

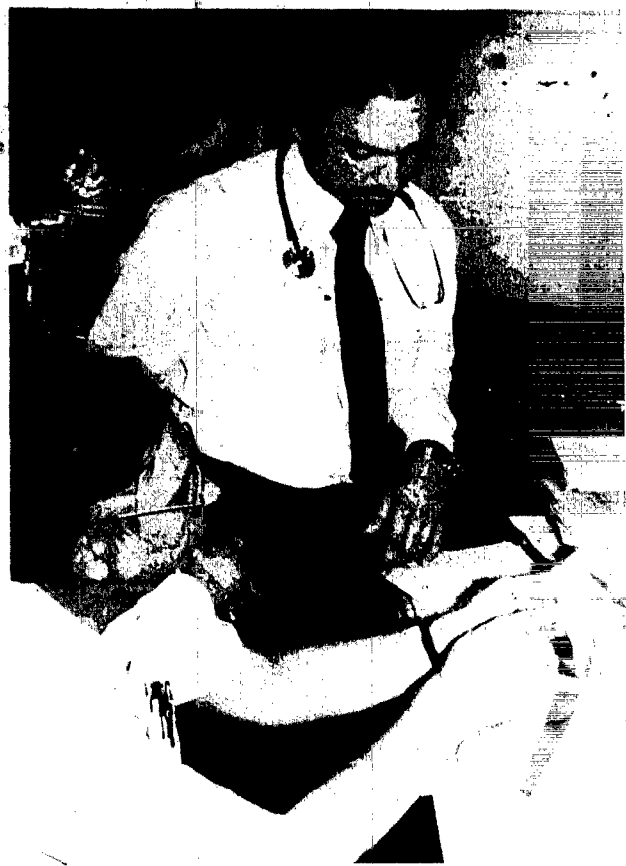

## Med Student Likes Wayne

The community of Wayne has attracted the attention of a fledgling medical student. But that doesn't mean he's going to set up practice in Wayne when he is licensed.

Juan Salazar, who will be entering his second year of medical school at Creighton University, Omaha this fall, has been spending the past three weeks with Dr. Bob Benthack, learning through observation.

Salazar, who earned his undergraduate degree in biology

from Baylor University, Waco, Texas, said he was impressed with Wayne and "if I decided to set up a small clinic practice, I would choose a community similar to Wayne."

The program under which Salazar has been working is sponsored by the Medical Education Continuing Organization. The doctor with whom the student works decides the length of the time the student will spend with him.

Salazar said the past three

weeks have been very beneficial as they have afforded him to observe practical applications of things he has learned during his first year in medical school.

He has been staying at Berry Hall on the Wayne State College campus. He has been able to be with Dr. Benthack in his clinical practice as well as during emergency-situations and during surgery.

Later this summer, he will spend some time as preceptor in Denison, Ia. He said he is looking forward to working in Denison. "My girl friend lives there."

Salazar said following this summer, he will be devoting full time to medicine the year around. "I will take my written national board next summer," he explained.

He has four years of medical school and then from two to five years of residency, depending upon what specialty he selects. He said he has not made any decision as to what field in which he will specialize, if any.

Salazar said he is impressed with Wayne and the friendliness of the people in the community. "I've made several friends in my short stay here. When I have time, I would like to come back for a visit."

## Medical Center Offers Service

Providence Medical Center will be in charge of preparing therapeutic meals for "Meals on Wheels."

Tama Krause, dietitian, said the modified meals will be prepared in the hospital's kitchen and delivered to the senior citizen for whom it was ordered by a physician.

## Earn Spot in State Show

## Hombres Horsemen Win District

Fifteen members of the Wayne County Hombres 4-H Horse club received a purple or blue ribbon at the District 4-H Horse show at Stanton Saturday, July 1, and will be eligible to go to the State 4-H

Area corn fields are being attacked by first brood corn borers and a depleted moisture supply is causing a hazard to not only corn, but alfalfa and oats as well, Spitze explained.

The area is about three and three-quarter inches short of moisture on an average scale and about seven inches behind last year at this time.

Spitze, who keeps a chart on moisture, said there was 1.09

inches of moisture recorded during the month of June. The average for the month is 4.82 for June.

The county extension agent said things looked good for June. The moisture was going into May. "We had built up a surplus during April. The moisture began to fade during May and we ended the month at about a

break even point."

The lack of moisture during June was the real turning point, according to Spitze. "The reserve we had built up is gone," Spitze said. "and now is the time when the crops are crying for moisture."

He said oats are hurting the most as they are turning fast and are at a critical stage. He

explained that the continued lack of moisture, high temperature and high winds will result in an "Oats Blast," a condition where the heads will not fill. Oats acreage in the county is down because of the wet weather during the regular planting season and because of government programs.

Spitze also said second cutting of alfalfa will be considerably lighter than the first cutting, primarily due to the lack of moisture.

The moisture from January of this year to June 30 has been 10.67 inches. The average is 14.22 inches.

Spitze said if the area doesn't receive a measurable amount of moisture soon, there will be serious problems. "We don't need just a shower, we need a good soaking rain," he stated.

Spitze said the corn yield could also be hindered by an infestation of corn borers. He said he has received reports of first brood corn borers at work now in area fields.

He said the first brood borers eat its way into the stalk of the corn plant, cutting down the nutrients which in turn will cut down the yield.

Spitze said farmers should make a check of their fields, taking at least ten plants thought to be infested from various parts of a field. He explained that if borers are found in 50 percent or more of the plants, the farmer should consider treatment.

The county agent said a granular insecticide is the most effective. "The granular gets into the whorl of the plant where the borers are working," Spitze explained.

Spitze said the treatment will do two things: it will kill the borers if it is applied effectively and it will prevent a large infestation of second brood corn borers which cause stalk break age and ear droppage. They appear usually in August.

The county agent said farmers who want to treat their fields should visit a county agent's office where he can pick up a booklet on insect control.

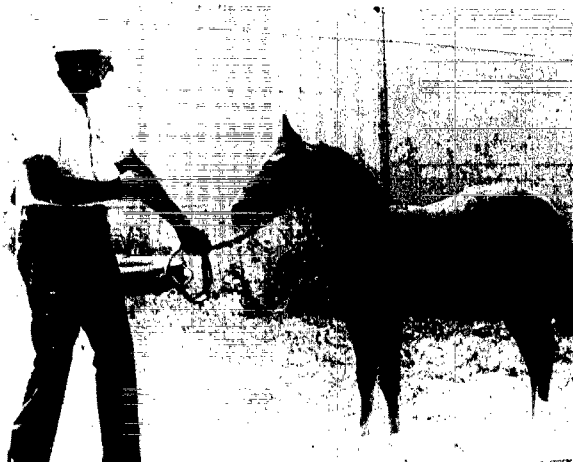

### Thistles Tough

It is too late to effectively eliminate flowering musk thistles with weed sprayers. Mowing and hand chopping are the only available alternatives, according to an Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources Extension weed specialist at the University of Nebraska Lincoln. Numerous, near solid stands have been observed in Nebraska pastures. John Furrer said some plants are over six feet tall; he added, and many are in late bud to bloom stage. Once the plant begins to develop the flower stalk, herbicides will not be effective. "If the plant begins to develop the flower stalk, herbicides will not be effective. If the plant is cut or sprayed after the stalk has blossomed, seed will be produced," he said. "However, mowing will reduce seed production, especially on late flowering plants."  
Single flowers may have more than 1,500 seeds, and the plants should be removed carefully by hand chopping. "Scattered plants should be removed from the field and burned," Furrer advised.  
The two-year plants received ample moisture last summer and have grown to "huge" proportions this spring.

**A LIVEABLE DIET**  
First your clothes shrink. Next, the scales seem to weigh heavier than they used to. Maybe it's time to face the real issue... there's too much of you!

Once you decide to go on a diet, the decisions aren't over. You have to choose which diet plan you're going to follow. Diet ads are tempting. Almost all promise a swift, easy, painless way to lose weight. But you may be playing a dangerous game with many of these crash diets. They often restrict your food choices to just a few and recommend cutting down on certain nutrients, like carbonyl drates or protein.

The wisest weight loss comes when only calories are limited. To get all the nutrients you need, eat a wide variety of foods. Read between the lines of magazine articles and paper back books that offer fat diets. See if they meet basic nutrition guidelines. Like servings from each of the four food groups each day. If they ignore the meat, milk, fruit and vegetable or bread and cereal, be careful.

Probably most important, ask yourself if the reducing plan helps you retrain poor eating habits. Some diets, help lose weight right away, then allow you to go back to the same old eating habits... and the bulges return.

Remember, those poor eating habits put on the pounds in the first place.

## Easy Chocolate Roll-Up

### Filling:

- 1/4 cup Oleo or Butter
- 1/2 cup chopped Pecans
- 1 cup flaked Coconut
- 1 (15 1/2 oz.) can Sweetened Condensed Milk

### Cake:

- 3 Eggs
- 1 cup Sugar
- One-third cup Cocoa
- Two-third cup Flour
- 1/4 teaspoon Salt
- 1/4 teaspoon Soda
- One-third cup Water
- 1 teaspoon Vanilla

Line a 10 x 15-inch jelly roll pan with foil. Melt the butter in the pan. Sprinkle nuts and coconut evenly over the butter and drizzle with condensed milk.

In a mixer bowl, beat the eggs at high speed 2 minutes until fluffy. Gradually add sugar, continuing to beat 2 minutes more. No need to sift the flour; spoon into cups and level. Add the rest of the ingredients; blend one minute at low speed.

Pour into the pan. Bake until the cake springs back when touched in the center, about 20 to 25 minutes.

While in the pan, sprinkle cake with powdered sugar. Cover with a tea towel; invert, remove the pan and foil. Starting with the 10-inch side, roll up jelly roll fashion using towel as an aid to keep the roll tight. Wrap in towel until cooled.

Slice and serve with a dab of whipped cream or a scoop of ice cream.

## Swiss Chicken Cutlet

- 5 Chicken Breasts, split, skinned and boned
- Salt
- 2 beaten Eggs
- 1 cup fine dry Bread Crumbs
- 1/4 cup Cooking Oil
- 3 tablespoons Butter
- 1/4 cup Flour
- 1/2 teaspoon Salt
- 1/8 teaspoon Pepper
- 2 1/2 cups Milk
- 1/2 cup Dry White Wine
- 1 cup shredded Process Swiss Cheese
- Avocado Slices
- Tomato Wedges

Place each chicken breast half between two pieces of waxed paper. Pound out to about 1/4-inch thickness with meat mallet. Sprinkle lightly with salt. Dip in beaten egg, then in bread crumbs.

In skillet, heat 2 tablespoons of the oil. Brown chicken cutlets, a few at a time, adding remaining oil as needed. Set chicken aside.

In saucepan, melt butter; blend in flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt and pepper. Add milk all at once. Cook and stir until thickened. Remove from heat and stir in wine. Pour about half of the sauce into the bottom of a 9 x 13 x 2-inch baking dish. Arrange chicken cutlets atop sauce. Top with remaining sauce. Cover and chill several hours.

Bake, covered, in a 350 degree oven until heated through. Sprinkle with cheese. Top with avocado and tomato. Return to oven for 2 minutes.

Whenever I serve this dish everyone wants the recipe.



**LEAF SCORCH**  
High temperatures with considerable wind are ideal conditions for a tree problem called leaf scorch.

The symptom resulting from this rapid loss of water is a burned or scorched appearance, usually beginning on the outer margins of the leaf and progressing inward. Yellowish-brown areas in the tissues between the veins are also evident. In severe cases, this area is killed and the leaf eventually becomes brittle and drops.

Other conditions can add to the severity of leaf scorch. Among these are shallow soils, confinement of the root system, roots which girdle the crown of the tree, drought, and a diseased root system. Trees planted near the south wall of a building may suffer due to the extreme exposure from the sun and reflection from the building.

**SUSCEPTIBLE TREES**  
Most trees are susceptible to leaf scorch. Ash, maple and oak are the most commonly involved species. Beech, dogwood, elm, horse, chestnut and linden are also highly susceptible to scorching. Firs, pines and spruces often show leaf scorch as a brown discoloration of the needle tips.

To minimize the amount of scorch, lightly fertilize trees that are low in vigor and keep the plants well watered. Recently transplanted trees should be watered faithfully during hot and dry periods.

**SUMMER SQUASH**  
Summer squash needs to be harvested from the vines every second or third day.

Many people prefer to harvest summer squash when the skin is soft and easily dented with the thumb nail. Varieties with elongated fruit, like zucchini, yellow crookneck and straightneck, should be harvested when they're two to three inches in diameter and up to six or eight inches long.

Summer squash will keep for about two weeks in the refrigerator at 32-40 degrees.

Be sure to harvest over-mature fruit if you want vines to keep producing.

**WINTER SQUASH**  
Don't confuse winter squash with summer squash. Winter squash is hard shelled, well colored, and doesn't mature as quickly in the garden. Most winter squash may take 80-115 days to mature. Depending on the variety, and on how early the frost occurs this fall, most varieties of winter squash wouldn't have time to mature.

Don't worry about blossoms on squash and other vine crops falling off without setting fruit. Many blossoms are male blossoms and wouldn't set fruit anyway.

## Probe Measures Water

A probe that uses neutrons to help measure moisture in soil is part of a series of experiments being conducted on the Dale Stollenberg farm near Corroll, according to extension agent, Don Spitzer.

The neutron probe works much the same as radar does in detecting weather. The probe is inserted into a buried aluminum tube. Neutrons are generated which bounce off moisture in the soil from which a moisture reading is taken.

This experiment, which is being carried on in conjunction with the Northeast experiment station, is part of the continuing experiments on irrigation in Wayne County conducted by the County Extension Service.

Spitzer says the probe will be used to verify the accuracy of the moisture blocks in the county.

## Still Time To Plant Beets

Table beets are garden vegetables that belong to the Chenopodiaceae or Goosefoot family. This group is supposedly so named because the leaf shape of many of its members resembles the footprint of a goose.

Sugar beets, an important Nebraska crop, Swiss chard and spinach are other food plants that belong to this family. Kochia and lambquarter, also goosefoots, are two of the state's most noxious weeds.

Beet roots usually are served boiled or buttered, pickled or in salads. They add color to meals. There is little color loss if they are not pared or cut before cooking. The weight-conscious person may be interested to know that table beets contain only about 35 calories per 100 grams. Beet tops also may be used as food and are prepared in the same manner as spinach.

## Swine Meetings Set For August 7 and 8

Addresses and discussion of swine disease, nutrition and management will be featured during the 19th annual George A. Young Conference on Advances in Swine Reproduction and the Nebraska SPF annual meeting scheduled in Lincoln Aug. 7-8.

The two-day combined program, scheduled for the Nebraska Center for Continuing Education at 3rd and Holdrege streets, is designed to update practitioners in veterinary and specific pathogen free swine producers, according to Dr. Thomas Socha, secretary-treasurer of the Nebraska SPF Swine Accrediting Agency.

Socha said there will be a \$37.50 registration fee for those attending both days, and a \$20 fee for those attending only the second day. The fee includes meals, except breakfast, on those respective days and a copy of the conference proceedings. Rooms are available at the Nebraska Center at additional cost, he said.

He urged those planning to attend the conference to pre-register.

## Soils Lacking In Nitrogen

Few Nebraska soils need phosphorus (potassium). Phosphorus may be lacking if it hasn't been used in the past. It does not leach out of the soil. If frequent or large applications of phosphorus or mixed fertilizer have been made, there usually is enough of this nutrient. Soils low in organic matter are frequently low in nitrogen. Nitrogen is readily leached by rainfall and watering, so yearly or more frequent applications may be needed for lawn grass, sweet corn and leafy vegetables with high nitrogen requirements.

## Heat Harms Hogs

People aren't the only ones who experience summer blazes as warmer, humid weather becomes the rule rather than the exception.

Hogs too can go through a "summer slump" as temperatures top 90 degrees. But there are several dietary changes and management practices that pork producers can implement to minimize the chances of decreased rates of gain and heat stress, according to two extension swine specialists at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

## Calving Difficulty Caused by Sex, Size

Calving difficulty in beef breed crosses is more likely if calves are heavy at birth. But effects of calf sex and breed-associated differences other than birth weight may be more important.

Of 1,591 crossbred calves studied at the U.S. Meat Animal Research Center in Clay Center, more than twice as many male calves as female calves required major assistance at delivery. Generally, the effects of sex on calving difficulty were even greater if the average level of difficult births in a breed group was higher.

Dr. Keith E. Gregory, geneticist of USDA's Science and Education Administration, found that differences in birth weight accounted for less than ten percent of the variation in calving difficulty observed in the mature cows used in the study. Anatomical or other differences in calves associated with breed of sire and dam therefore have important effects on level of calving difficulty, he says.

Calves in the study were sired by Hereford, Polled Hereford, Angus, Red Poll, Brown Swiss, Gelbvieh, Maline-Anjou and Chianina bulls and out of Hereford or Angus dams 4 to 9 years old. Calving difficulty and its association with birth weight are much greater in cows calving at two or three years of age. The calves were produced in Cycle II of the Germ Plasm Evaluation Program for evaluating biological types of cattle in breed crosses.

Major assistance was needed for delivery of 8.3 percent of the calves. Male calves averaged about 6 1/2 pounds heavier than female calves at birth, and each two pounds increase in birth weight was associated with about one percent increase in calving difficulty. Incidence of difficult births was greater in calves sired by bulls of target-type breeds.

In another study, similar but somewhat less pronounced influences on calving difficulty by calf sex and breed-related effects other than birth weight were noted.

were also seen in 1,601 calves born in Cycle III of the Germ Plasm Evaluation program. These calves were out of 4- to 11-year-old Hereford or Angus cows and were sired by Hereford, Polled Hereford, Angus, Brahman, Sahiwal, Pinzgauer and Tarantaise bulls.

Dr. Gregory says level of calving difficulty was almost twice as great in males as in female calves in Cycle III, and the effect of sex was greater with higher average levels of calving difficulty for sire breed groups. Considerable variation in incidence of difficult births remained among breed groups after effects of birth weight were removed in analysis of the data.

Dr. Gerald M. Smith, Dr. Danny B. Laster, Dr. Larry V. Cundiff, Dr. Robert M. Koch, and Dr. Henry A. Fitzhugh, Jr., were associated with Dr. Gregory in the studies, in cooperation with the University of Nebraska, Lincoln.

Mulching Helps In Many Ways

A covering of two to four inches of grass clippings, leaves or straw over the soil surface prevents most weed growth, keeps the surface soil moist and crumbly and lowers soil temperature as much as 10 degrees.

Crusting and erosion are deterred and the mulch provides a clean, dry surface on which fruits can rest. Where mulch touches moist soil, decay of organic matter will occur and form humus.
