Distribution of new telephone directories in Wayne, Winside and Laurel will begin Wednesday.

## Man Arrested During Alleged Tavern Break-in

An 18-year-old Wayne man was arrested during an alleged break-in at Cook's Tavern in Winside about 3 a.m. Aug. 7, police officer Clarence Feasel said.

Arrested was Delvin P. Smith, currently residing 119 1/2 Main St. in Wayne as his address. Feasel said Smith's driver's license listed him at a Hopkins address. The officer said he watched through the tavern window as Smith took \$16.10 from the tavern cash drawer. Smith apparently entered the tavern by squeezing between the bars over the window, according to Feasel.

Information supplied by Smith has also provided leads in solving a reported break-in at the tavern, July 31. Over \$100 was reported missing in that incident. Feasel said the Wayne county sheriff's department is presently investigating the July 31 case. Information gained while questioning Smith indicates that two minors were involved in that break in. Smith was being held in the Wayne County jail, Saturday morning.

of the Omnibus Education Act of 1972, notified all school districts that the deadline for compliance is the 1976-77 school year.

The regulation prohibits sex discrimination in admissions, financial aid, employment and athletics in the 16,000 school districts and 2,700 institutions of higher education that receive federal aid.

Hau said he doesn't yet know all the ramifications of the law. "Physical education must be integrated but Hau said that won't entail any major changes for public schools in Carroll and Wayne. The classes are already mixed through the sixth grade, Hau said, and PE classes above that level now use the same rooms at the same time. Some activities such as folk dancing and bowling are already coeducational.

With the addition of basketball this year, girls now have an opportunity to participate in a sport during each season.

In the fall, boys have cross-country and football, girls have volleyball. Winter sports are wrestling for boys and separate basketball teams for girls and boys. Boys have track, golf and baseball in the spring. Girls have a track team and could play on the golf team with boys, Hau said.

A girls basketball coach is yet to be hired and Hau said a male coach may get the job. "We want to make sure the girls get a qualified coach and it appears we don't have any female coaches with the back ground needed."

He said the position will be filled from among the present staff and several male coaches have been contacted about the possibility of taking the appointment.

"I don't understand the Title IX to mean a one to one ratio must be maintained between girls and boys sports. Girls must be offered an opportunity to participate." He said that while no plans have been made, there is a possibility that some boys programs may have to be cut back.

Allen school board Thursday night approved a \$504,101 budget for the 1975-76 school year. Based on the present property valuation, the mill levy will increase from 43.75 to about 43.5, according to superintendent Virgil Ferguson. The actual property valuation won't be released until September or October.

If valuations drop, as projected by the Dixon County

assessor's office, the mill levy would go up, Ferguson pointed out. Conversely, a hike in valuations means a drop in the levy, he added.

The projected new levy is expected to raise \$270,889.51 in taxes.

## Commissioners Set Road Budget

Wayne County commissioners hope to complete details for a proposed budget for 1975-76 scheduled for today (Monday). The commissioners met Friday morning and set \$605,025 as the tentative figure for the new roads department budget. A total of \$545,518 was spent on county roads last year.

A figure of \$22,575 had been set for the noxious weed control fund but the commissioners will meet with the control board today to discuss some proposed items. Last year's expenditures for weed control totaled \$28,272.

Included in funds allocated for 1975-76 is \$6,000 for the county planning commission. Total budget for the commission is \$16,000 with \$10,000 to be supplied from federal funds. Operating budget is \$1,000. A contract for planning services with the state Office of Planning and Programing will cost \$15,000 if approved.

## Youth Receives Ayrshire Award

Jack Warner, son of Mr. Jim Warner of Allen, recently received awards as one of the top seven young men in the Ayrshire Breeders' Association's Outstanding Junior Champion member contest.

The 15-year-old Warner received the award at the association's 100th annual convention in Killington, Vermont. Winners in the national competition were recognized for outstanding project work in the Ayrshire breed and for leadership in their communities.

A total of \$13,543.66 has been received by Wayne County schools in state aid for the fourth quarter of 1974-75, according to county superintendent Fred Rickers.

Of that total, \$7,117.68 went to 23 class I rural districts which were in operation last year. Amounts ranged from \$32.71 to \$216.63.

Winside (district 95) received \$2,646.46 and Wayne-Carroll district 17 received \$8,779.52. Rickers reported. He said the funds included both equalization and appropriated money.

## Highway Hearing To Be in October

A public hearing will be scheduled to discuss plans for improving highway 15 north of Wayne, announced state Roads Department public hearing officer Jack Loscreans this week.

He said the meeting will be in Wayne, probably sometime in the middle of October. Proposed improvements include resurfacing of the road from just north of Wayne to the interchange of highways 15 and 116 and new construction of an access lane servicing homes on the north edge of Wayne.



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# Jager Wins Third Trophy

Hugh Jager of Carroll gained his third grand champion market steer title Friday at the Wayne County Fair.

Jager had previously won the title in 1971 and 1974. A fellow Carroll 4-H'er, Brad Roberts, won the reserve grand champion market steer trophy. The champion steer weighed 1,025 pounds, the reserve champion, 1165 pounds. Both entries were purple ribbon winners in the crossbred heavyweight steer class.

Blaine Nelson of Wakefield showed the only purple ribbon market heifer and gained the grand champion market heifer title. First blue ribbon and the reserve grand champion market title went to Karen Wittler of Hoskins.

Haley Greve of Wakefield was the champion junior showman with a blue ribbon. Les Thomsen received a purple ribbon and the title of champion senior showman.

Thomsen also showed the champion commercial beef, a purple ribbon winner. Reserve commercial class champion was shown by Jeff Baier of Wayne.

Attendance on opening night of the fair was about 2,000, up from last year according to secretary manager Marilyn Koch. The barbecue Friday night attracted a nearly full house at least as far as the main parking lot was concerned.

Thursday night entertainment was provided by youngsters riding calves, tying goats and attempting to run down a greased pig in the junior rodeo.

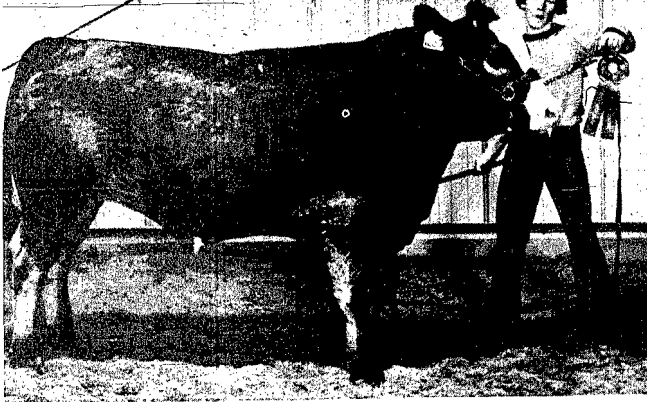

## Council to Hear Liquor Petition

A petition in favor of holding a special election for liquor by the drink will be presented to the Wayne city council Tuesday night.

City clerk Bruce Mordhorst said he was informed that

town owner Dick Korn had acquired the signatures of 20 percent of registered voters required to ask for a special election. Mordhorst said state law required that the election be held if a valid petition is presented.

The council will meet with home owners living along Graveland Road to discuss the possibility of paving the road. Several such proposals have been defeated in recent years.

City attorney Budd Bornhoff will present alternate proposals for three ordinances concerning delinquent payment of electric, water and sewer bills. The subject was tabled at the last meeting.

Other items on the agenda include discussion of fire truck and ambulance specifications in preparation for bid-letting, discussion of the transfer of funds to the airport authority and an update on details of the city operated taxi service to begin about Sept. 1.

## Bell Seeking More Revenue

Northwestern Bell filed an application Aug. 4 with the Nebraska Public Service Commission asking that they be allowed to receive additional revenue in order to earn at the nine per cent level authorized by the commission on July 3.

The application contained no specific rate increase proposal.

According to the company's chief executive officer, Bell's earnings are presently at a 7.6 per cent level. An additional \$7 million in revenue will be needed to reach the nine per cent earning figure, Morris said.

## Help needed in planning

The Wayne County joint planning commission has nearly finished its organizing phase and members are ready to roll up their sleeves and go to work.

Hopefully, the tremendous task of formulating a comprehensive plan for the county won't fall on them alone. Everyone in the county has a stake in the plan. Professional services for the planning process will be provided by the State Office of Planning and Programming. According to planner Jeff Foley, who will work with the commission, service is the key word here.

While the state will provide expertise in some areas of planning, direction for the plan will come from Wayne County, not Lincoln or Washington. During an era when federal and state governments are making continuing inroads into areas of responsibility formerly reserved to local political bodies, citizens should see the formulation of a long range county plan as an opportunity to help determine their own destiny.

The planning commissioners aren't faceless, nameless bureaucrats, they are local people and as such should be responsive to the needs of their neighbors. To do a good job, they are going to need everyone's help.

The ultimate goal of the commission is

to formulate a comprehensive plan to serve as a guideline for development in Wayne County through the year 1995. Two other phases must be completed before actual planning starts, however.

First, a survey must be made of what now exists in the county regarding population, human resources, public facilities, economic development, transportation, education and a host of factors which contribute to the quality of life.

The commission is making plans for a survey to obtain such information. It isn't always easy to take the time to complete a questionnaire, but it should be remembered that a good response will give the planning commission an accurate look at the county. That is the foundation for good planning.

The second phase will be to determine what areas in the county need development and to set priorities for development. Again, information from the public is important. Goals outlined in the final plan should reflect the goals of the people who live in the county.

County planning is a tough, complicated job. Individuals have an opportunity to contribute to the process. If they miss the chance, only they are to blame.

# STRAYEr Thoughts

AGRICULTURAL EXPERTS disagree on the effect on food prices of grain sales to the Russians.

Agriculture secretary Earl Butz, speaking to the Southern Conference of the Council of State Governments recently, said, "It is unrealistic for anyone to say that the mild recovery of wheat prices prompted by the Russian wheat sale will cause the price of bread to go up in any appreciable amount."

John Schmittler, ag undersecretary during the Johnson administration, on the other hand, foresees a 10 per cent increase in food prices in 1976 if the Russians are sold as much U.S. grain as they are believed to want.

Butz, however, pointed out that the average price of wheat in Kansas City plunged \$1.70 per bushel from last October to this June, but the price of bread didn't decline. Average prices in July had recovered about 35 cents of the \$1.70 drop.

A bushel of wheat will make about 70

loaves of bread. Simple math shows that a 35 cent rise in the wheat prices should raise the price a half a cent a loaf, if at all. In June, farmers were getting 3.6 cents for the wheat in a loaf of bread, an increase of one cent over the amount of June of 1972. Prices at the store have gone up 10.9 cents a loaf in the same period. Sort of looks like the American consumer should look at someone beside the American farmer when dissatisfied with the grocery tab.

MRS. EMIL Thies of Winside sent me an interesting clipping from the Cedar Rapids, Ia., Gazette in November of 1973 the sanctuary platform of the Peoples Unitarian Church there was being remodeled. While cleaning out the crawl space under the platform, they found a plaque reading: "In memory of Mrs. Mary L. Pingrey who, by the gift of \$2,000, freed this church from debt."

The plaque had been displayed on the

upper stairway of the church until a 1925 remodeling project.

A history of the church shows that repairs were made in 1893, costing \$1200. The church minutes of Jan. 8, 1899 show: "During the hour of the morning service a complete and most enjoyable surprise announcement by the treasurer of the fact that Mrs. Mary L. Pingrey of Wayne, Nebr., had presented the parish with \$2,000, contingent upon its being supplemented by a sufficient sum accumulated entirely to liquidate the debt of the parish."

## Nebraska

In late August of 1913, J.R. Huffman, a farmer in Nemaha County somewhere south of Nebraska City spent several days at the state fair, in Lincoln. He wrote an account not only of his experience at the fair but also of his trip by train over the Missouri Pacific Line. Apparently he boarded a through train to Lincoln at some way station south of Nebraska and went by way of Union, Weeping Water, and Eagle. His account was first published by the Nebraska Farmer, file of which are on microfilm at the Nebraska State Historical Society.

"To the farmer, the man who depends entirely upon the soil for his living and for that little sum for the rainy day, a visit to the state fair represents not only a few days of pleasure, but also an investment that brings abundant returns in profits from the few dollars expended therein.

"We are living in a progressive age, and the 'tightwad' who knows nothing but corn and hogs, and the fellow who does not see for himself, the fellow who does not touch elbows with others is just as certain to die of rust as his neighbor is certain to profit by mixing.

"Railroad fare in Nebraska is only 2 cents a mile. You can go any place on a Lincoln streetcar for a nickel. You can get a fine dinner on the fair grounds for the price of a peck of potatoes. Mr. Jones will do the chores for a few days. There is no greater stimulus than a trip to the state fair, so why not take it?"

"I am certain that I would be better off financially had I been less stingy in years past, and had made a vow earlier in life that the state fair would be one thing never neglected. If I am not stricken with appendicitis or some other fashionable disease, we'll be there this fall.

"On our trip toward the state capital we shall no doubt meet the fellow from Richardson county who is going to bring back the prize money on Poland Chinias. At Nebraska City we shall have a new passenger added to our crowded train—an old chap with iron-gray hair and chin whiskers. He is the leading fruit man from Otter county.

"At Weeping Water Tom Snodgrass joins us. He has a clean shirt carefully wrapped in a copy of the Brock (Nebraska) Bulletin, and 15 cents worth of cheese and crackers in a paper bag for emergencies (those who know Tom will under-

stand this best). Anyway, before we have reached Elmwood, Mr. Snodgrass has convinced the whole crowd of the awful waste of the stockmen of southeastern Nebraska due to our slowness in profiting by the use of the silo.

"Take notice! We have been on the road only two hours and are having a regular farmer's institute. Men who are experts in their line are headed for the state fair, and they are just bubbling over with good ideas. We are mighty stupid if we do not absorb a whole lot that is valuable to us.


"The bell on the engine rings, passengers begin to gather their grips together; we are in Lincoln. There is 'right smart' of a crowd at the depot, but when we get up on O street it looks like the bees had swarmed! Right here is where the fun begins for the fellow who is on the lookout for fun.

"We take a (street) car for the fair grounds and proceed to study the passengers. Over there in the northeast corner of the car is an old preacher from a country town. His face is as long as a horse collar, and we easily read from the lines thereon that he is worrying about the sins of the city folks. In the seat behind the preacher are John and Susan. John is wearing a heavy winter coat and vest; the perspiration is flowing from his brow, but his eyes are fixed on that little redheaded peach by his side. Beautiful clusters of freckles adorn her face, and she can chew gum so fast it makes us dizzy who have been traveling on a Missouri Pacific train.

"At last we are inside the gates. Here is a sea of people, ice cream and lemonade, vendors are screaming. An agent for a farm paper begs us to subscribe for his publication for one year. The price is only \$1, and on this very special occasion he will give us a \$2 pair of gold-rimmed glasses and a \$3 fountain pen as premiums just to show his appreciation of our generous patronage.

"We go down past the horse barns. There we see horses so large that they make Maud and Babe look like suckling colts, and dozens of Shetland ponies, so cute we feel like slipping one of them into our suitcase when the attendant is not looking.

"Will we come to the state fair next year, did you ask? You bet your boots we will!"

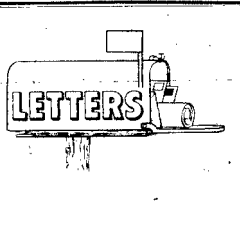

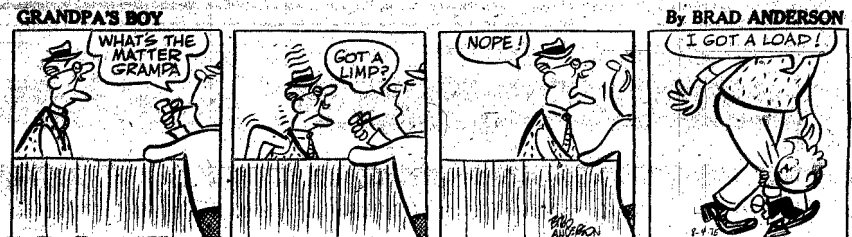

# Legion Falls In Pitchers' Duel

Paul Mallette probably wanted to throw just one pitch over Friday night in Sidney.

The one throw in seven innings of action that the Wayne ace would like to have had over was ironically a pitch to his rival York starter John Svehla. The pitch in the bottom of the fourth resulted in the only York hit of the night and proved to bring in the sole run of the game as Wayne fell 10 in the opening game of the state American Legion Class B state tourney at Sidney.

The loss dropped Wayne to 22-31 on the year as the defending state Class B champs headed into the Sunday night's game against Cozad in the continuing

action of the double elimination, four-team baseball classic in western Nebraska.

York steamed along to 26-9 on the year and continued in the winners' bracket with a game Saturday.

The clutch hit of the game came in the fourth with one out.

After walking York's Kim Gloystein, Mallette allowed his only hit of the game to York ace Svehla. Svehla hit a drive to right center field to score the hustling Gloystein from first. With the throw to the plate, Svehla went all the way to third but was stranded there as Mallette allowed no more hits.

Svehla lasted four frames and allowed only Mike Meyer to walk. York coach Steve Small made a pitching move in the fifth and brought in reliever Jim Butterfield from third.

In the sixth, Wayne got to Butterfield and threatened for the only time in the opening tourney contest. Pitcher Mike Sharer reached base on a walk, Jack Froehlich sacrificed Sharer to second and Sharer went to third as Mallette singled for Wayne's only hit of the

contest.

With one out and a man on third, Wayne seemed in position to tie the game as Gordie Cook lifted a fly ball to left field. But in left field for York Friday night was another pitcher in Gloystein. Gloystein caught the fly ball and used his 4-3 frame to fire a strike at home plate and get Sharer, who had tagged at third and tried to score.

That defensive gem proved to be the key for the winners as Butterfield put Wayne down in order in the top of the seventh.

Although allowing York only one hit, Mallette had runners on base in every frame except the third. Some key pick-off throws by catcher Mike Meyer, however, helped keep York runners close to the bag throughout the contest.

Mallette finished the game with six walks and four strikeouts as he handled the powerful York line-up that entered the game with a .274 team batting average after 34 games this summer.

Svehla and Butterfield combined for York to hold Wayne to one hit on five strikeouts and

two walks. York did not commit an error compared to three for Wayne but none of the miscues resulted in runs.

He is also impressed with coach Seward and the attention he has given the all-star contingent. "We're only here for a week, so why should he care?" O'Doherty asked rhetorically,

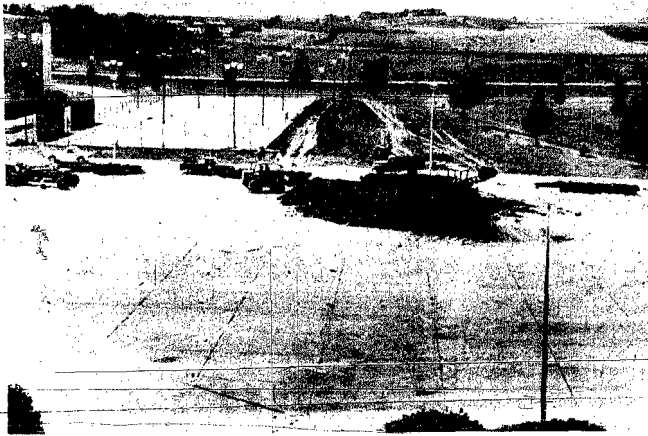
"But he's there all the time."

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**HEALTH TIP**  
FROM THE NEBRASKA MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

Four conditions are found in cancer of the mouth, although the specific cause or causes of cancer are not known. Usually one or more conditions are present in mouth cancer, according to the Nebraska Medical Association. The conditions which indicate cancerous mouth are chronic infection, smoker's spots, imperfectly fitting dental appliances or broken, jagged teeth. Corrections of these conditions when they exist appears to be a good way to help prevent mouth cancer. A person who observes basic oral hygiene rules is least likely to experience serious disorders of the soft tissues in the mouth. The most important safeguard is regular dental examination. The Nebraska Medical Association reports that cancerous growths vary so much in appearance that they are often difficult to recognize in an early stage. Cancer of the mouth can be eliminated if given early attention. The ever-present possibility that a precancerous lesion may be attacking the mouth is sufficient reason to insist on careful semiannual dental checkups for yourself and your family, the association says.

By dialing 911, the caller immediately will be connected with the Wayne police department. The dispatcher who answers the call will contact the emergency service best equipped to handle the situation when the caller gives the nature and location of the emergency. Although calls to 911 are answered directly by the police department, telephone company operators will continue to respond to any emergency calls they receive, according to M. D. "Mike" Smith, Northwestern Bell area manager in Wayne. Wayne authorities emphasize that only valid emergency calls should be placed through the 911 number. Routine business calls still should be made to the present telephone numbers used by the police department and other emergency services. Smith said that information about the new emergency number will be in the new telephone directory which is scheduled to be delivered this week. He added

**Winside Budget Story Errors**

The mill levy for property owners in Winside will go up about .5 mills to 24.1 mills for the 1975-76 fiscal year. A story in Thursday's Wayne Herald incorrectly reported that the levy would decrease to 23.6 mills.

Town board members Monday night approved the \$59,886 budget, which is about \$30,000 less than last year's figure of \$87,437.56. The new budget is smaller than last year's because federal and state monies to complete work on the baseball park and to purchase a new rescue unit aren't included.

The mill levy's up, however, to corner costs of work on the village library. The 24.1 mills will yield about \$14,800 revenue, not \$13,974 as reported.

During a special bid-letting meeting Thursday night, board members approved the purchasing of a street sweeper from Nebraska Tractor and Equipment Co. of Omaha. The sweeper which was on loan to Winside, costs \$23,500.

The Omaha firm was the only one of four companies to place a bid. The other companies which declined to bid were Mason, Big Bear Equipment and Construction Service Equipment, all of Omaha.

Tonight (Monday) the board will meet at 7:30 in the village clerk's office to update ordinance.

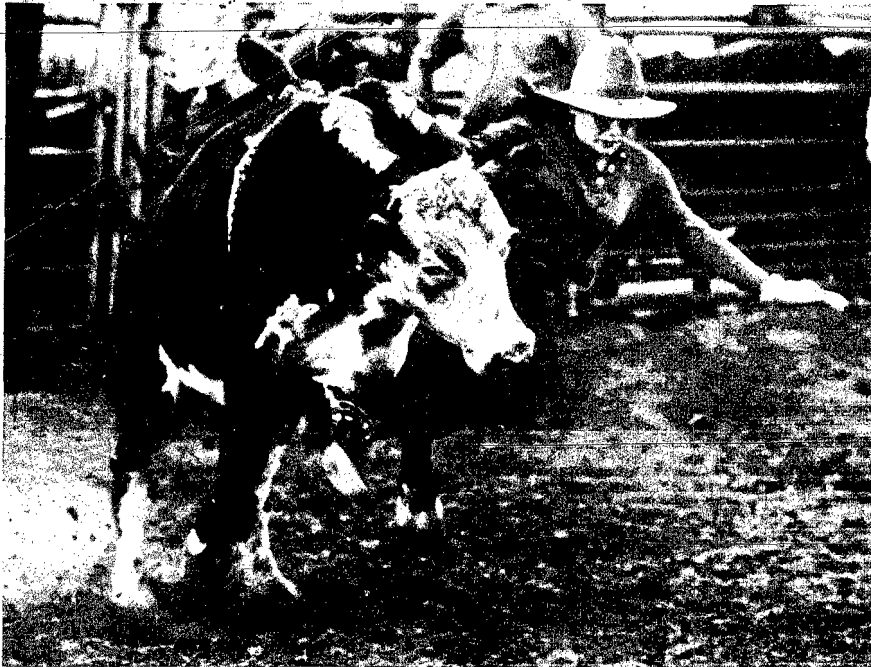
