Steel Work Goes Up

Heritage Building Taking Shape

Steel to frame the building for houses built by Heritage is nearly in place.

Workers for the Vakoc Construction company, Wayne, scurried around Friday to get as much work done as possible as a

major snow storm bore down on Wayneland Saturday.

Steve Guill, vice president and engineer for Heritage Homes Inc. of Nebraska builders of modular homes, had his fingers crossed

storm. "We hope to have the building enclosed within three weeks but a major storm could make it a little longer."

The 45,000 square foot Strand metal structure is being constructed by Vakoc construction,

sub-contractor for Rod Tompkins construction of South Sioux City. Tompkins is president of Heritage Inc.

Wayne Development corporation is financing the building. They will lease it to Heritage

Inc. according to an agreement announced at a ground-breaking ceremony in November, 1977.

When completed, the building will house production equipment to turn out one complete modular home every five days.

Target date for beginning production is the first part of April. Guill said there will be from 80 to 100 employees during the early stages of production. He projected that number to 200 within a three year period.

The engineer said Heritage will offer several different floor plans, mostly three bedroom single family homes. The homes are pre-sold before going into production.

Floor plans available include ranch style, raised ranch style with drive-in garage, split level and split entry. Certain modifications are available with each floor plan which allows the customer a chance to do some customizing without excessive cost. Guill said Heritage will build custom homes to specifications by the customer. He explained they will be able to produce a custom home in the same time as the floor-planned modular homes.

Heritage will deliver the homes to a site, usually in two units. A full basement or a foundation with crawl space can be utilized with the modulars. Guill said it will take Heritage workers about three days to set the modular on a foundation. All that is left for the homeowner is to hook up the water, sewer and electricity.

Guill said the modulars are completed before they leave the plant. This not only includes the painting of the dry walls and laying the carpeting.

"We offer several colors in paint, and several patterns in carpeting," Guill explained. He said Heritage controls the construction and the finishing of the modulars. "We do everything but wash the windows."

Guill explained the construction of the modulars is much the same as "stick" or conventional construction. He said the modulars will be competitive in the market.

The engineer said Heritage will deliver homes in a 150 mile radius of Wayne, including parts of South Dakota and Iowa.

Guill said Heritage is anxious to get into production and they look forward to being a part of the Wayne industrial community.

Dixon County Cases Solved

At least ten cases in Dixon county involving burglary and larceny have been solved, according to Sheriff Dean Chase.

Sheriff Chase said his department has been working with other law enforcement agencies on the cases. He expressed the possibility that more cases being solved in the near future.

Sheriff Chase said two individuals have been apprehended for their involvement in thefts. He said it is possible others may be charged in the future. The sheriff said incidents are still under investigation and it may take several days before they are finalized.

The Dixon county-sheriff explained that many stolen items have been recovered and leads to the location of several other items are being investigated.

He said individuals whose property has been recovered will be notified.

Dick Armstrong, business chairman of this year's Wayne City Heart Fund campaign, said "Not only are thousands of lives lost each year to diseases of the heart and blood vessel system, but cardiovascular diseases put

WSC Public Radio Site

Wayne State College is one of five public radio production studios that are a part of a public radio network being proposed in LB 601.

The proposal was introduced by Senators Steve Fowler and Shirley Marsh of Lincoln and Dave Newell of Omaha.

It provides that the Nebraska Public Radio network, consisting of nine transmitters and five production studios, be operated using frequencies by the Nebraska Public Radio commission.

The first phase of LB 601, according to Dr. Phil Heckman of Doane College, Crete, would serve 728,000 people in the Lincoln area and would cost 10 cents for each resident or 20 cents for each citizen in the listening area.

The proposed Nebraska Public Radio act (LB 601) would create the network which would broadcast 18 hours each day, 365 days a year with the schedule containing quality programming.

The other production studios are to be operated by Kearney State College, Chadron State College, Peru State College and the Nebraska Public Radio network.

Joy Gaylene Kler is among those students who have carried a program of 14 or more semester hours, who have no lower than "C" in any subject.

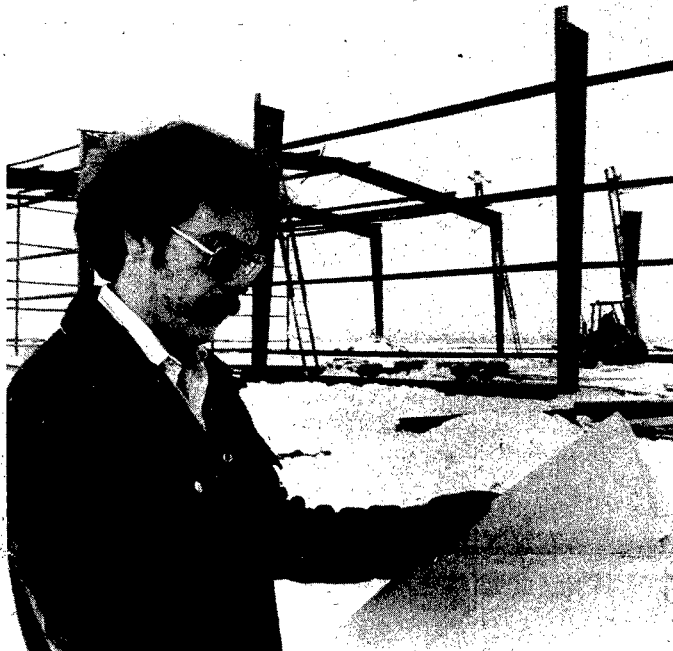
Named Head Of Committee

State Clears Air About Pollutors

State environmental officials have come to the aid of pollution violators listed by the Environmental agency (EPA) recently.

Jay Ringenberg, Nebraska Department of Environmental Control (DEC) water, permit and enforcement head, said the list of 36 firms and municipalities violating pollution-control limits didn't take into account several important aspects of the situation.

For example, the City of Wayne, which is 1 of 26 municipalities listed, received a DEC administrative order allowing it to continue in violation of the

July 1, 1977 deadline based on good faith efforts to comply. Case-by-case extensions are allowed by the Clean Water act of 1977, he said.

The greater percentage of the industrial firms listed by the EPA as violating water pollution standards are on the list because of EPA's failure to adopt pollution-control limits, he added.

He said EPA is supposed to promulgate regulations for the firms to follow to replace the 1972 limits which it declared inoperative. He explained that the firms can't be in compliance until they know what the limits are.

Ringenberg said the DEC recommended to the EPA that the municipalities and most of the firms not be place on the list.

He added that EPA's reference to the firms and municipalities as "major polluters" was misleading. He said EPA's definition is based upon the amount of pollution entering a stream. The state treats all systems equally, he added, regardless of size.

Home ownership and taxes

Whatever the problems of home ownership—climbing property taxes, inflated fuel bills, unavailability of reliable services—concern about them tends to fade away as April 15 approaches.

For, as the Nebraska Society of Certified Public Accountants points out, that little home with the big mortgage is the richest lode of tax deductions the average family can expect to mine, even though choice veins such as the office-in-the-home deduction have been virtually eliminated.

For many years it has been national policy to encourage family home ownership through tax benefits, and that is still pretty much the case today. Even the Carter administration's proposal for taxing capital gains as ordinary income would exclude gains on the sale of a personal residence.

The two biggest tax deductions a home brings, say the CPAs, are property taxes levied by state and local governments, and interest on the mortgage, including the "points" paid to persuade the lender to grant the mortgage.

The expected (recently-passed) tax credit for addition of home insulation and other energy-conservation measures will be (is) another tax break for home-

owners not enjoyed by those who rent. But the tax deduction for an office at home has been just about wiped out for employees who have offices or other work space elsewhere. To claim an office-in-the-home deduction now an employee must be able to prove that the home space is used regularly and exclusively for the employer's benefit as a principal place of business or to meet with clients.

People who conduct their own businesses out of their homes still can deduct a pro-rated portion of their household maintenance and repair costs, of course, but under the new policy they will do well to isolate work spaces from living quarters, leaving no doubt that except for storage areas the business-related space is used regularly and exclusively for business.

Other deductions that have been tightened are those on vacation homes rented out when not being used by the owner and his family. You can still deduct interest and taxes but other deductions such as upkeep, fuel, electricity and depreciation cannot be taken unless the place is not used for personal purposes more than the greater of 14 days or 10 percent of the number of days it is rented out during the year.

If you rented out the place for less than 15 days during the year, disregard the above. Do not declare the income and do not take the deductions, other than interest and taxes. Uncle Sam wants you to treat such an arrangement as a "wash."

And even if your use of a vacation

home falls within the permissible limits, your deductions on a so-called hobby business, except for interest and taxes and otherwise allowable deductions, cannot exceed income.

If you sold your home in 1977 at a profit and do not expect to reinvest at least the full amount received in a new house within two years, you may have to pay a capital gain tax. File a schedule D and Form 219 along with your tax return.

Should you still be undecided as to whether you are going to buy or rent your next home, you can defer payment of the tax for up to 18 months, but unless you are quite sure you're going to buy, the CPAs advise that you pay the tax immediately and avoid interest charges and perhaps a penalty. Save a copy of Form 219; incidentally, whenever you do finally sell without reinvesting it will be useful in establishing your cost basis.

All receipts and canceled checks having to do with the purchase and maintenance of a home should be retained indefinitely. They can be useful in computing your yearly tax bill, can help establish a cost basis that will minimize any capital gain tax you may ultimately have to pay, can be used in event of casualty loss insurance or tax claims, and conceivably can be used to win a reduction of real estate tax assessments. Now that you are getting your financial records together for 1977 tax return preparation, organize those papers and store any with possible long-term usefulness in a safe place. And that safe storage place, the CPA society suggest, should be away from the home.

OBSERVATIONS

Heating the outside

There is evidence... both factual and vocal... that January '78 ranks with those tagged through the years as being the coldest yet. And February isn't doing too bad in the frigid weather department to date.

One of the indicators is the amount of fuel consumed to keep our homes and places of business "apple pie warm." We don't have the exact figures but we have been told the fuel consumption during January, last was a whole bunch.

Perhaps we have been unwitting accomplices with the weather in making our fuel consumption more than it should be. Maybe we are warming the outside through insufficient insulation. If we are, we should stop it.

There is one way heat loss can be detected. A Thermal Scanning survey is being conducted in several area communities. The surveys point up the roof-top heat loss through an infrared sensing technique.

An area gas supplier is making a concerted effort to find heat losses in those communities which it serves. The program has a two-fold purpose. It helps to conserve energy through proper roof insulation and it will cut down on the heat bills if a property owner follows up the results of the scan.

Texas Instruments corporation has been a pioneer in the thermal scan. It has been active in Nebraska, South Dakota and Iowa. In Nebraska and South Dakota

alone, nearly 50,000 property owners have used the scan to correct a major heat loss.

The procedure in reality is simple and is accurate up to a degree. The scan takes place during the night, usually after 10 p.m. when most businesses are closed and people are home with the heat demand at its peak. The temperature has to be near the 30 degree mark. An appliance equipped with infrared sensing equipment flies at 1,600 feet, covering several blocks as it makes a pass the length of the town. Through an electronic process the roof temperatures will be translated to photographic sheets of paper showing the outlines of the buildings in shades of gray.

Well insulated roofs will show up on the readout prints as dark areas while those which are poorly insulated will show up as light or gray areas. The thermograms are then evaluated and shown to the property owners.

Through information gathered by the scan, property owners will be able to determine if they have adequate roof insulation.

We feel this could be an asset to Wayne property owners. From all indications, the energy crunch isn't going to let up, and cost of heating and cooling could skyrocket. Fuel costs could very likely be tempered with proper roof insulation and one prudent means to finding out what is proper roof insulation is through a thermal scan. — Chuck Barnes.

Wildcats Upend Ft. Hays in 109-104 Conference Thriller

Wayne State held off a series of Fort Hays rallies to post a 109-104 Central States Conference win over the Tigers at Hays Friday night. The win moved the Wildcats to 12-11 on the season and 4-5 in loop play.

The Wildcats led all the way throughout the first half with the exception of a two-minute streak when the Tigers gained the advantage. A pair of free throws by Bob Reeson and a basket by Mark Olsen provided Wayne with a 40-35 lead with five minutes left in the half and

Wayne went on to a 49-43 half-time lead. Olsen scored a season high 32 points for the Cats, including 12-13 free throws as Wayne won their first conference game on the road this season.

Fort Hays quickly caught the Wildcats in the second half as Tom Reeva's hitting a basket with 15 minutes to play to give the Tigers a 57-55 edge. A pair of free throws by Mike Pauls pushed the Tiger lead to six points, their biggest of the night before the Wildcats staged their

The two clubs then battled neck and neck for about seven minutes before Olsen went on a five-point spurge to give Wayne its final lead, 88-86 with 4:30 to play.

Then Jay Bellar hit two quick buckets and Meyer added four

College Offering Training Session on Knee Injuries

A training session for coaches and student trainers dealing with knee injuries will be held at Wayne State College, 1:30 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 18, in the main gym of Rice Auditorium.

WS head athletic trainer Regg Swanson will conduct demonstrations on taping techniques, rehabilitation, treatment variations and knee injury evaluation.

"I think a lot of times the coaches are put in the situation of doing a taping before a game," Swanson said. "If they can pick up a few points from us it could be helpful for them and their players."

Swanson said a graduate level training course will be developed for the summer 1978 semester, depending on interest shown in this and other training sessions offered at WSC.

"Hopefully, with a couple of these sessions coaches will be interested in taking the graduate class next summer," Swanson said.

The Saturday training session is open free to the public. Coaches and student trainers attending the session will be admitted free to the Wayne State-Pittsburg State basketball games, beginning at 5:30 p.m.

 history and the many physical and spiritual aspects of the Hindu art. He said most students take the no-credit classes out of curiosity and many drop out. He said the dedicated yoga students become healthier both physically and mentally through the practice.

"It's an attuning of the nervous system," Johnson said. "It improves concentration which improves memory. It's conducive to better physical health and well-being."

Johnson said a guru is needed to teach yoga students aspects of yoga that are spiritual and not easily understood. He said many misunderstand yoga, thinking it is merely sitting in different postures.

"You must have someone to guide you," he said. "There are spiritual aspects not expressed that must be explained to yoga students."

Dr. Bob is also head guru for the "Militarepa Rangers," a group of yoga enthusiasts and gurus that meet each year at the "Spring and Summer Nettle Soup festival." The group gath-

ers on an island in the Missouri River, near Ponca. Dr. Bob said yogis from throughout the Midwest attend the festival.

"Militarepa is taken from the guru, Militarepa, who lived in a cave in the Himalayas and lived on nothing but nettle soup," Johnson said. "He could walk on water. This is all documented in Tibetan literature."

Dr. Bob hosts the festival at his Ponca cabin or "ashran," which means hermitage. Johnson regularly to meditate in the serene surroundings.

Dr. Bob practices yoga. He is up at 4 a.m. each day, sleeping only five hours each night. He said he needs very little sleep because the yoga relaxes him, providing rest.

"It also prevents aging," he said. "It's kind of like tuning an automobile; you clean out the rust or dirt from the carburetor and it runs well. Yoga keeps your physical system going for a longer period of time."
