

Approve School Merger

Members of the Wayne County and Thurston County School Reorganization Committee Wednesday voted to approve a petition to merge Wayne County School District 1 with Districts 3 and 60.

The vote was taken after the petition was returned by the State Commission on School District Reorganization, Lincoin, with no action taken.

The state commission confiended the petition was in conflict with state statutes and decided to neither approve or disapprove the petition.

District 1, which had one student Jast year, contracted with the Pender School district for the 1977-78 school year.

According to state statute, the district must the merged with the contracting district.

Loren Park, recently appointed to finish the term of County Super intendent Fred Ricker's, sald the joint county committee

Superintendent Fred Ricker's, said the joint county committee acted on the advice of County Attorney Budd Bornhoft. —
Bornhoff said there was no conflict as District 1 had contracted with Pender and District 25 in Wayne County for the placement of four students during the 1976-77 school year. He said the committee was within its rights to approve the

petition as the district had pre-viously contracted with the dis-tricts to which it petitioned to be merged.

The action taken by the joint committee was final except for validation of the signatures by the county superintendent.
The district was split according to the wishes of the property owners. Park said.
Following final validation, the

district will be dissolved and parcelled out according to the petition.

Parent Aid Program

Planned for County

A Parent Aid program, sponsored by the Multi-County Social Service unit, Norfolk, soon will begin helping parents in the Wayne County area who are having family problems. Harry Mead, unit director, said although the program is still in the formation stage, it is designed to assist parents who having problems with children or family financial problems through budgeting advice and counseling both parents and children. The program will also include those areas where problems are caused through suspected child abuse or neglect.

The Parent Aid program was scheduled to begin Tuesday, Aug 1, in Wayne, Cedar, Madison, Stanton, Pierce and Antelope Counties but will go into effect at a later date because the staff positions are not completely filted.

When the program begins, the unit will have a coordinator and parent aids who are volunteer parents with contain qualifications.

Mead said there are not any income requirements to be an aide, but persons should have from five to ten free hours a week and be interested in developing a new friendship. He said that parent aids, will receive training concerning use of community resources, dealing effectively with crises and forms of discipline. Learning Disabilities

Teachers Learn from Students in Workshop

It's not often that students can be feachers and feachers can be students, but participants in a Wayne State College Specific Learning Disabilities (SLD) workshop are doing just that.

workshop are doing just that. Area elementary teachers are learning disabilities ranging from visual to motor to auditoridiscriminatino problems, or a combination of these. Such learning problems cause millions of children nationwide to develop learning "gaps" when the disability has not been identified and they are taught by traditional methods

techniques, these youngsters, who are of average or above average intelligence, can learn and do very well," said Dorothy Ley, director of the participating practicum students. "The teachers here observe the SLO child's learning style, in a way 1 guess you could say the students are teaching the teachers." Mrs. Ley said the WSC workshop is designed to help elementary teachers become more effective in working with their regular classrooms, and in iden lifying the SLD children for

special teaching. She said the program also presents teaching methods designed to maintain student interest in the class-room.

Mrs. Ley explained the program is somewhat of a "catchup" arms.

motor patterns. One child summed it up by saying 'my hand deesn't do what my head elis it to."

Phineas W. Hitchcock

Although the political career of Phineas W. Hitchcock does not attract the attention accorded that of his son. Gilbert, his important contributions to the development of the state are well documented in the library of the Nebraska State Historical Society. In 1871 he was elevated to the United States Senate at the age of 40 after a long career of public service. Both his election in 1873 and his defection 1877 had vast repercussions within the

state. Phineas W. Hitchcock was born in New Lebanon, New York on Nov. 30, 1831. He was graduated from Willlams College (Massachuseths) in 1855 with a degree in law. For a time he remained in New York state, however, in 1857 he settled in Omaha, at that time merely a village on the Missouri River. In 1853 he married Ann Monell, daughter of another pioneer hebraskan from New York. He established a law practice and entered local politics thereafter.

In 1860 Hitchcock was a delegate to the Republican convention which nominated Abraham Lincoln for President. After holding several state offices he was elected as a delegate of the Nebraska Territory in Congress in 1864.

The election of 1871 was characterized by a bitter spit in the Republican Party and intense emotions on all sides. In the 1870's senatorial candidates were chosen by the State Legislature. Vigorous personal campaigning and innumerable debates in smoke-filled rooms were common, especially in Lincoln. Hitchcock was elected by a coalition of Democratis, who preferred him, and by Republicans who did not support heir incumbent candidate, John M. Thayer.

While in the Senate Hitchcock authored the Timber Culture Act, which granted her Timber Culture Act, which granted the T




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

Stan Starling, Dixon County Extension Agent, says seeds do not usually germi-nate as well in fall gardens so special care is needed.

According to Starting, opening deep rows and planting slightly deeper than in spring will help put seeds where the moisture is. Planting after a rain or supplemental watering witi usually be necessary, he adds.

Soaking the seeds overnight before planting also will help, says Starling. Loose soil results in dryness and porgermination, so press soil firmly around seed but not to the point of packing the soil, he advises.

Sow the seeds thickly, then thin to proper spacing when plants are established. Using shallow cultivation to avoid drying the soil and adding a light mulch are other aids.

Most fall vegetables are cool season crops grown for their foliage or roots. Snap beans, summer squash, and cucumbers are exceptions since they grow quickly and will mature before cool weather. Most fall vegetables are quick growing and ready for harvest four to nine weeks after sowing.
