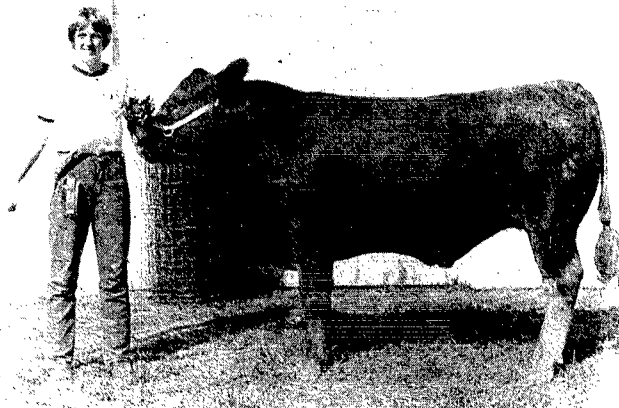

Concerns District 1

Approve School Merger

Members of the Wayne County and Thurston County School Reorganization Committee Wednesday voted to approve a petition to merge Wayne County School District 1 with Districts 25 and 60. The vote was taken after the petition was returned by the State Commission on School District Reorganization, Lincoln, with no action taken. The state commission confided the petition was in conflict with state statutes and decided to neither approve or disapprove the petition. District 1, which had one student last year, contracted with the Pender School district for the 1977-78 school year. According to state statute, the district must be merged with the contracting district. Loren Park, recently appointed to finish the term of County Superintendent Fred Ricker's, said the joint county committee acted on the advice of County Attorney Budd Bornhoff. Bornhoff said there was no conflict as District 1 had contracted with Pender and District 25 in Wayne County for the placement of four students during the 1976-77 school year. He said the committee was with in its rights to approve the

petition as the district had previously contracted with the districts to which it petitioned to be merged. The action taken by the joint committee was final except for validation of the signatures by the county superintendent. The district was split according to the wishes of the property owners, Park said. Following final validation, the

district will be dissolved and parcelled out according to the petition. The state commission disapproved a petition for merger of District 23 with District 57, 51, 5 and 23R in Wayne County and Districts 40 and 30 in Cuming County. Learning Disabilities

Teachers Learn from Students in Workshop

It's not often that students can be teachers and teachers can be students, but participants in a Wayne State College Specific Learning Disabilities (SLD) workshop are doing just that. Area elementary teachers are learning disabilities ranging from visual to motor to auditory discrimination problems, or a combination of these. Such learning problems cause millions of children nationwide to develop learning "gaps" when the disability has not been identified and they are taught by traditional methods.

"Given the proper teaching techniques, these youngsters, who are of average or above average intelligence, can learn and do very well," said Dorothy Ley, director of the participating practicum students. "The teachers here observe the SLD child's learning style. In a way I guess you could say the students are teaching the teachers." Mrs. Ley said the WSC workshop is designed to help elementary teachers become more effective in working with their regular classrooms and in identifying the SLD children for

special teaching. She said the program also presents teaching methods designed to maintain student interest in the classroom. Mrs. Ley explained the program is somewhat of a "catch-up" game for the children, whose levels of learning achievement are behind their learning potential. "These children may see, but they may twist letters around and see the word bag instead of dog," she said. "Or they may have difficulties in writing or coordinating their visual and

motor patterns. One child summed it up by saying 'my hand doesn't do what my head tells it to.'" The three and one-half week program provides individual instruction for the elementary students. Each classroom has six practicum students (one advanced) and a therapist to help between six and ten students. Over 70 elementary children and 66 practicum students (11 advanced) are participating in classrooms in Wayne and Norfolk. "We use the multi-sensory

approach to teaching new skills," Mrs. Ley said. "It involves the use of the eyes, ears and the sense of touch or muscle memory." "Muscle memory is the best there is," she added. "If you learn to ride a bike today, you will remember it two years from now even if you don't ride every day." Mrs. Ley said another teaching method used in the workshop is "instructional movement" from concrete to abstract examples, which help the student. See LEARN, Page 11

Reduced 30 Percent

Possible Rollback Of Property Tax

The State Board of Equalization tentatively voted 4-0 last Wednesday to reduce property tax valuations in 43 counties and to increase them in 14 others. If approved during meetings set for Aug. 1, 2 and 3, Wayne County property valuations will

be reduced 30 percent, according to Wayne County Assessor Doris Stipp. Mrs. Stipp said the reduction is due to the State Board of Equalization's decision to equalize all counties property valuations at 70 percent of value. She

said the board took this action because some counties (mainly Lancaster and Douglas) didn't get their valuations in by the required January, 1978 deadline. According to Mrs. Stipp there are good and bad points to the proposed equalization. She believes that it is more fair for all counties to have the same 70 percent valuation, and it will also be more fair for homeowners in the 65 years and over homestead bracket. Mrs. Stipp added that with the 30 percent decrease, and with the loss of valuation on personal property (farm machinery was not assessed this year), there might not be much of a tax break, because mill levies will probably be raised to meet the costs of running tax supported sub-divisions. The new ruling will also mean a lot of extra work for people in the assessor's office, for they will have more than 4,500 parcels of land to re-calculate. She explained the 30 percent reduction can't be given until the final word comes in after she and other county representatives testify in the early August meeting. "We were all in hopes they (state board) would raise every one up to our levels," Mrs. Stipp explained. "We find it like a slap in the face after being ridiculed for following the law."

Parent Aid Program Planned for County

A Parent Aid program, sponsored by the Multi-County Social Service unit, Norfolk, soon will begin helping parents in the Wayne County area who are having family problems. Harry Mead, unit director, said although the program is still in the formation stage, it is designed to assist parents who having problems with children or family financial problems through budgeting advice and counseling both parents and children. The program will also include those areas where problems are caused through suspected child abuse or neglect. The Parent Aid program was scheduled to begin Tuesday, Aug. 1, in Wayne, Cedar, Madison, Stanton, Pierce and Antelope Counties but will go into effect at a later date because the staff positions are not completely filled. When the program begins, the unit will have a coordinator and parent aids who are volunteer parents with certain qualifications. Mead said there are not any income requirements to be an aide, but persons should have five to ten free hours a week and be interested in developing a new friendship. He said that parent aids will receive training concerning use of community resources, dealing effectively with crises and forms of discipline. This information will be shared with parents during counseling.

Winside Residents Donate To Purchase CPR 'Anne'

Residents of the Winside community have been working together the past few months to collect enough money to purchase an Anatomic Anne.

Anatomic Anne is a lifelike doll which is used to aid citizens in learning lifesaving techniques through cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) classes.

Mrs. Charles Jackson, one of Winside's residents responsible for bringing the CPR program to the community, said it was difficult to obtain an Anatomic Anne each time classes were held in the community.

To solve the problem, one of the community's residents loaned the money to purchase an Anatomic Anne so classes could be continued without interruption.

However, the money, which amounts to \$252.65, must be paid back. Residents have already reached in their pockets and donated \$50 toward the purchase. Mrs. Jackson said donations still are appreciated and can be left at Miller's Market in Winside or with her.

The CPR program has successfully ended its first year in Winside, said Mrs. Jackson. To date, 150 persons in the community are certified to use the lifesaving technique.

Instructors have been Miron and Louise Jenness and Gary West of Wayne, and Mrs. Melvin Meierhenry of Winside. They have trained junior and senior high school students, housewives and farmers, rescue unit and

fire department personnel, members of the school faculty, and business persons.

"The response has been great and we hope it continues," said Mrs. Jackson.

Another class in Winside is scheduled to be held Oct. 9, 16,

and 23. Persons interested in taking the class are asked to contact Mrs. Jackson at 284-4544 for registration. Cost of the course is \$1.50 to help pay for materials. Classes during each of those nights run for three hours.

The club will not meet in August. Next meeting will be a 6:30 dinner meeting on Sept. 26 at Les'.

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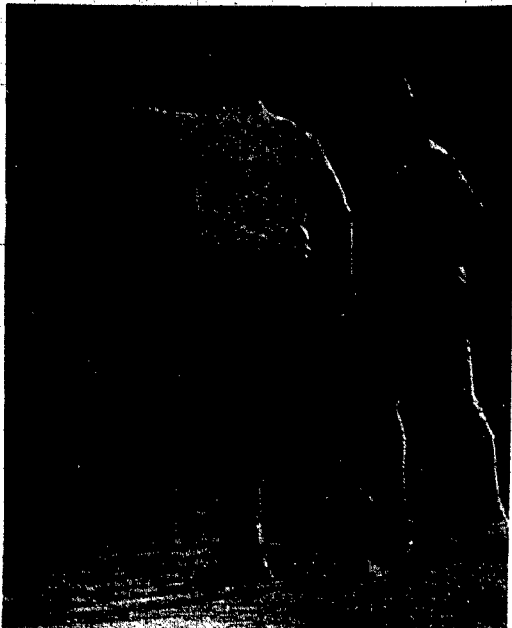

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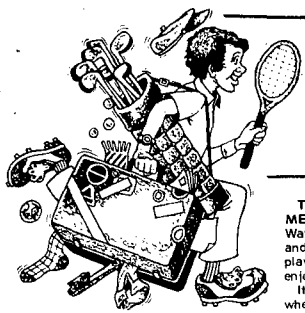

In northeast Nebraska, both games will be broadcast on WJAG in Norfolk.

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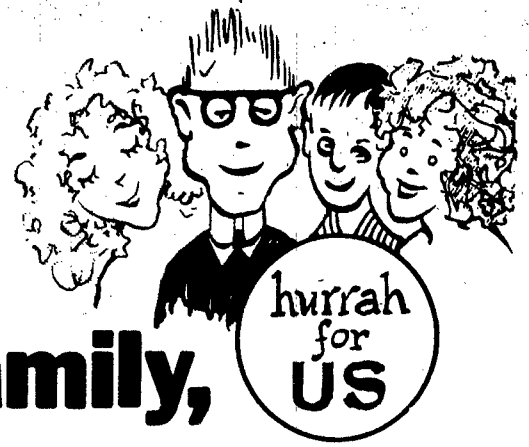
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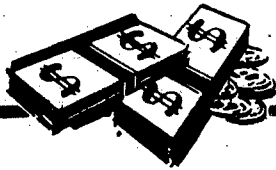
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Plant Fall Gardens Now

When the earlier harvested crops have been removed, best fall garden results will be obtained by preparing the soil and allowing it to settle for a while.

Stan Starling, Dixon County Extension Agent, says seeds do not usually germinate as well in fall gardens so special care is needed.

According to Starling, opening deep rows and planting slightly deeper than in spring will help put seeds where the moisture is. Planting after a rain or supplemental watering will usually be necessary, he adds.

Soaking the seeds overnight before planting also will help, says Starling. Loose soil results in dryness and poor germination, so press soil firmly around seed but not to the point of packing the soil, he advises.

Sow the seeds thickly, then thin to proper spacing when plants are established. Using shallow cultivation to avoid drying the soil and adding a light mulch are other aids.

Most fall vegetables are cool season crops grown for their foliage or roots. Snap beans, summer squash, and cucumbers are exceptions since they grow quickly and will mature before cool weather. Most fall vegetables are quick growing and ready for harvest four to nine weeks after sowing.

Suggested crops and planting dates are: Carrots (July 20-Aug. 5); Snap Beans (July 15-Aug. 5); Turnip (July 20-Aug. 15); Chinese Cabbage (July 25-Aug. 20); Lettuce (July 25-Aug. 5); Radishes (July 30-Aug. 20); Table Beets (Aug. 1-10); Mustard (Aug. 1-25); Swiss Chard (Aug. 1-20); Spinach (Aug. 20-Sept. 15).

For a list of the best varieties of each crop for fall gardens, Starling suggests contacting the County Extension Office and asking for the Horticulture Nebguide G-74-179, entitled "Fall Vegetable Gardens."

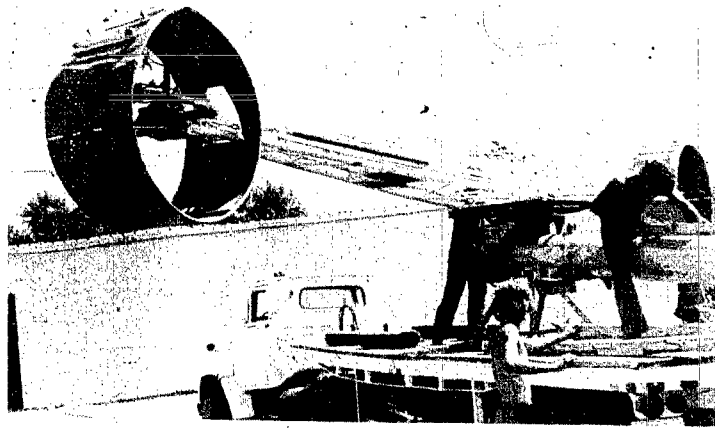

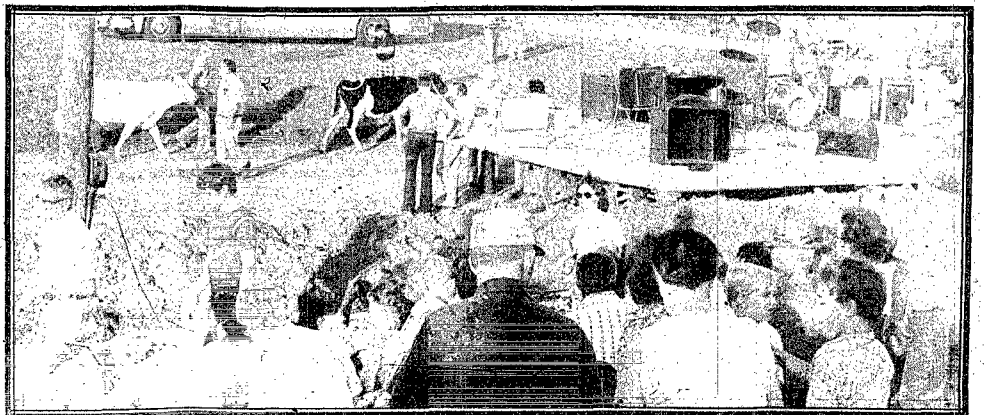

dents "learn by doing."
"An example would be in dealing with money," she said. "We deal with real coins before moving to the abstract problems in a workbook."
Lavan Maciejewski, a learning disabilities therapist in the Wayne workshop, said the teaching methods taught in the course will help participating teachers meet the needs of both their regular and SLD students next fall.

"The children in this program are not always slower," she said. "Many times they just have a different way of learning. They have average or above-

average IQ's, but normal teaching methods do not reach them. Here we try to teach the practicing teachers new methods which will help their regular students also."
Jan Pohlman, a returning observer in the workshop, said the WSC program helped her not only in teaching SLD students, but in teaching other classroom teachers as well.
"I think it is just fantastic," she said. "I have been asked to give similar workshops in Illinois, but we could not begin to give a program as good as the one here. It is just great for both the students and the teacher because both benefit from it."

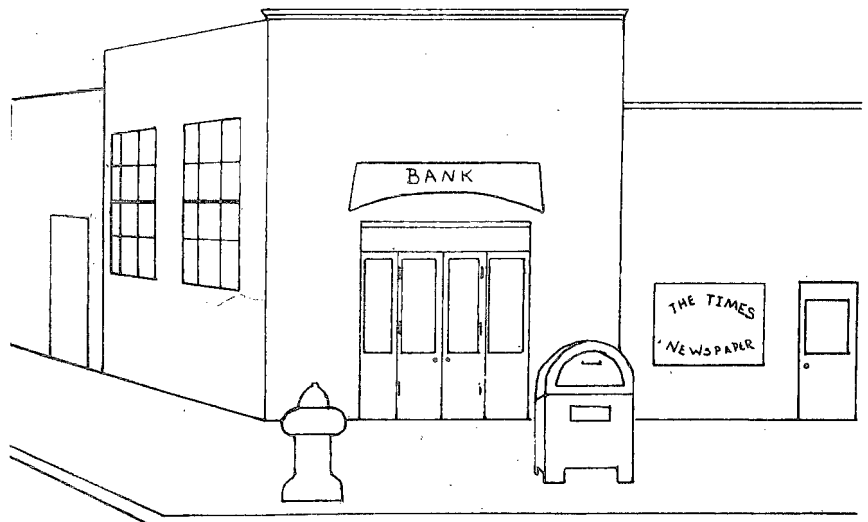

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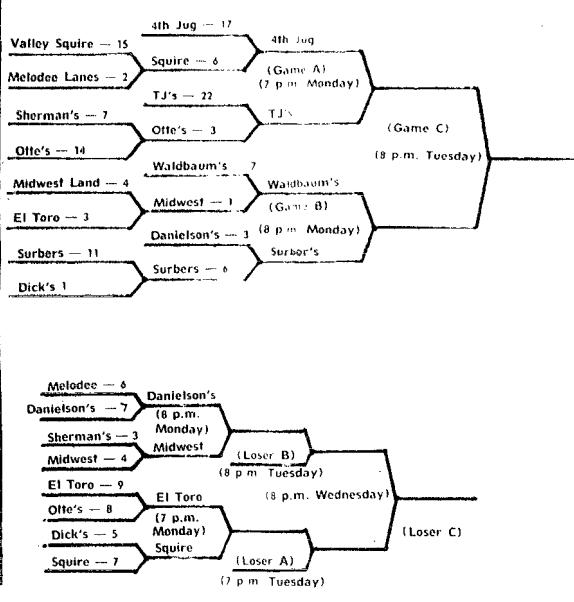
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
