

He added that there are offier problems that farmers cannot cope with which could be solved if the family farm was incor-porated.

Murphy said he will vote against outlaw-ing corporate tarms if and when such a bill comes before of the Legislature.



ware of some of the good news about the eronomy. Stock market prices are up more than 20 per cent since the beginning of the year. That means millions of small givestors are gaining more confidence in the future. The interest rate that banks charge their best commercial risks has gone down 31 per cent in five months. That means that the cost of borrowing is going down for everyone, mgking more money javailable for an expanding economy. Wholesale prices have gone down in each of the past three months - the first time that has happened since 1967. Those wholesale prices will have to be reflected in lower retail price tags in the months

just ahead. This development means that we are curbing runaway inflation, at least temporarily.

New car sales in February exceeded those of the same month last year. That means that the industry that has been hardest hit by the current recession is getting rid of its backlog of automobiles.

There are even some good news aspects to the bad news. Our unemploy ment rate is over eight per cent. That is bad news. There is certainly no way that anyone who has been laid off work is going to look at the bright side of employment statistics. Certainly, all of us sought to be sympathetic to anyone who has lost a job.

Objectively, however, it is good to note that there is only 2.7 per cent fewer people employed now than at the nation's record peak. Thousands excluded from President's clemency program

By RON HENDREN WASHINGTON – Some 7,500 Ameri-cans in Canada, together with smaller numbers in other countries of Europe and Asia, may be excluded from participating in the President's amerity program by the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS). These men are primarily View resisters where

The U₂₃ Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS). These men are primarily Vietnam war resisters who have been in their host countries long enough to have become naturalized citizens (in the case of Canada, five years), and who are deemed from or who have remained outside the outside states to avoid or evade training or service in the armed forces." The President's clemency program specifically excludes from participation persons whose situation fits that quote, which is from a section of the immigra-tion and nationality law. And although the law and case history are hazy, leaving plenty of room to help

The word voluntarily is the key. One

line of argument that has some promise — and a smattering of case history on the administrative law level — is economic coercion. That is, in the absence of clemency program that would permit them to re-enter the United States, these men were economically forced to become naturalized citizens of their host countri-es in order to obtain jobs, social services, and the like
