County Jaycees to Sponsor Fireworks Display

Traditional 'Fourth' Set for Area

The traditional picnics, fireworks and family gatherings will signal Independence Day Tuesday in Wayne and several surrounding communities. In Wayne, the County Jaycees will sponsor their annual Fourth of July fireworks display at sundown at the ball park. Wayne businesses have been

contacted by Jaycee members to collect the \$600 needed to pay for the fireworks. Project chairman Ben Stockdale hopes that the entire amount will be collected. Working with Stockdale in planning this year's display is Galen Wiser. As it stands, the City of Wayne has already given \$250 of the

\$600 needed. "We're looking forward to a big turnout!" Stockdale pointed out, "but we do need the help of local businesses." Businessmen who have not been contacted and wish to donate to make this year a success can contact Stockdale at 375-4055, or Wiser at 375-4855.

Celebrations in Carroll this year will include the annual Fourth of July picnic and games at the Dwayne Granfield farm northwest of Carroll. The public is invited. The event, which is sponsored by the Adult Fellowship group of the Presbyterian and Congregational Church, includes a picnic at noon, followed with ball games and races in the afternoon.

The Concord Betterment Association is sponsoring an "old fashioned" Fourth of July celebration in that community. A community picnic supper will be held at 6 p.m. at the Concord fair grounds, followed by games, contests and cake walks. The evening will end with fireworks and ice cream. A spokesman for the Betterment Association said donations to provide coffee and ice cream will be appreciated. And in Wakefield, local sky diver David Hitz will perform twice during the day at the city park. Hitz will make his first parachute jump (flag jump) at about 7 p.m. and a smoke jump will be made about 9 p.m.

Nears Critical State

Corn Expected 'Knee-High by 4th'

The corn crop in the Wayne-land area is expected to be "knee-high by the Fourth of July" but it is entering a critical stage where moisture is needed. While there hasn't been any appreciable moisture for the past ten days, extension experts stated the crop in most parts of the area can go another five to seven days without moisture and without causing damage.

University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension Climatologist Dr. Ralph Nellid last week stated weather conditions continue to be favorable as the corn approaches the critical tasseling and grain filling stages of development.

"The early March forecast of best yield prospects since the bumper year 1973 still holds," he said, "even though planting was delayed by rain, particularly in the Wayne-land area. The crop has been somewhat behind schedule until the recent hot-humid days which have brought the crop to about normal for this time of the year."

Dr. Nellid said because of the warmer temperatures, corn grows four times faster in July than after planting in May. "The growing stalk elongates rapidly — similar to opening a telescope or a fishing rod — as much as three inches per day or two feet

in a week," he said. "It can double its height in a very short time," he explained.

Dr. Nellid pointed out timely rains in the last part of June coincided with the period when small ears are formed inside the plants and their potential size at harvest is determined. "Ultimate realization of this potential will be affected by weather the next few weeks as the tassels and silks emerge, pollination takes place and the developing kernels are formed, he said.

The climatologist said above-normal precipitation prior to and following planting has provided favorable subsoil moisture for expanding root system to

nourish the corn. Hot days above 95 degrees F., however, can be detrimental to corn growth, he added.

Current moisture conditions suggest yield possibilities will range from 25 to 40 percent above normal, he explained. He pointed out, however, studies show each day above 95 degrees F. during the ear-forming-grain filling period can reduce yield potential 1.5 percent.

Certain areas in the Wayne-land area received hail damage and the crop was either wiped out completely or it was cut back. Dixon County has been declared a disaster area as far as the crops are concerned.

Wakefield Girl Accepts Grant

Kimberly Neuhaus, Wakefield, has accepted a Nebraska State College Board of Trustees scholarship for the fall semester 1978, at Wayne State College. The scholarships provide full college tuition at WSC and are renewable for up to four years, providing the student maintains an acceptable academic standing. Recipients are chosen by the Wayne State financial aids committee and must be in the upper 25 percent of their graduating high school class. About 120 high school seniors apply for the 20 WSC scholarships annually. The Board of Trustee Scholarship program began in 1971 and has been awarded to 427 students throughout Nebraska, including 68 scholarships awarded this year. See GRANT, page 11

Insulation Standards Set for Rural Housing

New insulation standards for housing in rural areas financed by the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will be put into effect, LaVern Ostendorf, county supervisor, announced this week. Implementation of the standards, first scheduled for March 15, had been held up during federal court consideration of a suit by the National Association of Home Builders challenging the new code. After FmHA prepared additional environmental material and a further hearing on the case was held, U.S. District Judge George L. Hart, Jr., dissolved a preliminary injunction. While certain aspects of the lawsuit remain to be resolved, the new insulation standards can now be implemented.

The new thermal standards are designed to provide for heavier insulation and other measures to make FmHA-financed housing less costly to heat or cool, and to conserve energy. They will apply to newly built homes and apartments financed by FmHA, and, insofar as is economically feasible, to existing housing purchased or repaired with FmHA loans. Better weatherizing through more effective insulation, storm doors and windows and other techniques will help families to reduce high fuel and energy expenses that jeopardize their ability to afford adequate housing. Wayne Postmaster Wilbur Giese reported more than 30 persons signed to take the clerk-carrier examinations to be given July 22 at 2 p.m. Giese said the response "indicates local residents consider Postal Service jobs attractive. Our pay, fringe benefits, working conditions and security are very attractive to some people." Giese said job openings in Wayne will be limited for the present time. The examination is being given to establish a register from which to draw for future vacancies as they occur, he explained. He pointed out vacancies will be filled by offering jobs to those who do well on the examination and who are placed on the office's up-dated register.

The Wayne Legal Aid Society has completed its move into new quarters located at 420 Pearl Street.

The Legal Aid Society is an organization dedicated to providing free legal services to people who cannot afford a private attorney.

The Wayne office covers a nine-county region in North-eastern Nebraska.

Three attorneys and one paralegal will be providing a full range of legal services to low income households in Burt, Cedar, Cuming, Dakota, Dixon, Knox, Thurston, Stanton and Wayne Counties.

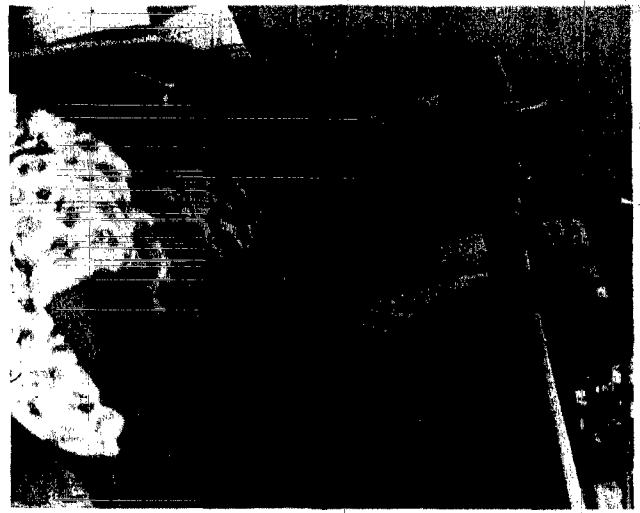
This is the seventh year that Miss Broekemeier has participated in Guild auditions.

5-3. The Midgets got their turn in the bottom of the third and took advantage of it.

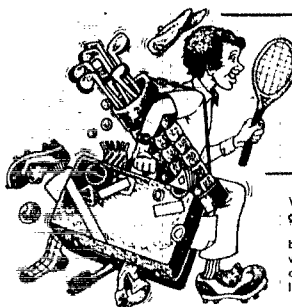

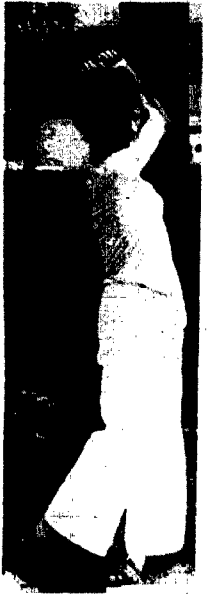

Wakefield plans to celebrate the Fourth of July with a bang thanks to 21-year-old Dave Hitz.

maneuverable and enables him to make a 360 degree turn in two seconds. Parachuters, just like drivers, are required to have a license and there are four different levels of licenses. Dave has both his A and B licenses and is

about to get his C license. They are based on the number of jumps and free fall time. A D license is the most advanced. When asked why he wanted to jump, Dave replied, "I wanted to see what it's like out of curiosity. The first time I

jumped I crawled out in the strut and asked myself "why am I doing this?" Dave has made 106 jumps at an average altitude of 7,500 feet he said. He usually has a 30 second free fall and opens his chute at about 2,500 feet —

plenty of time in case the main chute would malfunction. Then he has about a two- and one-half minute canopy ride down. Sky divers travel at speeds of 120-200 miles per hour, Dave said. "The reserve chute is smaller and simpler, you want it to open so you don't want anything unnecessary. It'll open in one second," Dave stated. A certified F.A.A. parachute packer has to repack the reserve chute every 60 days to meet regulations.

Two years ago while attending the University of Nebraska, Dave tried to register for a parachuting class which caught his eye, but the class was closed. Dave was determined to try parachuting out of curiosity, so he joined the Lincoln Sport Parachute Club.

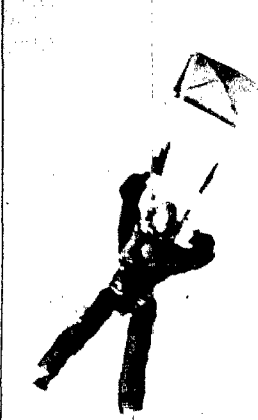
Now he works at the Fair Store in Wakefield and Tuesday he will be facing one of his biggest jumps at a home baseball game. Dave is planning to make two jumps, from 7,500 feet, the first one at 7:30 p.m. just before the Wakefield-Sioux City North Legion baseball game and one at about 9 p.m. Dave Bodlak of Wakefield is his pilot when he sky dives in the area.

In a warmup jump Thursday night Dave landed about 10 feet from second base. When a group after the jump, one person asked Dave why he sat on the wheel of the plane so long at the 5,000 foot altitude. Dave looked, "I looked down and noticed I was right above the cemetery and I didn't want to jump over it."

Dave owns his own parachute and has about \$1,200 of equipment in all.

He packs his own chute and says it's not difficult. "I have trouble making by bed but I can fold a chute without any trouble. It's pretty easy. I've never had any malfunctions," he said.

The main chute, Dave uses is a square one which is fully

All-Star Basketball Games Provide For Alcoholism

Basketball fans attending either of the two Nebraska All-Star High School Basketball Games in August are helping the youth of Nebraska deal with the problems of alcoholism and drug abuse. Proceeds from ticket sales for the Nebraska Coaches Association event will be divided among the state's three members of the National Council on Alcoholism — councils in Grand Island, Lincoln, and Omaha — and the state's three non-NCA councils in North Platte, Columbus, and Scottsbluff. Each council will determine how to use its share of the receipts.

The theme of the link between the six councils and the Nebraska Coaches Association is "Partners in Progress." It is the first year that the ten-year annual game has benefited the state's councils on alcoholism. The six councils serve their communities by offering information on alcoholism and planning and coordinating alcohol-related projects.

Lincoln, for example, does not provide direct treatment for alcoholics, but instead sponsors workshops, directs in-service training programs, and coordinates various drug and alcohol treatment programs in the city and Lancaster County to avoid duplication. The Lincoln Council on Alcoholism and Drugs has decided to channel money it receives from the All-Star Games into a school-community alcohol intervention project with a goal of having 10 percent of the Lincoln Public Schools staff trained to recognize and deal with alcohol-related problems. "Teachers need very appropriate ways of dealing with such problems," Peg Brown, family and youth specialist of the Lincoln council, said. "If teachers can react meaningfully, they

may be blocking at an early age addiction to alcohol." According to Brown, the Lincoln council will use the money it receives from the All-Star games to sponsor a teacher workshop that will assist teachers in handling problems such as a student who comes to class drunk or students who are abused by alcoholic parents. Brown hopes that, in part due to the Nebraska All-Star Basketball Games, teachers will know what to say after they tell a student, "I know you have a problem."

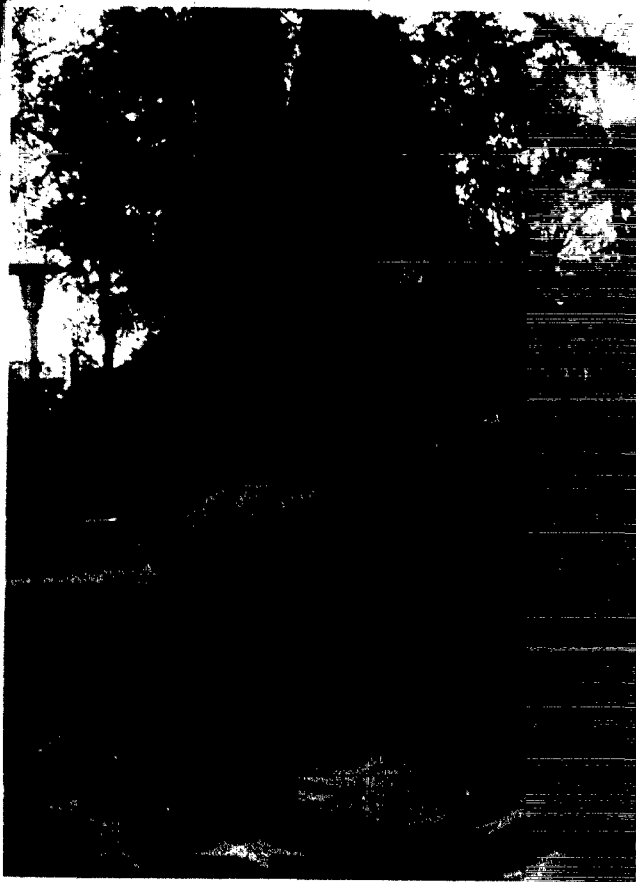

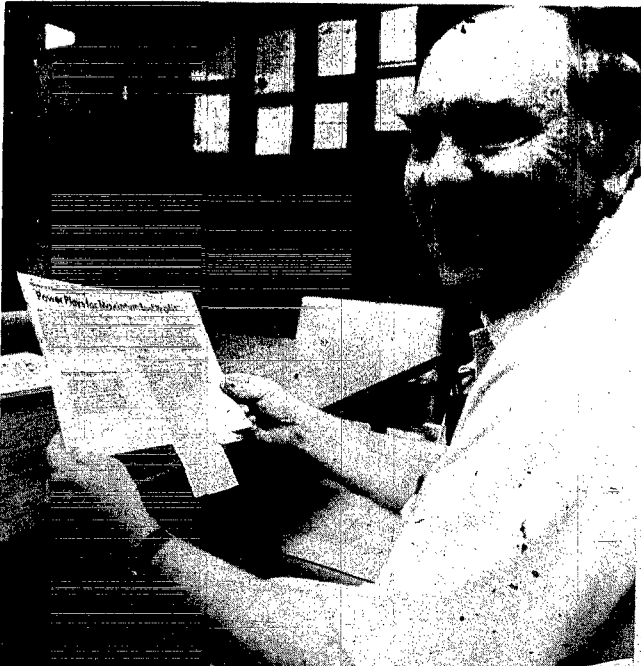

Slow Economic Start for Year

The year had a slow start in real output in Nebraska as the state registered the third consecutive monthly decline in February, according to figures compiled by the Bureau of Business Research, University of Nebraska-Lincoln. In the Wayneland area, real output during February, 1978 as compared with the same period a year ago ranged only 90 percent. City sales dropped to 86.6 percent as compared to last year's sales. The year to date as compared with the year to date a year ago shows a decline of 5.9 percent. Noting the November-to-February drop, researchers said the drop should be interpreted with caution, since short-term

directional changes in the index are not always accompanied by changes in the trend of state economic activity. The events of the next two months, according to William Gerdes, research associate at the bureau, should be carefully monitored, since they provide an answer to the question as to whether or not recent movements in the index (statewide) represent a lull in generally expanding state economy. Most of the February reduction in Nebraska economic activity was concentrated in agriculture, where output fell more than 13 percent. Measures of short-term production for the agricultural sector are subject to considerable

variation, and the potential rebound in agricultural activity in coming months. While physical production by the sector declined, prices received by Nebraska farmers continued to rise, and were up another 5.6 percent in February, according to Gerdes. Two other sectors in the Nebraska economy recorded decreases in activity for the month. They were manufacturing (-1.6 percent) and distributive (-1.1 percent) sectors. The remaining two sectors (construction and government) recorded increases in output for the month. Construction activity rose 4.3 percent and government output was up 0.5 percent. A significant portion of the

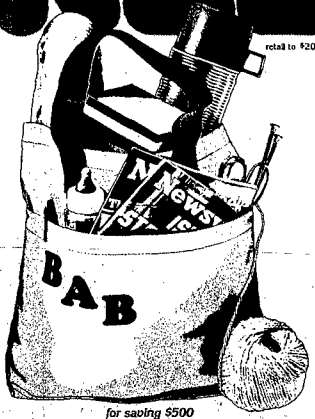

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
