For the first time anywhere in the United States, training will be offered in Nebraska to youth 12 years of age and older in developing skills to detect harm-ful insects in corn fields.

Don C. Spitze, Wayne County
Extension Agent, said the training-session-in-May will enable
participants to become apprentice Field Scouts for insects that
damage corn. The Field Scout
concept enables farmers to find
out about harmful insects in
time to apply necessary controls.

The sessions will cover the description and life history of corn insects, signs of damage, potential losses, cultural prac-tices, national and cultural con-

tices, national and cultural con-riols, how to scout fields and ho interpret field counts of insects. Following the completion of the May 23 workshop at North-east Station. Concord, youth will practice by conducting weekly field surveys and completing scouting reports, which will be used by County Extension Agents to assess the current insect situation.

Those untring DOL officials in the Bagdag on the Potomac have decided the 1963 Farm Labor Contractor Registration Act encompasses corn detasselers. And this comis when President Carter has asked for a positive program of deregulations in simplified versions to eliminate misinterpretation and overreaction. If this determination is let stand, it is a

as migrant workers means that costly, time-consuming registration and book-keeping requirements by seed corn companies would certainly mean fewer detasseling jobs this summer.

This is 180 degrees away from the proclaimed objective by the Carter Administration to place greater numbers of young Americans in productive jobs; during the summer months.

Actually, it's -a matter of definition DOL officials interpret a migrant worker as an individual "whose primary employment is agriculture, or who performs agricultural labor. or as seasonal or other temporary basis." Most dictionaries describe migrant workers as laborers who move from place to place to harvest seasonal crops.

Seed companies have been ferreted out as being subject to the law and it appears the family farmer would also get into the hassel if he hires students to detassel corn in his, fields. Carrying it a step further, if the fermer has his hired hand hauf the kids from a nearby town to a field and back again, that farm emptoyee, too, must be fingerprinted and registered.






