Total Cost is \$280,500

County Road Projects Underway

Some \$280,500 in county road work is scheduled to be completed in Wayne County during 1977-78, according to the one and six year road improvement plan.

The biggest and most costly project is the rebuilding of a bridge located six miles north and three miles west of Wayne

in Commissioner District 2. The total cost of the project is \$90,000 with \$27,000 coming from county funds and \$63,000 coming from federal aid secondary roads (FAS).

A project west of Winside is estimated at \$50,000 and includes grading, culverts and asphalt surfacing of one and

three-quarter miles of county road. The cost is split \$35,000 county and \$15,000 FAS.

In other projects slated for 1977-78, a timber bridge located five miles north and two miles east of Carroll will be removed and will be replaced by an 8-foot by 8-foot culvert. The cost is \$18,000 with Wayne County pay-

ing \$9,000 and Cedar County paying \$9,000.

Grading of two miles of east-west road located one mile east of Winside will amount to \$14,000 in cost and will be carried by the county.

Grainland Road from Blaine Street to Maple Street will be surfaced with concrete at a total

cost of \$33,000. The cost will be split \$11,000 special assessment, \$11,000 city funds and \$11,000 county funds.

A grading project six miles north and four miles west of Wayne will cost \$14,000 for two miles of a north-south road. The cost will be carried by the county.

Another two miles of grading at the same cost is slated for an east-west road located six miles north and two miles west of Wayne. The cost will be assessed against the county.

A bridge located six miles west and one-half mile south of Carroll will be removed and replaced with an earthen fill dam at a cost of \$10,000 with the county and the Natural Resources District sharing the cost equally.

The county will carry the cost of a grading project located one mile east of Wayne on a north-south road one mile north and one-half mile west. The cost is estimated to be \$7,000.

A grading and gravel surfacing project is slated for one mile on a north-south road located four miles south and two miles east of Wakefield at a cost of \$7,000 to come out of county funds.

Another grading project is planned for an east-west road located one mile south and three miles west of Altona. The project will cover one mile at a cost to the county of \$10,000.

County road crews have been fighting the weather to get projects completed this summer. They expect to move right along when the weather straightens out according to county officials.

Council Okays Expansion Plan

The Wastewater Treatment Facility Expansion plan was given council approval Tuesday night at its regular meeting.

The expansion will include the building of two additional "cells" to the east of the existing lagoon and to provide a spray irrigation system.

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The City Council Tuesday night authorized City Administrator Fred Brink to advertise for bids the paving of Grainland Road, Tara Ridge and South Windom.

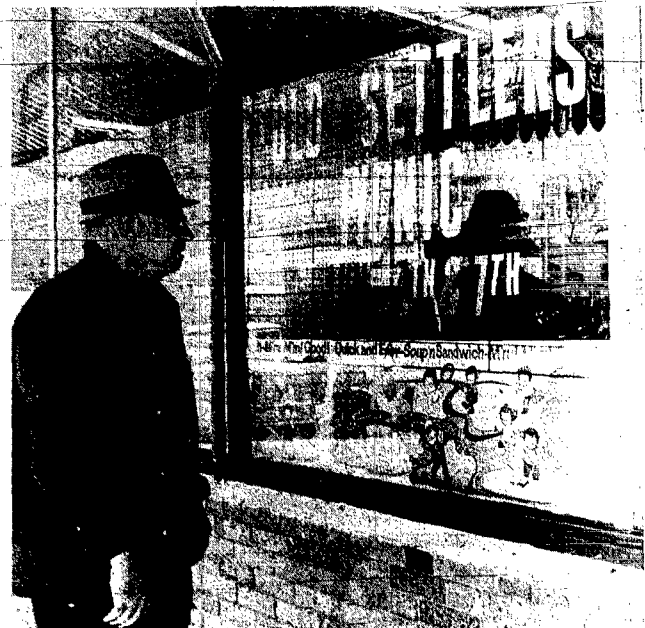

Some 736 County Farms Enrolled Set-Aside Plans Attract 59%

Some 59 percent of the eligible farms in Wayne County signed up in the feed grain set-aside program, according to Ray Butts, director of the Wayne County ASCS office.

Butts said 736 farms were signed in the program as of the close of the deadline May 31. There were 1,257 eligible farms in the county.

Butts said 66 percent of all of the normal crop acres in Wayne County is included on the farms

signed up in the program. He also said some \$165,688 in advance payments have been paid to farmers on 207 farms in the program. Farmers could receive one-half of the total payment at the time they signed with the program.

Statewide, about 74 percent of the farms enrolled in the federal program, according to State ASCS Director Glenn Kreuscher. Participation in the program requires a minimum set aside of

10 percent of the planted feed grains (corn, grain sorghum, barley) and 20 percent of the farms wheat acreage. There is no payment for the minimum participation but it does qualify the farm for grain loans, disaster and deficiency payments.

Butts explained payments could be earned by signing in and setting aside an additional 10 percent of the 1978 feed grain plantings. Farms participating in the additional 10 percent would be restricted to planting no more of the feed grain crop than they planted in 1977.

A recently changed provision of the program should result in more producers signing up, Butts stated. "We recently learned that participants could destroy corn to use as set aside.

Police Probe Possible Fraud

Wayne city police are investigating a report of what is reported to be a fraudulent band examiner.

Roger Boyce notified Police Chief Vern Fairchild of the alleged fraud June 2.

Chief Fairchild said, according to his information, a man had telephoned a Wayne resident about the middle of May and told he was an auditor for a Wayne bank and questioned her about a \$20 deposit she supposedly made.

The resident said she did make a \$20 deposit. The man then told her a check in the amount of \$1,250 had been forged in her name against her account and they suspected an amount on the bank.

Fairchild said the man told the resident his name was Robert(s) (not known if first or last name) and asked her to come to the bank and write a check for another \$1,250. He didn't tell her what she should do with the money, Fairchild said.

Low Income Legal Aids

Lower income people will now be provided with legal services which they can not normally afford, according to Tony Nanfito, staff attorney for the Wayne Legal Aids Society.

The society will serve the nine surrounding counties: Knox, Cedar, Dakota, Thurston, Burt, Wayne, Stanton, Cuming, and Dixon.

Legal services provided by the office are free of charge to clients except for court costs. The office does not deal with criminal cases, juvenile cases, workman's compensation cases, or cases dealing with contingent fees.

"We're here to provide legal services to people who can't afford it," said Nanfito. "I urge anyone to stop by our office for more information."

Currently, the Legal Aids Society office is located in the Health Service offices, but by June 5, a new office will officially be opened at 420 Pearl Street.

Persons who are receiving Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or Supplementary Security Income, are automatically eligible for free legal service, according to Kathy Miller. See LEGAL, page 9

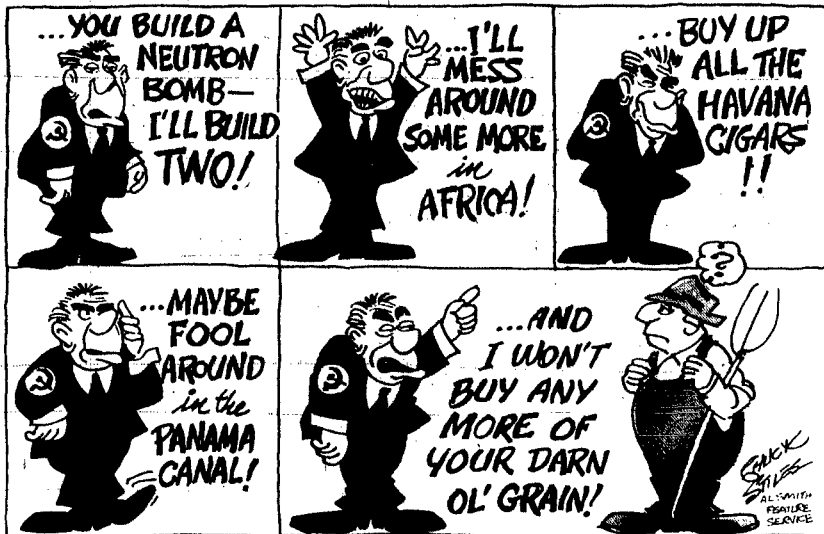

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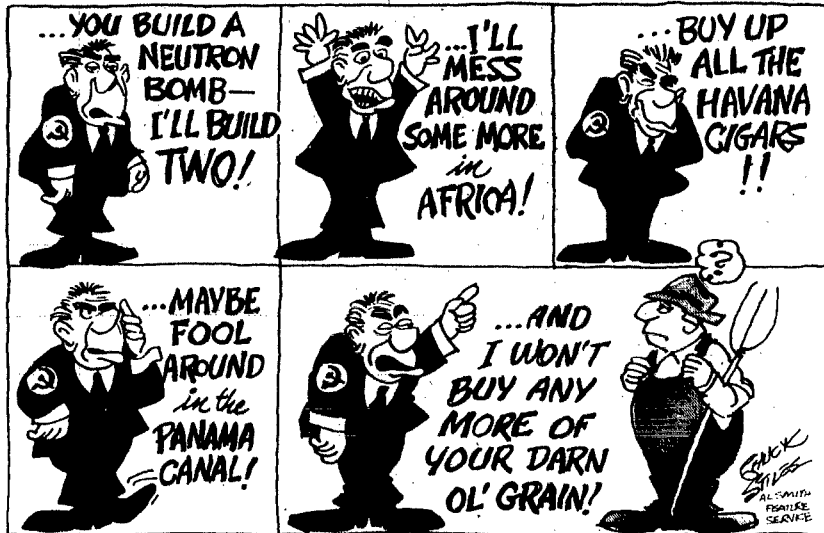

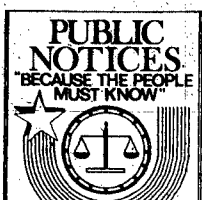

Section 2. Within said district, improvements shall be constructed consisting of grading, curbing, guttering, concrete paving, and construction of other necessary curbing and guttering. Said improvements shall be made on and along the following described streets within said district:

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 78.2 IN THE CITY OF WAYNE, NEBRASKA, DESCRIBED AS FOLLOWS: THE PROPERTIES INCLUDED WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF SAID DISTRICT AND PROVIDING FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF IMPROVEMENTS THEREIN AND REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 902 PASSED APRIL 25, 1978.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska:

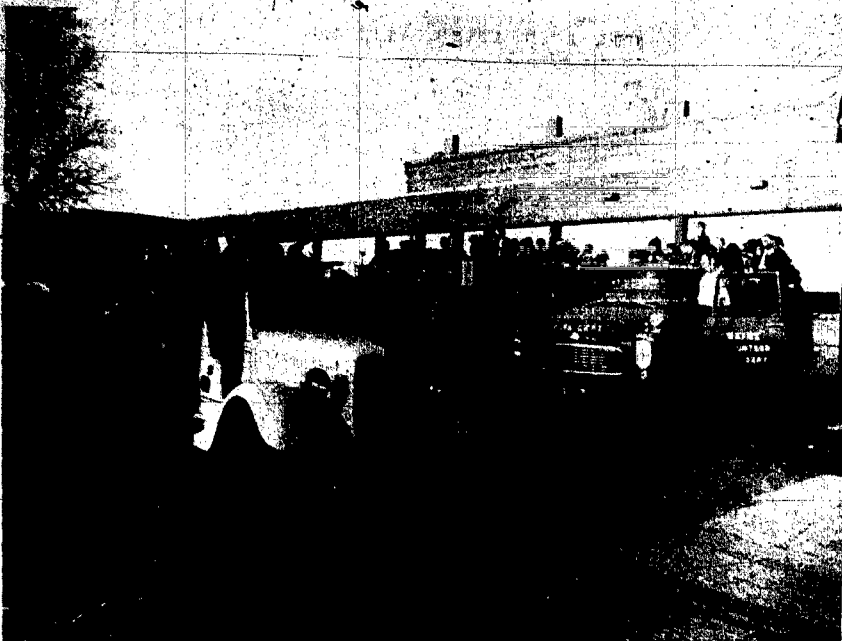
