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The Tax Man Cometh

Were the charitable donations made by Wayne County residents in the past year larger or smaller than those made by most other people in their income brackets?
Were their medical expenditures, local taxes and interest charges higher or lower?
Taxpayers who are busy assembling their income and expense figures for 1977, in preparation for their annual encounter with Uncle Sam, will be

interested to know how their deductible expenditures compare with the average.
Some guidance in this direction, for those who itemize their deductions, comes from the Commerce Clearing House, an authority on business and tax law, based upon data released by the Internal Revenue Service.
It has prepared a breakdown, detailing just how much the average taxpayer in each

income category has been listing for contributions, medical costs and the like.
In general throughout the country, it reports, families with earnings corresponding to the Wayne County average have been deducting a total of \$4,040, which is equivalent to about 25 percent of their adjusted gross income.
For those with incomes that are larger than the local average, the amounts deducted are

usually greater, but they represent a smaller percentage of their earnings. The converse is true for those with lower incomes.
The total deductions of Wayne County families with earnings of \$17,500, for example, will come to about \$3,960 if they conform to the average. Those with incomes of \$9,500 will be close to \$3,250 if they match the norm.
Of the \$4,040 in total deduc-

tions taken generally by families with incomes approximating the local average, \$460 is for contributions, \$1,630 for interest on loans and other obligations, \$1,440 for state and local taxes, and \$510 for medical and dental expenses.
These are purely guideline figures, it is noted, and are not automatically accepted by the Internal Revenue Service. Proper records must be available to support them.

Plan Field Scout Session

For the first time anywhere in the United States, training will be offered in Nebraska to youth 12 years of age and older in developing skills to detect harmful insects in corn fields.

Don C. Spitzke, Wayne County Extension Agent, said the training session in May will enable participants to become apprentice Field Scouts for insects that damage corn. The Field Scout concept enables farmers to find out about harmful insects in time to apply necessary controls.

The sessions will cover the description and life history of corn insects, signs of damage, potential losses, cultural practices, national and cultural controls, how to scout fields and to interpret field counts of insects.

Following the completion of the May 23 workshop at Northeast Station, Concord, youth will practice by conducting weekly field surveys and completing scouting reports, which will be used by County Extension Agents to assess the current insect situation.

Applications are due in the Extension Office by May 1st and the registration cost is \$3. Each workshop is limited to 25 youths.

In July, a second workshop will review information under field conditions. The youth apprentice scouts field reports will be checked for accuracy.

Farmers Take 'Wait'n See' Attitude

Wayne County farmers are taking a "wait and see" attitude concerning their farm planting operations.
Wayne County Extension Agent Don Spitzke said they are waiting to find out what the government has in mind in the way of a farm program.
Amendments to a comprehensive farm bill have kept it from the president's desk and area farmers don't know how much of what to plant.
Spitzke said area farmers

aren't in a hurry to get at the spring field work. "There are just a few who have started," he said.
Rain Showers are keeping the moisture at a high level. Spitzke said the moisture situation is very good and the coming crop year looks promising.
The field work is later this year than last but Spitzke pointed out last year was unpredictable as far as the weather was concerned. However, he said there is no great concern at this time about field work.
He said farmers should be giving some thoughts about their oats crops as it is the first crop in the group.

New Plan

USDA announced that corn and grain sorghum under price support loans can enter into the three year grain reserve program on May 1st.

Alden Johnson, Chairman of the Wayne County ASC Committee, indicated producers have until May 31 to obtain loans on 1977 crop corn and grain sorghum.

The interest on grain loans is 8 percent. The interest charge is eliminated after grain is in the reserve for one year. The next two years the loan will be interest free, Johnson stated.

Producers are required to leave the grain in the reserve for three years unless the national average market price reaches 125 percent of the loan rate. When the market price reaches this level the producer may repay the loan if he wants to. When the national average market price reaches 140 percent of the loan level the loans may be called for repayment.

Our 'migrant workers'

Unemployment in the teen-age ranks of Wayne area youth may be up this summer because of a determination by the Department of Labor (DOL) concerning migrant workers.

Those untiring DOL officials in the Bagdad on the Potomac have decided the 1963 Farm Labor Contractor Registration Act encompasses corn detasslers.

And this comes when President Carter has asked for a positive program of deregulation plus writing laws and regulations in simplified versions to eliminate misinterpretation and over-reaction.

If this determination is let stand, it is a travesty.
While students themselves would not be subjected to registration and fingerprinting, those who hire them would according to the present interpretation of the law.

Labeling the student corn detasslers

as migrant workers means that costly, time-consuming registration and book-keeping requirements by seed corn companies would certainly mean fewer detassling jobs this summer.

This is 180 degrees away from the proclaimed objective by the Carter Administration to place greater numbers of young Americans in productive jobs during the summer months.

Actually, it's a matter of definition. DOL officials interpret a migrant worker as an individual "whose primary employment is agriculture . . . or who performs agricultural labor . . . on a seasonal or other temporary basis." Most dictionaries describe migrant workers as laborers who move from place to place to harvest seasonal crops.


Seed companies have been ferreted out as being subject to the law and it appears the family farmer would also get into the hassle if he hires students to detassel corn in his fields. Carrying it a step further, if the farmer has his hired hand haul the kids from a nearby town to a field and back again, that farm employee, too, must be fingerprinted and registered.

We feel reasonably certain that Congress did not intend to include detasslers as migrant workers when it wrote the 1963 law. Whatever the case, the air should be cleared so students and other young people can find summer employment. It's a mess, but it doesn't have to be. — Chuck Barnes.

The couple's sons are Radelle of Wayne and Nyle of Lake in the Hills, Ill. There are three grandchildren.

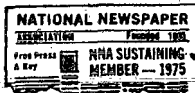

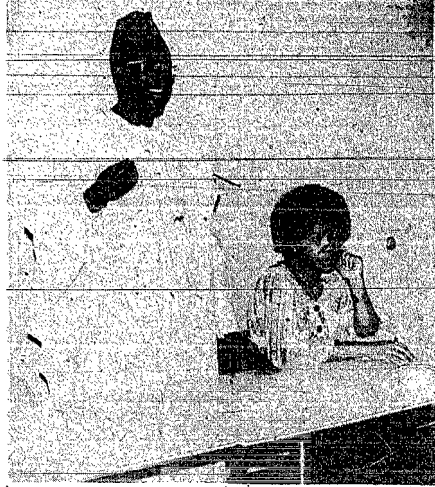

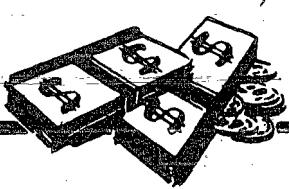

Dyas: Dam Project Could Hurt State

Passage of the proposed construction of the Norden Dam in north central Nebraska will not only create ill effects in the north central region, but will be felt all across the state, said Nebraska's Democratic Congressional candidate for the First District, Hess Dyas of Lincoln, who is running against fellow Democrats Allen O'Donnell of Wayne and Bruce Hamilton of Lincoln in the May 9th primary, pointed out to members of Wayne Kiwanis Club that cities such as Wayne, Lincoln and Beatrice will feel the rippling effects of higher electricity bills and damage to the environment.
Dyas said that approximately two-thirds of the costs to build the dam will come from increased electric rates and will be subsidized by taxpayers across the state over the next 50 years. He went on to point out that no one knows for sure what the impact of the dam will have on the environment, especially in the farming areas.

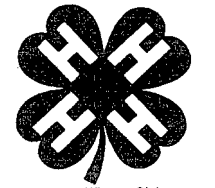
There have been promises that construction of the dam would enhance corn yields and double the capacity for livestock feeding.
Dyas denied those statements, saying that such predicted yields as 191 bushels of corn per acre with the new dam is nearly impossible under the current soil conditions. He also lashed out at the idea of doubling the livestock leader program, noting that feeders already have a surplus.
"This isn't Dyas' first try for a seat in Congress. In 1976 he ran as the Democratic candidate for the Senate, but failed. Two years earlier he ran for a seat in the House of Representatives. Married and the father of three children, Dyas is part owner of an audio-visuals firm in Lincoln. He got his first taste of campaigning in 1960 when he and his wife, Carol, worked for the late President John Kennedy.
