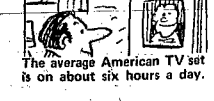

New Fungicides Now Available

Three fungicides received registrations March 31 for use in Nebraska against specific diseases, according to Dr. John Watkins, Extension plant pathologist in the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln specialist said the fungicides are DuPont Manzate 200, Rohm and Haas Dithane M-45 and Uniroyal Vitavax 25DB. The registrations were granted for use in Nebraska only by the State Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Plant Industry.

"Manzate and Dithane are foliar fungicides for foliar diseases of wheat," Watkins said. "The new label provides for their use on wheat leaf rust, tan spot disease and Septoria leaf blotch." The use against wheat leaf rust is a new use, he pointed out.

Tests on Manzate and Dithane over a two-year period indicate that two applications are needed for good control. The first application should come during the late boot stage of wheat development and the second application 10-14 days later. The second application must be made at least 20 days prior to harvest, as is directed on the label, he said.

Vitavax 25DB may now be used as a drill box seed treatment on wheat, barley and oats, giving the farmer the advantage of on-the-farm seed treatment.

"Vitavax is the only systemic available for control of loose smut," the plant pathologist said.

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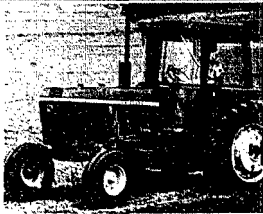

IRRIGATION SCHEDULING Lower Elkhorn NRD

Irrigation scheduling is the process of applying the right amount of irrigation water at the right time. There are presently two agencies involved locally in irrigation scheduling, they are Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District and the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Cooperative Extension Service. Lower Elkhorn NRD maintains three weather stations around the District with the help of the Extension Service. These weather stations are located near Concord, West Point and Battle Creek and are used to calculate evaporation and crop water use per day. Two other weather stations are located at Columbus and Bloomfield. The information is then broadcasted over local radio stations or can be obtained by calling special irrigation hotline numbers. Radio stations carrying the information are: WJAG -780AM, 106.7 FM Norfolk, KTTT -1340AM, 105FM Columbus, KTCH -1590AM 105FM Wayne.

Hotline numbers are: Norfolk 371-9300, West Point 372-2390, Wayne 375-1472.

Crop water use information will be available through both sources beginning June 1, 1978.

If a farmer knows the soil type of his irrigated field, he can find the moisture holding capacity of the top three feet of soil. The following table shows averages and shouldn't be used in calculations:

Soil Texture	Average Available Water (in.)		
	1 ft.	2 ft.	3 ft.
loamy sand	1.3	2.5	3.7
sandy loam	1.7	3.2	4.8
silt loam	2.6	5.1	7.6
silty clay loam	2.6	4.9	7.2

The moisture blocks in heavy soils or tensiometers in sandy soil can be used to calculate the amount of water taken out of the soil profile. The daily crop water use obtained from the weather stations can then be used to determine when to irrigate again and how much water to apply. When irrigation water is applied, it should not entirely fill up the soil profile. Thus, there is room for storage of rainfall. In this way you can save irrigation water by taking advantage of rainfall.

UNL Extension Service also has an irrigation scheduling program which utilizes the AGNET computer. Farmers who sign up for this program could phone their moisture block readings, rainfall and irrigation information into the nearest extension office with an AGNET terminal. The farmer would then receive information on when to start irrigating.

Lower Elkhorn NRD and the Extension Service will provide instructions on how to install and use soil moisture monitoring equipment, during the last week of May and the first two weeks of June.

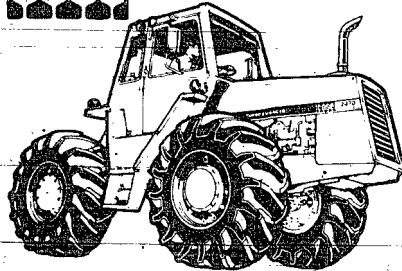


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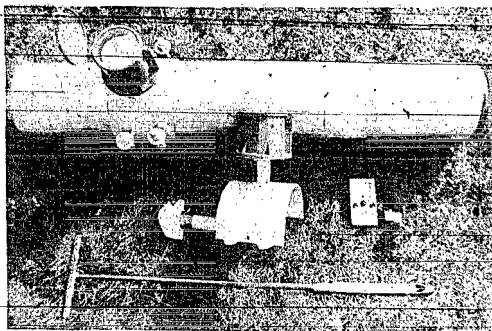

Cost-Sharing on Scheduling Equipment

Equipment used for irrigation scheduling consists of flow meter, soil probe, moisture blocks, hand held moisture meter and tensiometer. This year ASCS in several counties will cost-share on this equipment, however the cost-share will be for complete sets, not individual pieces. To obtain cost-sharing, the flow-meter must be installed before irrigation begins.

Class Package Designed To Aid Writing Abilities

A package of classes designed to aid high school English and writing teachers in improving student writing abilities has been developed at Wayne State College (WSC) for summer session, beginning June 5.

The courses, offered through the WSC Language Arts Institute, will focus on teaching writing in high schools and generating student interest in writing.

Dr. Donald Schultz, chairman of the WSC humanities division, said the classes will help teachers deal with the problems of teaching writing effectively. He said a final goal of the courses is improved student writing.

"Our own perception of the problem is that the writing ability of entering college freshmen has declined," he said. "We would like to do our part to break the cycle that seems to be a trend, of which we have been a part."

Five writing classes make up the core of the package. Classes include introduction to teaching writing, offered June 6-12; teaching expository writing, June 13-19; creative writing in the classroom, June 20-26; journalism for school publications, June 27-July 7 and philosophy of language, July 20-Aug. 11.

Courses are worth between one and three graduate credits and can be applied to a master of arts degree in English education at WSC. Complimentary courses in communication arts, media and literature will also be offered during summer sessions.

"The participants can enroll for whatever their schedules permit," Dr. Schultz said. "They could acquire up to 16 graduate credit hours if they enter full-time for both summer sessions."

Dr. Schultz said the new writing courses, taught by regular WSC faculty members, should help teachers become better equipped to lead their overall high school writing programs and therefore help improve student writing.

"Eventually we hope WSC and other colleges will see better writing by entering students," he said. "After all, these teachers are dealing with students who are close to the college freshman level."

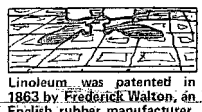


Carrolliner Girls

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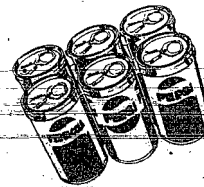
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
