## Local help for local problems

The Wayne area Human Resources Committee, which is still in its embryo stage, should be a good example of how local, voluntary organizations can take a realistic approach to handling local "problems."

The organization grew out of concern over possible child abuse and neglect in the local area.

"Possible" is a key word in the philosophy being developed by the group. Chairman Linda Baddorf is quick to point out that the committee members don't think child abuse is a major or widespread problem in the Wayne area; they just want to make some preparations to provide assistance should it be necessary. Contrast that to what is often the case with government agencies designed to handle similar "problems." The problem, as defined by Washington bureaucrats and local offices are established to deal with it. Factory workers must uncover a

case load sufficient to justify their employment and in areas where the "problem" isn't really a problem, definitions are stretched to fit. The government interference where it isn't really needed.

Mrs. Baddorf's group won't be out beating the bushes trying to uncover child abuse in a geographic area where it isn't widespread. The committee will be trying to make persons frequently in contact with children aware of the signs of abuse.

When a bona fide case does arise, the Human Resources Committee will be able to provide some people to help, plus reference to professionals experienced in dealing with such problems.

We think the committee, if it continues to follow its present track, will prove to be an example of how local people can deal with local problems, without a lot of fuss. That's refreshing. — Jim Strayer.

News of Note around Northeast Nebraska

**PRELIMINARY** plans have been underway for some time on the Days of '56 celebration scheduled for June 25-27 in Ponca. Some of the activities planned during the three-day event are a parade, style show and Ponca RCA rodeo on Friday; another parade, firemen's water fight, band concert and second rodeo performance on Saturday, and a ball game, boxing and final rodeo performance on Sunday.

**MEETING** in special session recently, the West Point City Council voted to advertise for bids for a new Civil Defense siren. The federal grant will not exceed \$4,721, according to Miller. This is one-half of the estimated \$9,442 required to purchase the 120 decibel, three signal, 240 volt, three phase siren.

## Who's got a secret?

President Ford has proposed an Official Secrets Act as one part of his program to reform the intelligence agencies. The Act would make it a felony for any bureaucrat to release intelligence "sources and methods," and it would subject that bureaucrat to a penalty of five years in jail or up to a \$5,000 fine.

On the face, this proposal may sound reasonable. All of us agree that there may be intelligence secrets that ought not to be revealed. And all of us think that bureaucrats ought not to reveal them. But if you look at the background of the American secrecy system, you will understand that the President's law is not designed to achieve that end.

At this point there are 15,000 bureaucrats who are entitled to stamp a document secret or classified in the executive. Every commentator agrees that some 90 per cent of the information classified in the secrecy system should not be secret and much of it covers up not national security secrets but the errors, the crimes and the abuses of our national security agencies.

The President has argued that the category "intelligence sources and methods" is much more limited than the general classification system, but a look

at the record makes the President look a little foolish.

For example, the CIA has argued that the revelation of a simple gross figure about what its budget is would endanger "intelligence sources and methods." Another example is that the CIA attempted to censor a passage in a book by John Marks and Victor Marchetti which stated that CIA Director Richard Helms could not pronounce the word Malagasy. That was an intelligence source or method.

Perhaps the most absurd example just took place in the House intelligence investigation. The House subpoenaed a document and when it received it a page was deleted. So it subpoenaed it again. And, finally, the page was supplied. The page was initially deleted because it would reveal intelligence sources and methods and when it was supplied the House found out what that was. It was a verbatim copy of a Jack Anderson newspaper column.

Through the years, intelligence sources and methods has been a category to cover up not simply intelligence secrets, but also the crimes and abuses of the intelligence agencies.

In the revelations of the past months, no one has revealed a secret that the administration can point to which has in fact been a national security secret. The secrets that have come out have been those of official crimes and illegality.

The upper deck of the boat has been turned into a display area for exhibits depicting the development of America's water resources and navigation. Each tour takes about 15 minutes.

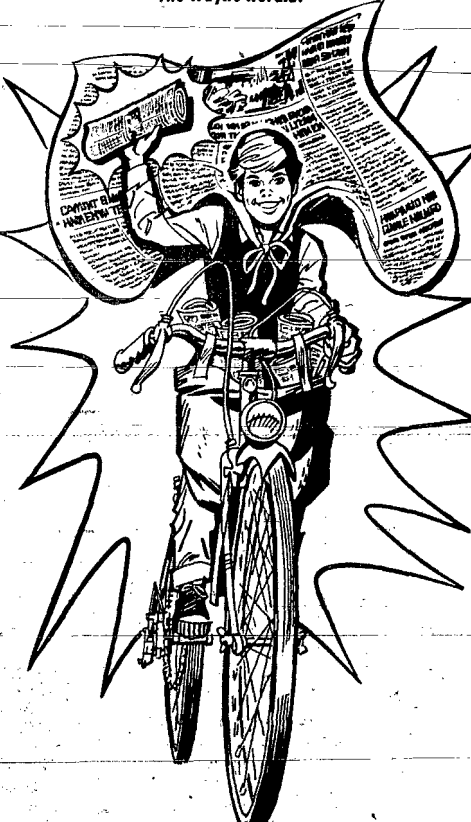

**HEAVENS—THE MEAT IS STILL IN THE FREEZER**  
Have you ever forgotten to take meat out of the freezer for supper? No doubt, every homemaker has either forgotten to take meat out or has found out at the last minute that there will be company coming and the leftover meat loaf just won't stretch far enough.

How can you get meat thawed out in just a few minutes? The answer: don't thaw before cooking; cook meats from the frozen state.

Meats can be prepared from the frozen state with practically no difference in shrinkage or flavor. Of course, additional cooking time will be necessary to allow for thawing.

For large frozen roasts, add about one-half more cooking time to the time required for fresh roasts. A roast that would normally require three hours to cook will require about four and a half hours when cooked from the frozen state.

Frozen steaks and chops require one-fourth to one-half

more cooking time than fresh steaks and chops, depending on their size. When broiling, place the meat at least four inches from the source of heat, so the exterior surface doesn't get too brown. When pan-broiling, the fry pan should be hot enough to brown the meat quickly before it can thaw and "water" in the pan. Lower heat after browning and cook slowly.

You don't need to thaw ground meat before cooking unless you need to shape it into loaves or patties; increase cooking time required for fresh meat by one-fourth to one-half.

Meats that are to be floured should be thawed partially so the flour will adhere to the meat's surface.

Cooking time for braising frozen meat is about the same as for fresh meat. There are lots of advantages of cooking meats from the frozen state. You never need to worry about last minutes plans if your husband decides to bring company home for supper or decides to take you out for supper; you can do either on a minute's notice because your steaks are in the freezer.

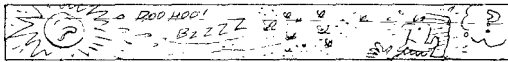
