First in the State

Although the 6,000 square foot food center is not completely finished. It opens for business tonight (Monday). This nearly doubles the size of the old store. And with the opening came the advent of computer check-out lanes to Wayne and the State of Nebraska.

The new check-out lanes are prime examples of efficiency plus. They utilize a scanner, a computer and a detailed print-out of the item's purchased...and the date and time they were purchased.

The NRC In-Store Controller system called "Cecil," utilized those stripes on merchandise which customers have been wondering about for the past year. They are called Universal Product Code Symbol (UPC). They contain the manufacturer's code, product and price code.

The prices of all the items are entered into a central computer which is located in the basement of the new facility. The UPC label on the Item is read by a light beam in the scanner when the Item is checked out. The information is received from the computer and transferred to the cash register and receipt instantly. Items which are weighed, such as meal and produce, are checked out by the cashier.

The receipt given to the shopper is a detailed accurate record of each item.

Al Wittig, owner of the modern, new food cent explained the new check-out service will save both the and money for the customer because of its efficiency."

"Each of the computerized checking Janes will take the place of three conventional lanes," Wittig explained. He said becuse of this efficiency, more groceries can be processed through a check-out stand during a business day, resulting in a larger volume of business which, in turn, allows for a reduction in prices.

"With our check-out machines which we used In-In-our old store, we could work about \$250 worth of groceries an hour." Withig explained. "With the electronic system, we will be able in handle about \$750 an hour."

Wittig said the convenience to the shopper in time saved while being check out, also was an important factor in deciding to install the electronic check-out lanes.

"We feel we are providing customer service with this new system because if not only allows us to do more business and thereby reduce, prices, but it gives the consumer an accurate record of items purchases and the price of each item." Wittig explained.

The in-store computer has more than a lood items stored in its memory bank. The computer can be put into manuel mode for in-store programming to add new items and to make price changes.

Wittig explained there will be a conventional check-out lane as well as the three electronic lanes.

Computerized shopping is just one of many unique characteristics to be bound in the new store.

Wittig hopes to have a grand opening in the very near future so customers can see for themselves, the many long-values.

"In the meantime, come in and meet Cecil," Wittig said.

# Second Brood of Borers May Attack Corn Fields

Wayneland farmers should check their corn fields for infestations of second generation corn borers.

John Witkowski, Northeast Station Extension entomologist, said late-planted, hall damaged or long-maturity corn is particularily susceptible to the second generation borers.

He said a survey Thursday revealed the corn borer larvae is hatching and there is a possibility of an infestation.


He pointed out the mature moths have laid their eggs and new corn borers are being



One of the strangest accounts of an air-ship published during this period is contained in a letter by a certain Anton Pallardy. The letter (reprinted in the March S, 1897, Weekly Arbor State of Wymore from an earlier issue of the Beatrice Woman's Weekly Gazette! claimed that its author and to other men had built an airship in the Badlands northwest of the state and were presently testing the machine, which was fanctifully described, in the Nebraska-Kansas area. Pallardy stated:

# Nebraska's 'airship' -1897

"With my three companions we have sailed over Nebraska in a line from the forks of the Platte, along the Little Blue Valley and thence to Manhattani, Kanasa, generally at night, returning to the Mauvais Terres (Badlands) in the early mornings. It is but a six hours trip from the Mauvais Terres to the junction of the Blue with the Kansas River, it was necessary that we should become familiar with the earth's configurations lying under our aerial track. Hence I am in your city (Beatrice) to make some necessary investigations, in order that we may obtain a title to the route over which we propose to operate our ship.

may obtain a title to the route over which we propose to operate our ship. "For prudential reasons I dare not describe our ship in dealth of you. Those who have seen It, know its general appearance to be something fike a very large umbrella with a transparent covering. This large umbrella is immediately above the car, which also contains the little motor for operating the large wings immediately above the umbrella. These wings are expanded and contracted at the pleasure of the engineer. Suspended above and attached to these wings are two. . . ballons containing the new gas, hellum. Immediately between the wings

is another smaller umbrella-like affair that can be made to revolve very rapidly, for a purpose I dare not disclose to

"I have shown you why we travel at night; simply to escape too close observation, until we have made a few further improvements that we see are necessary to the successful and formal public trial of our air ship. 

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

Sugar could be listed, for example, as either the added sugar content, or the total sugar content. Since many foods content, since many foods content sugars, the added sugar content method would exempt naturally sweet foods like orange juice and raisins, from being labeted. This method would, however, raise problems of enforcement since laboratory analysis can't distinguish between added sugars and those occurring naturally.

Labeling sugar in grams per 100 grams would also create problems since factors like water content affect the value, making comparisons difficult. For, example, the percentage of sugar in a powdered soft drink mix is considerably higher than the percentage of sugar in a figuid, although the amount of sugar per serving may be the same.

There are numerous problems in deciding whether or not to label sugar per serving may be the same.



### Croplands Diminish

Atthough approximately 17.5
million acres of potential crop
fand are available for future use
in the northern Great Plans —
Kansas, Nebraska, North and
South Dakola the nation's crop
land base has declaned by 11
million acres over the past sight
years, according to an Institute
of Agriculture and Natural
Resources specialist
A recent survey conducted by
the Soil Conservation Service,
bas revealed that there are 12
million acres of high and 5.5
million

Although land is available for conversion to farmland in the northern Great Plains region, the nation's cropland base de-clined from 41 million acres to 400 million acres over the past

cimed from 431 million acres to a00 million acres over the past eight years. However, since the cropland base has declined, "the average quality of the nation's cropland has been improving because the poorest land has been relired," Harlan explained. But another five million acres of marginal land should be retired. he said. Retired poor and marginal acreage can be replaced by the 111 million acres available throughout the nation for conversion—including the 17.5 million acres located in the northern Great Plains region. However, only 349 million of the 11 million convertible acres can be converted without the application of significant conservation practices, he said.

Of the 17.5 million convertible acres in the northern Great Plains region, 13 million acres will require wind and water errosion protection if converted to farmland, he said. "Basically, erosion is our biggest limiting

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
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
