


"I'm no forrester, so I can't say what types of trees are best to plant," Schulz said. "In the two new parks (Ashley and Victor) we planted a variety of hybrid trees, including elms, which are disease resistant."

Advice regarding types of trees best for replanting is avail able at the Soil Conservation Service office in Wayne.

Antique Plates To Cost More

Owners of vehicles in Wayne County bearing black antique license plates have until Aug. 24 to renew the plates for a \$10 fee, said Wayne County treasurer Leon Meyer.

After that deadline, antiques plates will cost \$60. Meyer said the hike, passed this year by the leoislature, doesn't affect those car owners who already have purchased plates, unless they fail to pay the \$10 renewal fee by Aug 24. Under the new law, cars not previously licensed as antiques will have to be 30 years old to qualify for the special plates. Fees for antique license plates should be sent to the state Motor Vehicle. Department. Instructions for sending the fee can be obtained from the Wayne County treasurer, at the county court house.

Farm population is stabilizing

Reports that the farm-population on a national level appears to have remained relatively stable from 1970 to 1973 and that the annual loss in the number of farm units has slowed brings questions as to what has caused the trend reversal.

More specific information on the abparent phenomenon must await precise figures the U.S. Agricultural Census now in progress and those results are many months away: It is known that during the three years from 1970-73, non-metropolitan counties increased their population by an estimated 42 per cent while metropolitan counties (those with populations over 50,000) grew 3.9 per cent on anional basis.

but for a brief period at least, farm and ranch opportunities offered some basis for optimism. Average age for active farmers today is more than 50 years and that means

is more than 50 years and that means that many fathers are approaching re-tirement and young people will have to move into the management positions if agriculture. Is to survive as we have known it. But the opportunities must be there to encourage them.

How much have government farm programs influenced the trends? That is a matter of conjecture and political persuasion. The known

How much have government farm programs influenced the trends? That is a matter of conjecture and political persuasion. The biggest losses in farm units was-occurring—when government support programs were keeping—farm commodity prices stabilized at low figures and building up government-held surpluses. Young farmers and ranchers want to make money, to take risks and to be compensated accordingity. They do not want to be "stabilized" into existence incomes and to get their compensation in "clean air and country living."

There may be another very practical reason why the loss of farm unit numbers has declined. There are definite limitations on how many acres and how much livestock one mah or one farm or ranch family can handle regardless of how large and how sophisticated farm equipment may become. There are built-in limiting factors" at planting, harvesting, irrigating or roundup time and many farms and ranches have approached or reached those limits.

Suppliers of farm credit are well aware of this factor and the dangers of trying to get too big. foo fast. Farm and cancel production is very much like other production — certain volume levels are more productive than others and the rate of profitability can drop off sharply when management gets too thin.

There is no single factor but a come ion of factors that is in fluencing ation of factors that is in fluencing a frend back to rural America. For now, farmers and ranchers and for that <u>matter</u>, all Americans, should recognize that I fi is taking place, and to shape some of their plans accordingly. — Contributed by Ma. M. Pathologists: Beware of Apple Rot

In Nebraska, apples are susceptible to several kinds of summer rots. These rots may show up any time between the late growing season and storage. Damage to infected apples range from minor external blemishes to complete -rotting, according to University of Nebraska Lincoln plant pathologists Jack Riesselman and David Wysong.

Most of the summer rots are lincited by fungi. Some of the common names of these rots are black rot, bot rol, sooty blotch and bitter rot. In most cases these diseases are favored by mild temperatures and humid conditions.

by mild temperatures and hu mid conditions
Prevention of summer rots begins with proper management. This involves correct pruning, watering and fertilization. Healthy trees are better able to fight off infection by following recommended cultural practices, fungicides are needed for effective control.

In a well-managed orchard,

practices, fungicides are needed for effective control.

In a well-managed orchard, free from debris, etc.. a half pound of zineb combined with a half pound of zaptan in the cover. sprays will effectively control summer rots. Spraying should begin at petal fall and continue at 10 to 14-day intervals until one week before harvest These sprays should also be combined with an effective in sect control program.

In poorly managed planting, two pounds of each fungicide will not effectively control these rots. Therefore, the key to control is a properly managed, clean orchard.
