Assessor Disappointed with Levies

Most Property Taxes Up in County

Even with a state mandated 30 percent rollback in property valuations in Wayne County, most property owners will probably see an increase in their property taxes.

County Assessor Doris Stipp said she felt some of the agencies could have held their budgets lower than they did. "Holding down the budgets is what it is going to take to hold the tax dollar down."

She pointed out the increase county-wide came, not only after the rollback but as well as a refund to political subdivisions who received a 62 1/2 percent personal property tax exemption.

She said she was disappointed in some of the levies approved by the board of commissioners for those agencies supported by tax monies.

Drafted in 1970, Peterson worked in psychological operations at Fort Bragg, N.C. Transferred to Vietnam, he served as a radio correspondent with "Pacific Stars and Stripes" newspaper. Peterson was the last "Stripes" correspondent out of Vietnam before the American military withdrawal in 1972.

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His last army assignment was in Seoul, South Korea as a news radio reader and FM morning host.

After seven long years of treatment and surgery in hospitals and rehabilitation centers in Wayne, Sioux City, and Omaha, 25-year-old Don Mau is home.

Mau was involved in a serious automobile accident on Nov. 4, 1971 which left him in a coma. He was taken to the Wayne Hospital where he was under the care of Dr. Bob Benhack.

After 11 days, he was transferred to St. Joseph's Hospital in Sioux City. There he received three weeks of treatment from a neurosurgeon. The list goes on — he was transferred to numerous hospitals in Omaha and Sioux City.

Ten months after the accident, Don came out of the coma in the Wayne Hospital. From there, he was placed in the Wayne Care Centre, until he underwent surgery in an Omaha hospital. After the surgery, he returned to the Care Centre, in May of 1978.

After two years on a rehabilitation program, the social service people informed Don that he had progressed and was ready to be placed in a home. His mother, Florence, decided that he would come home where she could care for him.

Don left the Care Centre Saturday and is happy to be home with his mother. There's no word to describe the way it feels to be home after seven years," Don said with a smile on his face.

Wildcats, Tigers Battle To Draw

The Wayne State College Wildcats opened their Central States season with a hard-fought 16-14 tie with a tough Missouri Southern team at Joplin, Mo., Saturday.

The game was a tight battle for position as the two teams took turns fighting a strong wind. With that wind against them, WSC scored first on a pitch from quarterback Rick Lade to junior tailback Bob Barry. After receiving several key blocks and losing several MS tacklers, Barry took off for a 44-yard scam, making it 6-0, WSC, with 6:48 left in the first quarter. The PAT by Bart Emanuel of North Bend failed.

The Lions of Missouri Southern remained undaunted and went on to score three minutes later with the wind in their favor, making it 7-6, Missouri Southern at the end of the first quarter.

With 8:41 left to play in the second quarter, the Wildcat's Bart Emanuel booted a field goal from about the Missouri

Southern 15 yard line, putting WSC ahead, 9-7.

The Lions led 13-9 at the half, following a scoring play with 3:18 on a bootleg by the Southern quarterback. The PAT was blocked by a determined WSC defensive unit.

The Wildcat defense scored the only Wayne State touchdown of the second half as Bob Ochse, a junior linebacker from Peru, Ill., fell on a blocked Missouri punt in the end zone. The Emanuel PAT was good, making it 16-13 with 13:22 left in the third quarter.

The two teams exchanged possessions with little success until the Lions scored again on a field goal with 10:57 left in the fourth quarter from about the WSC 30 yard line, tying the score at 16-16.

Southern threatened to score again late in the fourth quarter as the Lions attempted another field goal from the WSC 34, but the attempt fell short. Wayne State took possession, but was unable to move the ball on four incompletes passes.

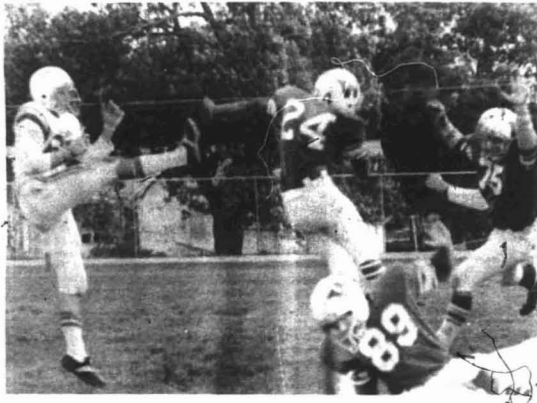
With only six seconds left in the game, Southern attempted

another field goal with the ball on the WSC 34. The kick fell far short under a heavy defensive rush, ending the game at 16-16. WSC tailback Bob Barry was the leading rusher for the day with 159 yards on 27 attempts. Barry now has 415 yards rushing in four games for a 103.75 game average.

Sophomore quarterback Rick Lade, who passed for three touchdowns and 202 yards last week at Midland, was held to nine completions in 25 attempts for 121 yards. Lade was selected the Central States Intercollegiate Conference "Offensive Player of the Week" for his efforts against Midland last week.

The Wildcats will face Kearney State College at 2 p.m. Saturday for Wayne State's homecoming.

Tailback Bob Barry and line-backer Dave Carlson were selected by coach Del Stollenberg as two of the three "Players of the Week" for their performance in WSC's 16-16 tie against Missouri Southern Saturday.

Stollenberg, who usually names only an offensive and defensive player each week, said a member of the Wildcat's improving offensive line will be added to the list after he reviews the game films later this week.

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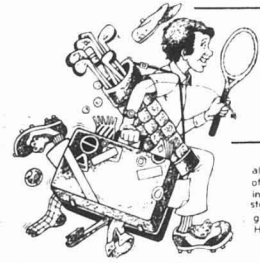

The Wildcats will be going into the game with a 1-2-1 record after a hard-fought 16-16 tie with Missouri Southern last weekend.

Kearney, a pre-season favorite in the Central States Intercollegiate Conference will face a much improved Wayne State offensive line, which has helped the Wildcats rush for over 753 yards this year.

Leading the Wildcat offense will be quarterback Rick Lade of Tekamah, who has accumulated 701 yards offense this fall, for a game average of 175.25 yards.

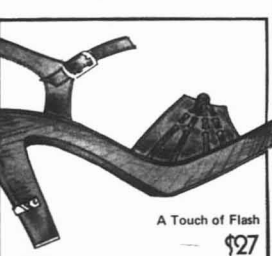

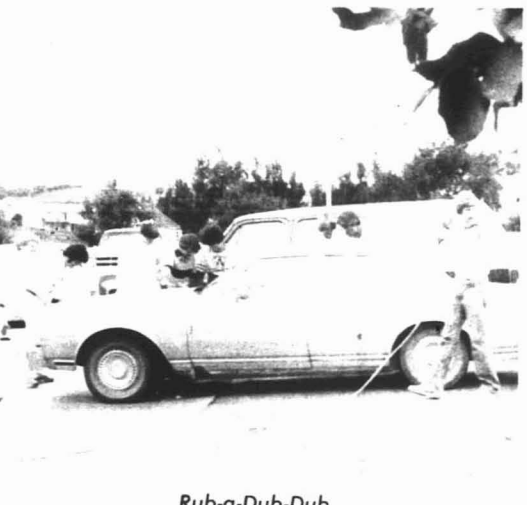

Receive Study Grant For Ground Water Use

Two Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources agricultural economists have received a \$18,000 grant to study legal and administrative aspects of ground water use.
David Aiken, water law specialist, and Raymond J. Supplis, associate professor of agricultural economics, are principal investigators for the project entitled "Evaluation of Legal and Institutional Arrangements Associated with Ground Water Allocation in the Missouri River Basin States."
The regional project began Sept. 11 and will end March 31, 1981. The investigation will study ground water management policies in North Nebraska, Kansas, Missouri, Iowa,

South Dakota, Minnesota, Montana, Colorado and Wyoming. Aiken explained that the Nebraska Water Resources Center and the Missouri River Basin Water Institute Consortium will coordinate with the states' universities in the study. Coordination with state agencies within the region will be through the Missouri River Basin Commission.
The University of Nebraska-Lincoln specialist said the study will deal especially with ground water reservoir depletions and interference between ground water and surface water users. Ground water quality and its relationship with ground water laws also will be studied.
"We plan to look at the ground water laws and regulations in

the states to see how successfully they deal with problems. In many cases the current laws don't address the real issues," Aiken said.
He added that the project will include an evaluation of the economic impact of ground water withdrawals. Other states' laws will be studied to see if there are any better approaches to ground water legislation.
"The ultimate goal is to make general recommendations to the states about how their laws might be modified to better deal with ground water management issues," he said. "We also could make suggestions for modifications of the Ground Water Management Act and will coordinate with the Nebraska state water planning process."

same farm. She said the same farm, if located in District 51 (a rural school), would have paid \$795.70 in 1977. It would have been charged \$1,026.02 in 1978.

The county assessor took another comparison for an urban residence in Wayne, using an average 1,000 square foot home. The taxes on the property in 1977 were \$470.20 while they are \$684.94 for 1978.

Taxpayers show that countywide, the tax levy was decreased 13.45 percent. However, all towns in the county showed an increase.

Wayne increased 3.73 percent. Carroll increased a booming 200.22 percent. Hoskins is up 16.60 percent. Shoes shows an increase of 38.88 percent. Heikes Addition is up 38.10 percent and Windsor increased 5.97 percent.

City schools show two with an increase, one with a decrease and one with no change. District 95B increased 20.46 percent. District 9C decreased 2.47 percent and District 76 showed no change in its budget from last year.

Rural schools have six showing an increase and five showing a decrease.

- ¼ cup Lukewarm Water
- 1 teaspoon Sugar
- 1½ cups lukewarm Milk
- 1 teaspoon Salt
- 2 tablespoons Sugar
- 3 cups Sifted Flour
- 2 Eggs (whites reserved until later)
- 5 tablespoons melted Butter

About 1½ to 2 hours before mealtime, soften yeast in the lukewarm water to which has been added 1 teaspoon sugar. Stir and let stand 5 minutes or so.

When yeast is soft, add it to the lukewarm milk in which salt and 2 tablespoons sugar have been dissolved. Blend yeast mixture with the flour, beating until smooth. Add beaten egg yolks and beat again. Then blend in the melted shortening. Beat. Cover and set away in a warm place to rise until light or bubbly (about 1 to 1½ hours). Then stir and add a little more warm liquid, if necessary, to make a nice thin batter.

Fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites and bake on a pre-heated waffle iron.

If desired, the batter may be prepared in advance and allowed to rise until light. It may then be stored in a refrigerator until time for baking.

If wanted for breakfast, prepare batter at night and set in the refrigerator as soon as mixed.

Molasses Cookies

- 1 cup Sugar
- ¼ cup Oleo
- 1 Egg
- ¼ cup Molasses
- 1 teaspoon Cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon Cloves
- 1 teaspoon Ginger
- ¼ teaspoon Salt
- 2 teaspoons Soda
- 2 cups Flour

Mix well. Form into 1-inch balls and roll in sugar. Bake on a greased cookie sheet for 12 minutes in a 350 degree oven. Makes 5½ dozen cookies.

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Press in a buttered 9 x 13-inch pan. Cool. Kids will love them.

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- 1 teaspoon Sugar
- 1½ cups lukewarm Milk
- 1 teaspoon Salt
- 2 tablespoons Sugar
- 3 cups Sifted Flour
- 2 Eggs (whites reserved until later)
- 5 tablespoons melted Butter

About 1½ to 2 hours before mealtime, soften yeast in the lukewarm water to which has been added 1 teaspoon sugar. Stir and let stand 5 minutes or so.

When yeast is soft, add it to the lukewarm milk in which salt and 2 tablespoons sugar have been dissolved. Blend yeast mixture with the flour, beating until smooth. Add beaten egg yolks and beat again. Then blend in the melted shortening. Beat. Cover and set away in a warm place to rise until light or bubbly (about 1 to 1½ hours). Then stir and add a little more warm liquid, if necessary, to make a nice thin batter.

Fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites and bake on a pre-heated waffle iron.

If desired, the batter may be prepared in advance and allowed to rise until light. It may then be stored in a refrigerator until time for baking.

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- Small amount of Water
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- 2 tablespoons Grape or Cherry Wine (or Vinegar from Sweet Pickles)
- 3½ cups Sugar
- 1 teaspoon Cinnamon

- 1 cup Powdered Sugar
- 1 (3 oz.) package Cream Cheese
- 4 tablespoons Butter
- ½ teaspoon Vanilla

Combine all ingredients and beat until smooth. Spread over cake. Roll and chill. Serves 8.

LEAFY SPURGE

Leafy Spurge is a persistent deep-rooted perennial which reproduces by seeds and roots. The stems are eight to thirty-six inches tall and are stiff and woody at maturity. The main stem may be surrounded by eight to ten secondary stems giving a clumpy appearance. The bluish-green leaves are long and narrow with smooth or slight wavy margins. The small flowers are borne on a short stalk above two large showy heart shaped bracts which are generally mistaken for flower petals. Three seeds may be produced in each flower which literally explodes on maturity throwing the seeds as far as fifteen feet. The seeds may remain viable for at least five years. Seedling plants generally do not flower the first year. Some roots may penetrate to depths of twelve feet. The reddish-brown roots produce a multitude of pink buds which are capable of producing new plants up to three feet away from the mother, mother plant. Scroglings of roots as short as 1/2 inch may give rise to new plants. All parts of the plant contain a milky sap which may cause severe irritation to human skin.

Control
In pastureland use one quart of 2,4-D plus one pint Banvel in early bud stage in spring or late fall. A spring treatment followed by a fall retreatment may be necessary with bad infestations.

Leafy spurge in cropland can generally be eradicated by two years of continuous cultivation. The infested areas should be cultivated three to four inches deep every time the leafy spurge is three to four inches tall (maximum) or about every two to three weeks depending on growing conditions.

Cultivation should continue from early spring to freeze-up in the fall. Care should be taken so that small piece of roots are not carried to uninfested areas. Cultivation should be done on hot days whenever possible as roots will be killed if exposed to temperatures of 86 degrees Fahrenheit or more for several hours.

Special Remarks
Leafy spurge is a very persistent weed and may take several years of vigorous effort to control.

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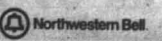

EXTENSION NOTES

DOWN-FILLED GARMENTS

Consumer demand for down-filled garments is strong. Consumers, however, should make certain they're really buying down and not feathers or some other substitute. Although no garment sold is 100 percent down, the Federal Trade Commission requires that garments labeled as down-filled contain at least 80 percent down. Because of the limited availability of down and its high price, many products marketed don't have the required amount of down, or don't contain any down at all. Laboratory tests show that some are mixtures of crushed feathers, feather fibers and animal hair.

It makes a big difference, because real down is priced higher, and because down is one of the best insulators relative to

its weight. If the garment is filled with a substitute, you may not be getting your money's worth.

How can consumers make sure their intended purchase is down-filled? First of all beware of bargains. If the price is very low the garment is probably not insulated with down. Check the weight of the garment and compare it with others. Down is lighter weight than feathers and other substitute materials.

Down has more loft, and traps more air than feathers or other substitutes. The buyer should crush the fabric, then shake it to see how quickly it recovers loftiness. Real down filler will make a quick and complete recovery.

The buyer can also crush the garment, feeling for hard or coarse particles which might indicate substitute fillers. Real down is very soft and no hard feather veins should be felt.

Must Act Now To Kill Insects

Unless you're looking for some additional roommates this winter, now is the time to prevent fall insect pests from seeking winter quarters in your home, according to Bob Roselle, Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources Extension entomologist.

Nothing will succeed 100 percent in excluding the free-loaders, he says, but several preventative measures can reduce the annoyance. Diazinon sprayed around the outside foundation and onto the lawn for example will form a barrier the pests will find difficult to cross.

Making sure the house is tight also will make it hard for insects to enter, according to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln specialist. Caulk all openings, check to see that doors and windows fit tight, and patch any holes in the screens.

A fumigant bomb will rid a room of insects that have already infiltrated the home, but it won't prevent additional bugs from entering, he says. Activate the bomb and leave the room for two to three hours.

"Most insects are just pests and not really damaging, but crickets are an exception," Roselle notes. "These insects like to chew on clothing, especially when articles are stored in a damp basement."

Cockroaches or water bugs sometimes spend the summer outdoors and then try to move inside for the winter, so do eliminate leaf beetles, "but these basically don't do any damage," Roselle says. "Poisons will kill the pests, but since they must be removed to the outdoors any way, it's best to just swab them or sweep them outside."

Air Control For Ag Plants?

If there are air quality standards for humans, why not for agricultural plants? This question is often asked by growers and other agriculturists. Michigan State University Experiment Station Director Dr. Steven Wittwer says not having air pollution standards for crops is asking for trouble. He says navy bean and potato crops have been damaged by air pollutants. Wittwer cites "acid rainfall" caused by sulfur and nitrogen air pollution in the eastern half of the United States as an increasing problem. "Acid Rainfall" tends to make soils more acid and unfit for crops. It also causes more coal burning in the future and resulting air pollution could worsen the acid rainfall problem.

FIELD BINDWEED

Description
Field bindweed is a perennial, reproducing by seed and underground rootstocks. The plant produces underground rootstocks which spread in every direction from the plant. The true roots penetrate to depths twenty-five to thirty feet. The stems are slender, two to seven feet in length, and have a prostrate or twining habit of growth. The leaves are ovate-oblong, with acute basal lobes. The flowers are white or pink, funnel shaped, about an inch across. The capsules bear one to four dark brown, coarsely roughened seeds which usually have one convex and two flattened sides.

Control
In non-cropland areas, use one quart, 2,4-D plus one pint Banvel during vigorous fall growth or bud stage in spring. Avoid tillage five weeks before and one week after application. Plan to treat for several consecutive years.

In crops such as corn, bindweed can be treated at the bud stage in early summer with 1/2 pint 2,4-D amine, plus a pint Banvel per acre. If corn is removed for silage, fall application of one quart, 2,4-D plus 1 pint Banvel per acre should be effective. Field bindweed can also be fall treated after removal of soybeans.

Special Remarks
Roundup can also be used on field bindweed in the fall after row crop harvest, or in noncropland. In some tests, Roundup has been no better than 2,4-D plus Banvel for field bindweed control.

Roundup may be used as a spot treatment of Field Bindweed in barley, corn, oats, sorghum and wheat.

1. It is a "spot" treatment only. Roundup will kill the crop in the treated area also. Take care to avoid drift outside target area.
2. Treatment must be made prior to headings of small grain and sorghum, initial pod set on soybeans and silk on corn. Do not apply when the crop has 1/2 seed.
3. For control of perennials, the weeds should be treated in the optimum stage of growth. The best time to treat field bindweed is in late June or when plants are in early bud stage. Weeds should be growing actively, but prior to drought stress.

Roundup should be applied at the rate of 2 gallons per 100 gallons of spray. According to the label only hand held and gun equipment can be used.

A copy of the label must be in the possession of the user at the time of Roundup application for spot treatment.

Getting Ready for Winter? Close Up Cracks, Air Spaces

There's more to getting ready for cold weather than closing storm windows and collecting firewood. According to Gerald Bodman, Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources Extension engineer, it's also important to assure that homes are as airtight as possible.

The most effective weatherization measure is nearly always caulking and weatherstripping, he says. In fact, the Institute's AGNET "House" computer home energy program has shown that in most homes tested, one-fourth to two-thirds of the total home heating cost is due to air infiltration.

It's not practical to get the air infiltration figure down below 1% to one third of home heating costs, Bodman notes. "However, if you can get it down from two-thirds to one-half you can save \$75 to \$100 a year for an investment of \$50 to \$75 in materials and one to two days labor," he reports.

Caulking and weatherstripping on the outside of a home is done for two purposes, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln specialist explains. It controls air movement, which is directly related to heating costs, as well as the movement of precipitation into unprotected wooden portions of a home. The latter will help minimize the development of fungus growth, rotting and to some extent, insect damage, he says.

Pesky Weeds Not So Pesky

Tires form milkweed, sow thistle and pennycress? Some USDA chemists think so. Research is under way to see how much and what kind of hydrocarbons can be produced.

Pesky weeds, exotic ornamentals and common wild plants in 34 species (out of 300 studied) show promise as potential sources of natural rubber, oil and chemical crops as well as new sources of food nutrients and fiber. Goatsue, studied as a rubber crop during World War II, is the 34 of the top ranking potential hydrocarbon crops. It is suggested that chemicals from plants should be called "Botano-chemicals" to distinguish them from petro-chemicals obtained from petroleum.

HOUSE PLANTS FROM SEED

Many house plants and foliage plants are propagated vegetatively. Many can be grown from seed.

In the time it takes to root a cutting of African violet, you can grow a transplantable seedling of coleus, cyclamen, mimosa or a host of other popular plants.

Where do you locate the seed? Most nursery catalogs have a section labeled "House Plants from Seed." Many plants used for bedding plants also do very well as house plants.

If you've grown garden transplants such as tomatoes or peppers, you can grow house plants from seed. Soil, water and fertilizer requirements are similar to those required for growing vegetable transplants. Not everything is known about the growing requirements for all potential seed grown house plants, so you will have to experiment.

FERTILIZING PLANTS

While lawns are fertilized in early September, most plant materials shouldn't be. Straw berries, fruit trees, ornamental shrubs and trees may not survive the winter if fertilized in late summer.

Don't prune plants in late summer or early fall. Wait until the severe weather of winter has passed before you prune. Pruning plants now either results in new growth which is winter killed or die back on the newly pruned wood.

PREVENTING STUMPS FROM SPROUTING

Tree stumps can be prevented from sprouting by treating with chemicals such as 2,4-D, 2,4,5-T or silvex mixed with a carrier such as diesel fuel or kerosene. The container should always be read for instructions, but generally common formulations are 4 pounds actual ingredient per gallon, mixed at a ratio of 16 parts diesel fuel or kerosene to 1 part chemical (1/2 pint per gallon). The freshly cut surface and trunk should be drenched to the point of the chemical should be applied with a sprayer or brush.

When handling the chemicals, avoid body contact and avoid contact with desirable plants. Store the chemicals out of reach of children and pets.
