First Hearing on Proposed Land Controls

Wayne County residents Tuesday will have an opportunity to voice their views concerning proposed county land use controls.

A public hearing on the proposed zoning and sub-division regulations will be held at 8 p.m. in the courtroom of the Wayne County Courthouse.

The Wayne County Joint Planning and Zoning Commission, whose members have spent more than two and one-half years drafting the proposed regulations, will be on hand to explain the zoning plan and to answer questions.

Residents may inspect the regulations at County Clerk's office, the Farmers State Bank, Carroll, Voss Implement, Hoskins and Winside State Bank, Winside.

The regulations have evolved from comprehensive surveys of existing land use and conditions. The surveys included data on physiographic features of the land, land use, building conditions, environmental conditions, aesthetic features of land and buildings, historical sites and buildings, and public preference for land use, i.e. recent construction trends.

Along with the surveys, the Commission

took into consideration existing transportation systems and major community facilities to analyze and determine their effect on establishing the existing patterns of land use.

Using this and other data, the Commission has completed a future land use plan which will be recommended to Wayne County Board of Commissioners. The land use plan coordinates future transportation and community facilities plans.

The plan reflects effective and equitable land use controls (zoning) based on public desires.

After acceptance of the land use plan, the Wayne County Board of Commissioners will adopt a resolution designed to preserve, protect and promote the public health, safety, peace, comfort, convenience, prosperity and general welfare.

The area of jurisdiction is all land in the county except the incorporated municipalities (Wayne, Winside, Carroll, Hoskins) and the area of jurisdiction around the municipalities (one mile for Winside, Carroll and Hoskins, two miles around Wayne).

The resolution will also create four types of districts in the county: General Agri-

cultural District (AGG), Exclusive Agricultural District (AGX), Flood Plain District (SFP) and Airport Hazard District (SAH).

The intent of the AGG District is primarily for application to rural areas of the county which are generally characterized by extensive or intensive agricultural uses of land.

The AGX District is intended primarily for application to those rural areas of the county where it is necessary and desirable to reserve for exclusive agricultural use appropriately located areas suitable for the See HEARING, page 8

Says Schools Short-Changed

State Sen. Donald N. Dworak, Columbus, has pointed his finger at the Legislature's Education Committee which he claims is holding back distribution of some \$55 million in state aid.

According to Dworak's figures, three area schools are being short-changed because the committee will not advance two bills which would release the money.

The schools include Wayne-Carroll which received \$46,988.48 in state aid for the 1977-78 school year, representing a loss of some \$34,444.32 compared with the 1976-77 payment.

Winside also dropped some \$10,644.30 in aid money with Wakefield shouldering \$27,520 less money. Allen came up on the plus side with \$3,158.53 more state aid for this school year than it received during the 1976-77 school year.

Cold Storage Sold

Errol Mann, Oakland Raider field goal kicker, and three associates from North Dakota have purchased Wayne Cold Storage.

The announcement of the sale was made this week. However, the new owners have been operating the beer and soft drink distributorship since Jan. 1 this year.

Joining Mann, who is from

Battle Creek, Minn., are Donald (Tom) Hartness, Gwinner, N.D.; Dennis Schmiess and Curt Knutson, both of Oakes, N.D.

The business was purchased from Tom and Linda Preger who took over the operation in 1967 and moved it to its present location east of Wayne in 1971.

Hartness said Rod Huttman, who has been associated with Wayne Cold Storage for three

years, has been named manager of the operation.

The spokesperson for the new owners said basically the operation of the business will remain the same. Home base will remain in Wayne with a smaller warehouse remaining in O'Neill.

The operation covers 15 counties in distributing Pabst Blue Ribbon beer, Schmidt beer and Heineken beer and an orange soft drink. The distributorship encompasses routes ranging 100 miles north and south and 200 miles east and west.

There are ten full-time employees in the business and three part-time employees. The full-time employees besides Huttman are Jim Pokett, John Rebensdorf, Rich Wurdinger, Gary Rahn, Don Schulz, Dean Pearson, Rich Jones, Ted Rebensdorf and Ted Fritton (O'Neill).

The part-time employees are Diane Wurdinger, Diane Fritton (O'Neill) and Herb Swan.

Hartness said the delay in announcing the sale was because of licensing and other paperwork. He said he and his associates are looking forward to meeting the people served by Wayne Cold Storage.

Warrants Attention

While we believe every public hearing concerning the Wayne County area should be of interest to county residents, we especially urge area residents to attend a county zoning public hearing to be held Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the courtroom of the county courthouse.

This is the initial meeting on proposed county land use controls. Comments made at this meeting will be used in the final draft of the regulations which will be recommended by the Wayne County Joint Planning Commission to the Wayne County Board of Commissioners for adoption.

There will be other public hearings but this first one which gives the planning commissioner a "feel of the people" concerning the proposed zoning. We feel this first impression will be a lasting one and persons who wish to make comments regarding the planned zoning regulations should make every effort to attend the meeting.

The Herald this week carries a front page in-depth story about the preliminary planning. While the story is detailed, it represents only the tip of the zoning "iceberg." The total picture can better be brought into focus at the meeting Tuesday night when the regulations are reviewed.

The preliminary comprehensive zoning plan represents two and one-half years of work on the part of the Planning and Zoning Commission. The period of dedicated work by itself indicates to us the importance for responsive public interest.

We are just beginning to discover that all things will not be for all time. The primary example the present time is the dwindling energy sources. We have

passed the last frontier in land use and controls are needed out that in every time and place, land has played a significant role in the life of man. Land is the basis of our wealth of agricultural production, the sources of our supplies of minerals, timber and water and provides the base upon which we erect homes, buildings, roads, bridges, streets, railroads and airports.

Land provides space for yards, recreation, for farm and ranches. Land may be altered or transformed by leveling or filling; or it may be submerged by the building of reservoirs and ponds. All of this is common knowledge. Perhaps not so common is the fact that land is scarce. People should be concerned as to its use. We are of the opinion the fewer regulations, the better. But land use should be regulated to the extent there is some insurance it will be productive for generations to come.

Aside from this deep and binding moral obligation, rural land use controls should also attract interest because (1) they would serve as a preventative of conflict between property owners (and the prevention of economic loss) which occurs as a result of incompatible uses on adjacent tracts of land and (2) the protection of society's interest in preserving and promoting health, safety and general welfare of its citizens.

It is not difficult to establish that everyone has a stake in rural land zoning. One means of protecting this stake is to become involved in the regulation of type and intensity of land use. Make the effort. Attend the meeting. — Chuck Barnes.

The Rev. S.K. deFreese, pastor of the Redeemer Lutheran Church in Wayne, presented the program, entitled "Challenges of Widowhood."

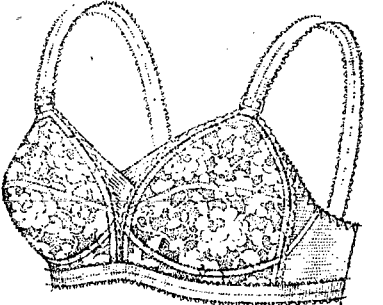

50 From County Learn About Estate Planning

Estate planning alternatives and decisions were presented to about 50 Wayne County men and women during a meeting late last month in Hoskins.

Dr. Phil Henderson, University of Nebraska Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, Lincoln, conducted the day's program.

Henderson encouraged all adults especially young couples, to plan their estates carefully. The first step, he said, is to determine financial objectives to assure that the highest possible percentage of life earnings will be inherited by heirs accord-

ing to the wishes of the decedent.

"Very rarely can you avoid all federal estate tax, but with estate planning you can surely make a dent in it," said the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources specialist.

"Further steps in planning," he added, "include inventorying your financial assets, obtaining professional help in preparing a legal will, and then keeping your will up-dated."

Among other topics discussed by Dr. Henderson were tax deductible gifts, marital deductions, partnerships, corporations and trusts. He also presented

various ways to hold title to property and to own life insurance policies.

Anna Marie Kreifelts, area home extension agent at the Northeast Station, near Concord, introduced Dr. Henderson and opened the program.

The meeting was sponsored by the Wayne County Cooperative Extension Service and the Wayne County Home Extension Clubs as a part of their "Citizenship in Action" program thrust for 1978.

A similar estate planning meeting will be held on March 13, from 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at the Northeast Station. Dr. Henderson will again be the featured speaker.

All interested persons are welcome to attend the meeting, said Miss Kreifelts. Persons attending are asked to bring a sack lunch.

Nelson Stops Allen Quint at State; Eagles' Hopes Still High for 1979

Despite Allen High's 53-43 loss in the first round of the state Class D tournament, coach Steve McManigal already is planning for next year's squad.

And for good reason. Returning to the Eagles camp will be the starting five on this year's squad which the coach and several sports writers from Lincoln and Omaha daily papers rate as one of the best teams in the tournament in Lincoln.

For now, the coach said after four tiring periods of basketball, "We're not looking ahead because we're proud of this year."

Allen girls, and their tremendous fan support despite poor driving conditions from Allen to the capital city, showed the rest of the state teams that basketball in Northeast Nebraska is very competitive.

Although the Eagles had their share of problems in the first half, they regrouped under the guidance of McManigal and his assistant Gary Troth to overcome a seven-point halftime deficit and take the lead in the third quarter.

Junior Susie Erwin, who led the Eagles with 16 points, and sophomore Stacey Keester connected on back-to-back baskets in the third period to pull their club within one point, 30-29, with 4:45 remaining. Erwin then took charge to put her team in front for the first time on an arching shot from the top of the key for a 31-30 Eagle lead.

The advantage was the only one McManigal and his crew held during the Class D contest at Lincoln High's Johnson Gym. Nelson, with its 6-3 Tommy Allard and 6-0 Mary Schulte, rallied their club using their height advantage for the inside shots to go back in front 38-25 going into the fourth period.

The Eagles trailed by six points halfway through the fourth until Erwin sank a pair of baskets to put new life in her team and into the boisterous Allen fans.

Trailing 44-42 Allen continued to use its full court press hoping that Nelson wouldn't be able to handle it. The Tigers midway in the game had trouble getting past center court, but shaking off those problems with nifty ball handling and lob passes to get by Allen and set up their offense.

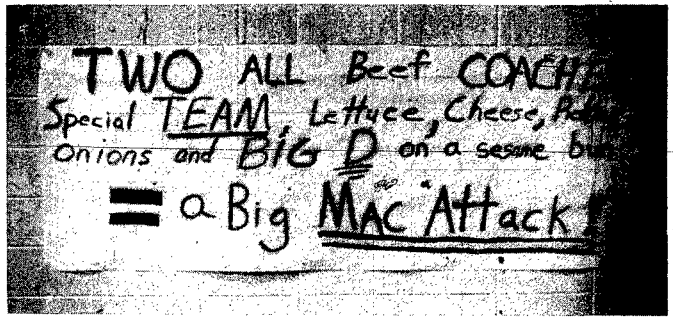

raising of crops or livestock because of high quality soils, scenic characteristics, existing or potential irrigation or exclusive agricultural character of the area.

The SFP District is intended for application in those areas which have been defined by the Nebraska Natural Resources Commission as being Commission Floodways or which by reason of historical documentation and other data have been defined by the Joint Planning Commission as being flood hazard areas.

The regulations are intended to minimize the extend of floods, the hazard of loss of lives and property caused by floods, to secure safety from floods.

The SAH District is intended for those areas which are within the Airport Hazard area as defined by the Nebraska Department of Aeronautics.

One of the major concerns of the county zoning has been the minimum lot requirements in the two agriculture use districts.

The minimum lot requirement in the AGG District is ten acres for single family dwellings except that residences existing at the time of adoption of the regulations shall be exempt from the minimum requirements.

The AGX District calls for a minimum lot requirement for residences of 25 acres except that farm residences existing at the time of adoption of the regulations shall be exempt from the minimum requirements. Also, the minimum lot area for uses prescribed as exceptions shall be 25 acres subject to approval of the Board.

Minimum distance requirements for the location of 1st, 2nd and 3rd class feedlots from residences and dwellings are also set out in the regulations. A 1st class feedlot shall not be located no closer than one mile, a 2nd class feedlot no closer than three-quarters of a mile and a 3rd class feedlot one-half mile.

The proposed plan also outlines provisions for subdivision within the districts. The purpose of the Subdivision Regulation Resolution is to insure that new development resulting in land subdivision in the County shall conform to minimum development practices and standards.

It is intended, according to the proposed resolution, that such subdivision shall result in properly coordinated design and construction of lots, blocks, streets, utilities, public facilities and other community assets.

A County Board of Zoning Adjustment would be created by Resolution and the five members would be appointed by the County Board. They would serve three year terms.

The County Board Zoning Adjustment would have the power to hear and decide appeals where it is alleged there is error in any order, requirement, decision or determination regarding zoning regulations or any regulation relating to the location or soundness of structures or to interpret map.

The County Board will also designate a Zoning Administrator who will administer and enforce the zoning Resolution.

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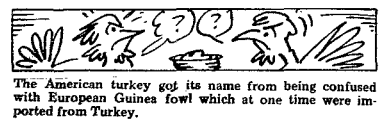

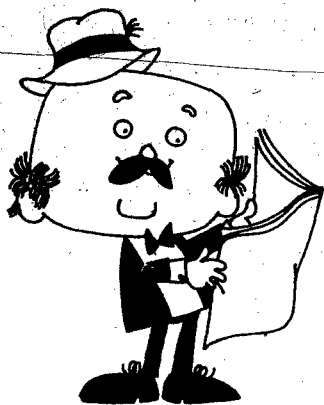
