

Some 5º percent of the eligible farms in Wayne Courty signed up in the feed grain set-aside program, according to Ray Butts, director of the Wayne Courty ASCs office. Butts said 736 farms were signed in the program so of the the program, farmers could payment at the time they signed the the grogram. Close of the deadline May 31. There were 1,257 eligible tarms in the courty. Butts said 66 percent of all of the normal cop acres in Wayne County is included on the farms county as a cop acres in Wayne County sincluded on the farms county is included on the farms 10 percent of the planted feed grains (corn, grain sorghum, barley) and 20 percent of the farms wheat acreage. There is no payment for the minimum participation but it does qualify the farm for grain loads, disas-ter and deficiency payments.

Butts explained payments could be earned by signing in-tentions and setting aside an additional 10 percent of the 1978 feed grain plantings. Farms participating in the additional 10 percent would be restricted to planting no more of the feed grain crop than they planted in 1977.

A pioneer conservation plant

About 1900, a Pennsylvania Duich farmer named Gift purchased some atlafa seed that had been imported fram Europe. It contained an odd reddish seed as an impurtly. When the seed germi-nated and grew, it began to accupy the spaces between the aflafia plants and, as the alfalta declined, it fully occupied the

soil, spreading by means of rhizomes and by seeds which matured in later summer. Eventually the field was plowed and planted to corn and potatoes, but this interloper seemed to thrive under con-ventional fillage. The Gifts considered it a weed.


Interloper seemed to thrive under con-ventional Hilage. The Gifts considered it a weed. In Juno, 1935, a young Nebraska born agronomist slumbled onto the little farm Usi' as the "weed" was in full bloom. By now it had taken over most of the farm to the exclusion fo corn, potatoes, and weeds. The agronomist was Dr. Fred V. Grau, fresh from his Ph.D. work at the University of Maryland, recently hired by Pensylvania State College (later Uni-versity) as the first extension agronomist in turr in the U.S. Nis-brief historical account of the discoury and develop-ment of the discoury and develop-ment of the bollowing account. Born on a small farm near Bennington, Nebr., Grau reselved his bacheler of science degree at the University of Ne-braska in 1931. He had cared for the university's first turf pois, established with a 300 grant from the "greens section." United States Coll Association. His initerest in growing things was en-hanced by his work in the Living Plant Museum and by his employment as "greenkeeper" at the old Shrine Country Club (now Hillcrest). Upon graduation he worked briefly at the Midwest Turf Gradens on the A.D. Lasker estate north completeld his master's degree in 1933 at the University of Maryland, and, in 1933, his Ph.D. An interview-Lating fail of 1934 at Pann State left to a lob in estension wark and a

Completed this insist is degree in 193 at the University of Maryland, and, in 1935, his Ph.D. An interview In the fail of 1934 at Penn State led to a job in extension work and a-subsequent investigation of the curjous plant crownvetch. Grau took plants, Howers and seeds to Penn State for Dosifive Identification. No one knew what it was: A botany key traced it to Coronilla varia. An old German text described it as assentially worthless and possibly toxic to foraging animals. But, having seen the plant (a legume) grow in poor soil, choke weeds, and cling to a nearly vertical rock highway slope, Grau let that it had a future, especially for reducing erosion. The root system was magnificent, occupying vitruality every crevice between soil gentices, binding/ the particles together to create a rich, mellow growing medium for other plants, and depositing a blanket of mulch on the soil surface.

Grau's efforts to interest-Pennsylvania farmers in producing seed of crownvetch failed. In 1940 he and his wife Anne purchased land and planted a crop them-selves. The only seed, bed preparation was 'simple roughing with a disc. No fertilizer was used. In 1946 the world's first harvest in Centre County, Pennsyl-vania, yielded a few gonny sacks full of what looked like 'brown sticks. These were the pods, each of which contained a single elongated reddish seed.

single elongated reddish seed. The crownvetch industry was born in Nebraska between 1944 and 1948 when Grau introduced the plant on his brother's farm near Benningtion and on his sister's farm near Omaha. The brother, Theodore Grau, noted that Jersey catille moved steadily across a field of alfalfa in order to graze on the crownvetch. Of great significance was the fact that, although animals were lost to blast on atlalla, there was never a

case of bloat on Penngift crownvelch. This confirmed the Graus' numerous carlieg abservations in the East. Robert Boelger, Fred Grau's nephew, became interested in the crownvelch project, and logelher they expanded the plantings and planeered seed production in Nubraska. Theodore Grau had shown carlier that "crownvelch" seed, produc-tion was reasible in Nebraska. Fred Grau, the farm bay from Bennington, had helped device pa ane wagricultural indus-try which had far-reaching effects in the suruges for clean water, better crops, mures, more beautiful highways, and the saving of untoid millions of dollars in engineering and maintenace costs.


