

The 1864 Congress had amended the Pacific Railroad Act of 1862 to provide a land grant for an extension of the lowa Burlington through Nebraska to connect with the Union Pacific. Calvert worked as a surveyor from freight office clerk to division engineer, chief engineer of the Burlington (1884).

His wife, Cora Belle Hardy Calvert, was the daughter of Harvey Wesley Hardy, a pioneer Lincoln merchant, 1887-78. Lincoln mayor, and 1886 prohibition candidate for governor of Nebraska. In September of 1904 Calvert moved with his Burlington office to Chicago. In 1912, however, he refurned to Lincoln, where he resided at 4201 Calvert St. Inamed for him) until his death in 1916. A collection of Calvert's surveying, instruments was donated to the Nebraska State-Historical Society in 1967 by Phillip Seacrest Hardy, a nephew of Cora Hardy Calvert. Calvert's personal papers are now in the Society Archives.

The following excerpts are from an 1898 letter written by Calvert to Charles F. Manderson, U.S. Senator from Nebraska (1883.1895). The complete letter, edited by Larry Gara, appeared in Nebraska History, June, 1954. Although written for promotional purposes, if contains much information on the history of the Burlington Railroad and of the areas in Nebraska through which its lines passed.

"The Burlington lines east of the Mo. River were completed through to Pacific City — near present Pacific Junction November 27th 1869 and although it was shown by examination to those locally in Charge-west of the Mo. River lines that Bellevue was from an Engineering and a commercial standpoint the best point from which to start a line west and they evidently, had hopes up to the early summer of 1869 that possibly they might persuade the Union Pacific to join them in building a bridge at that point, they abandoned the Idea of starting from Bellevue in the early part of July 1869 for on the fourth-day of that month-ground was broken and work begun at Platts mouth for the extension west from that point. The line was-opened to Lincoin July 20th 1870 and completed to Kearney in September 1872 after which no more lines were built until 1878. "During the years 1872 to 1874 (The Grasshopper years) the business was very discouraging especially in the new and sparsely settled country west of the Big Blue River . . . In 1878 things began to look more encouraging and the line

Well known TV, sports and race car personalities joined the crusade by reporting their compliance with the 55 mph limit and encouraging the public to comply.

According to a California Highway Patrol spokesman, "There shouldn't be anyone in California who isn't aware of our speed reduction effort."

Hastings to Red Cloud was built. From this time on various branches were built from year to year ... "At the time the work of construction was begun at Plattsmouth, the country was fairly well settled to Lincoln, west of a line north and south through that point there was not much of what we would today call civilization. There were a few houses where Crete now is ... West of Crete there were a very few settlers, one between Crete and Dorchester and three or four near Friend. Otherwise the country was a blank, a few straggling herds of Buffalo, some jack rabbits, coyoles and ....

"When the line of Road was located through to Fort Kearney in 1871 and the locations selected for side tracks at which it was hoped to build the future locations selected for side tracks at which it was hoped to build the future towns it seemed necessary that some one make a beginning and the Railroad Company arranged to have built at each point four small, two story, frame houses. These buildings though quite small appeared to be immense in the Mirage so frequent in these hot summer days and could be seen for many miles, there being no trees in sight anywhere or other thing that raised above the surface of the plane. The stations so located were named from Crete west with names having first letter in alphabetical order. (Chief engineer Thomas Doane named the towns Crete, Dorchester, Exeter, Fairmont, Grafton, Harvard, Inland, Juniata, Kenesaw and Lowell.) Later new points sprung up at Friend, Sutton, Saronville, Hastings, and, Newark. "When one considers the rapid extension of-Railroads into the trans-Missouri country during the quarter of a Century, just passed. one must realize that a wonderful change has come over the great American desert, almost as if by magic. — T.E. Calvert"

Gross remains free on \$5,000 bond after pleading not guilty to both counts. No trial date has been set.








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
