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## 'Roundup' Nets 39

Parents-Friday registered 39 youngsters to attend kindergarten at West Elementary School in Wayne next year according to principal Dave Luff.

Registrations were completed during the annual kindergarten roundup. Children who will be in kindergarten next year were not only able to register but also received hearing and vision tests.

Luff said he had expected an additional nine youngsters to enroll for classes next year, based on census figures, and inviting any parents who were not able to register the roundup and would like to register their children for kindergarten next year to contact him at the school any time.

Mrs. Jim Seward, principal of St. Mary's Catholic school, said five children were registered for first grade classes next year. She said any parents in the area wishing to enroll children for next year can call her at the school.

Another kindergarten roundup is scheduled for today (Monday), this time at Lincoln Public Schools. Regular kindergarten classes will not meet. Parents of children born between Oct. 15, 1971, and Oct. 14, 1972, should attend the roundup, scheduled for 9-11 a.m., school officials said.

Hoskins Public School has scheduled its roundup for 2 p.m. Tuesday. Parents undecided about sending children to kindergarten should make arrangements to have children tested, school officials said.

## DEC Director: Big Red Farm May Become Showplace

Big Red Farms, Inc., of Wakefield has been working hard to be a good neighbor and could become a model for rural industry. Department of Environmental Control (DEC) officials said following a visit to the egg-production facility Thursday.

Dan Drain, DEC director, said the visit was prompted by complaints lodged against the egg-production operation of the Milton G. Waldbaum Co. at a public hearing in Wakefield March 11. Many of those complaints stemmed from incidents which occurred two or more years ago and the company has made considerable progress since then in taking corrective action, Drain said.

"I'm confident it (Big Red Farms) will turn out to be a fine operation, one which people will take great pride in," Drain said. "I look for it to become a showplace."

Big Red Farms produces eggs in 15 hen houses, each accommodating 40,000 birds. Complaints aired at the March 11 meeting stemmed from problems with waste disposal in

three categories: run-off water from bird-watering troughs, solid waste disposal including dead chickens, and odor from a dryer used to process manure into fertilizer and a livestock feed supplement.

Waldbaum manager Dan Gardner at the hearing March 11 acknowledged that the company had experienced some problems when it first began the poultry operation but said efforts had been made to correct problems so the company could be a "good neighbor" to nearby property owners.

Drain and other DEC officials Thursday confirmed that Big Red Farms has made considerable progress in handling the tons of waste produced by some 900,000 hens.

The dryer used to process manure into commercial fertilizer and livestock feed supplement is well within air pollution regulations according to Joe Francis, head of the DEC air pollution division.

A recently completed test revealed that emissions from the dryer stack were only 30 per cent

## Liquor Tax on City Agenda

The Wayne city council Tuesday night will open bids for a new truck and pickup, will consider three ordinances, and discuss the possibility of armor coating for South Douglas St. and Roosevelt park.

One of the ordinances if passed will vacate alleys on the block occupied by Allied Lumber to clear the way for contemplated expansion of the business.

A second ordinance will change the location for regular council meetings. The council has conducted one special meeting in new quarters in the city hall.

A third ordinance under consideration would affect speed limits on Highways 15 and 35 within the city.

In addition to the proposed armorcoating for South Douglas St. and Roosevelt Park, the council will discuss a paving project for Grantland Road.

Other agenda items include a request for a burning permit by Wayne Auto Salvage, a resolution to authorize the police department to request a grant for audio-visual equipment, and discussion of the city liquor license occupation tax.

## Laurel Voters Will Decide Bond Issue

Petitioners in Laurel gained the necessary number of signatures to call for a special election to decide a bond issue for a municipal nursing home.

Voters will decide in the April 12 special election if the City of Laurel should issue up to \$837,500 in negotiable bonds to finance a 50-bed municipal nursing home, either through purchase of an existing building or construction of a new facility.

The project would be financed through a mill levy on property within the city limits.

Mrs. Betty Kavanaugh Friday was sworn in as postmaster of the Carroll post office in ceremonies in Norfolk.

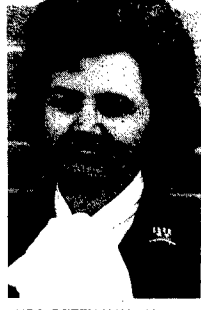

## Wayne Broker Changes Plea

A Wayne securities broker charged with engaging in unethical practices in Arizona Monday was allowed to withdraw his guilty plea and charges may be withdrawn.

U.S. District Court Judge Walter Craig indicated he may consider motions to have the charges against Elary Richard dropped and Richard's Omaha attorney said he understands the charges will be dismissed.

Three former officials of the now defunct Arizona Land company Monday were sentenced by Craig in connection with the allegedly fraudulent operations of the firm. Four other defendants, a land salesman and three securities brokers, were found innocent of charges against them.

Testimony in the four-month trial was estimated at \$1.5 million. New Life Trust investors were bailed on an estimated \$5.3 million, some deposited in Canadian and Mexican banks, according to assistant U.S. attorney Joel Sacks.

## Carroll Youth Wins 4-H Trophy

Wayne County 4-Hers recently completed their 4-H beef carcass contest. Carcass information is obtained from the packing plant at slaughter time on a 4-H market beef.

Information obtained from the packing plant includes confirmation, maturity, marbling, quality grade, yield grade, rib eye area, kidney, pelvic and heart fat.

Ribbon placings are based on the following standards:

- Purple — minimum of low choice quality grade carcass and 2.49 yield grade or less.
- Blue — minimum of low choice quality grade carcass and 2.50 to 3.24 yield grade.
- Red — minimum of high good carcass grade and 2.99 yield or better or low choice carcass grade and 3.25 to 3.99 yield grade — all others.

This voyage is possible through the current planetarium show, "The Archive Project," a blend of current scientific knowledge, philosophy, and imagination. Sometime in the middle of the third millennium A.D., the civilization of Earth has embarked upon a journey of exploration through the intense gravitational black hole at the center of the galaxy.

Earth has joined intellectual resources with the ten other civilizations of the galactic community to journey through the gateway between universes.

Throughout the show, the planetarium audience finds itself inside the Earth biocell of an interstellar vehicle, a vehicle fused with the mind of a computer, Archive One.

Archive One communicates both its perception of its surroundings, and the purposes, possibilities, and changing status of the voyage.

The show is different than any offered previously by the planetarium, and should appeal not only to science fiction buffs, but to anyone who would like their imagination stimulated.

Presentations are scheduled for Wednesday evenings at 7:30, and Sunday afternoons at 3:30. Special showings can be arranged by groups and organizations.

The Fred G. Dale Planetarium is located at the south entrance of the Carhart Science Hall. No admission is charged. Visitors are reminded to arrive on time.

Courses in semiconductor technology and semiconductor circuit analysis will be new to the NTC summer line up.

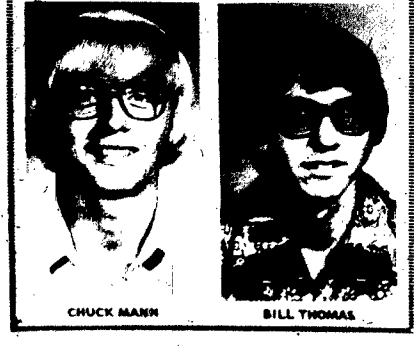
Other courses will include ceramics, painting, biology, real estate, accounting, criminal investigation, English, camping and canoeing courses.

## City Officials Take Look At Law Consolidation Plan

Some 35 city council members from nine Dixon County communities Tuesday met with sheriff Dean Chase in Altam to discuss a proposal to consolidate law enforcement in the county.

Chase said the municipal officials weren't asked to make a commitment to the proposal but did express an interest in meeting with the county supervisors to discuss the matter further.

The supervisors will be invited to meet with city officials April 19 at 7:30 p.m. in the Altam fire hall, Chase said.

Wakefield now has two full time and one part time police officers. Ponca, Newcastle, and Emerson each have one full time officer. Other communities in Dixon County — Allen, Dixon, Concord, Waterbury, Martinsburg and Maskell — do not have police officers.

Under the consolidation proposal, four deputies would be added to the sheriff's department which would then provide police services for all communities in the county.

Chase has estimated first-year costs at \$60,000. The Region 11 and 25 Crime Commission has submitted a preliminary application for Law Enforcement Administration Assistance funds. As proposed, LEAA funds would provide about \$72,000 if a grant is requested and approved, with the state and county each paying \$4,000. In 1979, federal and state financing would decline to \$27,500 and \$2,750 respectively. Local financing would increase to \$24,750.

Under a Nebraska statute, communities in counties with consolidated law enforcement pay \$9 a year per person for police services.

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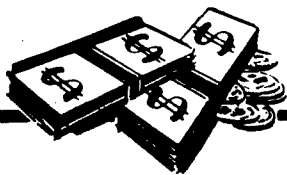

In the early days of the Big Red operation, when the company was having trouble with the manure drier, it was forced to dispose of tons of manure by burying it. Some landowners were concerned that seepage might eventually contaminate underground water in the area. Drain said there is a 10-foot layer of fill dirt between the manure and natural soil. Vertical separation from the water table and the composition of soil at the disposal site are such that chances of contamination are remote, Drain said.

He also said it appears the company is now doing a good job of disposing of solid waste, including dead chickens. Disposal chores are done daily, he said, and refuse is placed in closed containers.

Engineer Jim Condon of the DEC water pollution division observed floor cleaning practices taken by the Waldbaum. The waste is fairly caustic, Condon said, draining into the wooded area on the Big Red property. The possibility of water running off onto adjacent property is not too significant, the engineer said, although he indicated he would review his findings and possibly suggest some disposal methods.

Drain said alterations to the drier have pretty much taken care of the manure disposal problem. The waste is dried, sacked and sold as fertilizer and as a livestock feed supplement.

Complaints had been registered about Big Red trucks hauling waste from the plant scattering manure along the roads. Gardner said that since the drier has been functioning properly the drier is now operating at only 50 per cent of its capacity. Drain said, Gardner indicated the company plans to add six poultry houses to the 15 now in operation.

During discussion following the visit, Gardner commented on a letter entered in testimony

during the March 11 hearing, alleging that money from the Big Red operation goes to Omaha, home of company owner Dr. Milton Waldbaum, while problems stay in Wakefield.

"Nothing else about the hearing disturbed me," Gardner said, "but I think that was a low shot."

Dr. Waldbaum, present for the DEC visit said "I think the people understand that none of the killings would be here if all of the money went to Omaha."

Drain said the DEC will keep an eye on the Big Red operation but basically will work with the company. Drain said he and other DEC officials would compare their findings and possibly make some suggestions where improvements might be made in the poultry operation but indicated general satisfaction with steps taken by the Waldbaum company to handle waste disposal and with the current operation of Big Red Farms.
