# Priority System for Snow Removal

The Wayne Chamber of Commerce is making certain new arrivals in the Wayne business community are welcomed in style as Gary Van Meter, Chamber executive vice president, announced a "Welcome to Wayne" Chamber coffee to be held Wednesday, Jan. 18.

Van Meter said the coffee will be held at Country Crafts and Custom Cabinets, 416 N. Main, beginning at 10 a.m. The new business held an open house in December and is operated by Chuck and Lynn Jensen.

The coffee will also serve to welcome Chuck Barnes, new editor of the Wayne Herald.

Van Meter urged all Chamber members to attend the coffee as this is a new effort by the Wayne Chamber of Commerce to make newly arrived business and professional persons in the Wayne community feel "at home" in Wayne.

When snow chocks up area highways and roads, the Nebraska Department of Roads joins with mail carriers in making their appointed rounds "no matter what the weather conditions are. The state road department has worked out an effective snow removal policy which is based on a road's traffic volume and provides a continuous flow of information on highway conditions to the public plus procedures for helping those who are stranded or have to abandon their vehicles. Highways carrying 3,000 or more vehicles per day have the highest priority for snow removal. The department attempts to clean these highways to the bare pavement as quickly as storm conditions permit. These bare pavement efforts include plowing, sanding and salting. It is a 24-hour operation with split crews working 12 hours a stretch. Next in line are roads that carry 800 to 3,000 vehicles a day. The department plows these down to bare wheel tracks in each lane. Sand is used at intersections and on bridge decks to give travelers better traction for stopping and starting.

The department keeps the public informed of highway conditions through the various media. Progress reports are updated when conditions change. Reports are called in by field personnel to the districts. The districts consolidate these reports and pass them on to the public communication outlets. Vehicles stalled on the traveled roadway present a problem in snow removal work. If the vehicle is unoccupied, the road crews tow it to the shoulder. They take precaution not to damage the car or truck. If the vehicle is occupied the crews check on the physical well-being of the occupants and will take them to the nearest shelter if the situation calls for it.

The emergency service is free. However, the department is not in the towing or car repair business and will not interrupt its snow removal operations to tow a car any distance or try to repair it. The crews will assist by summoning aid by radio. If a car has to be towed for any distance or pulled out of a ditch, crews will ask the driver to make the hook up.

Department officials said motorists can help make snow removal faster and more effective if they heed road conditions reports. The district reports include location and kind of equipment that is working. This information alerts motorists to be on the lookout for snow removal equipment on the highways.

Department officials said motorists are sometimes skeptical when the department discourages traveling even when roads in the immediate area are passable. But the district has a total picture of conditions and can give accurate reports on whether it is safe to drive.

When storms are too bad, the department will pull its equipment out of operation. Poor visibility is a tough problem for snowplow operators. There is always a risk of personal injury if their equipment goes off of the roadway as well as damage to the equipment. There is always a possibility of hitting a stranded vehicle. They wait for the weather to clear as periods of zero visibility are usually short.

The department urges motorists to postpone non-essential travel during storms. However, bonafide emergencies are another matter. When they occur, the department, along with other state and local agencies, will do everything possible to help.

Cities and counties are responsible for streets and roads off of the state system.

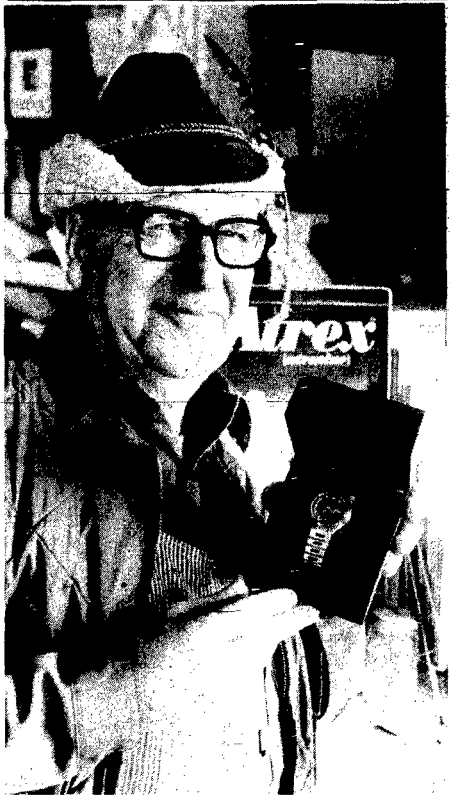

### 'Black Elk' Play Jan. 18

The ancestors of Nebraska's native Americans will speak again next week at Wayne State college (WSC). Their voices will be heard through the play "Black Elk Speaks," based on a book by Nebraska Poet Laureate and WSC graduate John G. Neihardt.

"Black Elk Speaks," will be performed by the Folger Theatre group at 8 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 18 in Rice Auditorium. The play traces native American history, as interpreted by Neihardt, through the eyes of Olga Sioux Holy Man, Black Elk.

The play, sponsored by the Nebraska Committee for the Humanities and the WSC Center for the Humanities, focuses on a 400-year period following the arrival of Europeans in Ameri-

ca. In addition to the play, WSC will host a series of events focusing on Native American history, including a panel discussion on the play, featuring George Barta, director of the Sioux City Indian Center; a series of discussions on native American history, featuring the cast of the Folger Theatre Group performing "Black Elk Speaks"; and the airing of a series of broadcast tapes on John Neihardt by the KWSC broadcasting studios.

George Barta of the Sioux City Indian Center will participate in a panel discussion on native American history at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 17, in the KWSC broadcast studios in the Val Peterson Fine Arts center. Other panelists will include

Sayre Andersen, Dr. Donald Schultz, James Brummels and Arthur Dirks, all of Wayne State college.

The Folger Theatre group cast will participate in classroom presentations at WSC the day of the play. The performers will be available to the public and other classes through arrangements with Dr. Donald Schultz, chairman of the Center for the Development of Humanities.

Completing the schedule of native American History programs will be the airing of a Neihardt film festival through the KWSC broadcasting studios. Films will be aired between 6:30-8 p.m., Monday, Wednesday and Friday, Jan. 16-20 and between 6-8 p.m., Tuesday and Thursday, Jan. 17 and 19.

Merlin Beiermann was elected chairman of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners in a meeting held last Tuesday in the commissioners' room in the Wayne county courthouse.

Norris Weible, county clerk, was named clerk of the county board.

Commissioner Kenneth Eddie was selected to serve as chairman of the welfare board.

The resolution also calls for the county clerk to be authorized to call a physician in the event of an emergency.

The Wayne Herald was redesignated the official newspaper for the publication of legal notices emanating from the various departments of government of the State of Nebraska and for the publishing of proceedings required to be published by the county board or other officers.

The inventories of the county officials were examined and approved and fee reports from the county clerk, county sheriff, CDC, and county treasurer, also gained the approval of the commissioners.

County Sheriff Donald Weible was named chairman of the board of health of Wayne county and Dr. Robert Bentback as county physician and Fred Rickers, a member.

In other business, the commissioners agreed to enter into an agreement between the county and city regarding the hard surfacing of Grainland Road.

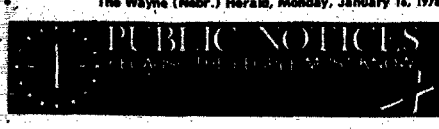
The county board also passed a motion that the wage scale for the highway department employees is to be directed by the entire board of county commissioners.
