Pumpkins Good For Eating Too!

When choosing pumpkins for jack-o-lanterns this year, keep in mind that pumpkins are good for eating as well as decorating, reminds Teresa Shaffer, Extension nutritionist in the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

"Instead of carving faces in the pumpkin, try having children draw features with a felt tip marker," she suggests. "Then after Halloween is over you've got the makings for some tasty, nutritious dishes."

"Pumpkin has fewer calories and provides more vitamin A than any variety of winter squash," the University of Nebraska-Lincoln specialist points out. "In fact, pumpkin has five times the vitamin A as acorn squash. And one piece of pumpkin pie provides 100 percent of the recommended daily allowance of vitamin A," she adds.

"A pumpkin suitable for both seasonal decoration and cooking should be free of skin blemishes and small holes, according to Don Janssen, Extension horticulturist at UNL. Blemishes may be signs that weevils have gotten into the pumpkin's interior and made it unfit for eating."

"Make sure the stem is dry and well attached," Janssen advises. "If it is, the pumpkin is well matured and won't

deteriorate before you get a chance to use it."

To prepare fresh pumpkin for cooking, wash and cut in half crosswise. Remove and save the seeds, and place shell side up in the baking pan. Bake at 325 degrees F. for an hour or until the pumpkin is tender. After scraping the pulp from the shell and putting pulp through a strainer, it's ready to use in baked goods.

"Even the seeds can be made into a special treat," Shaffer says. "Just soak them for 24 hours in salt water, using four parts water to one part salt. Spread the seeds on a cloth-covered baking sheet and roast at a low temperature (100 degrees F.) for two hours. Turn the oven off and leave the seeds overnight."

Pumpkin can be used in any recipe calling for winter squash, as well as in pies, quiches, puddings and cookies. It also can be served mashed and as a vegetable with dinner or prepared in the same manner as sweet potatoes.

"But if you want to enjoy this fall treat without saving your jack-o-lantern or cooking fresh pumpkin, you can take the easy way out," Shaffer says. "Just mix a can of pumpkin with a box of vanilla instant pudding and a cup of milk, and pour into a graham cracker pie shell for a no-bake pumpkin pie."

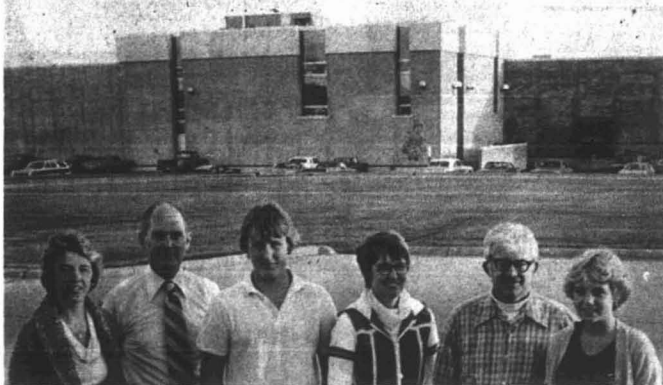

CREATE NEW JOBS FOR NEBRASKANS

Also contributing was WSC's number two singles player Vicki Carsey of Fremont who ended the fall season with a 4-4 split.

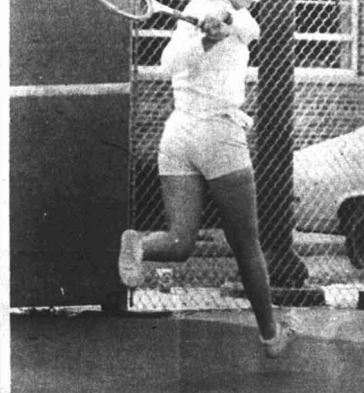
The Wildkitten's number three player, Judy Janick of Bellevue, although playing well, had trouble connecting on her serves this fall and finished with a 2-6 overall record.

 Far Pre-Schoolers
 Younger brothers and sisters may feel left behind when older children go off to school. Loneliness and boredom can lead pre-schoolers to constantly pester mom for attention.
 Parents can help alleviate these symptoms by planning special times for activities with the child. The child may be given some alternative things to do during each day.
 With other children away at school, parents may have more time to spend with the younger children. Children need to be loved alone, and each needs a special time when he has a parent's undivided attention. This doesn't mean a parent needs to hover over the child. Children need to learn to play alone.
 One activity idea might be for

neighborhoods to form play groups for pre-schoolers. Such activities give the children a chance to feel they too are "attending school." It also provides a chance for children to interact with others of their age.
 To be effective a play group must be more than a baby sitting arrangement. Purposes may be to help children develop social skills—learning that people are different, having conversations with others, and getting along with new adults without having mother nearby.
 Parents can take turns hosting the play group. Two adults to about five children provides adequate supervision.
 Play group activities could include free and structured play, games, story and musical experience, field trips, and celebrations for special holidays and birthdays.
