Grisly news: I-80 deaths increasing

LINCOLN - Gristy news has been released by the State Accident Records Bureau.
Despite the 55 mile-per-hour speed limit, the number of traffic deaths on the Interstate Highway is increasing.
There were 19 deaths in motor vehicle accidents along interstate 80 in the year ending in March of 1974. The speed limit on the super highway during that time was 75 m.p.h.
But in the next 12 month period, ending this March, there were 21 1-80 traffic, deaths recorded. The limit during that period was 55 m.p.h.
The 20-mile-per-hour reduction in the speed limit wasn't ordered for safety reasons. It was an energy conservation step. But officials were sure that it would have a wetcome by-product, a reduction in the highway slaughter.
