

Hospital Administrators Accepted for Fellowships

Sister Therese Koch and Charles Thomas, both of Wayne, have been notified of their acceptance as Fellows of the American Academy of Medical Administrators (AAMA).

The AAMA is organized to encourage "a scientific approach to medical administration" and to maintain criteria of competency for the profession.

Candidates for membership must have at least three years of experience in the medical administration field and hold an appropriate baccalaureate degree.

Fellowship status is the highest rank and honor bestowed by the society, for "services beyond the ordinary demands of the profession."

Candidates for fellowship status must complete an original paper dealing with the medical administration field, plus two project papers.

Sister Therese, administrator of Providence Medical Center in Wayne, and Thomas, former P.M.C. administrator and now head of Our Lady of Lourdes Hospital in Norfolk, worked jointly on a paper, "Timely Success for the Health Care Executive," a study of time management in hospitals.

In addition to completing the required projects, fellowship candidates must have been AAMA members for at least four years and meet requirements for continuing education. Community service is also con-

sidered by the AAMA credentials committee.

Sister Therese and Thomas are invited to attend the organization's annual convocation Aug. 27-28 to formally receive their fellowships.

The occasion is the 33rd annual Wayne State College High School Music Camp, July 24-31.

Instructors have been appointed, counselors assigned, accompanists located, and assistants alerted. The rehearsal calendar has been printed, and swimming, pool, tennis, and other outside activities have been arranged. Meals have been planned. Photo sessions have been scheduled. Concert tickets

have been printed. Everything is just about ready now.

More than 20 music camp staff members have been preparing for the event for months, and registrations are coming in daily — 198 to date.

Campers will check into dorms, register and audition all on the 24th. Then it's down to work. Evening events will conclude day-long rehearsal and lesson sessions. The faculty-staff recital will be Monday; the student recital, Tuesday; Camp Campers, a variety show, Wednesday; stage band and swing choir performance, Thursday; and honor groups concert, Friday. The public is welcome to attend the 8:15 p.m. events at no charge.

The grand finale concert, featuring the entire campus population, will be Sunday afternoon, July 31, at Ramsey Theatre. Admission will be \$1.50 for adults and 50 cents for children six years old and over.

Shopping Center Plans Revealed

Phil Griess, owner of Griess Rexall at 221 Main St. in Wayne, Friday announced plans to move into a new building which will be constructed on the east side of Main Street between Fifth and Sixth Streets.

Al Wittig, owner of Wittig's Food Center had previously announced that he will relocate his business in the 70-by-190-foot steel building to be erected by Simpson's Structures of Norfolk.

Griess Friday said his portion of the building will measure about 50 by 70 feet, giving him about 50 per cent more floor space than the drugstore's current location. The pharmacist said he will expand some of the departments in his business after moving into the new location, but details haven't been worked out yet.

No dates for beginning or completing construction have been set, although demolition work has been started on houses located at the building site.

A paved parking lot at the site will provide space for about 66 cars.

Griess said there are no plans at this time for use of the building now housing his store.

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County Population Down But Upswing Is Indicated

Wayne County's population declined by 11.4 per cent from 1970 to 1976 but an increase from 1973 to 1976 is an encouraging sign, according to the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, and future population estimates should be monitored closely.

Three Injured In Accident at 35-98 Junction

Three accident victims were listed in stable condition Saturday morning in Providence Medical Center in Wayne following a collision Thursday morning at about 10 o'clock at the intersection of Highways 35 and 98 eight miles west of Wayne.

State Trooper Don Matejka of Norfolk said Emil Dion of Wayne was driving westbound on Highway 35 and had just started a left turn at the intersection when the accident happened.

The Bureau report attributed the six-year population decline, from 10,400 recorded during the 1970 census, to the 9,211 provisional estimate for July 1, 1976, to "significant declines in the institutional (college) population."

The revised population figure for July 1, 1975, is 8,949. The bureau report said the increase was the first for Wayne County in the 1970s. Future estimates should be monitored closely, the report said, to determine whether the population increase will be temporary, or the signal of a more lasting trend.

The July 1, 1976 population estimates for Nebraska's 93 counties were prepared jointly by the Bureau of Business Research and the U.S. Bureau of the Census. According to the report, published in the July issue of "Business in Nebraska," nearby counties enjoyed significant growth during the six years following the 1970 census. Stanton County population increased by 16 per cent and Madison County grew by 5 per cent. The population boom in

Stanton County reflects the growth of Norfolk, in adjoining Madison County, with increasing numbers of people residing in Stanton County and enjoying the employment, schools and other services of nearby Norfolk.

Madison County itself has reversed its net out-migration trend of the '60s and early '70s and recorded a net in-migration of 1.9 per cent since 1970. The remainder of Madison County's population increase is attributable to natural increase, the number of births exceeding the number of deaths. In-migration indicates more people moving into the county than moved out.

Another Northeast Nebraska county, Dakota, was the fastest growing county in the state from 1970 to 1976. The population estimate for Dakota County is quite accurate, according to the report, because it is based on the results of a special census conducted in 1976. Since 1970, the county has experienced net in-migration of 16.4 per cent, compared to a net in-migration of just 0.7 per cent for the state. Employment in manufacturing, primarily meat packing and processing, more than doubled in Dakota County from 1970 to 1975. See POPULATION, page 5

Camera Course Offered

A short course in intermediate photography is being offered through the Wayne State College Department of Continuing Education on July 15, 16 and 17, with a follow-up date of Aug. 6.

The workshop will deal directly with camera handling and photo composition. There will be enough basic darkroom instruction to facilitate camera handling and composition, according to the three course instructors.

Gerald Van Roekel of Hills, Minn., Don South, Sioux Falls, S.D., and Dennis Linster, Wayne, all accomplished freelance photographers, will teach the class.

Students must furnish their own adjustable camera, and each should have some basic camera handling experience, or should have attended the "Black and White Photography" workshop held on the WSC campus previously. Bulk 35mm film will be available at the course site.

Classes will meet at Benthack Hall on the WSC campus. Two credit hours are offered. Cost is \$36 for Nebraska residents or \$60 for non-residents, plus a \$10 matriculation fee for first-time students at WSC.

Burglary Pleas Heard

Wayne County district court judge Eugene C. McFadden Wednesday accepted pleas from two Wayne men, each charged with two counts of burglary.

Terry Biggerstaff and Darrell Allvin were each charged with breaking into the Nu Tavern and Logan Valley Implement on April 2. Biggerstaff pleaded guilty to the Nu Tavern charge and the second charge was dismissed.

Wayne County attorney Budd Bornhoff said another case pending against Biggerstaff in Wayne County court will also be dropped. He had been charged with breaking into the Joint in Wayne on May 11.

Judge McFadden ordered a pre-sentence investigation for Biggerstaff and set Aug. 3 as the date for sentencing. Biggerstaff remains in the Wayne County jail after failing to post the \$5,000 bond fixed by judge McFadden.

Allvin pleaded not guilty to

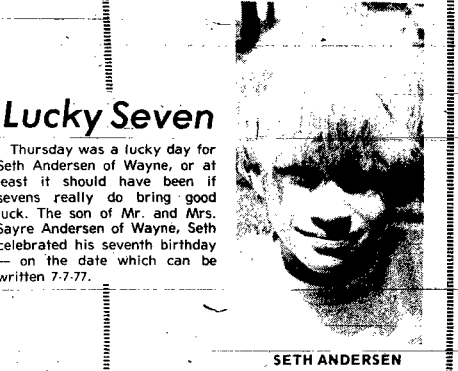
both charges and remains free on \$5,000 bond. A date for hearing the charges has not been set.

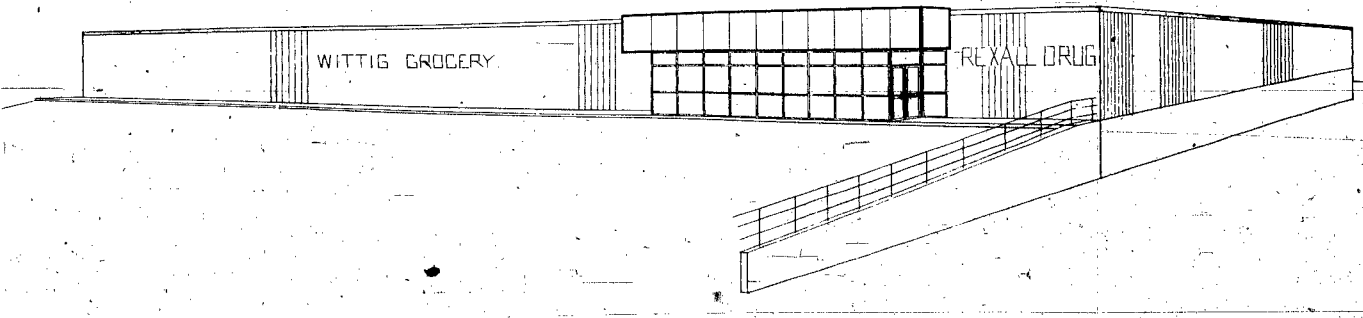
Planning Group Meeting Set for Wednesday Night

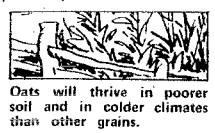
Eight of the 20 hits were for extra bases, Gross pointed out,

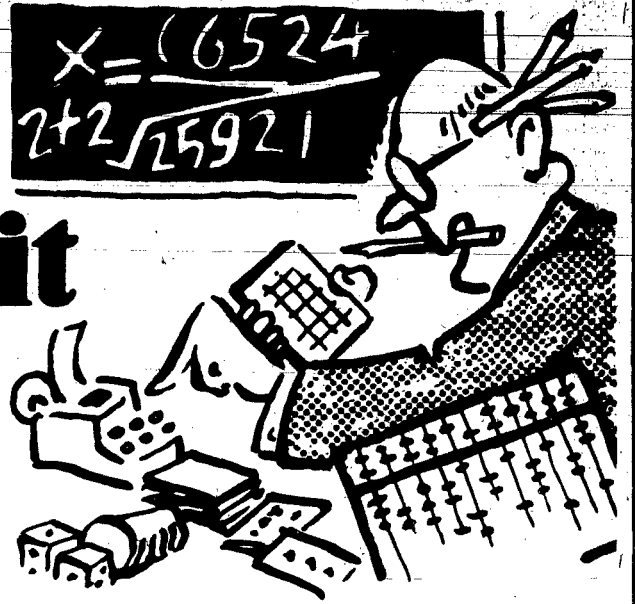

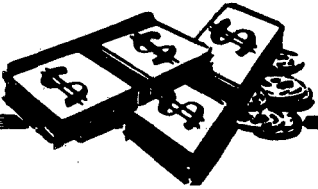

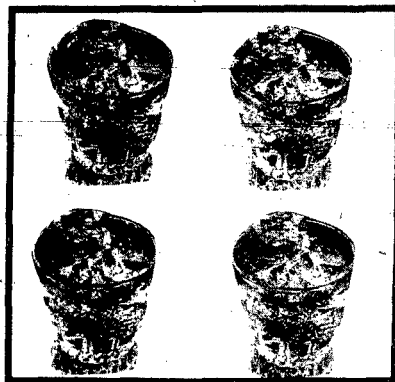
Gross remains free on \$5,000 bond after pleading not guilty to both counts. No trial date has been set.

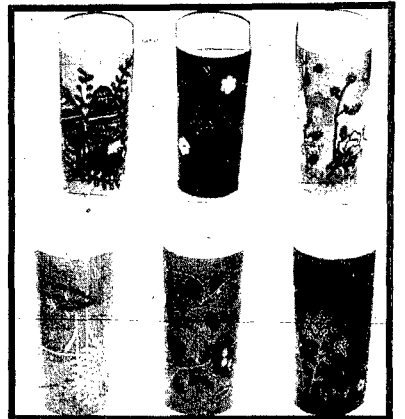

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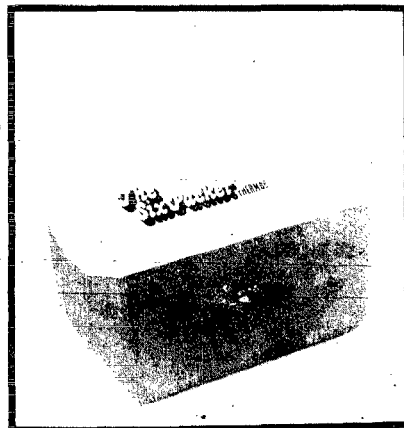
