## NE Station Gets \$2,200 For Swine Research Work

The Northeast Station's swine research project is one of four University of Nebraska projects which will receive a financial boost from grants totaling \$10,000 awarded by the Nebraska Pork Producers Association. The station will receive \$2,200 for research on comparing different types of swine housing available on the market today.

The other swine research projects which will benefit \$3,300 to be used for the construction of a metabolism research building at the NU North Platte Station. \$2,500 for further research on the "flaked, formed and sectioned" pork product being developed in the NU meat laboratory in Lincoln. \$2,000 for continuation of a study of the costly swine disease transmissible gastroenteritis (TGE), underway in the NU veterinary science department.

He will be evaluating an open front, outside apron type housing system being used for growing finishing swine. Gain, feed efficiency, labor requirements, costs, foot injury, health problems and waste disposal in these units will be compared with existing modified open front and totally enclosed buildings.

nancy. By running a feed through an animal, researchers can tell how much of that feed is used by the animal's body. Such research will tell which feeds are most efficiently used, and therefore are most economical for pork producers.

Dr. Roger Mandigo, NU animal science professor, has led research on the flaked, formed and sectioned pork. The process involves taking flakes of meat from the lower value cuts of pork, pressing them into a meat "log," then slicing off patties or chops of equal size. The restructuring process has received attention from institutional food services where control of quality and the size of each serving is important.

The pork producers grant will look at how these products cook up either fresh or after heating, freezing and thawing. Also to be studied is the role of additives, by products, soy and non-meat protein ingredients in manufactured pork products.

The TGE research, under the leadership of Norman Underdahl, veterinary science professor, has both short and long range goals. One immediate objective is to continue studies of the carrier pig and methods of detecting carrier pigs.

## Vanishing Landmarks Are Art Show Subject

The public is invited to a three day American Bicentennial Flavored art show at Wayne State College's Fine Arts Building.

On display during the Friday through Sunday show will be 30 oil paintings depicting life in early rural Nebraska. The paintings have been done by Red Cloud artist Elmore Robertson.

Bringing her paintings to Wayne for display is the local American Bicentennial committee, headed by Mrs. Roberta Welle, dormitory housemother at Wayne State.

Mrs. Welle noted that the art show is one of the first of several major activities and events the local Bicentennial committee will sponsor in coming months as the nation moves closer to the observance of its 200th birthday.

Mrs. Robertson was commissioned to paint "anything that soon will be no more" by Mr. and Mrs. Harry Obitz of Red Cloud, Mo., and Mrs. Obitz dedicated to "fackie" that project themselves after Obitz found out about all the real life necessary to get official American Bicentennial project recognition and possible federal funds.

The result was more than 30 oil paintings in a "Vanishing Nebraska Landmarks" series.

Mrs. Robertson, who was born and raised in the Red Cloud area, painted everything from early railroad bridges in large barns built by Nebraska pioneers, from windmills and spring houses to the small tools early farmers used to scratch a living out of the soil, from old harnesses to the buzz saw used by her father.

Mostly self taught, Mrs. Robertson learned some of the techniques of painting through extension courses and work shops. She started painting at an ART SHOW, page 8.

## Council Okays Creating City Airport Authority

Wayne mayor Freeman Decker will likely appoint members of the city's newly created airport authority board during the council's next meeting.

The council voted 8-0 during Tuesday night's meeting to create the airport authority, which will be responsible for managing the municipal airport east of Wayne.

Mayor Decker will appoint five members to the board, subject to the approval of the council.

Also Tuesday night, mayor Decker named Rev. S. K. DeFrees to serve another six year term on the city's advisory commission on aging.

Mayor Decker earlier this month named Mathilda Harms to replace Rev. DeFrees on the board. The decision by the other commission member, Pat Dralper, not to serve another year left another vacancy to fill.

Decker also appointed Max Lundstrom and Dan Sherry to serve three year terms on the city planning commission.

They will fill the vacancies left when Bob Allen and Charles Carhart end their terms at the end of this month.

All the appointments gained the approval of the council during Tuesday's meeting.

In other action the council agreed to meet at 7 p.m. Monday to work on the budget for the coming fiscal year.

Approved the Wayne County Jaycees' request to set up the organization's fireworks stand on West Seventh Street.

Voted 5-3 to join the Nebraska League of Municipalities' power pool, the group which will bargain with Nebraska Public Power District over rates charged communities obtaining electricity from NPPD.

The grant, to be shared by 11 colleges which are members of NETCHE (Nebraska Education at Television Council for Higher Education) consortium, will fund teaching learning centers at the 11 schools and will continue programs begun last year.

The learning center will be open to all students on both credit and non-credit basis, and will offer help in study skills, test taking ability, outlining practices, reading skills and other areas of learning.

A director for the learning center is yet to be hired for Wayne State, according to Dr. Willis.

Other NETCHE consortium members who are receiving the HEW grants are Chadron, College of St. Mary, Dana, Doane, Hastings, Kearney, Midland Lutheran, Nebraska Wesleyan, Peru and York.

Approximately \$5,000 of that amount will be used to help faculty members teach better through the use of such means as supplementary classroom materials, textbook evaluation and a series of nine video-taped instructional development lessons.

About \$1,000 of the WSC grant will be used to improve administrative practices.

Approximately \$4,000 of the grant will go toward development of the student learning center program. Fifteen students participated in the learning center program which got underway last year.

## New District To Vote on School House

Voters in the recently enlarged school district south of Wayne will go to the polls July 22 to decide whether to issue \$95,000 in bonds to finance construction of a new grade school.

The new school house would be built just off Highway 15 four miles south of Wayne. It would include three classrooms and a multipurpose room for the approximate 52 students expected to enroll there this fall.

The newly enlarged school district No. 52 includes land from six former districts — Nos. 8, 10, 34, 40, 69 and 88.

## Survey Shows: Divorce Rate On Low Side in Wayne County

How high is the divorce rate in Wayne County compared with that in other communities? How many local residents are divorced? How many have remarried after being divorced?

For the great majority of men and women in the local area marriage is once-in-a-lifetime undertaking. For others, who start out with equally high hopes, their marriages end up on the rocks.

In general, the divorce rate has been on the rise for a number of years and is still mounting. This is indicated in the latest survey by the Department of Commerce, the National Center for Health Statistics and others.

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According to the latest tabulations, some 10 out of every 1,000 local residents over the age of 14 are either divorced or separated from their spouses.

The comparable national average is 53 per 1,000. In the West North Central States the rate is 39 and, in the state of Nebraska, 24.

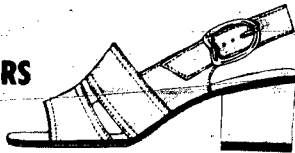

On the other hand, the number of marriages that took place in the year, 2,235,000, was expectedly small. It was the first time since 1958, in fact, that a drop was recorded.

The decline, at a time when the population of marriageable age was larger than normal, is attributed to prevailing economic conditions. Many young people have postponed their marital plans.

Because of the decrease in marriages and the increase in divorces, there was one divorce in the year for every 7.3 marriages.

In Wayne County, according to more recent figures, there are some 90 men and women who are divorced or separated.

Many others, who were once in the divorced column, have since remarried. In general, it has been found, there are about 2.5 such persons for every one who is currently divorced.

It is estimated that there are about 230 local residents in that category.

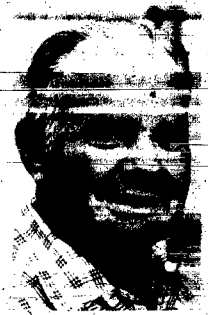

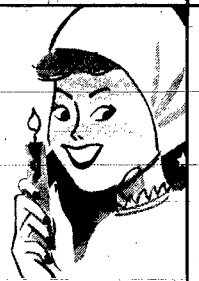

# Problems drive some state officials buggy

**CAPITOL NEWS**  
**LINCOLN** — There were problems last week that were driving some state officials buggy.

For Gentleman Farmer Woody Varner, it was the bugs in his tomatoes.

For entomologist Robert Rosette, it was a much bigger bug problem — the cutworm.

Varner, more formally known as University of Nebraska president Durward B. Varner, is working a 75-by-150-foot garden this summer as an escape from the cutworms or problems that generally bug him.

He's having trouble, he confesses, with insects which want to share his crop.

The cutworms which threaten cash crops of a larger nature — the corn, milo, alfalfa and even soybean fields of eastern Nebraska — are worrying Rosette, an extension entomologist at the university.

He said the cutworm problem this year is the worst he's seen. Severe crop losses

are predicted, he said.

Farmers facing this pest were urged to contact their county extension offices for advice.

**Researcher Denied**  
 Senator Ernest Chambers of Omaha apparently won't be able to use David Rice as a research assistant.

The Omaha legislator said that if Rice could have been released on bail pending the appeal of his murder conviction to the U.S. Supreme Court, Chambers would have been able to conduct some research projects.

Rice was convicted of first degree murder in the death five years ago of Omaha policeman Larry Minard. The patrolman died when a booby-trapped suitcase exploded.

Dynamite and other material from which bombs may be made were found later in Rice's house by police, but his conviction, although upheld by the state

supreme court, was overturned in federal district court and by the 8th Circuit Court of Appeals.

The federal courts have held the evidence used to convict Rice was obtained during an illegal search by police.

Edward Poindexter of Omaha also was convicted in the case. His appeals still are in the lower courts. He and Rice are being held in the State Penal Complex.

The courts ruled recently that Rice cannot be freed on bail while the high court is considering his appeal.

**Omaha Board of Appeal**  
 Another Nebraska case is being appealed — this one involving the Omaha School Board and government claims that the board deliberately created conditions which prevent racial integration of the schools.

The Omahans had won their case in district court but the 8th Circuit said the district decision was wrong. The school

board is asking the full eight-judge circuit bench to review the case.

Officials in Omaha say it might require the busing of about one-fourth of the 60,000 students to achieve the integration standards the court currently is saying must be met.

**Job Picture Brightens**  
 There was encouraging news from the State Labor Department.

The unemployment report for May indicated 4.7 per cent of Nebraska's potential work force is out of a job.

That's the lowest unemployment rate since last November.

The 4.7 per cent rate compares with a 5.7 per cent figure in April. Unemployment benefits paid in May totaled \$3.9 million, compared with \$5.4 million in April.

State labor commissioner Gerald Chizek said the improvement in the job situation was due, in large part, to

agricultural and construction work opening up in the spring.


He said there was an increase in employment in all job categories except manufacturing, which he said continued to decline.

**Win Some, Lose Some**  
 The traveling chautauque show sponsored by the University of Nebraska made some money and lost some.

It was \$3,500 in the black in Scottsbluff and \$988 in the red at McCook.

There was profit at Chadron, a loss at Norfolk and break-even at Hastings and Nebraska City.

Despite the varied success at the gate, the show was an apparent artistic success. It consistently got good reviews and it combined cultural, educational and entertainment programs under a big tent — in the manner that was popular throughout the Midwest a half-century ago.

It is not just a youthful adventure. Adults have to sponsor or support these things in one way or another — by buying, by selling, by using their property or simply by looking the other way.

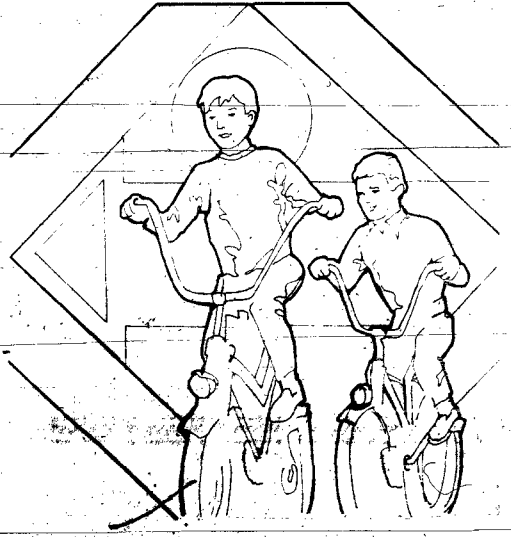

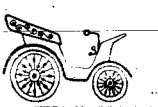

## 'In Washington'

### Is public interest law down for the count?

WASHINGTON — William Ruckelshaus, hero of the Saturday night massacre, has just taken on what may be the toughest challenge of his career.

Ruckelshaus is the co-chairman of the newly formed Council for Public Interest Law and his idea is to take this stepchild of the legal profession and turn it into a full-fledged member of the family.

It's a job to make even the God-father wince. Top-notch trial lawyers have rarely gotten excited over the nickel-and-dime rewards of suits to stop air pollution or protect the rights of disabled workers. Thus, class action suits — really the only gun in the public law arsenal — have generally served as a training ground for young and inexperienced attorneys, while the big boys have been earning their steak and champagne on automobile accident and medical malpractice suits.

So, Ruckelshaus and others concerned with public interest law must have felt encouraged by the advent of no-fault auto liability insurance and reform in medical practice insurance, which are drying up a lot of trial lawyers' traditional watering holes. Perhaps the steak-and-champagne bunch, having no place else to go, would turn to the more difficult, but by no means impossible, feat of turning a buck from the practice of public interest law.

Encouraged until — wham! — the Supreme Court, in a positively disastrous decision in May, barred the award of attorneys' fees in cases

where citizens' groups sue successfully for their rights.

That decision caused widespread fainting among public interest lawyers across the country. It means not only that fewer lawyers will tackle class action suits, but also that awards of thousands of dollars previously granted to lawyers by lower courts are now nullified.

So what is Ruckelshaus to do? The only answer is for him to work on Congress to pass legislation specifically authorizing federal courts to grant attorneys' fees to winning parties in public interest cases. Several state legislatures have already made such rulings applying to state courts.

Sen. John V. Tunney (D-Calif.) has promised to float such a proposal. Tunney, however, is about as lightweight as you can get and still keep your feet on the Senator floor, and anyway, the chances of his colleagues going along with the idea in this time of economic recession are slim. Should the proposal make it through the Senate, though, it will probably clear the House, thanks to last year's bumper crop of sensible young representatives.

If Ruckelshaus and other adherents of public interest law can't get Congress to back public interest law, the fledgling concept may well die.

But what the heck? After all, public interest law only helps people who can't afford lawyers and who don't know how to protect their own rights anyway. So long as the legal needs of the John Connallys and the Maurice Stanses are taken care of, what else matters?

**Premium Rate Is Going Up**

**For Medicare**

Starting July 1 the premium rate for Medicare hospital insurance will go from \$36 to \$40 a month for people who pay for this protection. The increase is due to rising hospital costs, according to Dale Branch, social security district manager in Norfolk.

Premiums are required for only 10,000 of the 23.5 million people who have Medicare hospital insurance.

Hospital insurance is extended automatically without premium charge, to people reaching 65 who are eligible for social security or railroad retirement benefits, to disabled people under 65 who have been entitled to social security disability benefits for 24 consecutive months or more, and to many people with chronic kidney disease, said Branch.

But people 65 and over who aren't eligible for social security benefits can get Medicare hospital insurance by paying a monthly premium if they also sign up for Medicare medical insurance, he added.

Medicare hospital insurance helps pay hospital bills and many related expenses. The hospital insurance premium rate is based on the average monthly Medicare hospital insurance payment for patients who have the protection.

Medicare medical insurance helps pay doctor bills and other medical expenses. The basic premium rate for the medical insurance is \$2.70 a month.

Over 23.5 million people have one or both parts of Medicare. In fiscal 1974, the hospital insurance program paid over \$7.7 billion in benefits and the medical insurance program paid over \$2.8 billion.

People can get information about signing up for Medicare by calling or writing any social security office, Branch said.

**Garden Tips**  
Though trees can be pruned anytime you like, faster healing of the wound usually follows spring pruning.


If you haven't cut off that broken branch or corrected the forked top, get out the saw or pruning shears and do it now. In addition to the above reasons for pruning, other purposes are removal of dead wood, shaping of the crown, removal of low branches that interfere with pedestrian travel and alleviating branch crowding and rubbing.

Make the final cut flush at the main branch or stem so the wound has a chance to heal. If heartwood is exposed, paint the wound with a tree paint. Some trees like birch and maple bleed from spring pruning, so work on them could be delayed until summer.

**U.S.D.A. NEWS**  
Hog inventory down  
Hog inventory for the nation was 2,800,000 hogs and pigs in the farms on June 1. This inventory number was 18 per cent below a year ago, according to Doug Murfitt, state statistician of the State Federal Division of Agricultural Statistics. The drop resulted from 18 per cent reductions in both breeding stock and market hogs.

Farrowings during the March-May quarter totaled 160,000, a 27 per cent drop from a year earlier. However, pigs saved per litter of 7.5 was up from last year resulting in a March-May pig crop of 1,200,000 down 25 per cent from 1974.

Farrowing intentions off  
Intentions of the pork producers for the next six months are to farrow 200,000 sows, a 15 per cent reduction from the same period in 1974 and the smallest number since 1965. Of those 200,000 farrowings, 120,000 are planned for the June-August quarter and 140,000 for the September-December quarter, 20 per cent and 19 per cent reductions, respectively.

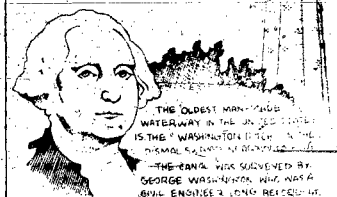
