Public Asked to Help Youths Relive the Past

Wayne area residents who own antiques are being asked to display them at the city auditorium Tuesday afternoon in conjunction with the second annual Wayne Middle School Senior Citizens Center history program.

Dan Johnson, middle school social studies teacher who has been working with center members in planning this year's educational program for his seventh grade Nebraska history students, said that the Wayne County Historical Society will not permit its antiques to be displayed at the auditorium during the program.

If area residents do not respond by offering their antiques to be displayed, much of the effect of the program will be lost, he noted.

The students have been studying about Nebraska history for several weeks, he said, and are looking forward to seeing real examples of some of the things they have been learning about.

Persons wishing to display antiques may either take them to the city auditorium between 8:45 and 11:30 a.m. Tuesday or get in touch with Johnson so he can pick them up.

All antiques displayed will be handled with care, Johnson emphasized.

Members of the Senior Citizens Center plan on displaying some of their own antiques during the program, noted Mrs. Jocell Bull, center director.

The county historical society has a policy of not permitting antiques from the museum on the top floor of the county courthouse in Wayne to be displayed in public except when the society sponsors such a display, according to a society member.

Tuesday's program is scheduled to begin at 12:30 with observing of antiques.

Also scheduled during the program are group singing, skits by the students, a style show by members of the center wearing old fashioned clothes, square dancing and reports by students of their interviews with the elderly residents of the community.

The youths also will recite poems by the late John G. Neihardt, former Nebraska poet laureate, and will have an opportunity to taste homemade bread and butter prepared by center members.

The program, open to the public at no charge, will end at 4 p.m.

Highway Work Closer

The state of roads department has received approval from the federal highway administration for the study of design of proposed resurfacing of Highway 35 east of Wayne.

The proposed resurfacing project would begin at the east edge of Wayne and would run east and then north for about 9.4 miles, according to the state roads department.

Hoskins Board Will Review Sewage Plans

Hoskins town board will meet with a representative of a Columbus engineering firm tonight (Monday) to examine plans for the town's new waste treatment facilities.

Officials will look at plans for a mechanical plant and a lagoon system before seeking bids on both, according to board member Herman Opler.

The board earlier authorized the Columbus firm to draw up two different plans so federal officials could determine which would cost less.

Almost two years ago the federal government okayed building a mechanical plant at the site of the community's present plant located near Spring Branch Creek on the west side of town. However, inflation boosted the estimated \$50,000 project to near \$100,000, causing federal officials to cancel construction.

The federal government would pay 75 per cent of the total cost, with the state and Hoskins splitting the remaining 25 per cent.

AA Groups Sponsor Film On Alcoholism

Wayne's two Alcoholics Anonymous groups will sponsor a film on alcoholism Friday at 8 p.m. in the basement of the Grace Lutheran Church in Wayne.

Winside Teachers' Pay In Hands of Committee

Winside teachers and school board have named their representatives on the three-man fact finding committee which will attempt to settle pay negotiations for the 1975-76 school year.

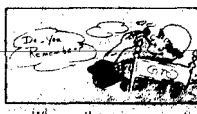
Selected last week to represent the teachers is Noel Roberts—of the Nebraska—State Education Association, Norfolk attorney Robert Oite will represent the school board.

The two representatives now will name a third party before talks begin.

Two weeks ago the board and teachers declared they had reached an impasse after failing to come to an agreement on the board's wanting to deviate from the salary schedule to three teachers and the board's refusal to increase insurance coverage.

The teachers want the school district to pay full single and family insurance coverage that would total over \$11,000, according to superintendent Don Leighton. The district presently offers full single and half family coverage for a total cost of about \$6,800, he said.

Both groups agree on the \$7,500 base salary for the coming school year and on the four per cent pay hike for each year of teaching experience and the four per cent pay hike for each nine hours of college credit beyond a bachelor's degree.

A member of the Wayne-Carroll school board has been named to the state advisory council for the new ESEA (Elementary and Secondary Education Act) Title IV, according to the Nebraska Department of Education.

ESEA Title IV will consolidate a number of existing federal programs after July 1, including library resources, instructional equipment, innovative and exemplary programs, assistance to state departments of education—planning and evaluation; dropout prevention, and nutrition and health.

W-C School District Not Among Leaders in Immunizing Children

Although the immunization level for measles among Wayne-Carroll kindergartners is high, the immunization level for rubella is at the minimum recommended by the state and the immunization level for polio is considerably under that minimum.

Immunization against measles for local kindergartners is 96.7 per cent, putting the school above the 90 per cent minimum considered necessary to guard against outbreaks of measles in a school, according to the state department of health.

However, local kindergartners have only the minimum 90 per cent immunization for rubella and only 83.3 per cent immunization for polio, according to figures compiled by local school officials as of Dec. 20.

Of the 37 school districts in the state with total kindergarten enrollment between 50 and 150, Wayne-Carroll ranks ninth in measles immunization, 23rd in rubella immunization and 35th in polio immunization, according to the state department.

Even though more than 90 per cent of the kindergartners are immunized against measles, there could still be an outbreak of that disease in the local school system, state officials note.

Outbreaks of measles in Omaha began in a school with reported immunization levels of 90 per cent or higher, they note.

"This proves measles and rubella outbreaks are possible unless all children are immunized," said William Pack, immunization coordinator with the state health department.

In addition, information concerning the immunization status of kindergartners is not documented in all cases by a physician or health agency record, he noted. "Since it is not documented, parents may be incorrect in saying their children have been immunized against those diseases and that may result in a higher immunization level being reported for schools than is actually true, he added.

Only two of the 37 school districts included in the state department's latest report had 100 per cent immunization against measles as of Dec. 20. They were Holdrege and Minden.

Only three school districts—Bloomfield, Holdrege and O'Neill—had 100 per cent immunization against rubella as of that date.

A total of nine had attained complete immunization of their kindergartners against polio. Those schools: Alliance, Bloomfield, Creighton, Gothenburg, Gretna, Holdrege, Kimball, Minden and Springfield.

"Schools should still strive to see that every child who enters school is immunized before or as soon as possible after entering school," according to Pack.

A Nebraska law requires that every child be immunized against these diseases unless parents indicate, in writing, they do not wish him immunized. The responsibility of enforcing this law lies with each school board of education," he noted.

The state health department will furnish vaccine free to physicians, who request it, Pack explained. Parents then merely have to pay the doctors administrative fees for immunizing their children.

Mrs. Neil Dinges, Wayne-Carroll school nurse, noted that if parents begin now, they can have their children immunized by the time kindergarten classes start next fall.

She added that parents with questions about immunizing their children may either get in touch with her or talk to her during the annual kindergarten roundup scheduled at West Elementary School on April 11.

Parents of all children entering kindergarten classes in the Wayne-Carroll school district next fall are invited to attend that event along with their children so they can be introduced to what school will be like in the fall.

It's not unusual for Wayne High to field a state contender in Class B baseball year after year, and this year probably won't be an exception.

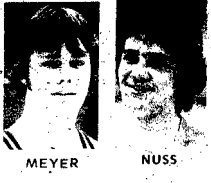
What is unusual in the 1975 edition of the Blue Devils is the number of players on the team—28.

Pitching won't be the club's only strong point. With a trio of 400 hitters, hitting will also keep the team in contention.

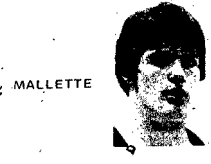
Senior Mike Meyer, catcher, and Mallette carry a hefty bat, last year hitting over .400.

Archery Fishing Opens Tuesday

Archery season on game fish opens in Nebraska on Tuesday, but gets underway with a new feature that might find some bowmen at odds with the law if they fail to note a new regulation.

That rule is the closure of state owned or state controlled waters until July 1. In the past, most of these waters opened on April 1, but for the first time this year, game fish in state lakes are being protected from archers during spawning seasons.

Spawning bass, northern pike and others are especially vulnerable to archery fishermen in the spring when they spend most of their time guarding nests or depositing eggs in the shallows. Game and Parks Commission fisheries biologists felt that the archery harvest of spawners has been excessive on heavily used public water.

Bowmen also may take nongame fish on most state waters year round, with the exceptions of a few areas closed, to all archery fishing. These areas are Two Rivers, Kearney County, Louisville, and Fremont State Recreation areas, Mormon Island and Windmill State Way side areas and trout streams.

According to Nebraska law, all fish are considered game fish except buffalo, carp, gar, quill back, sucker and gizzard shad.

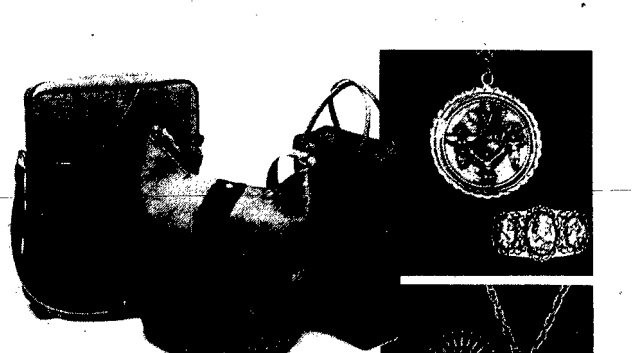

Ak-Sar-Ben Approves Scholarship Increase

The Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben have announced the largest increase in undergraduate scholarships since the program began 30 years ago.

Wayne State College will receive four scholarships under the new program.

Nick Newberry, chairman of the Ak-Sar-Ben scholarship committee, said the board of governors has authorized an overall 40-per cent increase in undergraduate scholarship contributions for the coming academic year.

Ak-Sar-Ben underwrites some 370 scholarships at 16 colleges and universities in Nebraska and Iowa State University, plus seven area schools of nursing.

Ak-Sar-Ben's total annual contributions for undergraduate scholarships will exceed \$170,000 beginning next year.

The newly announced program will provide four-year renewable scholarship values ranging from \$1,800 at private institutions to \$1,600 four year at the University of Nebraska at Lincoln. Additional matching grants ranging from \$150 to \$300 per student will continue to be offered to private colleges, universities and schools of nursing.

"Ak-Sar-Ben has historically placed a high priority on its scholarship program," Newberry said, "and in a year when the organization has achieved the highest membership in its 80 year history, we believe this significant increase in scholarship contributions is timely and appropriate."
