uncle. An older brother, the Rev. L.H. deFreese, is pastor of the First Lutheran Church in Oklahoma City and younger brother Rev. Paul deFreese is pastor at Kountz Memorial Lutheran Church in Omaha. A third brother, Luther deFreese, is secretary of the Kansas City, Kans., YMCA. Unlike his brothers. Rev. deFreese has never been attracted to, cities, preferring instead the close relationships and stabile community he found in Wayne. "Wayne people are remarkably well established. There is more continuity here. Traditional values have been maintained."

At the same time, the pastor notes a number of changes he has observed over the past 35 years. When he first moved to Wayne about two-thirds of the church mail went to rural congregation members. The number of larms has dropped since then and the pastor estimates that now about three-fourths of the congregation have city addresses.

And "while traditional religious"

fourths of the congregation have city addresses.

And while traditional religious values have remained strong locally, the pastor said churches probably don't serve the same roll as community centers that they once did.

"There are more activities for people to select from," he explained, adding that the scope of church activities has also broadened.

Thumbing through a record of ministerial actions he has performed, memories flood back to the pastor: baptisms, confirmations, weddings, funerals. Many for second and third

generations of families who belonged to the congregation when he began. "You get close to people," he said, and that is a source of both joy and pain. "Pretty soon, when you have a funeral, it's like a member of your own family."

The record is a long one: 920 baptismal rites, 350 marriage ceremonies, 597 youth confirmations.

A triantful of people included in the record are particularly a source of pride, because of their decision to enter the clergy. The people are the church, Rev. deFreese said, but if it is to replenish itself, the church must raise leaders to keep it strong.

To accomplish that goal, a congregation needs to have one of its members enter the clergy about every 20 years, deFreese said.


Staying with one congregation for 35 years has nonetheless involved a con-siderable amount of travel for Rev. deFreese. Part of his duties include deFreese. The majority go to local hospitals but a number also enter medical centers in larger communities and the pastor's rounds often take him to Yankton, Sioux City and Omaha.

Wayne Parish Is Still Pastor's 'First Love'

As a seminary student, S.K. de-Freese was told that as a pastor he would have one love — his first parish. The prediction has proven true for the pastor now in his 33th year with the Redeemer Lutheran Church in

Mayne. After being ordained May 15, 1942, the Rey, deFreese was a supply pastor on a short term basis for a number of communities including Columbus. The Wayne church was his first permanent assignment, considerably more permanent than he originally anticipated.

He said he and Mrs. deFreese thought five years would be a good ministry, "but at the end of the first five years the church was in the middle of a building program, and I think we kind of fell in love with the people here and wanted to stay."

"We've had some calls for other ministries since then, but we're still here," he added.

The Redeemer Lutheran congregation began planning to build a new church in 1947 and the building at 502 Lincoln St. was completed in 1948.

A Nebraska native, the Rev. deFreese-was graduated from Midland Lutheran College at Fremont and then attended Western. Theological Seminary, now the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago.

Several generations of his family preceded the Rev. deFreese in the clergy, including his father and an




