# Corn Expected 'Knee-High by 4th'

Insulation Standards

The corn crop in the Wayne-land area is expected to be "knee-high by the Fourth of July" but it is entering a critical

white there moisture is needed.
While there hasn't been any appreciable moisture for the past ten days, extension experts

past ten days, extension experts stated the crop in most parts of the area can go another five to seven days without moisture and without causing damage. University of Nebraska-Lincoin Extension Climatologist Dr. Ralph Nelid last week stated weather conditions continue to be favorable as the corn approaches the critical tasseling and grain filling stages of development.

"The early March forecast of best yield prospects since the bumper year 1973 still holds," he said, "even though planting was delayed by rain, particularily in the Wayneland area.

The crop has been somewhat behind schedule until the recent hot-humid days which have brought the crop to about normal for this time of the year.


Dr. Nelld said because of the warmer temperatures, corn grows four times faster in July than after planting in May. "The growing stalk elongates rapidly — similar to opening a telescope

in a week," he said. "It can double its helghth in a very short time," he explained.

Dr. Nelid pointed out timely rains in the last part of June coincided with the period when small ears are formed inside the plants and their potential size at harvest is determined. "Ultimate realization of this recential."

nourlish the corn. Hot days above 95 degrees F., however. can be detrimental to corn growth, he added.
Current moisture conditions suggest yield possibilities will range from 25 to 40 percent above normal, he explained. He pointed out, however, studies show each day above 95 degrees F. during the ear, forming-grain filling period can reduce yield potential 1.5 percent.
Certain areas in the Wayneland area received hall damage and the crop was either wiped out completely or it was cut back. Dixon County has been declared a disaster area as fer as the crops are concerned.



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

Dave said he loves to sky dive because It's "so quiet and pretty." He plans on night jumping and jumping into water some time. "In free fall it's like you're suspended not falling." Dave added. The force is great but it's easy to do flips, loops, lurns, anything."

"In sky diving, your body is like an airplane, the more you buck the faster you fall and the more you spread out the slower you fall You can track (travel horizontality) at about 70 miles an hour." Oave also has his pilot's license.

After the practice, Dave told people, "The ready now." In his landing he fore a small hole in his jumps because she wasn't going to sew it up. When asked how she felt about Dave's hobby she replied. "It scares me to death, but I go along with it, he loves it.


