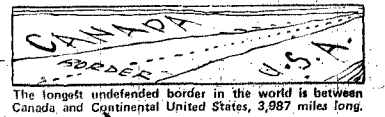

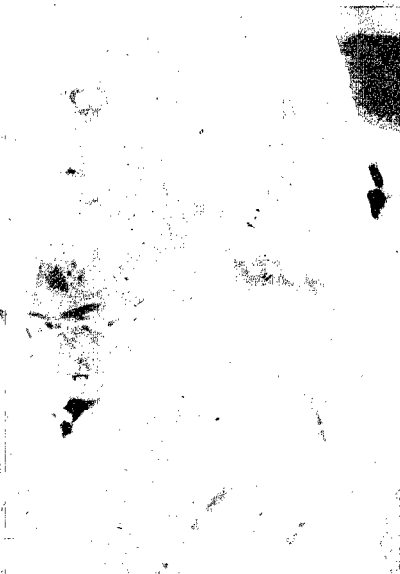

### 76th Is Off With a Bang

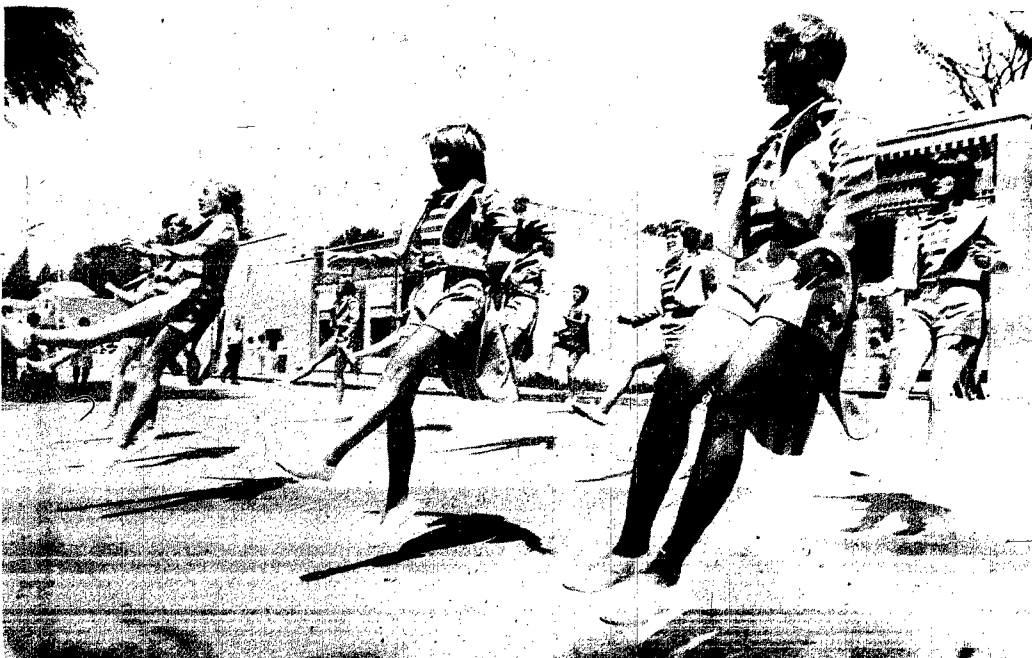

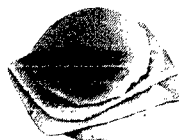
