlog of automobiles.

There are even some good news aspects to the bad news. Our unemployment rate is over eight per cent. That is bad news. There is certainly no way that anyone who has been laid off work is going to look at the bright side of employment statistics. Certainly, all of us ought to be sympathetic to anyone who has lost a job.

Objectively, however, it is good to note that there is only 2.7 per cent fewer people employed now than at the nation's record high. There are five reasons why there hasn't been a larger percentage change in the number employed. Our population wanting jobs is growing all the time. And, there are always people

unemployed even during our biggest booms.

The low prices that farmers who raise cattle are receiving for their animals is certainly bad news for them and for our Midwestern economy. The same situation, however, is providing temporary good news for each housewife. The price of beef now is considerably lower than it was a couple of years ago. It's probably lower now than it will ever be again. Anyone who has freezer space and available funds would be wise to take advantage of present low prices for beef. Of course, if our farmers who feed cattle don't receive better prices in the near future, the consumer will suffer in the future because of a shortage of beef.

No one should overlook bad news. We must face facts, both good and bad. It's time now, however, for a little emphasis on the good news. This is still the land of opportunity. Right now, when America is in a recession, there are young men and women beginning businesses that will grow to be giant industries. I believe that if you put your faith in the future of America, your trust will be well placed.

'Some days, aspirin is a senator's only answer'

It was another long week. On Monday, March 3, the insurance committee, which I chair, heard the two different versions of no-fault insurance. This insurance covers only the cost of medical expense and loss of wages that result from an automobile accident. Too many people have the mistaken opinion that no-fault covers automobile damage and property damage. It does not.

Senator John DeCamp of Neligh introduced the trial attorneys' version, which would preserve to the greatest extent possible the opportunity to bring suit to recover not only medical expenses and lost wages but also other damages, that is, pain and suffering.

The bill I introduced was endorsed by the Nebraska State Department of Insurance and representatives of the insurance industry. It brings the state into compliance with the mandates of the U.S. Senate bill.

The arguments were diametrically opposed on an almost point by point basis, and it made for a long afternoon. The testimony extended from 2 till 5:45. The committee will now consider the relative merits of the arguments in an executive session and will act upon each bill, either killing it

or advancing it to the floor for debate on general file.

Tuesday was not to be outdone by Monday. The same committee heard two bills. One dealt with the subject of direct branch banking throughout the state, the other with indirect branch banking through multi-bank holding companies.

The principle proponents of both bills were three of the larger banks in the state. The Nebraska Bankers Association and the Independent Bankers Association were strongly opposed to the concept that there is need for or benefit to be derived from such legislation. Again, it was 5:30 before the public hearing was over.

Hearings like these are difficult to chair. Where the parties involved offer conflicting testimony, the hearing provokes many questions from committee members as they strive to reach a proper decision.

Thursday, I presented Atokad's weekend recreation bill to the miscellaneous subjects committee. A busload of supporters was in attendance. The show of support by these people will encourage the committee to advance the bill, particularly in view of the well presented testimony.

Before leaving for Lincoln, I must remember to take two aspirin and deliver this column to the editor.

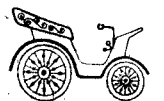

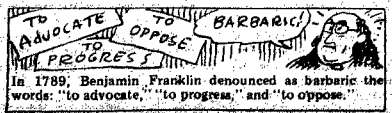

New DES Regulation
 Effective March 16, all cattle and sheep presented for slaughter at federally inspected establishments must be accompanied by certificates stating they have not been fed DES (Diethylstilbestrol) for the preceding 14 days.

The reason for the order is that an increasing number of violations have been detected since the use of DES has been reinstated. Animals had either been slaughtered before the withdrawal time was completed or the withdrawal period was not long enough.

Lice on Cattle
 Korlan is registered for control of lice as a pour on material. Other products, such as Ruelene, Warbes, Ro-Ral, and Nevugon, are not suggested for use in January, February and March. They are systemic grub control compounds and could cause adverse reaction.

'74 Drouth Results in \$1 Billion Crop Loss

The 1974 drouth caused a \$1 billion loss in the value of corn, sorghum, soybeans, wheat and hay produced in Nebraska, estimates state statistician Doug Murfield.

Murfield used yield level trends from past years to figure what "normal" yields would have been in 1974 had the drouth not occurred. He then compared the total value of these hypothetical normal yields to the estimated 1974 yields.

The following season average prices were used in Murfield's calculations: corn \$3.45 per bushel, sorghum \$3.14 per bushel, soybeans \$7.60 per bushel, wheat \$1.10 per bushel, hay \$3.50 per ton.

For example, if 1974 had been a normal year, corn grain yields would have been about 115 bushels per acre, irrigated, 74 bushels, non-irrigated, and 13 tons per acre crop silage. Value of these corn crops would have totaled \$2.158 billion.

Includ, Murfield related, irrigated corn produced 103 bushels

TGE
 Here are some suggestions from extension veterinarians on TGE.

1. Many TGE outbreaks can be traced to the recent purchases of feeder pigs. It has recently been found that TGE virus can be carried by feeder pigs for as long as 104 days after they have recovered from the infection.

2. TGE is very contagious. Pork producers should adapt the two-bait system: one pair to wear to town where other pork producers congregate, and one pair to wear at home when doing chores with the swine herd.

3. Restrict all visitors from contact with the pigs and sows for three weeks before farrowing begins and until weaning time.

In the judging contests held as part of the show, Denise Magnuson of Laurel placed second in the division for adult women. She placed just behind Diane Kubicek of North Bend in the contest.

A record 526 hogs were shown in the Fremont event, 400 of them crossbreds.

All hogs shown will be entered in a carcass contest based on per cent of ham and loin.

The show was sponsored by the George A. Hormel and Co., the University of Nebraska extension service and animal science department, and the Fremont Chamber of Commerce.
