

Three Event-Filled Days Spice Red Meat Promotion

Three event-filled days are slated for a red hot city-wide red meat promotion March 30, 31 and April 1.

Wayne merchants are combining low prices with certificates for red meat during the three-day promotion. Each store has its own promotion and shoppers are asked to check the advertisements in today's (Monday) Wayne Herald and Thursday's Wayne Herald.

Certificates are being made available to participating merchants by the Wayne Chamber. The certificates can be redeemed at any of the four Wayne retail meat outlets.

Wayne shoppers also will have an opportunity to take part in special events planned throughout the three days. The events include a Livestock Weight-Guessing contest, a best Red Meat Recipe contest and Microwave Oven demonstrations.

There is even something special for the kids. A free movie for the kids will be shown at the Gay Theatre starting at 2 p.m. on April 1. The movie is a musical adaptation of Mark Twain's "Huckleberry Finn."

The movie is being sponsored by Columbus Federal Savings and Loan, the First National Agency, the First National Bank, KTCH Radio, Midwest Land company, the Morning Shopper, Northwestern Bell, Ken Swartz, Ken Olds and Bob Enz; Property Exchange, the State National Bank, the State National Farm Management, Triangle Finance, Wayne County Abstract and The Wayne Herald.

The Weight-Guessing contest will be conducted throughout the three days. Animals provided by the Northeast Nebraska Livestock Feeders Association will be displayed somewhere in the downtown business district for shoppers to guess their weights.

The display time for the contest will be from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each day. The weight-in time will be 4:45 p.m. on Saturday, April 1.

The animals to be displayed and the prizes to be awarded are: Thursday, Sheep, \$25 red meat certificate; Friday, pig, \$50 red meat certificate and Saturday, steer, \$75 red meat certificate.

In the event of a tie, the winner will be drawn by chance. Guesses are limited to those 16 years of age or older. The guesses may be made at the display site of each animal.

Northeast Nebraska Livestock Feeders Auxiliary Friday, March 31, will host a red meat sample give-away in each of the four grocery stores. They will hand out samples of red meat and informative literature on mutton, pork and beef.

The Red Meat Recipe contest will include lamb, pork and beef. The contest is open to everyone. They can submit their entries to any Chamber member store. The entries must be submitted before Thursday, March 30.

A \$25 red meat certificate will be awarded to first place winners in each of the three divisions. The winners will be announced at the microwave oven demonstrations on Saturday, April 1. The judges are Providence Medical Center dietician and kitchen staff.

THE SPRING THAW, which has attracted national interest because of the flooding in East-Central areas of Nebraska, also caused extensive damage to a road on the municipal airport. The water caused by the mild spring weather has

chewed out a portion of the bank, undercutting the roadway. The road presently is being used to get to the Solid Waste Dump site. The site will be closed when the new transfer station is completed.

Airport Authority Seeks To Up-Grade City Airport

The Wayne Airport Authority is proposing major improvements to the Wayne Municipal airport.

Preliminary planning calls for construction of a new North-South all weather runway 75 feet by 4,200 feet.

Other improvements outlined

in an environmental assessment of the proposed improvements include a 600 foot extension of the Northeast-Southwest runway, extending lighting system and acquisition of land for runway and clear zones, construction of a connecting taxiway and apron and installation

of a segmented circle and wind cone.

The assessment report is on file at the Wayne City Hall and the Wayne Public Library for public viewing.

The purpose of the improvements, according to the reports, is to up-grade the classification

of the Wayne airport to handle larger aircraft and to provide better service. The Airport Authority states in the report: "It is the studied opinion of the Airport Authority the proposed improvements will greatly benefit the community and the flying public."

The airport now has two landing areas, a 50 foot by 2,800 foot Northeast-Southwest runway and a 250 foot by 2,150 foot Northwest by Southeast landing strip.

The airport is presently classified as a Sub-Basic Utility Airport. The improvements would upgrade it to a Basic Utility 1 airport which could handle General Utility aircraft.

A Basic Utility 1 airport must have at least one runway which is at least 3,000 feet in length.

There are 21 aircraft at the airport. There are 16 single engine aircraft, 3 twin motor aircraft and 2 helicopters.

The airport has handled 15,330 operations (takeoffs and landings) with itinerant aircraft (not based at the airport) accounting for 20 to 25 percent of the total operation.

High octane gas sold at the airport has been climbing since 1974 when it pumped 12,100 gallons. There were 14,600 gallons pumped in 1975 with nearly double (28,000) pumped during 1976. The Authority said the 1977 figure would reflect a higher gallonage than the previous year.

The proposed land acquisition would include only agricultural lands, according to the report. Some 115 acres along the North West side of the airport, 13 acres on the North side and 12 acres on the South side.

Included in the acquisition would be the railbed of the abandoned Chicago and North western railroad. It pointed out the solid waste site Northwest of the airport would be closed as soon as the new solid waste transfer station is completed.

The Authority said the improvements are consistent with the State Airport System Plan and the National Airport System Plan. The report states the proposed improvements would lessen noise and emission levels on the west side of the airport.

Thompson is a native of Iowa, coming to Nebraska in 1949 when he assumed the post of executive secretary-treasurer of the Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation.

Under his direction, the Nebraska Federation has made consistent progress in membership, finances and programs. The organizational and administrative structure of Farm Bureau in Nebraska is recognized for its stability and soundness.

Final Report

Look at Hot Lunch

A report by the Special Services Self-Evaluation Committee touched on areas already covered in other reports to the Wayne-Carroll School Board of Education.

The report also represented the final report by the various committees.

Laura Frederickson, media services director for District 17, presented the report at the March 13 meeting of the school board.

She pointed out that she realized many of the areas touched on by her committee had already been outlined in other reports.

The first recommendation is to serve lunches to high school students in the high school building.

The reasons for the recommendation are the present lunch period is too long for elementary students and the high school use of the multiple purpose room cancels out all activities for elementary students during the lunch period.

Some of the school board members challenged the recommendation but pointed out once again, the board will not make any official comment under review of all of the reports.

The committee also recommended enclosing the area designated for elementary office space in the elementary school.

The reasons for the recommendation are the building is used intensively at night and cannot be secured; equipment must be moved daily to avoid damage. Another is the area located near the main entrance to the building is cold and drafty.

The committee suggested putting a walk-in freezer outside of the building. The new facility could result in savings in food costs by larger purchases and result in a greater variety in the menu.

The committee also suggested improving the kitchen area which, in turn, would improve the lunch program.

Reasons for the recommendations are lack of kitchen space, lack of room for freezers, office and storage space as well as providing area for loading and unloading foods and commodities.

The final recommendation by the special services committee is to build a bus barn facility. The committee stated the facility would keep buses protected from the weather and would eliminate vandalism.

Work for willing hands

Scientific achievement has stimulated steady growth in many areas of endeavor including that of the medical field in general and longevity in particular.

Growing old isn't a sin. It's "living to a ripe old age" that is causing problems. With this in mind the legislature last week passed a retirement bill by lopsided margins extending the mandatory retirement age five years... from 65 to 70.

We feel this is a step in the right direction but it is only a step. There are still many problem areas which sooner or later will "bite each" and every one of us because we are all growing "old" every day.

There isn't a simple formula that will take care of our elderly either now or in the future. But this is no excuse for not making a continuing search to provide for the needs of our "grand generation."

There are a great many older people who would like to work and be paid for it. What we need, we feel, is a major shift in career patterns. What our leaders must address themselves to is a fully accepted social custom of further careers for individuals past the mid-point of life. We know it's feasible because it is already occurring in specialized instances.

Police, firemen, military people and some others quite commonly take retirement in their early 50's (often in their 40's) and launch a second career. Others who now retire at age 65 become successfully self-employed, or engage in voluntary work which is in effect a further career. Most doctors and lawyers pay no attention to the age differential.

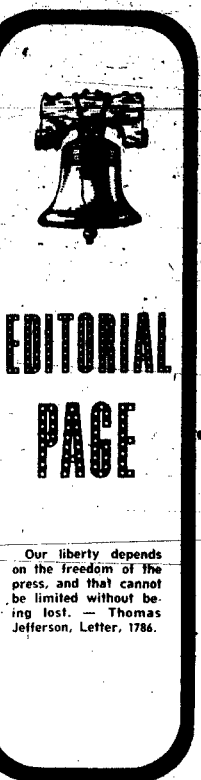
To accomplish such an end will mean making available a far greater number of full-time, part-time and flexible

schedule jobs for older people. We will need to become far more skilled in using volunteers for social and civic work, providing them with rewards of status and recognition.

Probably most important is that we need counseling arrangements in corporations, union and social agencies that will help those terminating one career to find their way to the next stage of the journey. That may involve providing information as to what kinds of work are available in what parts of the country. It may involve advice as to the kind of mid-life training needed to prepare for another kind of activity.

A "further career" need not involve a change of occupation or even institution. We here in the rural Wayne area are well aware of the importance of input by "old-timers" in the agricultural field. Many present generation family farm owners turn to those who have farmed the land before for counseling and decision making. We have long realized that not everyone wants to be put to pasture just because of chronological age. However, all of our old people in the area are not farmers. Many are business and professional people who want to cut down some but who are not ready to completely cut the tie that binds.

We are barely at the beginning of the huge task of providing work for willing hands. We acknowledge the need for such work in early and middle life. The need does not disappear in later life. We just choose to ignore it. — Chuck Barnes.

We stuff off the implication and compose a philosophical rhyme for the irreverent.

On innocent victim of Cupid, Remember this terse little verse: To let a fool kiss you is stupid, To let a kiss fool you is even worse.

"Saturday Night Fever" isn't catching.

At least one source reports two-by-two, they're going back to ballroom dancing. We welcome this news for two reasons: It renews our faith of the "now generation" and we never really got the hang of disco dancing.

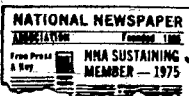

The Wayne and Dixon County Home Extension Councils are beginning plans for two diabetes screening clinics to be held on Saturday, April 8.

The Dixon County Clinic will be held at the Allen fire hall from 9:15 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. The Wayne County Clinic will be set up in the basement of St. Mary's School in Wayne from 2:30 to 7:30 p.m.

Home Extension Council health leaders Mrs. Larry Lubberstedt of Dixon and Mrs. Larry Nichols of Wayne are in charge of clinic arrangements. Other Home Extension Club members will be assisting.

Persons who would like more information should contact Anna Marie Kreifels, Area Extension Agent, Northeast Station, Concord, Nebr., 68728.

Testing at both clinics will be done by members of the American Medical Students Association, University of Nebraska Medical Center, Omaha.

Anna Marie Kreifels, area extension agent, said the clinics are held to screen for suspected and undetected diabetes. The test, which does not diagnose cases of diabetes, merely tests for high blood sugar level which could be a warning signal.

Persons with positive results are referred to a physician for further testing. Known diabetics are asked not to be tested at

Children's Books Reflect Different Lifestyles

Move over Dick, Jane, Puff and Spot. There's a new breed of children's books on the market today that are written to reflect different lifestyles and some realistic problems children may face.

According to Dr. Ron Daly, Extension family life specialist at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, there are many more children's books being written lately that include minority group members and deal with special issues like adoption, divorce, death, handicapped persons, single parents and bi-racial marriage.

Daly says such issues help children better understand other persons and situations, and can give them greater appreciation for themselves.

Children who are part of a "non-traditional" family or have already faced a family crisis like death or divorce may be able to identify with other families like their own and feel better about themselves through the use of such books, he adds.

Although many parents recognize the value of children's books for verbal and literary development, books can be used for many other purposes as well, notes the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources specialist. "One of the most important of these is helping children understand the world around them and some of its complexities.

Books also are valuable in helping the child establish a solid base for future social contacts," Daly points out, adding that children's understanding at an early age about social skills and different lifestyles can help or hinder them in their relationships with people later on.

Books may also help parents build a positive relationship with their children, notes the specialist. "Reading with or to a child can be a fun experience that helps build positive attitudes towards books and family members sharing those books," he says.

Parents who wish to expose their children to books on special problems and topics may have trouble finding such books in libraries or bookstores. Daly says librarians appreciate suggestions, so parents should feel free to make them.

Following are a list of subjects and books which Daly says parents may find useful to start with:

Father-Child Relationships — "The Summer Night" by Charlotte Zolotow.
Death — "Nana Upstairs and Nana Downstairs" by Tomie de Paola.
Adoption — "Abby" by Jeanette Caines.
Bi-Racial Marriage — "Black is Brown is Tan" by Arnold Adoff.
Divorce — "Where is Daddy? The Story of a Divorce" by Beth Goff.
Handicaps — "Howie Helps Himself" by Joan Foster.
Single Parents — "A Father Like That" by Charlotte Zolotow.

Some other authors who show minority group members as principal characters include Steptoe and Ezra Jack Keats.

Daly cautions parents to be selective in the kinds of books they choose for their children, regardless of topic. Good quality children's books include vocabulary that's suitable for the child's age and attractive illustrations that follow the text of the book.
