Transfer Station Open to Public

A chain across the Wayne city landfill Saturday marked the end of that operation and the start of another as the Wayne solid waste transfer station opened to the public today (Monday).

Vern Schultz, street commissioner and coordinator of the new station, said area residents

can refer to a new city ordinance (No. 913) published in the Wayne Herald for complete details concerning the station.

The solid waste brought to the new plant will be compacted

into containers and the contract carried to a landfill near Norfolk.

Leonard Schwanke will be the city official in charge of the new plant. Other city employees

have been trained to operate the plant.

Schultz said the first month will be used to work out the "bugs" in the operation. "The hours and charges will be the

things most difficult for those using the station to remember."

The charges at the transfer station are outlined in the ordinance and basically are figured See OPEN, Page 10

'Shorings' are in Place For New 'Mineshaft Mall'

The "shorings" are in place for the "Mineshaft Mall," now under construction in the former Coryell Chevrolet-Oldsmobile dealership on Second Street in downtown Wayne.

Roy Coryell, the man behind the spade for the new facility, which is expected to house some 12 to 15 different small businesses.

One business, the Joint, has been located in the building for the past two years, Coryell explained, but they also plan to spruce up their shop when the mall opens for business.

Coryell couldn't give a definite time table for when the facility would be open. "We're going to do the engineering on the heating and cooling next week. I would expect we would be able to handle a few businesses in a couple of months, if things go well."

Coryell has been thinking about the mall for about three years and has been actively engaged in bringing it to reality for the past year.

"We have been doing a lot of cleaning out and remodeling areas in the former shop such as the wash rack," Coryell explained. He said it has been time-consuming but now things are beginning to roll.

He said he has been contacted by several persons interested in locating in the new mall. The types of businesses include: arts and crafts, shoe repair and leather goods, a grocery, sporting goods, under 12 children's clothes, radio shack and martiniizing dry cleaning.

"We are going to be selective as to what

businesses we will allow to locate in the mall," Coryell explained. "We will be working with area banks when we deal with the individuals. We are going to be a little 'picky.'"

Coryell said he will build the space to accommodate the business and will furnish the heating and cooling. "The individual businesses will be responsible for the decor and arrangement of their stores." He said the stores will be leased.

The former Wayne businessman said because of the central location, it will be fairly inexpensive for a new business to open up in the mall. "We will provide them with storage as well as the heating and cooling."

In reference to the heating and cooling, Coryell is working with engineers to adapt the old steam boiler to the new mall. "We hope to work out something using solar energy but that is down the road a ways."

The mall will be on two levels and will have about 14,000 square feet. It will have a central aisle with drinking facilities and restrooms, plus a central area which will be marked by a colorful skylight.

"We also hope to have a game room for the kids and a small lunch shop with specialties such as ice cream and candies," Coryell explained.

Coryell explained the purpose of the mall is to bring new businesses to Wayne and to provide a service to area customers. "We believe there is a place for the mall and that it can work hand-in-hand with existing See MALL, Page 10

Highway Information Meeting Here

Residents of the 15 counties in Highway Engineering District III, Tuesday, Sept. 27, will have an opportunity to express their opinions on the state's highway construction and improvement plans.

The meeting will be held in the Wayne City auditorium beginning at 7:30 p.m. with Highway Commissioner Merle Kingsbury as chairman.

Personnel from the Nebraska Department of Roads, a member of the State Highway Commission and a representative of the Legislature's Transportation Advisory Committee will host the highway information meeting.

Counties other than Wayne include Knox, Antelope, Cedar, Dixon, Dakota, Thurston, Madison, Stanton, Cuming, Burt, Colfax, Platte, Boone and Pierce.

We hope that both residents and public officials will attend this meeting and give us their views on the current highway program. We will describe Nebraska's highway plans for fiscal years 1979-1984 and encourage questions from the audience." State Roads Director

David O. Coolidge, said. The District III meeting is one of eight district informational meetings scheduled for September and October.

One major item in the proposed improvement plan is the resurfacing of highway 15 north of Wayne and the resurfacing of highway 35 from Hoskins west to Norfolk.

Bachelor of Science Degree WSC Part of New Nursing Program

A Bachelor of Science in Nursing Degree for Registered Nurses has been established in Northeast Nebraska, according to an agreement signed recently by the President of Wayne State College, Northeast Technical

Community College, the University of Nebraska, and the Chancellor of the University of Nebraska Medical Center.

Wayne State College and Northeast Technical Community College will provide non-nursing

courses, while the University of Nebraska Medical Center's College of Nursing will be responsible for presenting nursing and other specialized classes.

This cooperative endeavor, in which the NEWUS Project

(Wayne State College, Northeast Technical Community College, University of Nebraska, State Department of Education) served in a liaison capacity, will allow a registered nurse to earn See WSC, Page 10

Four Receive NPPD Payments

Four communities in the Wayne area are included among some 225 Nebraska cities and towns who have realized \$2,076,490.93 as a result of agreements leasing their electrical distribution systems to the Nebraska Public Power District (NPPD).

Vince E. Rossiter, Hartington, member of the NPPD board of directors, said the four communities are Hoskins, Allen, Concord and Dixon.

Hoskins will receive \$2,995.55; Allen will receive \$4,131.46; Concord will receive \$1,441.12 and Dixon will receive \$1,038.80.

The payment represents one-half of the annual payments made by NPPD under terms of the lease agreements. The payments were made for the first half of 1978. The money may be used by the communities any way it determines, Rossiter explained.

NPPD operates the electrical systems and makes all additions and improvements to the property to maintain efficient service. See NPPD, Page 10

Enuf is Enuf; Post Reward

A third tree in Wayne's downtown improvement project was broken off and destroyed Thursday night. Four Wayne businesses have contributed \$50 each to a fund establishing a reward for information leading to the arrest of person or persons vandalizing the trees.

County attorney Budd Bornhoff cited Nebraska statute for the reporter and declared that the offense is punishable by a fine of "not more than \$100 or less than \$5 plus double the damages." Downtown improvements chairman Roger Nelson judged the value of the trees and labor for planting and care at not less than \$50 each.

Contributors to the fund remain anonymous. Anyone wishing to contribute to the reward may do so by contacting the Wayne Herald.

Persons with information about the vandalism should contact the Wayne city police. The reward now stands at \$200.

Wayne Community Chest Kickoff Set for Sept. 25

A kickoff breakfast for the 1978 Wayne Community Chest drive will be held Monday, Sept. 25, according to an announcement this week by Chest Chairman Bill Dickey.

Working together

Enrollment at Wayne State College this year is up over that of last year. And school officials, in cooperation with the Wayne Chamber of Commerce, are implementing programs to keep the enrollment up despite predictions of a declining enrollment during the next three to four years.

A committee of Wayne Chamber of Commerce members, representing a wide spectrum of community life and business, are working with the college to put together a program that will tell the Wayne State story.

Dr. Lyle Seymour, president of Wayne State, said he is going to head delegations to various communities in 24-county Nebraska areas served by Wayne State, to explain the programs offered by the state institution.

Dr. Seymour said his staff is presently contacting community civic organizations to line up dates when he could present the Wayne State story. His first outing will be to Oakland Nov. 14.

The program will include a slide presentation, giving an up-to-date visual look at Wayne State. Dr. Seymour will follow up the picture presentation with a general history, programs offered and statistics compiled by the school. "We don't intend to overpower them with words and pictures," Dr. Seymour said. "The one thing I want to impress upon them is that Wayne State College is their college. . . it just happens to be located in Wayne."

We feel this attitude of self-help and community college cooperation is the start of something big which will benefit both the Community of Wayne and Wayne State College.

Seventy-five percent of the students at Wayne State are Nebraska residents. Seventy-eight percent of Wayne State graduates stay in Nebraska. Wayne State graduates make up 31 percent of the teaching staff in schools in the 24 county NE Nebraska area. This figures out to be about 2,100 Wayne State College grads

who are teaching in the Nebraska schools. This does not include school administrators or counselors.

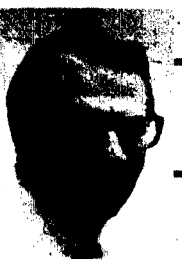
A fast rundown of Wayne State grads who are teaching in area schools shows 44 in the Wayne-Carroll school system and 2 in St. Mary's, 17 in Wakefield, 110 in Omaha public schools with another 200 in the Omaha metro area. Norfolk public has 82 with 9 in Norfolk Catholic and 4 in Norfolk Victory school. Laurel has 24. Allen has 17, Pender has 26, Harrington Public has 10 and Cedar Catholic has 10. Fremont public has 45 and Fremont Berigan has 3. Madison schools have 17 with 2 at St. Leonard's.

Getting down to the nitty-gritty of finances, some \$890,000 was returned from Wayne State College to the community of Wayne in 1977 for goods and services. The monthly average is \$208,033 returned to the area. The Wayne State physical plant is worth about \$37.2 million with an annual operating budget of \$7 million. Net yearly salaries paid to some 972 employees amounts to \$22.2 million.

These figures in our opinion, present ample evidence why Wayne and Wayne State should work together for a common cause. We are encouraged that the Wayne Chamber has become involved. And we hope Chamber members will lend their expertise and time in helping to further the cause of Wayne State when called upon. After all, if we don't do it, who is? — Chuck Barnes.

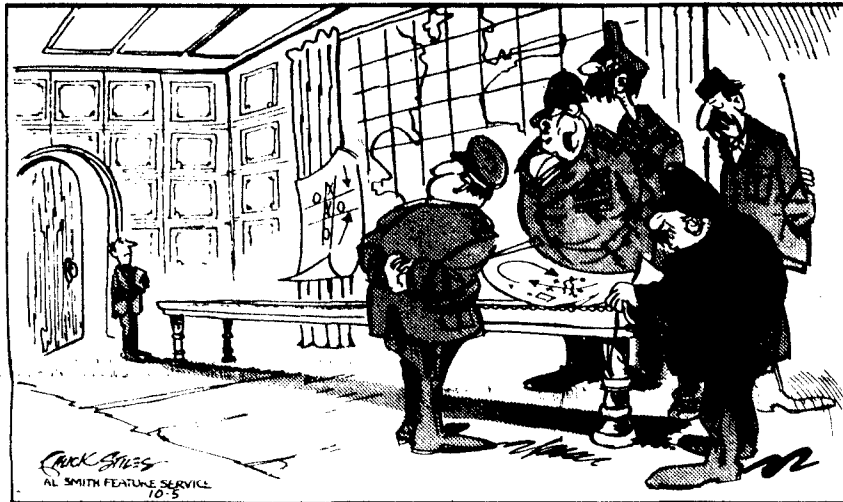

In their only successful drive of the game, the Wildcats moved the ball down field with passes from Paul Roberts to Bob Hawkins, Joel Broekemeier and Rick Bowers. Hoping not to yield a touchdown, Ponca Coach Dan Hoelsy sent in his first string defense when Winside moved down to the 10 yard line.
Winside moved the ball only three yards in three plays and faced a fourth down, and goal play from the seven yard line. With 4:20 left in the game, Roberts hit Bob Hawkins in the end zone for the lone Wildcat TD, only the second touchdown given up by Ponca in three games.

Laurel JH Tops Wakefield

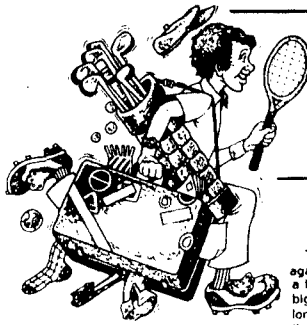
In a matchup of area junior high teams, Laurel outduelled Wakefield 14-6 Thursday.

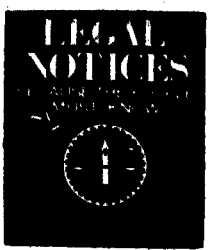

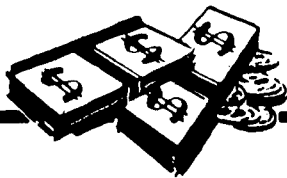

on a cubic yard although they are not listed that way in the ordinance.

The fees in general for use of the station are:

Automobiles and station wagons without trailers, \$1 per vehicle; pickups without sideboards, \$2 per vehicle; pickups with sideboards, \$3 per vehicle; licensed Class A collector trucks, \$1 per cubic yard; two-wheel trailers (4 cubic yards maximum), \$4 per trailer; four-wheel trailers (6 cubic yard maximum), \$6 per trailer; all other trucks, \$1 per cubic yard.

Tires without wheels and including sizes 10-20, 75 cents per tire; tires without wheels larger than sizes 10-20, \$1.50 per tire; heavy material (see ordinance), \$2 per cubic yard; large appliances (see ordinance), \$2 per item; all other large items, \$2 per item or bundle.

"Solid waste" is defined in the ordinance to include garbage, rubbish, trash and waste.

Schulz said the fees established for the station by the ordinance will be doubled for solid waste delivered to the station which is generated from any permit located outside the corporate limits of the city.

They will also be charged an annual fee of \$10, Schulz explained.

The hours of operation at the station are:
Monday, Wednesday and Friday 9 a.m. to 12 noon.
Tuesday and Thursday — 9 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 p.m. to 3 p.m.
Saturday — 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Coryell said malls of the same type have been successful in Columbus and Fremont and one in Chandler, Ariz. which is almost identical to the building he is remodeling for the mall.

He said the name for the mall is the brainchild of the designers, Donald E. Fry and Associates, Inc., Omaha. "We are following the theme with the use of rustic lumber, pilings and bridge planks which were secured from the county, and by keeping our eye out for things that will blend with it."

Coryell said he has a spot picked out for some porches he has been saving as well as an oxen yoke and an Wells Fargo sign

dating back to 1887. Some lights from the old Stratton House hotel will also be used, he said.

The building itself is structurally sound although it dates back to 1931 when Coryell's father, Bill, opened up the dealership. "I think the location was a blacksmith shop in the old days," Coryell said, pointing out the Region IV offices just east of the mall was once a livery.





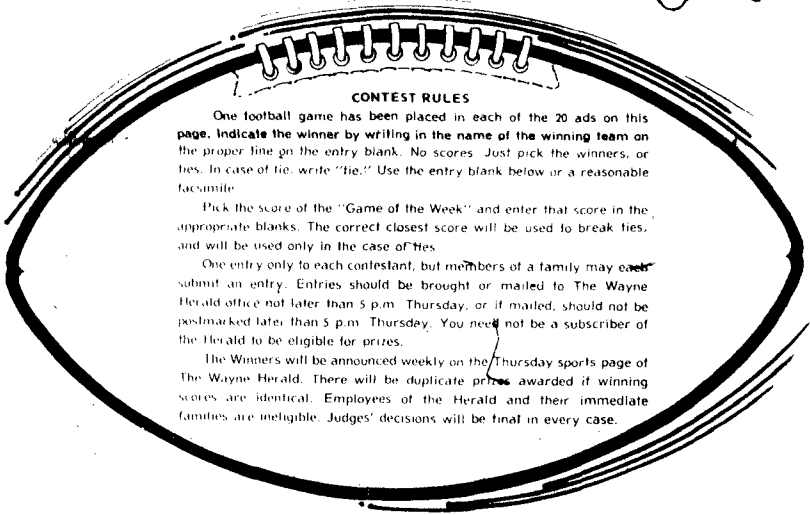
