



Echtenkamp: Asphalt Paths Are Possibility for Golfers

Wayne's golf course may have asphalt paths for golfers within several years, said Don "Red" Echtenkamp, grounds superintendent at the country club the past three years.

With the increased use of golf carts, more damage is being done to the course, Echtenkamp told Wayne Kiwanis during Monday's meeting. Whether to install asphalt paths will be up to the country club's board of directors, he said.

Echtenkamp pointed out that the cost of maintenance of Wayne is more than an 18-hole course. "It's 150 acres of grass, greens and trees that need special attention."

Three times a year the greens are aerated, and a half-inch top dressing of sand, peat and black dirt is applied. Echtenkamp said. In addition, the course is sprayed with a chemical to kill weeds and fertilized. A fertilizer is applied only once instead of twice a year because of the cost increase, he noted.

The course and aprons are usually mowed three times a week while the greens are four times, according to Echtenkamp, and watering is almost a daily routine for some of the fairways.

"The big job is to keep the mower blades and blades sharpened," Echtenkamp said. Winterkill and Dutch elm disease are two of the growing problems in the maintenance of a good-looking course, Echtenkamp said. Plans are to cover

Grisly news: I-80 deaths increasing

CAPITOL NEWS
LINCOLN — Grisly news has been released by the State Accident Records Bureau.
 Despite the 55-mile-per-hour speed limit, the number of traffic deaths on the Interstate Highway is increasing. In the year ending in March of 1974, there were 19 deaths in motor vehicle accidents along Interstate 80 in the year ending in March of 1974. The speed limit on the super highway during that time was 75 m.p.h.
 But in the next 12-month period, ending this March, there were 21 I-80 traffic deaths recorded. The limit during that period was 55 m.p.h.
 The 20-mile-per-hour reduction in the speed limit wasn't ordered for safety reasons. It was an energy conservation step. But officials were sure that it would have a welcome byproduct, a reduction in the highway slaughter.
 Since that isn't working out on the interstate, officials say careless drivers must take the blame.
 Ironically, the 1975 Legislature took a controversial step which eases the sting of being caught exceeding the 55 m.p.h. limit on the Interstate, as long as the violator isn't topping 65 m.p.h. Over a veto, the senators said the

penalty for getting caught going up to 10 m.p.h. beyond the interstate limit would be a \$10 fine, without court costs and without the assessment of any points against the driver's license.
 Governor James E. Exon had objected strongly to that provision. He said it makes a mockery of the 55 m.p.h. limit and would be almost impossible for the State Patrol to enforce.
 What's more, he said, it is unconstitutional in his opinion. A court case is to be brought by the State Justice Department to determine whether the Constitution is, indeed, violated by different penalties for interstate speeders than those who exceed the limits on other roads.
Energy Surveys Start
 The state and the federal government is underwriting a project designed to make businessmen and industrialists aware of methods that can reduce their consumption of energy.
 The project involves teams of engineering students from the University of Nebraska who tour stores and plants and then make suggestions on how energy may be saved.
 The students are operating only in

Omaha and Lincoln during the pilot period of the project, but officials said they hope the studies can be made statewide as well.
 The funding involves \$7,500 from the State Fuel Allocation Office and \$2,500 from the Federal Energy Administration.
Victor Syng of the FEA regional office in Kansas City said the Nebraska project is the first of its kind in the nation.
Platte Fight Continues
 The National Governors' Conference at New Orleans has adopted a resolution Governor Exon says should help prevent the U.S. Corps of Engineers from assuming control of the Platte River.
 The resolution urges Congress to enact a law limiting the criteria of navigability to waterways having present actual capabilities for transporting commerce.
 The Corps can have jurisdiction over waterways declared navigable and, under present standards, that can mean rivers that have never been navigated in regard to the Platte, it is being argued that Indians and fur traders used the shallow river for

canoe navigation many years ago.

'In Washington'

Vietnamese evacuation was humanitarian . . . but illegal

WASHINGTON — When the War Powers Act was reported to the Senate floor in 1973, J. William Fulbright, then chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, noted that "it is far more difficult to master a power which has been permitted to atrophy than to defend one which has been habitually used."
 He probably didn't know how right he was. Only two years after that act was passed over the vote of Richard Nixon, it was violated flagrantly, openly and, by his own admission, proudly, by President Gerald Ford, who used American troops to evacuate tens of thousands of Vietnamese from Saigon.
 The operation was humanitarian and clearly the right thing to do. But it was unquestionably illegal.
 Now there are indications that the whole issue of who has the right to make war may be joined again.
 The State Department has told Americans in Luanda, Angola, to be prepared to evacuate. The evacuation, which could be accompanied by the introduction of American troops into Angola, is a result of strong anti-white sentiment in the African colony. Already hundreds have died in fighting in the capital city of Luanda.
 If evacuation becomes necessary, what happens to Angolan nationals who have been working for Americans? If permitted to stay behind, there is a good chance they and their families could be executed.
 If the President orders their evacuation without congressional approval, he will be breaking the law.
 The whole situation is pregnant with enormously important constitutional questions, and yet it has been all but ignored by the media.
 Indeed, despite all the Watergate rhetoric about no men being above the law, several major news organizations actually went so far during the Vietnam evacuation crisis to make clear that they weren't overly concerned about the legalities of evacuating Vietnamese, while leading behind the scenes for White House help in getting their Vietnamese employees safely out of Saigon. It would seem that the media have a weak of getting our issues.

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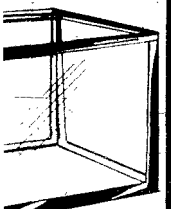

Where Will You Shop?
Today's crowded marketplace offers a variety of retailers which vary in size and modes of operation. There are specialty shops, variety shops, department stores and discount merchandisers. Where will you shop?

The variety of retail outlets gives you lots of places to look for bargains, but you can't count on any one type of store to guarantee bargains. There is nothing automatic about saving money when you shop. You still have to compare quality, price and service.

A specialty shop handles a limited type of goods. Consumers can count on getting personal attention from well trained sales people in specialty shops. Prices might be higher than at other stores, but quality of goods and other services are usually good.

Discount stores aren't really a different kind of store. They're a different way of doing business. Their intent is to offer customers lower prices by volume sales and low overhead expenses. Some ways they reduce overhead is by locating in low rent areas, offering lower wages, hiring lower clerks, doing extra for making deliveries and dealing mainly with items that sell fast and have a good mark-up.
