

Purchase System Is Popular Service Offered by ESU-1

Nebraska schools have saved nearly \$1.5 million on purchased equipment in the past five years, thanks to cooperative purchase agreements with educational service units.

Jim Clark, director for the Educational Service Unit-1 (ESU-1) cooperative purchase department, said the service has been consistently popular with school superintendents.

Basic principle of the system is obtaining lowest prices through volume buying. Purchases for the entire state are made through ESU-17 offices with headquarters in Ainsworth.

Orders are placed in June and delivered to the service units in August. After receiving the bulk orders, ESU-1, Clark then assembles the individual orders for each school which are delivered or picked up in September. Equipment available under the cooperative purchase system includes film and slide projectors, file cabinets, tape recorders and a wide range of other items. Paper supplies and office furniture are not included.

Savings of 50 per cent over catalog prices are common, Clark said, with savings running as high as 40 to 70 per cent for some large volume items such as projector bulbs. Bulbs accounted for \$40,000 in orders statewide last year, he added.

Orders made by schools in the ESU-1 district totaled around \$35,000 this year, Clark said, averaging about \$1,000 a school. A 2.5 per cent commission is charged on the purchase price goes to ESU-1 to help pay the cost of two staff members who manage the purchase system. ESU-1 receives one-half per cent to pay for insurance against breakage.

Clark also oversees several other services available to schools. ESU-1 has 12 nine-inch laminators which are loaned to schools free of charge. Schools pay only for the lamination material, and each school generally has use of a machine for six to eight weeks each semester. A new service being offered this year is microfilming of school records.

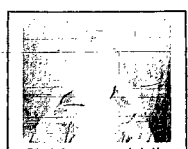

A WEDDING MEASURE



A wedding is a measured event. Brides are measured for their gowns, the first home is measured for carpeting, furniture, draperies and even the traditional march to the altar is measured. So is her cake.

WEDDING DAY CAKE

3 pints ice cream, any flavor, softened
1 container (oz.) Elite Eye Cool Whip
non-dairy whipped topping, thawed
1 cooled baked 8-inch yellow cake layer

Spread ice cream evenly in an 8-inch layer pan which has been lined with plastic wrap. Freeze until firm. Split cake layer in half horizontally to make 2 layers. Unmold ice cream onto 1 layer on serving plate; top with second layer. Quickly frost sides and top with about 2 cups of the whipped topping. Using remaining whipped topping in a pastry bag, decorate top and bottom edges of cake with flowers, roses, shells, or whatever you desire. Store in freezer until ready to serve. Let stand at room temperature for 10 minutes before cutting. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

Kevin Kraemer had nine solo tackles while Dowling, Uhl and Lin Smith finished with eight each.

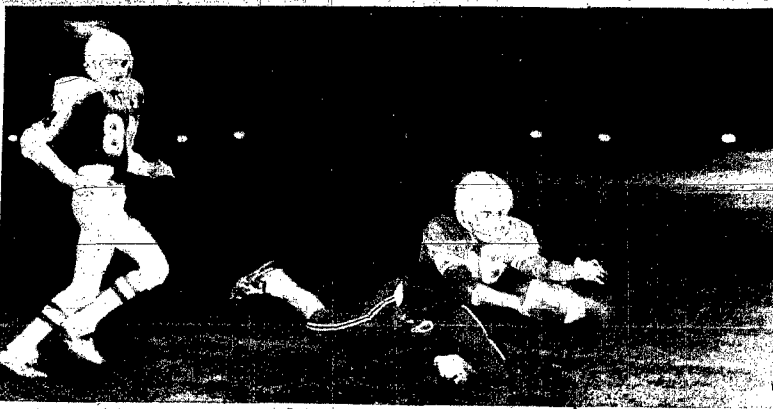
Allen's only score of the evening came when Uhl connected with Smith for a 29-yard TD pass in the final period.

If Wednesday's game at Emerson-Hubbard is any kind of a guide, the Wayne-Blue Devils will be going into the contest at Pierce tonight (Monday) with only one thing in mind — winning.

Wayne State College include: \$625 for soundproofing doors for the radio-TV rooms in the Fine Arts Building; \$750 for the Art Department Foundry; \$2,500 for a laboratory in Rice; \$1,500 for heating plant tube bundle; \$325 for blacktop sealing; \$550 to remove boiler stack; \$685 for Connell Office repairs; and \$1,250 for a Connell Seminar room.

Renovation plans for two Wayne State Buildings remained in the "concept" stage following approval of another motion by the board.

Referring to the Education and Humanities Buildings, William Colwell of Chadron, speaking for the trustees' building and grounds subcommittee, moved to "await pending studies on space utilization, enrollment expectations, and operational costs" before taking further action on renovation plans.

He moved to continue on-going programs in the buildings. Defining the Board's feelings, Rich Bringleison, executive officer and secretary to the Board, explained that the members were not comfortable with the current renovation program statement, but wanted to keep the concept alive.

The second grant application is due: a community advisory council will be in formation, consisting of 8-10 citizens from Northeast Nebraska. This group will meet and designate area consultants to advise in implementation of a pilot workshop.

The workshop will be the culminating point in the planning stage, according to Schultz. Tentatively set for February, the seminar is entitled "Crazy Horse: The Image and the Reality."

This session will implement the poetry of Nebraska poet laureate John G. Neihardt and another Nebraska poet, Donald Jones, author of "Miss Liberty Meet Crazy Horse." Featuring local participants, the seminar will be filmed and hopefully sent for use in schools, Nebraska Educational TV, and historical societies, Dr. Schultz related.

The humanities grant is just one more step in the renovation of the humanities department at Wayne State and restoration of cultural interest in Nebraska. Within the past few years, the college has experienced declines in student populations up to 50 per cent in the humanities division, and up to 33 per cent reinforcement of the humanities faculty, mandating a 15-hour class load for instructors.

The Neihardt Center will donate facility and services for the regional program, Dr. Schultz said.

Schultz and the Humanities group feel Midwestern culture is very real, but a method of understanding and realizing its modern application has never been successful.

"We hypothesize that there is a market for humanistic learning," the division head noted. "But we haven't (prior to the cultural undertaking) devised a means to reach the Midwest people."

Other than topics of general nature, the Wayne and Bancroft groups feel programs in the cultural awakening program should specifically apply to Midwestern interests.

Currently requesting three years of assistance from NEH, the area humanities program hopes to continue as an ongoing program, not limited to Neihardt's work. Objectives of the program are to create a sense of cultural community, provide humanistic focus upon the local community, make fuller use by the community of the humanistic resources of Wayne State College and the Neihardt Center, and enrich existing humanistic programs at Wayne State College and the Neihardt Center.

Future annual programs suggested are "The Indian in Northeast Nebraska," "Ethnic Contributions to the Culture of Northeastern Nebraska," "Rural Populism in Northeast Nebraska," "The Arts and Letters in Northeast Nebraska Schools," and "Rural Self-Image and Post-Modern America."

'Approach With Open Mind'

As a prospective member of the Wayne-Carroll school board, I have had the opportunity to sit in on a regular meeting of the board. I feel that a good program for students with learning disabilities is a great asset to our community and school. However, I don't feel we should overlook special education for the students who have special talents and abilities. If our school is to be really good it must challenge every student to better himself. Many of these special education programs are partially federally funded.

I live four miles east of Wayne and farm 920 acres in partnership with my brother, Wayne. Being a land owner (and taxpayer) helps me to realize how much of our tax dollar goes toward the education of our young people.

I received a bachelors degree in education with majors in math and industrial arts from Wayne State College in 1951. I am 46 years of age and my wife (the former Bonnie Sorenson) and I have been lifelong residents of Wayne County, excluding my three years of military service in the Army during the Korean War. We are the parents of four daughters. Having children enrolled in all three of the Wayne schools in itself helps me to keep abreast, to some extent, as to what is going on in our schools. So, I feel now is the time to become involved and to take an active part and interest in our public school.

We are members of Grace Lutheran Church and have served in various positions. I've been on the building committee, parish education board, welcoming committee, and served two terms as trustee. I have been a member and past president of the Wayne County Extension Board and am at present a member of the Wayne County Joint Planning Commission. I have also been quite active in the Wayne County Farm Bureau and am president of this organization. I've been a member of the Wayne Rural Fire District No. two for several years and am president of this group at the present time.

When people don't vote, Murphy said, special interest groups have more power.

The senator said he believes there is a lack of concern about the future of the nation's youth, because of the legacy which will be left them in the form of a tremendous national debt.

The debt now amounts to \$3,000 for every man, woman and child in the country. "When I die," Murphy said, "my two sons will inherit \$8,000 in debts for money spent on past government."

Murphy told the Lions he had introduced a resolution which was approved by the last session of the Unicameral, calling for congress to enact a measure which requires them to balance the federal budget.

Expenditures in excess of appropriations would be added as a surtax to the next year's budget. Government incurred debt would never be carried past one year.

Murphy said that because he does not expect Congress to place such a restriction upon itself, his resolution also contains a provision for Nebraska to join other states in calling for a Constitutional convention to consider an amendment mandating a balanced budget.

The senator termed "a sleeping giant" the constitutionally provided right to call such a convention.

"Until we make government accountable, the debt will in crease," Murphy said. A constitutional convention has never been called he added, but the provision is there.

"The people still have the

power to mandate to Congress what they want."

Murphy said he believes the U.S. Supreme Court would uphold the idea that such a convention could be called to consider a single, specific issue. He said, however, that he believes Congress would offer the proposed amendment for ratification by the states before a convention is called.

Murphy said his unsuccessful bid for office in 1968 and his successful bid in 1972 were both "good, clean, honest races."

"Politics at best doesn't enjoy a tremendous reputation," Murphy said. "When the truth is ignored and misrepresentations are made, it is a very unfortunate situation."

"I'm having such a situation now, and I only ask to respond."

"For one thing," Murphy said, "I have no cousin in Nebraska," referring to a claim made by his

opponent that the two candidates are cousins.

The senator said his attendance record in excess of 98 percent refutes claims that he is never on the floor of the Unicameral.

Murphy said he had also been accused of precipitating a problem between a South Sioux City councilman and the State Justice Department.

The senator said he has had no contact with the councilman involved and that the South Sioux City attorney has made efforts to squash the allegations made against Murphy.

"This is unfortunate," Murphy said, "and I apologize for it. Not because I have participated, but because the public has had to endure it."

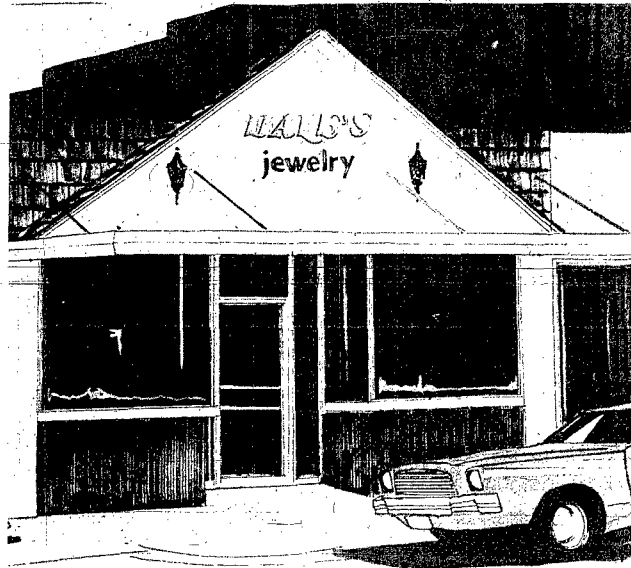

FIRST WARD

Economy Showed Increase During June

Nebraska's economic activity increased moderately during the month of June, after a slight pause in May.

The physical volume of output at the end of June equaled that recorded in April of this year, according to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln College of Business Administration's Bureau of Business Research.

Writing in "Business in Nebraska," Duane Hackmann, research associate, noted that total output for the first two quarters of 1976 was 3.6 per cent above the same period in 1975.

The first quarter of 1976 was slightly stronger, economically, than the second. This trend parallels national economic conditions.

Nebraska's May to June gains occurred mainly in the government and agriculture sectors. Smaller increases were also posted in the construction and distributive trade sectors, including retail, wholesale trade, insurance, and finance. Real output changes in most sectors of the national economy changed only fractionally between May and June.

Much of the increase in government employment may be in response to its overall low levels during the first six months of 1976. For the first two quarters government employment in 1976 was one per cent below last year. The gain recorded in June may represent the catch up from depressed levels.

Residential construction continued as a strong component in June and combined with a small increase in nonbuilding con-

struction generated a 1.6 per cent improvement in real construction output for the month of June. Residential construction remained quite strong during the first six months of 1976, while total construction measured in constant dollars and adjusted for seasonal patterns was slightly below the first half of 1975.

Retail sales rose sharply in Nebraska from May to June registering a seven per cent increase after adjustment for price changes.

Retail sales had been rather stagnant during the last portion of the second quarter, not an expected considering the strong national showing during the first quarter of 1976.

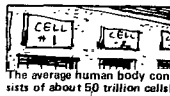
Of regional interests, retail sales continue strong in the areas of the state much the same as in the preceding months. For instance, strong gains have been recorded in Region 23, Alliance, and this pattern continues. Fairbury recorded a substantial gain over the previous year restoring the Fairbury region to the group of strong regional performance.

An indication of the strength in retail sales is suggested by the fact that all cities reporting retail sales show gains over the previous year after adjustments for price changes. This is the first widespread improvement in all cities since the state started out of the recession during the second quarter 1975.

Manufacturing was the only section in the Nebraska economy for which a decline in real output was observed from

May to June. This decline was very slight and may be attributable to statistical fluctuations and not a real decline in output. Employment actually increased during this period. The performance of the manufacturing sector will require some additional monthly observations before a

definitive conclusion can be reached.

to followers of one or the other presidential candidates. In all that time, campaign buttons have become a part of Americana.

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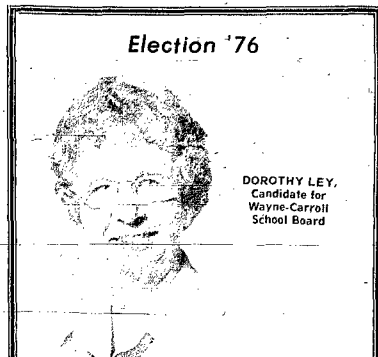

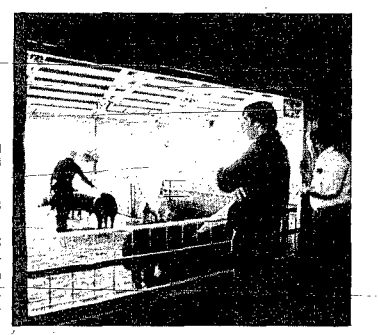
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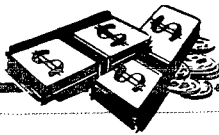
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
