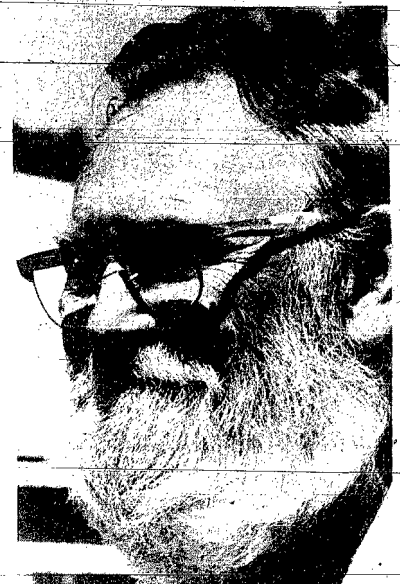


### Some of The Best Beards In Winside

## Two Dixon County 4-H's Top Dairy Judging Contest

Two Dixon County 4-H'ers placed first and second in the 4-H dairy judging contest during Monday's district dairy show at Atokad Park in South Sioux City. They were sisters Pat and Deb Domsch of Wakefield, who placed first and second, respectively. Daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Domsch, each received purple ribbons.

Also receiving a ribbon in judging was their brother Carl. He received a blue.

All three also received ribbons for animals they presented during the district show. Pat was awarded a blue for her two-year-old Brown Swiss. Deb received a red for her Guernsey senior calf and Carl received a red for his two-year-old Holstein.

Another Dixon County youth, Jack Warner, took the second-place showmanship trophy out of a field of 72 entries. Warner and his sister, Jeanne, won blue ribbon awards for their Ayrshire

dairy herds and received the following awards for individual Ayrshire animals: Jack — blue ribbons for his junior calf, senior yearling and his three and four years old; Jeanne — red ribbons for her junior calf and senior yearling and a blue ribbon for her three and four year old. Their parents are Mr. and Mrs. Jim Warner of Allen.

### Hoskins Man Hurt in Mishap

A 37-year-old Hoskins man suffered several broken ribs and injured vertebrae when he lost control of his motorcycle late Monday afternoon on the Lane Marotz farm east of Hoskins.

Orville Broekemeier was taken by the Hoskins rescue unit to the Lutheran Community Hospital in Norfolk where he remains a patient. The accident took place around 4 p.m.

## Notices Will Signal End for Elm Trees

Notices to remove diseased American elm trees will be distributed in Wayne next week. Street commissioner Vern Schulz said he doesn't expect the notices to surprise anyone.

"I've made an annual survey of dead trees since Dutch elm disease hit the state in 1969," Schulz said. "Now when I knock on the door, people know what I'm there for."

Schulz has issued 366 re-

moval notices in the past six years and will distribute 69 this year. Some notices are for more than one tree. The total number to be cut down this year is 87.

That doesn't tell the whole story concerning the total number of trees removed, however. "You can bet that from 25 to 50 trees have been cut down every year in Wayne since 1969 without any notice being issued," Schulz said.

A comparative total for city property hasn't run as high, Schulz explained, because a wider variety of trees is planted in city parks. About 25 American elms have been cut from city property since 1969 and three are scheduled for removal this year. "That should about do it as far as American elms on city property are concerned."

Officially, the notice will give property owners 30 days to remove trees, but that isn't any cause for alarm. Schulz said the city realizes there are too many trees for removers to service within the time limit. "If property owners make arrangements

within 30 days for removal of trees, we're happy," Schulz said.

A list of tree removers is available at the city clerk's office.

Dutch elm disease is usually first noticeable when top branches begin to lose their leaves and die. It then progresses to the lower branches. Notice is not issued for trees with any remaining shade value.

"I've seen trees that look dead blossom in the spring and be totally dead 30 days later," Schulz said.

The street commissioner thought this year would be a turning point for the number of trees to be removed. "I thought we would be giving fewer notices this year, simply because it's getting harder to find American elms in Wayne. You

really have to look for them now."

Dutch elm disease is a fungus that blocks the flow of food and water in the trees, causing the leaves to wilt. It is transmitted either by a beetle that breeds and lives on elm trees or from one tree to another through the roots.

Because of the latter method of transmission, Schulz feels the eventual death of all American

elms in Wayne is inevitable. "There are properties where I've served a notice every year. The disease spreads through the roots, right down the row."

It takes longer for big, hardy trees to die, Schulz explained, but he believes there won't be an American elm left in Wayne in five years.

Property owners who still have American elms might be wise to plant replacement trees now, Schulz continued. "That way, by the time the elms are removed, the new trees should have a little growth."

## Winside Festival Brings Rain, Good Time to Area

After a year's lapse, the Winside Old Settlers Reunion resumed its tradition bringing rain to the surrounding area.

The showers were welcome and didn't hamper activities during the 75th anniversary of the festival. Volunteer firemen would hardly have noticed a gully washer Thursday night as they mopped hoses for the annual water fight.

Pierce and Hoskins were eliminated and the champion ship boiled down to a battle between Winside and Wayne. When the fight was over the Wayne smokers stowed their hoses and took home the 1975 title.

A fantastic display of tonsorial splendor greeted the audience Thursday afternoon as men displayed carefully cultivated beards for the whisker judging contest. Sharon Sue Pelic, Miss Nebraska 1974 presented prizes to the winners.

Dallas Schellenber was picked as the most kissable contestant. A thick brush won Max Westerause the prize for the fullest beard but in the next category "neatness counted and Don Longnecker was judged to have the best trimmed beard.

Blonds may have more fun but they didn't have a chance in the final contest category. The judges were looking for the whitest beard. They found Frank Fleer and named him the winner.

## Council Agenda Includes Budget, Rate Hikes

Items on the Wayne city council Tuesday night agenda include two public hearings and two utility rate increases.

A hearing concerning the creation of a downtown improvement district is scheduled for 8 p.m. The proposed budget for the 1975-76 fiscal year is scheduled for public hearing at 8:30.

The proposed budget is \$2,574,068, some \$34,000 less than expenditures for the current fiscal year.

Ordinances allowing for increases in natural gas and electric rates will be considered. If passed, one ordinance will allow Peoples Natural Gas Co. an eight cent per 1,000 feet increase. The increase in the cost of electricity will be set when the ordinance is considered.

Council will also discuss revision of delinquent payment ordinances, an increase in the city clerk's salary, several items pertaining to street maintenance and paving a proposal to use the city's reserve ambulance as a municipally operated taxi and the transferring of certain city property to the newly created airport authority.

## Visitors See Test Facilities

Visitors from 13 counties toured beef and swine facilities at the Northeast Station near Concord Wednesday night. Livestock specialists discussed findings of the previous year's research findings.

Swine specialist Bob Fritsch explained the results of tests to find the effect of housing and management techniques, density of population and use of supplemental heat on swine growth and feed efficiency.

Beef research tested the efficiency of silage from drought stricken corn against irrigated corn, beef specialist Vernon See TOUR, page 3

## 4-H Sale Expanded This Year

All 4-H exhibitors of market animals will have an opportunity to sell their animals at a 4-H auction this year, county agent Don Spitz announced Thursday.

In past years, the sale has been confined to market beef animals. Another break with tradition will be the scheduling of the sale, sponsored by the Wayne Chamber of Commerce. In recent years it has followed the Wayne County fair by a couple of weeks. This year it will be the last day of the fair, Aug. 10, at 4 p.m. at the fairgrounds show arena.

Spitz said there were two main disadvantages to having the auction weeks after the fair. It meant exhibitors had to bring the animals back to Wayne and the animals weren't always ready for market then.

Animals usually experience weight loss during the fair, Spitz said, and it takes time to properly finish an animal.

This year the bonus auction will be held immediately after the fair, but exhibitors will retain ownership in the past, packers would bid on animals, establishing a base price. Local businessmen would then bid above the base price. The difference was the bonus price.

For example, a packer would

bid \$50 a hundredweight for a steer. Then a business would bid perhaps \$55 a hundredweight on the animal and pay the \$5 a hundredweight as a bonus to the 4-H exhibitor. The packer would pay the base price and bought the animal.

Under the new system, bids will be for the bonus price only and the exhibitor retains ownership of the animal which he can sell where and when he wants.

The 4-H livestock owners will pick the bonus checks up at the buyer's place of business this year, Spitz said. "We want the kids to have some contact with the people who support the 4-H."

Each 4-H exhibitor of market livestock may sell one beef or one of three beef or one swine or one sheep. Spitz said about 83 animals are now expected to be offered at the auction.

"We've had tremendous support from the Wayne business men in the past," Spitz said. "We're hoping that the larger number of animals will give more people a chance to bid."

Exhibitors of dairy or breeding animals will also be eligible for a bonus for the first time this year. A pool has been established for contributions which will be divided among dairy and breeding animals exhibitors.

## Antique Plates To Cost More

Owners of vehicles in Wayne County bearing black antique license plates have until Aug. 24 to renew the plates for a \$10 fee, said Wayne County treasurer Leon Meyer.

After that deadline, antique plates will cost \$60. Meyer said the hike, passed this year by the legislature, doesn't affect those car owners who already have purchased plates, unless they fail to pay the \$10 renewal fee by Aug. 24.

Under the new law, cars not previously licensed as antiques will have to be 30 years old to qualify for the special plates.

Fees for antique license plates should be sent to the state Motor Vehicle Department. Instructions for sending the fee can be obtained from the Wayne County treasurer, at the county court house.

## Students Paddle Their Way in Ecology Class

High school students from several Nebraska and Iowa communities participated in the energy and environment course offered at Wayne State College this summer.

The inter-disciplinary course, funded by the National Science Foundation, involved chemistry, physics and biology studies, classroom and laboratory work and field trips, and provided the opportunity for high school students to study science at the college level.

Kathy Haas, daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. Robert Haas of Wayne, and a Wayne High School student, experimented to determine the movement of materials through an ecosystem.

Another WHS student, Robin Mosley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Keith Mosley, researched the effect of chemicals on soil organisms.

The course, which got underway June 16, and concluded Friday, July 25, was taught by WSC faculty members Dean Metz and Wes Fritz, and Wayne

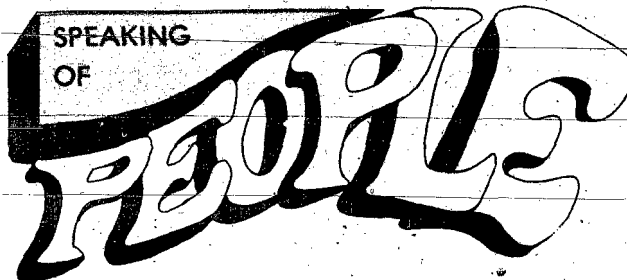
## Wayne State, Music Prof Guest Soloist

# Heck Award to Be Presented at All-Star Game

A new award to be presented annually will be unveiled at this fall's Nebraska Coaches Association All-Star Basketball Game, it was announced by All-Star director Bob Morris of Waverly.

Entitled the "Mike Heck Award," it will be given each year during the All-Star Game in honor of the late Creighton University basketball player who participated in the 1972 All-Star contest after completing his prep career at Papillion.

According to Morris, the award will be given annually to someone "who best reflects the fine character that Mike Heck possessed, and who has made a

substantial contribution in some way to the game of basketball in Nebraska."

Heck, at 7-1, was the first and thus far only seven-footer to play in the All-Star Game. He had a standout career at Papillion, scoring 29 points a game his senior year and pulling down 16 rebounds per game. He achieved a high point total of 46 for one game, with 26 rebounds in his best single game effort.

Heck was one of three Papillion Monarchs who have played in the Coaches All-Star Game. He scored nine points on four field goals, all in the third quarter of the 1972 game, and one of four free throw attempts.

He was a member of the South squad which lost to the North, 90-68.

Upon graduation from Papillion, where Heck was also an excellent scholar and president of the Monarch Student Council, he was heavily recruited by several universities before deciding on Creighton. He was competing in his third year of varsity play for the Bluejays when he died in his sleep last spring. During his days at Creighton, he was instrumental in continuing the school's basketball success among independent major university competition.

Heck's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Nikolaus Heck of Papillion, will be in Lincoln for this summer's All-Star Game to assist Morris in the presentation of the award, scheduled to take place between the third and fourth quarters of the game.

The game, slated for Aug. 15 in Lincoln's Pershing Municipal Auditorium, will begin with pre-game ceremonies at 7:45 p.m. It is the seventh annual contest between 24 of the state's best graduated senior high school basketball players with the North leading the series four games to two.

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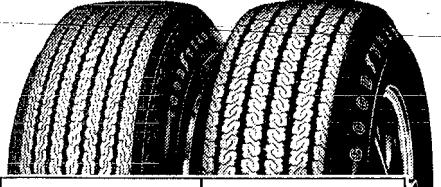
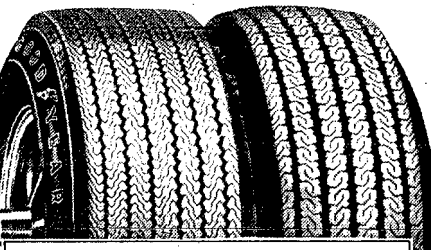

**Pathologists: Beware of Apple Rot**  
 In Nebraska, apples are susceptible to several kinds of summer rots. These rots may show up any time between the late growing season and storage. Damage to infected apples range from minor external blemishes to complete rotting, according to University of Nebraska Lincoln plant pathologists Jack Riesselman and Dr. David Wysong.  
 Most of the summer rots are incited by fungi. Some of the common names of these rots are black rot, bot rot, sooty blotch and bitter rot. In most cases these diseases are favored by mild temperatures and humid conditions.  
 Prevention of summer rots begins with proper management. This involves correct pruning, watering and fertilization. Healthy trees are better able to fight off infection by these organisms. But even by following recommended cultural practices, fungicides are needed for effective control.  
 In a well-managed orchard, free from debris, etc., a half pound of zinc combined with a half pound of captan in the cover sprays will effectively control summer rots. Spraying should begin at petal fall and continue at 10 to 14-day intervals until one week before harvest. These sprays should also be combined with an effective insect control program.  
 In poorly managed planting, two pounds of each fungicide will not effectively control these rots. Therefore, the key to control is a properly managed, clean orchard.
