

Trustees Approve \$63,000 Budget

WSC Foundation Receives \$10,000 Memorial Grant

A 1979 calendar year budget of \$63,000 was approved Friday by the Wayne State College Foundation Board of Trustees at their annual meeting at Wayne State. The funds will be allotted from the Foundation's 1977-78 fund drive. The 1978-79 drive will begin Nov. 1 this fall. The funds budgeted for the coming year will be used to support a variety of projects outlined in the meeting. Foundation Executive Secretary Chuck Kay said included in the coming projects approved will be "Academic Challenge Awards" for the various academic divisions. The awards will allow funds for meaningful academic projects that are not eligible for state funds.

"I think this program will really prove beneficial to the academic divisions on campus," Kay commented, "because they can receive support for some good academic programs which help the students." About \$25,000 of the 1979 budget will be used for the awarding of scholarships to students attending WSC. The remaining funds will be divided between an expanded WSC alumni program, the WSC International Education Program, the WSC Arboretum project and other "development programs." About \$45,000 has been allotted for a WSC student-loan fund. The Foundation Board also re-elected the current officers Friday to another term. Officers

for 1979 include former Nebraska Val Peterson, president and Henry Ley, former Nebraska Director of Banking and president of the State National Bank in Wayne, vice president. Charles Leila Maynard was re-elected secretary-treasurer and Writer Kay will continue as executive secretary-treasurer. A \$10,000 check from Mrs. Vera Selton of Nazareth, Penn., was presented to the Foundation at the Friday meeting. The money was donated to the Foundation to establish a memorial scholarship for her sister, Ida M. Warner, who was a WSC professor of Home Economics from 1950 to 1968. One-half of the \$10,000 will be used for the scholarship fund, which will award a scholarship annually to an outstanding WSC student majoring in home economics. The remaining \$5,000 will be added to the Ray Schreiner Memorial Scholarship established one year ago at WSC. Dr. Ray Schreiner was chairman of the WSC Applied Science Division from 1938-1971 and an industrial education professor from 1971 to 1974.

Also presented at the meeting was a check for \$250 by Deloris Runquist, president of the WSC Faculty Wives Club. The money, to be used for the WSC Arboretum project, was earned through the sale of the club's 1978 cookbook.

In other business the board was informed on a deferred giving program involving insurance and other forms of estate planning which the Foundation will use in future fund raising campaigns.

Approved the establishment of a "Development Assessment Committee" with the responsibility of surveying the future needs of WSC and the Foundation. The committee will also establish the future goals of the Foundation.

Agreed to provide added support for WSC admissions programs in 1979.

Agreed to provide added funds to the WSC Alumni Association programs in 1979.

Agreed to purchase portraits of the individuals still living who have WSC buildings named after them.

Dr. Lyle Seymour, president of WSC, made a presentation of a "Northeast Nebraska Community Awareness" slide presentation at the meeting. The showing outlined the impact of WSC on the Northeast Nebraska region. Dr. Seymour said he will be showing the program to various groups throughout the region in the coming months, with the first scheduled for Oct. 16 to members of the Crofton Chamber of Commerce.

Tuttle Begins Jail Sentence

A Laurel man today (Monday) began serving a two-week sentence in the Wayne county jail after District Court Judge Eugene McFadden Wednesday overruled a motion for a new trial. David A. Tuttle was found guilty of resisting a Wayne police officer and refusing to take chemical tests. He was charged Sept. 26. County Judge Bruce Henning March 2 sentenced Tuttle to serve two weeks in the county jail on the charge of resisting an officer and was placed on probation on the second count, contingent on his paying a \$100 fine. The case was appealed to district court where McFadden affirmed the court's ruling and overruled the new trial motion. Tuttle has been placed on probation for three months during which time he is ordered not to operate a motor vehicle at any time.

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Stands Up Against Wind Gusts

Area Corn Crop Passes Major Test

The corn crop in the Wayne-land area passed a major test past week when winds gusted up to 30 miles per hour whiplashed at the current crop and the corn stayed upright.

John Witkowski, extension entomologist at Northeast Station, said there was some thought that corn might go down from the force of the winds because of disease. However, most of the corn came through with flying colors, according to Witkowski.

He said the corn harvest is just getting started in the area. He pointed out that most of the full-seeded hybrids are still pretty wet and it will be several days before the harvest moves into high gear.

"Some farmers, who have finished their soybean harvest and have early full seed hybrid corn, are trying to move into the fields. Witkowski said. He explained there is not enough harvesting done yet to make a determination as to yield. "It looks promising," he ventured. Witkowski said farmers are still facing major problems even though the corn held its own with the wind. "The corn looks like it will produce better than average yield and if that happens, storage will become a serious problem."

Witkowski said many farmers are trying to move their 1977 corn which has been stored on the farm, to regional terminals. At the same time, many producers are trying to build additional on-farm storage but they are being held back by the lack of materials and workers. "If farmers are forced to put shelled corn on the ground because of the lack of storage space, and the corn is a little wet, there could be trouble," Witkowski observed.

Trial Date Set for Hill

Trial for a Kansas man charged with first degree sexual assault has been set for Nov. 20 in Wayne County District Court. District Judge Eugene McFadden in court Wednesday overruled a motion to withdraw a plea of nolo contendere (no contest) by William G. Hill, Rossville, Kans. which he entered April 24 to the charge after County Attorney Budd Bornhoff agreed to drop a second charge against Hill.

Hill initially entered a plea of not guilty to both charges on Feb. 1. His motion of withdrawing the not guilty plea was granted after he agreed to the no contest plea to the primary charge of first degree sexual assault.

Judge McFadden July 20 determined there was probable cause to send Hill to the Lincoln Regional center for observation and diagnosis to determine whether or not the Kansas man is a sexual sociopath under Nebraska law.

Hill returned from Lincoln and made the motion to withdraw his no contest plea which was overruled and trial date was set.

He has been remanded to the Wayne county jail under \$500,000 bond to await trial.

OBSERVATIONS

Ounce of prevention

Some things bear repeating, such as preventing fires. It may seem trite but it is not trite. Fires cause millions of dollars in property damage and, even more importantly, they are killers. They do not discriminate. Thinking it could not happen to you will not prevent fires. Thinking that it could happen to you, can help to prevent fires.

Nearly every minute of the day, a fire breaks out in a dwelling somewhere in the United States. The reading time of this piece is about four minutes so someplace, somewhere four fires are eating their way through someone's dwelling. Thousands of fires happen each year as the result of careless use of tobacco and household chemicals, defective heating equipment and overloaded electrical wiring. Nearly 9,000 lives are lost annually in U.S. fires. This is tragic to say the least.

Observance of a few common-sense precautions can greatly reduce the risk of a household fire. One of the world's largest integrated manufacturers of fire-protection equipment, recommends that a person:

- Keep a supply of large, deep-dish ashtrays throughout the home and be sure that all cigarettes are crushed out. When guests leave or before retiring, check each room for burning cigarettes. Most importantly, never smoke in bed.
- Cover all combustible materials such as gasoline, cleaning fluids and paint thinners before storing. Keep them in a safe place. When using volatile materials, be sure there is adequate ventilation to carry away the fumes.
- Install a fire extinguisher in the kitchen and on each floor of a multi-level dwelling. Be sure all members of the family know where each extinguisher is located and how to use it. The extinguisher must be filled with the correct chemicals and fully charged to the proper level. Some extinguishers have a pressure gauge that you can check periodically, even if they have not been used. But in most models, refilling and charging is necessary only after use. To be certain that all members of the family

know how to use a fire extinguisher, it is suggested that the head of the family demonstrate its operation outdoors after buying it.

— Have your heating system and chimney checked before each winter season, and keep oily rags, newspapers and other combustible materials far away from heating equipment and stoves.

— Keep young children out of the kitchen when no adults are around, and keep matches out of their reach.

— Avoid overloading your electrical system. If your electrical appliances are slow in warming up, they may be starved for current by overloaded or inadequate wiring. Circuits forced to carry too much current can burn white hot, searing insulation and touching off hidden wall fires which can burn for days, emitting deadly fumes. Be sure your fuses are of the proper amperage. Many electrical outlets are caused by overloaded fuse boxes.

— Conduct family fire drills periodically so that everyone knows what to do in case of fire and the best routes for evacuating the premises.

— Sleep with bedroom doors closed. If you smell smoke and the inside surface of the door is warm to the touch, do not open it. Instead, try to exit by another route or through a window.

— Consider installation fire and smoke alarms to alert the family in time to escape a blaze.

— If it is necessary to call the fire department, give all pertinent information clearly and succinctly. If the fire cannot be reported by telephone, turn in an alarm at the nearest fire box. Be sure that all members of the family know where the nearest fire alarm is located.

— Call your local fire department to arrange an appointment for a fire-safety inspection. In many communities this service is provided for residents without charge.

Fire safety precautions, together with early warning and knowledge of what to do in case of fire, are the best ways to make sure you and your family are safe at home.

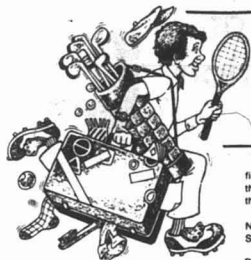

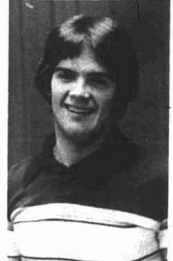
"We made some mistakes that cost us," Coach Dennis Gonnerman said. "This was a tough one to tie."
