ecological danger than other types of insecticides, they are a greater health risk to man in causing gastro-intestinal and respiratory disorders and reducting the level of a blood enzyme, called a cetyl chol inester a se, which is necessary for the proper function of the nervous systems. Dr. Spiegel explained. It was this enzyme, he explained, which a ched as the yardstick in determining the degree of contamination among the volunteers. By taking blood samples from volunteers in April before the spraying season and comparing the levels of the enzyme with a second set of samples taken by area health professionals within & hours after the spraying was completed, Dr. Spigel and colleagues were able to determine who was contaminated from the amount the enzyme had decreased.

who was contaminated from the amount the enzyme had decreased. If a volunteer's acetylcholine-sterase level in the second sample fell below 70 per cent of that in the first, he was classified as being seriously contaminated, he said.

"We sent letters to those who we found to have serious contamination and advised hem to avoid further insecticide use until their degree of contamination declines, which usually takes about tour to six weeks." Dr. Spiegel said.
For some of the seven commercial pesticide applicators in the study who suffered a phigher degree of contamination than the farmers (although their low number and greater exposure to insecticides compared withfarmers prevented any conclusive evidence to be drawn from the group). Tederal guidelines make their abstinence from insecticide use mandatory.

Cattle feeders have operated in a loss situation during most of the last 4 years and these are, the first profits of significance for many months.

"With rising prices for feeder cattle, profits on cattle placed in April, Profits of cattle placed in April, Proce and Prover S55 per 100 pounds in October to return

the same margin of profit as those sold in April. If feeder cattle prices and feeder costs continue to rise as expected, Choice steer prices in excess of \$55 will be required after October just to cover

steer prices in excess of \$55 will be required after October just to cover costs."

Note particularly the stattement by the analysts that Choice steers would have to stell for over \$55 per 100 pounds in October. This information was compiled well before the President made his announcement concerning increased beef imports and thus was surely available to him and certainty was in the hands of Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland.
