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Little Contamination

Pesticide Poisoning Study Made

Some 17 farmers and commercial applicators from the Wayne land area were among 98 participants in a recent pesticide study. Participating in the study was limited to persons who applied organophosphates and/or carbamate type insecticides during this year's planting season. Each participant was asked to submit two blood samples — the

first prior to applying insecticides; the second with 48 hours after discontinuing insecticide use. The two samples were compared to determine the degree of insecticide contamination in each of the study participants. According to the data compiled, a majority (70 percent) of the individuals were either un-contaminated or had only minor insecticide contamination during

the planting season. Approximately 20 percent suffered significant contamination and only 10 percent were shown to be seriously contaminated. No study participant was contaminated to the degree that would put his health in immediate danger. Only four participants reported more than mild symptoms consistent with insecticide poisoning.

Dr. Robert Spiegel, assistant professor of pharmacy, explained organophosphate and carbamate insecticides were developed during World War II for chemical warfare. They are used extensively by Nebraska farmers, many of whom have undergone special training. Although organophosphates and carbamates present less of an

ecological danger than other types of insecticides, they are a greater health risk to man in causing gastro-intestinal and respiratory disorders and reducing the level of a blood enzyme, called acetylcholinesterase, which is necessary for the proper function of the nervous systems. Dr. Spiegel explained. It was this enzyme, he explained, which acted as the yardstick in determining the degree of contamination among the volunteers.

By taking blood samples from volunteers in April before the spraying season and comparing the levels of the enzyme with a second set of samples taken by area health professionals within 48 hours after the spraying was completed, Dr. Spiegel and colleagues were able to determine who was contaminated from the amount the enzyme had decreased.

If a volunteer's acetylcholinesterase level in the second sample fell below 70 percent of that in the first, he was classified as being seriously contaminated, he said.

"We sent letters to those who we found to have serious contamination and advised them to avoid further insecticide use until their degree of contamination declines, which usually takes about four to six weeks," Dr. Spiegel said.

For some of the seven commercial pesticide applicators in the study who suffered a higher degree of contamination than the farmers (although their low number and greater exposure to insecticides compared with farmers prevented any conclusive evidence to be drawn from the group), federal guidelines make their abstinence from insecticide use mandatory.

As a follow-up to the study, another is planned next year in the same seven counties, plus another six, with the help of the counties' extension agents, who procured this year's volunteers, and area health professionals. See STUDY, page 7

A Little Bit Old to Eat Though

THIS 70,000-YEAR OLD FOSSIL of a tarpon fish was "caught" by Charles Jerman, Bloomfield, Jerman, uncle of the Liska brothers, found the fossil while doing some real fishing on Lewis and Clark Lake. 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Area Telephone Rates Increased

Mother Bell will dip into area customers' pockets beginning Tuesday as Northwestern Bell officials announced new telephone service rates. The Nebraska Public Service commission last week approved a schedule of new telephone rates for Northwestern Bell customers on the Wayne and Winslow exchanges. The rates will become effective Tuesday. The new schedule will represent a five percent increase. For customers in Wayne, the in-

crease for a single party residence line will be 30 cents per month. The increase for the same service in Winslow will be 20 cents per month. Business telephone lines will increase seven percent in both Wayne and Winslow. A single party business line in Wayne will increase to \$15.55 per month. The increase in Winslow will be \$10.45. PBX, Key, Centrex and Rotary Hunt business services will

increase 10 percent and private line business service will increase 33 percent. The rate increases are the result of the Nebraska Public Service commission's order authorizing Northwestern Bell to earn an additional \$4.9 million. Rate for long distance calls will not be changed. The last telephone rate increase was in April, 1976, when residential rates were raised 15 cents and business rates were raised 40 cents.



House Damaged

THIS HOUSE in Waterbury received extensive smoke and water damage Wednesday afternoon as firemen from Allen worked for nearly four hours to put out a fire. The house belongs to Marvin Dierkins, Ponca, but was being rented by the Steven Florkes, who had moved from South Sioux City. The Florkes were not at home when the fire started and the alarm was turned in by a neighbor Mary Vanstrom. Allen Fire Chief Allen Kjer said the fire possibly could have been started by propane gas leading to the furnace which had just been turned on.

Tax Rollback Is 'Headache'

The recent tax rollback is proving to be a headache for the county assessor's office.

Wayne County Clerk Norris Weible said the county assessor's office is re-working all valuations recently completed, to comply with a 30 percent rollback ordered by the State Board of Equalization.

Weible said a public hearing on the county budget, which includes budgets from all the

taxing agencies, probably will be held Aug. 29.

Weible said the mill levy, which is set by the county commissioner's, will be just about the same as last year, "or a little higher." The mill levy last year was 12.43. The maximum levy is 14.285, he pointed out.

He explained the commissioners will try to "hold the line" on the mill levy but be-

cause of changing horses in midstream by the state board, the exact levy cannot be determined at the present time.

The anticipated mill levy was expected to be considerably lower this taxing year because of increased valuations. However, the rollback to equalize valuations statewide will cause the levies to be increased because of the lower valuations.

Pheasant, Quail Numbers Up

Nebraska's pheasant population is substantially higher than last year's, and quail numbers show a modest increase, according to surveys compiled recently by Game and Parks Commission wildlife biologists.

The pheasant population shows a 46 percent increase over last year, according to observations made by the state's rural mail carriers the last two weeks in July. Each year, the carriers count pheasants and other wildlife they observe on their rounds, and the information has proven a very reliable indicator of ringneck populations.

The mail carriers' data for this year showed the Panhandle pheasant population up 19 percent, the Southwest 45 percent higher, central Nebraska up 46 percent, the Northwest up 43 percent, southeast Nebraska up 37 percent, and the Sandhills up 148 percent.

Ken Johnson, chief of the Commission's Game Division, noted that the apparent dramatic increase in the Sandhills does not really involve very many birds because of the area's limited habitat.

The quail picture is considerably brighter in most parts of the state than the 4 percent increase shown in surveys by game biologists would indicate. A drop of 28 percent in the

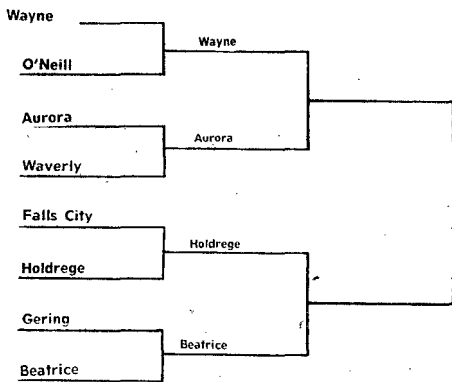

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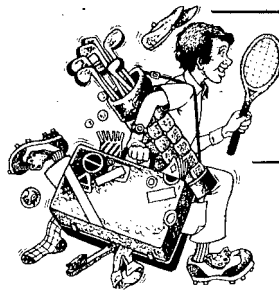
BEING CONGRATULATED after hitting a solo homer, Ray Nelson steps on the plate to make things official.

THE CENTRAL STATES intercollegiate Conference, in preparation for this year's football season will conduct a football press conference Monday, Aug. 14 in Omaha.

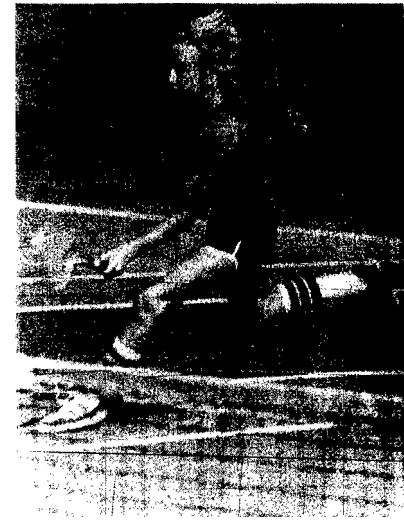

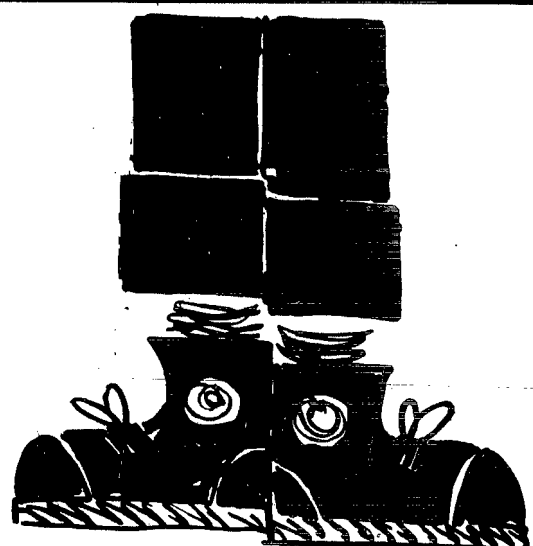
Republican River area offset rice gains made in the rest of the state. The quail population is 17 percent higher than last year in northeast Nebraska, the South-east is up 9 percent, east central Nebraska is 15 percent above last year, the north central area is 3 percent higher, and the Platte Valley from Grand Island on west is up 11 percent. "Actually, the quail picture is pretty bright, even in the Republican area," Johnson said. "Last year, that area experienced a phenomenal increase of 93 percent. Thus, anything short of that this year would show up as a loss by comparison. When we look at this year's Republican data compared to a more normal year, like 1976, the quail population there shows a 38 percent increase," he said. Good weather throughout the nesting season and a winter free of widespread major blizzards are the major factors involved in the increase of gamebird populations, according to Johnson.

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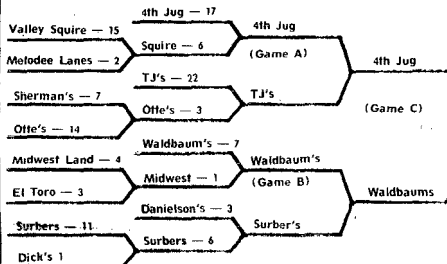


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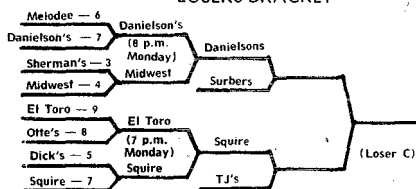
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
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
