The Wachiska Chapter of the National Audobon Society, several Lincoln falconers, and a Lincoln veterinarian have form-ed a raptor rehabilitation center where they care for birds of prey incapacitated by encount-ers with vehicles, powerlines, or disease inductors, or disease inductors, or disease inductors, or disease.

These volunteers provide day to-day care for the birds, while the Game and Parks Commis-sion relays injured birds to the center from all over the state, and releases rehabilitated birds

But the dormant cacti should be watered only every few weeks during the fall and winter. Most arid species of cacti require bright sunlight to grow. The plants should be placed in south windows if possible and artificial light used to supple-

plants. A good growing mixture for arid cacit consists of equal amounts of peat moss, gardem soil and sharp sand, he said. The cacit should be re-potted when-ever the plant is within one-fourth inch of the container wall. According to Lindgren, the plant should not be watered for several days after re-potting, so damaged roots have time to heat.

The arid cacti should be ferti-lized monthly from spring to fail with a low nitrogen fertilizer such as 5-10-10. But, excessive nitrogen can cause succetent growth and result in insect and disease problems, he said. The plants should not be fertilized
