Council Nixes Rezoning Request

A standing room only crowd Tuesday night watched as a request for rezoning was struck down by the city council when it failed to receive the necessary three-fourths majority. The request to rezone two lots

from residential to commercial came from Scott's Restaurant Inc. of Wayne. The lots are located in the East 100 block of Seventh Street. Duane Schroeder, Wayne attorney representing Scott's

which he described as being on the order of a "McDonalds without the double arches," stated his case for granting the request, maintaining that it was not "spot zoning." His contention concerning the

spot zoning aspect was reinforced by a decision by City Attorney Kem Swaris. Swaris agreed that the zoning change would not affect the attitude of the area, citing a Grand Island court case. His contention

was backed up by William M. Phelps, planner in charge for the update of the city's comprehensive plan by Kirkham, Michael and Associates.

Schroeder maintained that the request should be considered on its facts and circumstances alone and not by action taken before by the council regarding rezoning requests.

The request was also recommended for approval by the city planning and zoning commission.

Budd Bornholt, Wayne attorney representing Dick Wacker, owner of the Dairy Sweet Drive-In which is located across the street south from the lots named in the request, said the request was a "classic example of spot zoning."

He also produced a letter from Scott's requesting the zoning change, stating that the letter's brevity put the council in a position of "buying a pig in a pike."

Bornholt said the business build-up on Seventh Street was endangering the downtown business district. He suggested the council wait until the new comprehensive plan is completed (June, 1979) before taking any action regarding rezoning on Seventh Street.

Following a short discussion, the council voted on the request. Cliff Ginn and Darrell Heier voted against the measure with Darrell Fueberth, president of council, not voting because of a conflict of interest as he was the broker who sold the property to Scott's.

Council Okays Liquor Request

Owners of the soon-to-be opened Windmill Restaurant Tuesday night were granted approval by the city council for a Class J liquor license.

Lamar and Preston Olsen appeared before the council, explaining the new facility, which is located on Third Street in the old Wittig's Food Market building, will be opened in two to three weeks.

They said the restaurant, which will accommodate 90 to 100 persons in the main dining room, will be open from 5:30 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily. It will also have a meeting room which will hold approximately 100 persons.

Jerry Brandstetter of The Stratton House, appeared in opposition to the request of the license which allows on sale of beer and wine.

Brandstetter pointed out to the council the owners have been denied a Class C liquor license by the State Liquor Commission previously. He also alleged the owners have been involved with liquor related traffic charges with one pending in a Madison county court.

He said the state commission has made it known its belief that Wayne has enough liquor licenses (10) to serve the area.

The council approved the request with councilmen Sam Heppburn, Leo Hansen and Darrell Heier, voting no.

Sheriffs Sale To Settle Claim

A sheriff's sale of the Emphasis building and property located in the Wayne Industries Park, will be held at 2 p.m. Nov. 16 at the east front door of the courthouse.

The action is being brought by Wayne Federal Savings and Loan Association of Wayne. The sale is by virtue of an Order of Sale issued by the clerk of the district court of Wayne County, on a decree of foreclosure.

The decree describes Wayne Federal as plaintiff and Emphasis, Inc., a corporation; Northwestern Bell Telephone company, a corporation and the City of Fremont, a municipal corporation, as defendants.

The land and building will sold at auction to the highest bidder for cash to satisfy the judgment and costs of the action.

Ranking in Jeopardy

Nebraska Number One In Business Climate

The Wayne area joins with the State of Nebraska in being named as number one in the United States with the best business climate.

Gary Van Meter, secretary, Wayne Industries, who attended the fall conference of the Nebraska Industrial Development Association in Lincoln Thursday and Friday, said the rating came after a study by the Minnesota Tax Commission. The study ranked each state

on 46 variables grouped into two categories: (1) economic factors and (2) facilities for living.

Van Meter said the economic factors covered labor, cost and market considerations while facilities for living variables covered the general quality of life.

On economic factors alone, Nebraska ranked in a tie for first place with Oklahoma. The study indicated. On facilities for

living variables, the state ranked in a tie for 5th place with Wisconsin.

Van Meter explained that when both categories were combined, Nebraska finished alone in first place.

Nebraska also ranked among the top 10 states on 13 of the 46 individual variables. Van Meter said these variables measured worker's compensation, insured unemployment, the unemployment rate, vocational expenditures, commercial electric and industrial electric rates, natural gas prices, the crime rate, rail service, student-teacher ratio, school attendance, the cost of single family homes and life expectancy.

When asked about Nebraska's and Wayne's economic future in light of the study, Van Meter said "we are in a better position than ever before to attract new business and industry to our state and community. This is explicit proof that Nebraska can offer those factors which are most important to business and industry for them to develop and prosper."

Van Meter added that "we should be mindful that we will have to work to maintain the number one ranking." He commented that the majority of activity that has enhanced the economic picture of the state has come from the local level. "Cities and communities that See BUSINESS, page 9"

Nebraska Native Plans to Become Lutheran Minister

Connie Jones, a philosophy major at Florida Atlantic University (FAU), Boca Raton, Fla., was honored at the 10th annual Honors Convocation held there Oct. 26.

Connie, who plans to become a Lutheran minister, was this year's recipient of the Phi Kappa Phi Scholarship award. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Earl R. Jones of Cape Coral, Fla., formerly of Wayne.

Her bachelor's degree in philosophy, to be awarded by FAU next March, will prepare her for the four-year master of divinity program at Trinity Lutheran Seminary in Columbus, Ohio, where she will begin her studies next summer with an intensive six-week course in Greek.

Connie entered FAU in 1976 as a Faculty Scholar, a program that permits exceptional high school graduates to enter FAU, an upper division university, without the required two-year degree from a junior college.

She had graduated from Cypress Lake Senior High School, Ft. Myers, Fla. in 1971 and worked for five years at various jobs.

Connie says she enrolled in FAU's College of Science with plans of eventually becoming a dentist. Within the first year,

however, she felt called to the ministry and has devoted all her efforts toward attaining that goal.

She transferred to the College of Humanities and has accelerated her studies to graduate even sooner.

Connie has been consistently named to the President's Honor List and the Deans' List, both of which name outstanding students at the end of each academic term.

Her most recent honor was the selection for the \$500 Phi Kappa Phi scholarship award.

"She is one of the most outstanding students we have seen in a long while," commented Dean Jack Suberman of the College of Humanities.

In spite of a rigorous study schedule, Connie finds time to work 15 hours a week in Dean Suberman's office. She is president of FAU's chapter of Phi Sigma Tau, chairman of the Student Advisory Committee, and in anticipation of her future role as a minister, has chosen to teach Sunday school at the Boca Raton Lutheran Church, where she also sings in the choir.

Connie admits there is little time to indulge in hobbies, but as an accomplished musician she does find an occasional moment to play the piano or guitar. Connie also loves to travel. In 1975 she spent six weeks in Europe traveling by train through dozens of countries.

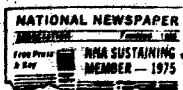

The Rev. John Upton, pastor of Grace Lutheran Church in Wayne for the past five years, has announced that he will leave in January to serve a congregation in Hawaii.

Upton will preach his farewell sermon Dec. 31 and plans to leave for Hawaii Jan. 5 to become pastor at the Messiah Lutheran Church at Ewa Beach on the Island of Oahu.

Upton said he and his family will be living about 15 miles from his sister and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph (Ruth) Manning, who teach at a Lutheran high school in Milliani Town.

Upton said the church he will be serving in Hawaii is a small congregation started about 18 years ago. The church also runs a nursery school.

The Rev. Thomas Mendenhall, associate pastor at Grace Lutheran Church since November, 1977, will serve as vacancy pastor until a new pastor named by the voters assembly.

Upton arrived in Wayne in April 1973 to assist the Rev. E.J. Bernthal with parish work at Grace Lutheran and to serve as Wayne State College chaplain for the Nebraska District of the Lutheran Church Synod.

He served as vacancy pastor at Grace Lutheran when Pastor Bernthal moved to Twin Falls, Idaho in October of 1973 to serve the Immanuel Lutheran Church. Shortly after he was named head pastor by the voters assembly.

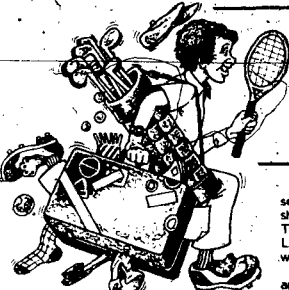

Hall of Fame Inductee To Be Honored

The first former Wayne State College athlete to be inducted into the newly formed WSC Sports Hall of Fame will be honored Saturday during halftime ceremonies at the WSC-Washburn football game at WSC.

Virgil Y. (Joe) Lindahl will be the first of 13 to be honored this year at Wayne State. The new Hall of Fame, sponsored by WSC and the Wayne Second Grasser's Club, is designed to recognize those who have made significant contributions to WSC athletic programs.

Ralph Barclay, a member of the Hall of Fame selection committee, said that after the initial induction of 13 members, the honors will be awarded to a limit of five per year. He said

coaches, athletes, administrators and others contributing to WSC sports will be considered for the honors.

"We want to recognize the people who have contributed to our sports programs, such as high caliber athletes," Barclay said. "We are also interested in what they have done afterwards in contributing to society."

Barclay said Lindahl will be joined later this year by 10 other former WSC athletes and two non-athletes. Awarding ceremonies for those, in addition to Lindahl, will be held at half-time for the home WSC-Kearney State basketball game, scheduled for Feb. 2.

Lindahl, a 1941 graduate of Wayne State, is also a member of the NAIA Hall of Fame. He is now athletic director of the

University of Northern Colorado, where he was also head football coach when the school was known as Colorado State College.

Lindahl was an outstanding football player in his years at WSC. He was a three-time Associated Press "Little All-American" as an end for Wayne State and was a member of the Director's Degree in Physical Education from Indiana University in 1964 and has been athletic director at UNC since 1966.

In addition to previous honors mentioned, Lindahl was named to the Helms Football Hall of Fame in 1961 and the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 1973.

Nebraska Game Commissioners Make Changes In 1979 Fishing Regulations And Tournaments

Nebraska's 7-person board of Game Commissioners made several changes in the 1979 fishing regulations during their October 13th meeting at Lincoln.

Included were changes on the taking of bullfrogs, ice fishing, boat fishing on Lake 20 at Fremont SRA, fishing tournaments and contests on public waters, and fee fishing at Ft. Robinson State Park.

Frog hunters will have to change their tactics slightly next year, as the commissioners imposed a 4 1/2 inch minimum body length for the 1979 season, plus removed the gig and bow and arrow as legal methods of taking bullfrogs. Froggers will have the option of catching bullfrogs by hand, hand net, or hook and line.

Fisheries Chief Bob Thomas noted over-harvest of frogs in some waters was occurring, and the size limit would allow more frogs to reach spawning maturity.

Ice fishermen east of Highway 281 will be restricted to a maximum of five lines with no more than two hooks per line. This regulation was necessary according to Thomas, to curb some of the congestion on lakes in the eastern part of the state.

Fishermen in the west will still be allowed 15 lines as in the past.

Boat fishing at lake number 20, Fremont State Recreation Area will not be allowed during the hours of 10 a.m. to one hour before sunset to allow power boaters full access to the lake. Fishermen will be able to use the lake from one hour before sunset to 10 a.m. the following day, however.

The Commissioners also removed the trout fishing fee requirement at Fort Robinson State Park and associated State Special Use Areas, in Sioux County, and stipulated that the Commission be notified of all fishing tournaments or contests of state waters at least 30 days in advance of the event. This change, noted Thomas, would allow the commission to monitor catch results and make improvements on public waters.

In other action the commissioners approved the substance of a report on the state water

planning and review process as it pertains to the state's proposed water use plan, but withheld final adoption of the report until potential changes can be made by a work planning committee. Final adoption by the commission was deferred until the December meeting.

Reaffirmed their support of September 1974 commission resolution endorsing legislation designed to reduce litter and curb use of disposable beverage containers.

Approved the purchase of two tracts of wildlife lands including a 480 acre tract in Madison near Battie Creek, and an 80 acre plot adjacent to Kintners Ford Wildlife Area near Hum-

Named this week are defensive back Doug Fischer of Wakefield, and two repeat players for the honors, offensive tackle Dale Pelland of Medinah, Ill., and running back Bob Barry of Battie Creek.

"Dale has played very steady ball for the last few games," Stoltzenberg said. "He did a good job against Ft. Hays. Needless to say the yards did not come

easy. Bob (Barry) had 153 yards and his longest was 14 yards, so someone was doing the job up front."

Barry, a 6-3, 200-pound junior, has been named WSC "Player of the Week" four times for performances this fall and in 1977. He was named for the honors previously this fall after rushing 159 yards against a strong Missouri Southern team.

Barry, who has been keyed on by opponents this fall, has still managed to accumulate five touchdowns and 861 yards rushing for an average of 107.62 yards per game. The 1977 Second-Team All American rushed for 153 yards in 30 carries Saturday for one touchdown. Barry, a junior this fall, set an all-time single season rushing record last fall with 1130 yards. He has gained 2506 total yards rushing thus far in his career at WSC.

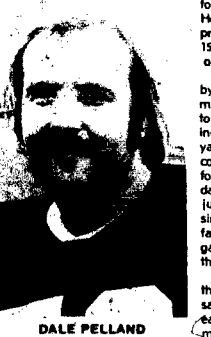


"After looking at the game films we think these three probably were the most outstanding as far as their overall performances," Stoltzenberg said.

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WS Season Draws To Close Old Records May Be Broken

Despite a disappointing 2-4-2 record for the Wayne State College Wildcats this fall, several WSC all-time records are close to being broken as the team prepares to face the Washburn Ichabods for a 1:30 p.m. game Saturday in WSC's Memorial Stadium.

With Rick Lade's 119 yards passing last Saturday against Ft. Hays, he has set an all-time single-season passing record for WSC with 112 yards in the air this fall. The previous WSC high of 1105 was set by Steve Gunther in 1970.

Lade's performance this year also qualifies him for the all-time total offense record for a single season at WSC. His 1299 yards tops the 1161 yard record set in 1970 by speedster Sam Singleton.

As a sophomore this fall at WSC, Lade is already closing in on the all-time career passing record at Wayne State. His 1955

total passing yards, including 656 last fall and 1299 this fall, is only 263 short of the four-year career record of 2218 set by Dave Miller between 1972 and 1975.

Other records are also being broken at WSC this fall. Junior split end Jeff Ingram is on his way to breaking the single-season pass receiving record. He has 36 receptions so far this fall and needs only five more to match the 41 caught by Maurice Mintken at WSC in 1975.

Junior Bob Barry, who already holds the WSC all-time single-season rushing record with 1130 rushing yards gained in 1977, is nearing the career rushing record of 3003 established by Sam Singleton between 1967 and 1970. Barry has rushed for 2506 in his career at WSC, including 515 yards in 1976, 1100 yards in 1977 and 861 so far this fall. Though unlikely to break the record this fall, he is only

497 yards short of Singleton's mark.

Washburn, although 3-5 overall and 1-4 in CSIC play this season, has also had individual standouts this fall.

Washburn's leading receiver Mike Keely, after 8 games, has caught 26 passes for 442 yards and 3 touchdowns, averaging 55.3 yards per game. Keely has set a new all-time leading pass receiving yardage record with 1488 yards at Washburn. He is also only 7 catches short of breaking Washburn's all-time receiving record.

Ichabod Mike Cassen is Washburn's leading scorer this year with 42 total points. Cassen has kicked 18 to 20 extra points and has made 8 of 11 field goal attempts.

Offensively Washburn will be a tough opponent for the WSC defense. The Ichabods are averaging 315.8 yards per game, with 145.5 of those through passing and 170.3 yards rushing.

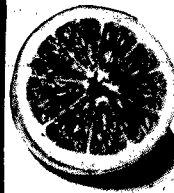

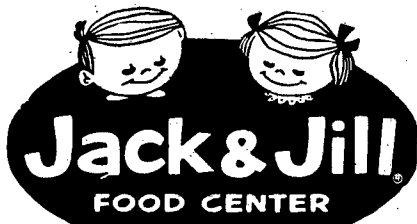

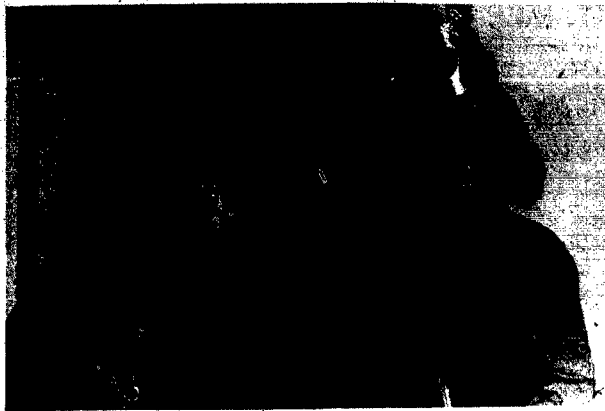
Silence is like a dandelion; untouched it's beautiful — but with a change in the wind it's destroyed.

Survey - Thone, Whelan In Tight Race

While voters in the Wayneland area and the First District in general are throwing their weight behind Cong. Charles Thone to be elected governor in the general election, the race narrows to a close contest in the eastern third of the state.

A poll taken recently shows Lt. Gov. Gerald Whelan taking a four-to-three count over Thone in the populous Omaha metro

area, a traditional Democratic stronghold.

The Omaha area response gives the Democratic candidate a slight three percent edge of the eastern Nebraska urban vote, according to the survey.

Whelan's second district strength offsets some of the anticipated Thone majorities of other urban centers in the state's eastern third, while in Lincoln, the poll shows the two contenders are locked in a close struggle.

Twelve persons in Wayne were polled in the survey. Five were Democrats, five were Republicans and two were independents. Six of those polled favored Thone with Whelan picking up three with two undecided and one "neither."

Seven of those polled in Wayne were women. Four picked Thone, one selected Whelan and one was undecided.

The question: "If the election were held today, who would you be likely to favor for governor?" was asked of 917 registered voters in 22 eastern Nebraska communities. Some 407 or 44 percent said they would vote for

Whelan with 375 or 41 percent giving Thone the nod. Some 56 or 11 percent were undecided with 39 or 4 percent not wanting either of the candidates.

Greater Omaha's support for Whelan (215 of 440 surveyed) gave the Democratic candidate a 49 percent to 36 percent margin over Thone in that area.

In Lincoln, both Whelan and Thone polled 42-percent with the remainder undecided or determined to ignore both candidates.

When advised of the results of the poll, Whelan said that "if I'm running even in Lincoln, then I'll beat him."

Thone, however, expressed surprise at the results of the poll in Lincoln. He said his private pollsters have assured him he is "running away with it in Lincoln."

Regardless of the present first district figures, Thone said he always meant to offset Democratic urban strength with conservative numbers in the west. He said he had just returned from a western swing and the said the western campaign "looks pretty good."

Thone aide Art Knox said he has been relying on a Republican telephone bank operation which places Thone ahead of Whelan in the Lincoln area by a 59 to 24 percent margin.

Knox expressed some concern about the urban poll "which could give the implication that Thone is losing ground or trailing."

Looking over the survey work of professionals in the employ of the Thone campaign, Knox said, "I can't see where, Charlie is hurting."

Knox said Thone's rural and western support should combine "to keep Thone and Whelan about 15 points apart."

The survey also pointed out the governor's race is one of personal allies rather than issues. Only 16 of 917 respondents could identify a candidate's stand on an issue which they had listed as important to them.

However, identifying areas of concern for state action and priorities, the first choice for many urban dwellers was greater attention to the problem of crime. Some 214 of 917 questioned listed crime as their number one concern.

Limitation of local government spending claimed the attention of another 198, while aid to education and efficiency and effectiveness in state government were listed first by 103 and 101 respondents respectively.

Water priorities, equalization of property values and highway improvements were also mentioned concerns according to the survey.

Senior Citizens will appear on live television from 7:30 to 8 p.m. on the Grand Generation Show, which is funded by ETV and the Nebraska Commission on Aging. The bus is expected to arrive back in Wayne about 11 p.m.

He said that stray dogs brought to the veterinary clinic are kept five days, and, if no home is found, destroyed through the use of an intravenous injection.

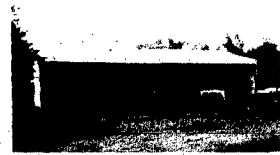

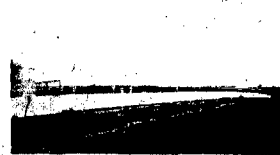

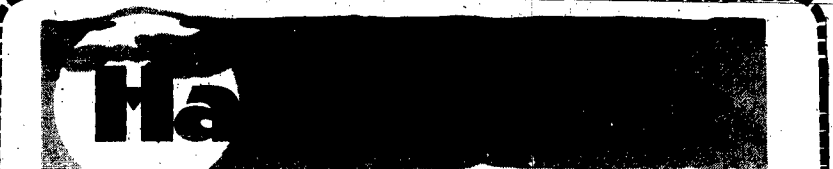
Injured Birds Given Relief

Sick or injured hawks, eagles and owls are being given a new lease on life, thanks to efforts of a handful of concerned Lincolnites, and the Game and Park Commission.
The Wachiska Chapter of the National Audubon Society, several Lincoln falconers, and a Lincoln veterinarian have formed a raptor rehabilitation center where they care for birds of prey incapacitated by encounters with vehicles, powerlines, traps, unprincipled shooters, or disease.
These volunteers provide day-to-day care for the birds, while the Game and Parks Commission relays injured birds to the center from all over the state, and releases rehabilitated birds to the wild.
Many are involved in the project, which is headquartered in two old barns near Lincoln. Headed by Betsy Hancock, a past president of the Wachiska Audubon group, and by Mike Cox, a licensed falconer and member of the Nebraska Hawking Club.
For their efforts, the raptor rehabilitation center was presented the 1978 Outstanding Wildlife Conservation Award of the Lincoln Journal-Star.

Lab Checks For Elements

Nebraska will play an important part in a national study to determine the presence of cadmium and leads in soils and plants.
A joint study has been initiated by the Department of Agriculture, Environmental Protection Agency and the Food and Drug Administration. The purpose of the study is to obtain information on cadmium and lead in crops and soils to use in establishing maximum allowable metal content in food crops and soils. Answers are needed in developing guidelines for land applications of sewage sludge and other wastes.
The Soil Conservation Service will collect samples for plant and soil analyses from approximately 6,000 food crops. Soil samples will be analyzed by the SCS National Soil Survey Laboratory at Lincoln. Plant analyses will be made at a USDA soil, plant and nutrition laboratory at Ithaca, N.Y.

Since beginning work about two years ago, the group has treated over 100 birds, and with considerable success. About 60 percent of the birds have eventually been released back to the wild, a level of success that matches or tops most other rehabilitation facilities in the U.S.
A 60 percent release rate is outstanding, considering the fact that many birds brought to the center have injuries that are beyond repair, according to Ross Lock, Game and Parks Commission biologist in charge of nongame and endangered species.
Raptors brought into the center may suffer from a variety of ailments, but the most common are broken wings, crushed legs, disease, or pesticide poisoning.
In the fall and winter, the predominant injury is from shooting or being caught in traps. In the spring and summer, there are many nestlings that have fallen or been blown out of their nests. Sometimes young birds lack the experience to hunt for themselves and become too weak to fly.
"One of the biggest problems facing workers at the raptor center is people trying to doctor the birds themselves. Besides being illegal, this is also harmful. Many people feed them hamburger, for example, but hamburger may actually kill a bird of prey," Lock said.
Unauthorized attempts of doctoring the birds also delay the immediate veterinary attention which is often necessary if an injury is to be repaired. The raptor center can rapidly and accurately diagnose the ailment, provide treatment for the dehydration and shock which usually accompanies most injuries, take X-rays, and perform surgery needed to pin wingbones or amputate an appendage.
Rather than attempting to treat an ailing bird, people should contact the Game and Parks Commission. With five district offices, 58 conservation officers, and many other field personnel, the Commission can quickly pick up injured birds and relay them to Lincoln for prompt treatment.
Convalescence following initial treatment may take a week or two, or it may take several months. The birds must be adequately fed, and hawks, eagles and owls can be pretty finicky eaters, so finding a supply of the right kind of food is always a problem.
The longer a bird is kept in captivity, the more difficult is its return to the wild. Birds lose muscle tone after being grounded for a few weeks, so they must be exercised, and sometimes trained to hunt, before being freed.

A Harvest of Fall Recipes!

Chicken Pot Pie with Buttermilk Gravy

- 3 tablespoons Cooking Oil
- 3 tablespoons Flour
- 1 cup Buttermilk
- 1/2 cup Milk
- 1 1/2 cups cooked Chicken, diced
- 1/2 cup Chicken Stock (or bouillon)
- 1 small Potato, boiled and diced
- 1 1/2 cups Frozen Mixed Vegetables
- 1/4 cup Minced Onion
- 1/2 teaspoon Poultry Seasoning
- Salt and Pepper

Warm oil in a large saucepan. Remove from heat and work in flour with a fork until smooth. Return to low heat; gradually add buttermilk and milk, stirring constantly, until the mixture thickens and becomes creamy. Add chicken, stock, potato, vegetables, onion and poultry seasoning. Salt and pepper to taste. Heat just until mixture begins to simmer, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. (Pastry recipe below.)

Pastry

- 2 cups Sifted Flour
- 3/4 teaspoon Salt
- Two-thirds cup Shortening
- 4-6 tablespoons Cold Water

Sift flour and salt. Cut with two table knives (or pastry cutter) into shortening. Add water, a little at a time, until dough will ball on a fork. Roll dough out thin on a lightly floured board. Place in one 9-inch pie tin or in three commercial-size pot pie tins. Fill pies and cover with a top crust. Crimp edges to seal, and make slits for steam. Bake at 375 degrees for about 1 hour, or until crust is golden. (Place baking sheet under the pies while baking them.)

Pies can be made up in advance and frozen for some time before baking.

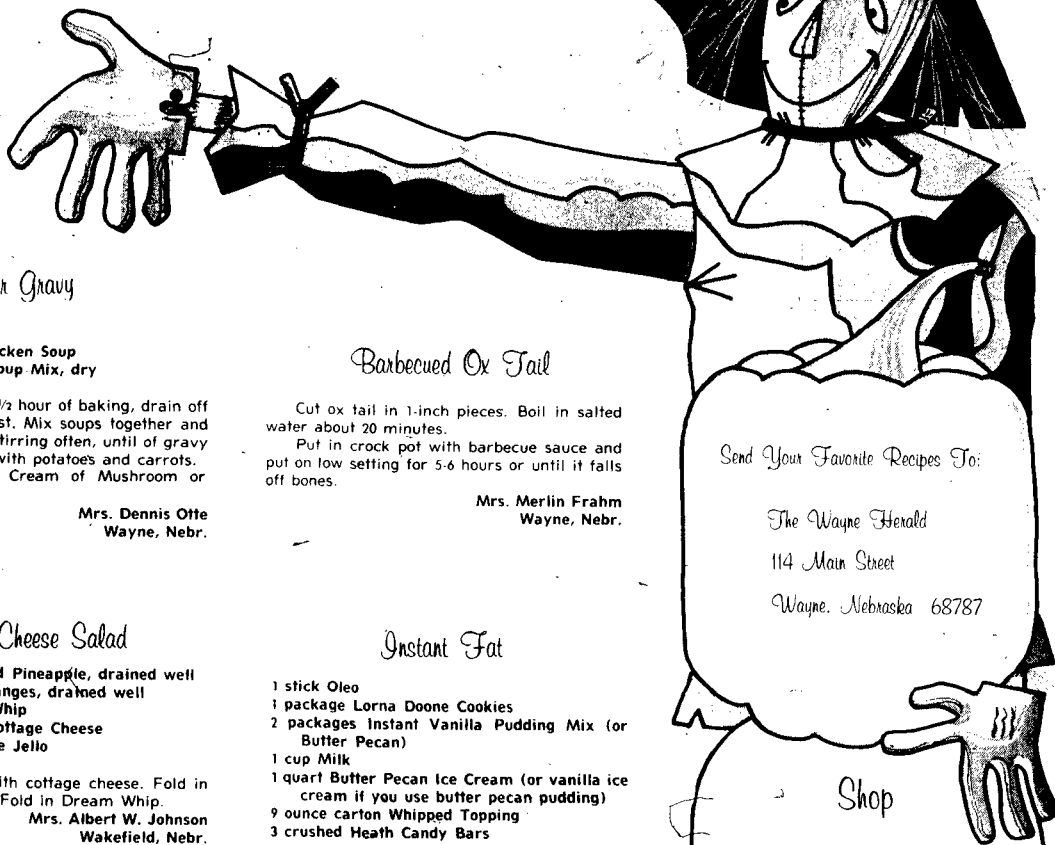

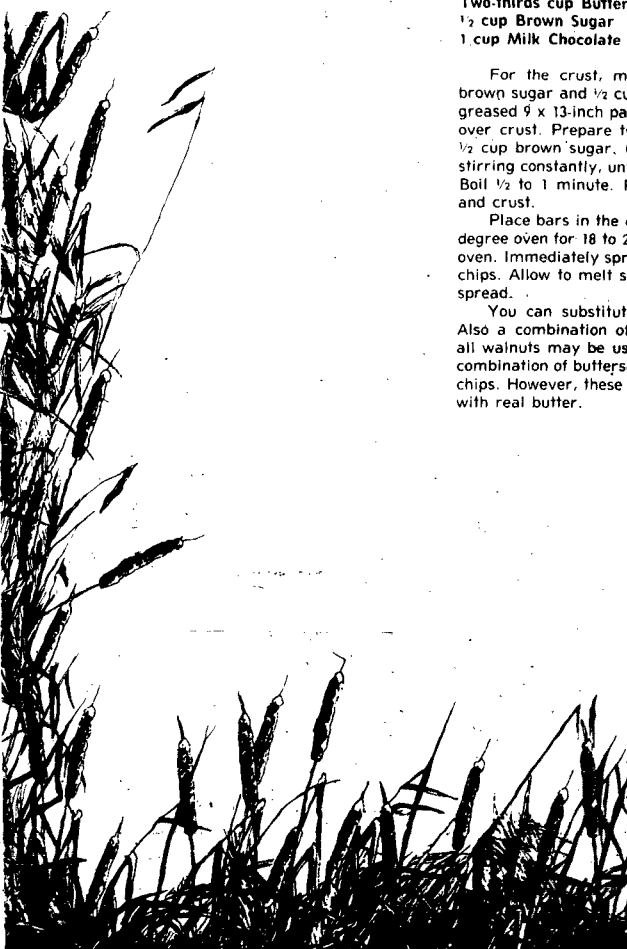
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Comprehensive state water plan and cost

LINCOLN — It has been estimated that the cost of completing a comprehensive state water plan during the next five years will be \$2.2 million.

That was the statement recently by Darryl Williamson, executive secretary of the Nebraska Natural Resources Commission, during one of the periodic meetings called by the Legislature's Public Works Committee to see how work on the plan is progressing.

A lengthy draft of the plan has been prepared, and several of the senators on the committee thought it was too detailed and could be difficult for many to comprehend.

Williamson said the report will be "streamlined" and that a summary of it will also be prepared. But he said there is a need to have the detailed data in the plan so that local government officials dealing with water questions and problems will have firm guidance in arriving at their decisions.

He also told the committee, headed by Sen. Maurice Kremer of Aurora, that

water resource management will not be taken over by state agencies, at the expense of local governmental units.

When Kremer said there have been suggestions from some that this will happen, Williamson said he does not envision that will come to pass.

Sen. Howard Lamb of Anselmo said attending committee meetings does not help him answer constituents who want to know what the Legislature will do next session regarding water legislation.

Lamb said he keeps hearing at the meetings "more plans of how we're going to plan," but Williamson said water planning has to be done thoroughly and gradually.

He did say the Legislature may, because of public pressure, have to deal with some problems before the planning is complete.

Next year, he said, the commission will collect data and study in-stream flows, water quality planning, groundwater reservoirs and the management of surface and groundwater.

Williamson said in-depth studies of the state's water basins will have to be stopped so money and resources can be devoted to the water plan. He said the

current Blue River Basin study will be completed next year but several others will be discarded. A study on the Platte River Basin has been finished.

Marsh Is Criticized
State Treasurer Frank Marsh has been fielding some criticism from a couple of state senators for demanding that 40,000 Nebraska fill out four-page forms he sent them — even if the recipients have nothing to report.

Marsh wants those who may be holding unclaimed property to inform him so the state can take control of the property.

Under Nebraska law, Marsh, as state treasurer is the custodian of property left with people for seven years without the owner being identified. Usually, the unclaimed property is something like savings bonds left in a bank safe deposit box after the owner dies or moves from the community.

Marsh, claiming there is a considerable amount of unclaimed property in the state, sent the 40,000 forms to bankers, accountants, lawyers, judges, officers of corporations and others.

Sens. Donald Dworak of Columbus and Robert Murphy of South Sioux City both

received complaints from constituents, and both said the state treasurer was being over-zealous.

Dworak said Marsh's move was a "blunder" and that it gave government a "lousy image."

So far, Marsh said, 60 to 70 percent of the respondents have listed no property.

The state auditor some time ago suggested more follow-up was needed because only a third of the more than 500 banks and financial institutions failed to respond last year. Marsh then decided to change the policy to require reports, even if recipients of the forms had nothing to report.

The treasurer is threatening those who fail to respond with \$50 per day fines.

Murphy, who said he told inquirers to ignore the reports, warned Nebraskans to "brace yourselves, citizens, your government is at work."

Burbach Favors Thone
Although he's a Democrat and eight years ago lost a narrow race to J. James Exon in a bid for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination, former state Sen. Jules Burbach of Hartington says he's backing Republican Charley Thone for

governor in the Nov. 7 election.

Burbach was also beaten four years ago in a race for the Democratic lieutenant governor nomination. The winner in that one was Lt. Gov. Gerald Whelan, handpicked by Exon to be his running mate.

Burbach says, however, his two defeats had nothing to do with his endorsement of Thone, who grew up in northeastern Nebraska as did Burbach.

He said he endorsed the Republican because he considers him best-suited for the job of governor.

Ineptness No Excuse
The State Supreme Court ruled recently in two Scottsbluff County cases that a defendant will be held responsible for his own ineptness if he elects to act as his own counsel after the trial court refuses to permit him to use lay counsel.

One of the men was charged with willful and unlawful failure to file a valid state income tax return. In his appeal to the Supreme Court after his conviction, the man said a defendant in a criminal case cannot be denied lay counsel and still be considered to have had assistance of counsel as guaranteed by the federal

constitution.

In reviewing the case, the Supreme Court acknowledged the trial court judge's mistake during jury selection when he commented the man was charged with income tax evasion. The Supreme Court said it could find no evidence the misstatement prejudiced the case. Then it added the man made no objection at the time and "must be held responsible for his ineptness of counsel even though that counsel was himself."

The other man, who had filed an incomplete tax statement, also listed among alleged errors in his trial the denial of lay counsel.

DeCamp Files Brief
State Sen. John DeCamp of Neligh has filed a brief with the Supreme Court stating the State Board of Equalization should equalize assessment of tangible property in all 93 counties at 100 percent of actual value.

The brief said the court should overturn the Aug. 7 order of the board because it is an actual property tax market of actual value.

By that action, the board failed to comply with the law, DeCamp said.

The 'mess we're in...how?

Farmers and ranchers struggling with the problems of inflation, high taxes and government regulations involving environmental, labor wage and hour factors plus many more, have reason to ask, along with all Americans, "How did we get into this mess anyway?"

Recently Dr. John A. Howard, director of the Rockford College Institute, provided some thought-provoking answers to that question. A summary of his analysis includes the following:

—For the first 1 1/2 centuries of the U.S. republic, concern was mainly on preserving the principle of liberty, with the primary role of government one of helping the citizens in pursuit of their own life purpose, adjudicating their conflicts and protecting their persons from assault and their property from theft and vandalism.

—Then in the middle third of this century, a second American revolution occurred. The protection of liberty has been replaced by the granting of privileges, benefits and service. The new justifying principle is not liberty, but the distribution of gifts and favors.

—In the aftermath of the Great Depression, a compassionate citizenry became accustomed to having Congress authorize help for an endless list of people clamoring their needs. The dream of a more humane society had turned into a nightmare of governmental extravagance and corruption, of unfulfilled promises on a gigantic scale, of foolish, useless, counter-productive and expensive programs and a populace increasingly divided into militant groups compelling fiercely against each other for the favors dispensed by the government.

—The advent of the welfare state has changed the basis on which the voters judge who is the best candidate for national office. In the new order, voters seek more concerned about what benefits the elected officer will provide for them. Promises, hypocrisy, deceit, and

"clout" have become more characteristic of eligibility. In 1976, of 21 Congressmen linked in one way or another with political wrongdoing or personal scandal, 19 were re-elected.

—When liberty was the byword, taxes were collected only to pay to operate the government. Now a large and rapidly growing portion of the taxes is collected for the express purpose of "redistributing the wealth." Such confiscation of assets discourages productive people from working and encourages lazy people to loaf.

—Bureaucracy nourishes small problems into big ones. The last thing that people employed to attend to a problem want to do is to solve that problem and put themselves out of work. Thus the jobs of problem-solvers are safeguarded and multiplied.

—The transition of government from being a guardian of liberty to a dispenser of privileges is illustrated by the minimum wage law. The only lever available to him in obtaining a job is a willingness to work for less than the

Future capital question

WASHINGTON — At the end of World War I, a flood of American veterans returned home looking for work. Many of them had to drive a truck in the Army. And to many of those so experienced starting a private bus company looked like a good way to make a buck.

So, they scraped together enough money to buy a suitable vehicle and went into business, providing irregular service on an irregular route. This was the era of the "jitney" bus, and it drove the franchised bus and trolley companies to distraction.

The jitney operators thought that once they had made enough to cover their out-of-pocket expenses, the rest was gravy. So their fares tended to be lower than the established transit systems. But most of them forgot one very important fact: That machine under them began wearing out the moment they started to use it, and one day it would have to be replaced.

Thus, the end of the ride came when riders had a breakdown and the hapless proprietor discovered, too late, the reason well-managed businesses set aside a percentage of income to cover the eventual costs of replacing capital equipment.

Some people think that our country as a whole is now repeating the mistake of the jitney bus operators. The debate gets complex, but the issue is an important one.

Ultimately, capital represents foregone consumption. That is, you acquire some money — either from your own efforts directly, or from an investment — and you decide to reinvest it in some (hopefully) income-producing project, rather than simply buying a tanciel suit, car, house or yacht.

Such capital formation and investment has a lot to do with the economic future of both individuals and nations.

How is America doing? Not well. If you look at a chart of "fixed capital formation as a percentage of gross domestic product, 1961-1967," you would find the U.S. at the bottom among Western industrial nations, at 17.8, and Japan at the top, with 33.0. Even Great Britain — widely regarded as the sick man of the capitalist world — did better, at 28.6.

The real problem, though, is not the rate at which we are accumulating capital, but rather, what we are doing with it.

Roughly four things can happen to the money you earn and don't need to spend on satisfying your immediate survival needs: (1) You can spend it on yourself as leisure time or in some other form of immediate consumption. (2) You can save it and invest it for your own (and others') future gain. (3) The government can take it away from you and give it to someone else (transfer payment). (4) The government can take it away from you and invest it for the future benefit of the government ("society").

In the case of options (1) and (3), the society is consuming its own seed corn, like those jitney bus operators. In the case of option (2), the capital is being invested for future return. The difference then is in whether you believe that all individual investors collectively or the government will make wiser decisions in the long run.

To the extent that the government taxes away our income, it substitutes its own decision about the future use of capital for ours. The current trend is entirely in this direction, and it comes not only from outright government confiscation of income, but also from seemingly innocent government activities such as paying for government employee and Social Security pensions out of current tax revenue, rather than from income on invested capital.

The National Chamber has a committee charged with examining the long-range consequences of such policies, known as the "Council on Trends and Perspectives."

The Council has just issued a report on this thorny capital formation issue. It is called "Public Policy and Capital Formation" (stock number 5836) and is available at \$3 a copy from the Chamber of Commerce of the U.S., 1615 H Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20062.

The Council's study raises some very disturbing questions. It is not a place of propaganda, but rather a thoughtful discourse on the policy alternatives available to us. I urge all Americans to give the issue some very serious considerations.

Opponents of the Bottle Bill continue to advertise: "clean up all the litter" or "we need a litter law."

The signs and ads promote Washington State comprehensive litter law and promise to introduce the same law in Nebraska as they have tried in 1977 and 1978.

The Washington State law is a TAX. The tax is administered at the retail level. Much of the tax is lost in administration and bureaucracy. It taxes products that rarely produce litter. . . has been called a "tax on food to pick up beer cans." Food products carry 52 percent of the tax in Washington, while beverage containers carry only 3 percent.

Nebraska campers and travelers say that Washington is cleaner than Nebraska, but Oregon is cleaner than Washington. Oregon has a Bottle Bill for litter control. There is a citizen effort now in Washington State to get a Bottle Bill instead of a litter tax.

Nebraska does not need a litter tax when the 5¢ refund in proposition 301 does the job without state taxes and high administrative cost. — Dorris Marzhausen.

Tribute to war dead

A brief glance at the newspapers on file at the Nebraska State Historical Society shows that since the signing of the Armistice on Nov. 11, 1918, countless words of tribute have been written to America's war dead. But perhaps none have been more poignant than the few words scribbled in black pencil on the cross marking the grave of former Creighton University instructor Leo N. Wall, who died on the battlefield at Sergy, France — "He met his God like a soldier. Killed in Action July 31, 1918."

Lieutenant Wall, like so many others, was buried in foreign soil. How difficult it was for the families of American service men to accept their burials was said by a young French girl. She wrote the following letter (Creighton Chronicle, Feb. 20, 1919) to Mrs. E.P. Gauthreau, mother of Sergeant Alfred L. Gauthreau who died of pneumonia at Bordeaux,

France, on November 12, the day after Armistice. (Gauthreau: 26, was a Creighton graduate.)

"Madam: I wish by this letter to try to send you a little softening of your terrible grief. I live near the cemetery made here for our American brothers who died for France.

"We, like many of our compatriots (mama and I), are trying to fulfill our duty towards these brave soldiers; by keeping up one of their graves, since their parents who are so far away have not the consolation of being able to do it.

"We met recently in the cemetery, an American officer, Captain J. H. Wheeler, who asked us to take charge of another grave, that of a non-commissioned officer whom he loved very much, and which he did not wish to see abandoned. Upon his request mama consented for me to take charge of it."

Proposed Amendment No. 1

A vote FOR this proposal will authorize any city or village to issue bonds for the purpose of acquiring and redeveloping blighted properties in a redevelopment project, which indebtedness would be paid off in part through the sale of properties to private developers and in part through the additional revenue the city or village would receive from the increased values of these improved and redeveloped properties.

A vote AGAINST this proposal would not allow cities or villages to utilize this additional method of funding the improvement and redevelopment of blighted properties.

For Against

Constitutional amendment to provide that cities and villages may acquire and redevelop substandard or blighted property, issue bonds or other evidence of indebtedness for the redevelopment and pay off such bonds by the receipt of additional property taxes from new valuations on property in such project.

Proposed Amendment No. 2

A vote FOR this proposal will enable the Legislature to broaden the Industrial Development Act, under which cities and counties may issue revenue bonds to acquire, finance and develop real and personal property for lease to manufacturing or industrial enterprises, by enabling the cities and counties to do the same for non-manufacturing commercial or business enterprises not engaged primarily in direct sales to the general public, and would provide that such bonds would not be an obligation on the general credit or the taxpayers of any such cities or counties.

A vote AGAINST this proposal will retain the present provision limiting the cities and counties under the Industrial Development Act to acquiring and developing property for lease only to manufacturing or industrial enterprises, thus prohibiting them from doing so for non-manufacturing commercial or business enterprises not engaged primarily in direct sales to the general public.

Constitutional amendment to expand the powers of counties, cities, and villages to issue revenue bonds to include bonds for commercial or business enterprises, and to provide that such bonds shall not be a charge on the general credit or taxing powers of any such county, city, or village.

Proposed Amendment No. 3

A vote FOR this proposal will authorize the Legislature to enact legislation providing that the increased value of land or improvements to residential, commercial or industrial real property resulting from the installation of direct alternate energy systems for heat, cooling, or electricity shall not be taken into account in assessing such property.

A vote AGAINST this proposal will not allow the Legislature to take into account the increased value of land or improvements to real property resulting from the installation of alternate energy systems in the assessing of such property.

For Against

Constitutional amendment to allow tax exemptions or tax credits for installation of direct alternate energy systems.

Proposed Amendment No. 4

A vote FOR this proposal will retain the present salary for members of the Legislature at \$400.00 per month, but would allow them to receive a per diem as limited by law, and their actual expenses while engaged in performance of their duties as members of the Legislature.

A vote AGAINST this proposal would not allow members of the Legislature to receive a per diem as limited by law, and their actual expenses while performing their duties as members of the Legislature, while retaining the present salary of \$400.00 per month.

(8) Use or consumption shall include the exercise of any right or power over a beverage incident to the ownership thereof, other than the sale or the keeping or retention of a beverage for the purpose of sale.

(1) A dealer shall not refuse to accept from any person any empty beverage container of the kind, size, and brand sold by the dealer, or refuse to pay to such person the refund value of a beverage container as established by section 3 of this act.

FIBER IN THE DIET

Whole breads and cereals, bran, fruits, and vegetables, legumes and nuts—all are foods with something in common. Each of these foods when eaten contributes a valuable nutrient to our diet—fiber.

The reason most widely known for the inclusion of fiber in our daily diet is to prevent constipation, a problem of immediate concern to many people.

Fiber containing foods play an important role in the proper elimination of food wastes from our body. The fact that fiber cannot be digested by humans and that it has the capacity to absorb and retain water enables fiber to assist in discarding body waste normally.

These characteristics together with the nutritional value of fiber foods make them essential

in our daily diet.

Grandmother was correct in her advice that one should eat bran to prevent irregularity. According to Dr. Jean Mayer, a leading nutritionist, bran is one of the best fibers to include in the diet because bran absorbs and retains to 200 times its weight in water. Bran not only helps prevent irregularity but is a good treatment for constipation.

Excellent vegetable sources of fiber are the leafy green vegetables—celery, broccoli, brussel sprouts, cabbage and lettuce to name a few. The root vegetables are also good sources.

Some fruits rich in fiber include apples (with skins), plums, strawberries, blueberries, blackberries and pineapple. Eat these fruits and vegetable raw and with their skins, whenever possible, to obtain their full fiber value. Cooking tends to soften the fiber in foods.

How much fiber is enough? The amount and quality of fiber contained in various foods will vary greatly depending on where it was grown and in what season and locality it was produced, maturity when gathered, and the time and method of preparation.

If you are not under the immediate care of a physician, an adequate amount of fiber will be consumed if you follow the USDA recommended food plan "A Daily Food Guide."

Cacti Attractive But Require Care

A cactus can be one of the most attractive house plants, but proper care techniques must be followed to ensure a healthy plant.

Soil mixture, drainage, temperature, light and fertilizer are all important in the care of cacti, but watering is the most important factor, said Dr. Dale T. Lindgren, Extension horticulturist at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln North Platte Station.

Arid cacti should be watered regularly during the active growing season in the spring and summer when the top one-half inch of soil feels dry. The soil should be thoroughly watered and allowed to dry before being watered again, the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources specialist said. But the dormant cacti should be watered only every few weeks during the fall and winter.

Most arid species of cacti require bright sunlight to grow. The plants should be placed in south windows if possible and artificial light used to supple-

ment natural light if necessary, Lindgren said.

The plants will tolerate temperatures of 90-100 degrees F. during the growing season, but the dormant cactus plants will do best at temperatures ranging from 45-55 degrees F. The cooler temperatures ensure sturdier plants.

A good growing mixture for arid cacti consists of equal amounts of peat moss, garden soil and sharp sand, he said. The cacti should be re-potted whenever the plant is within one-fourth inch of the container wall.

According to Lindgren, the plant should not be watered for several days after re-potting, so damaged roots have time to heal.

The arid cacti should be fertilized monthly from spring to fall with a low nitrogen fertilizer such as 5-10-10. But, excessive nitrogen can cause succulent growth and result in insect and disease problems, he said. The plants should not be fertilized during the winter months.



Editorials

Bereuter, for Congress

Voters of Nebraska's 1st Congressional District are especially fortunate this year.

Either way the majority goes on Nov. 7, the people are guaranteed of getting a new congressman of exceptionally attractive characteristics.

Both Democrat Hess Dyas and Republican Doug Bereuter are relatively young men of integrity and honor, of demonstrated personal political courage, of unusual intelligence and perception, of good manners and historical insights and loaded with energy.

Of the two, Dyas is the more polished politician. But he's been at the business longer, first in Democratic party leadership posts and then as a scrappy candidate for the House and the Senate. Dyas has not simply been a prize ornament on the growing Nebraska Democratic tree, he is one of the reasons that tree is flourishing.

Bereuter's experience in electoral politics does not have such extended length. Yet he's won three elections and has four years in the Nebraska Legislature gives the Utica businessman a seasoning that no amount of money can buy.

In those four years, Bereuter produced a record of accomplishments particularly constructive and beneficial for the State of Nebraska. The list goes from locally-controlled mechanisms to make the best and most profitable use of natural resources — water and land — to an insistence that large sums appropriated to the University of Nebraska be spent for improved undergraduate instruction, not administration.

As a member of the Appropriations and

Budget Committee, Bereuter schooled himself to understand and then insist upon priorities of public expenditures. He was a veteran of fighting Proposition 13-type battles before that become the chic thing to do.

He has understood that that which might be politically attractive and momentarily expedient can carry the seeds of long-term error and social drag, especially in a financial sense. But in characteristically attempting to apply reason to problems, by preferring private initiative to public response, Bereuter has not distanced from human concerns.

He is, as we see it, exactly the kind of winning, modern moderate who can help turn around the Republican Party, nationally and in his home state. If elected, Bereuter has a real future ahead of him, the sort of representative capable of attracting — and holding — new faces and young faces to his political party.

In the weeks of summer and fall campaigning, it may appear that because of the reported closeness of issue stands by the two nominees, they would vote alike in the 96th Congress. We don't accept that, and judging from the kinds of organizations contributing to Bereuter and Dyas, neither do the various interest groups. They grasp a real difference, Bereuter being more the conservative.

Both Dyas and Bereuter are splendid men. The Journal senses, however, that Bereuter would be more in tune with the public policy attitudes of the entire district, besides all the other positive features he has to offer.

Without reservation, the Journal endorses Doug Bereuter of Utica for Congress from the 1st District.



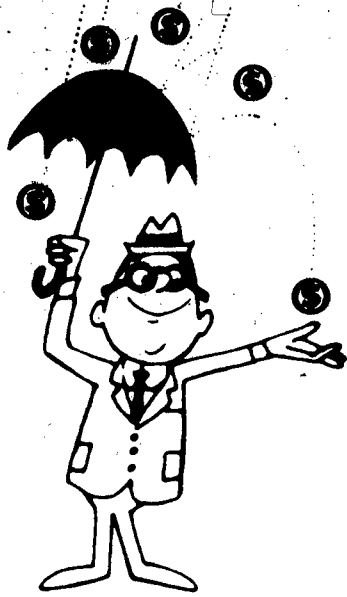

Swine Specialist Fritschen Assumes New Duties

The appointment of Prof. Robert D. Fritschen, 42, to become associate director of District 1 (Nebraska panhandle counties), and the University of Nebraska Panhandle Station has been approved by the NU Board of Regents.

Fritschen, who has been serving as a District Extension swine specialist at the Northeast Station near Concord, will assume his new duties at the Station on Jan. 1, 1979.

Fritschen will join District 1 Director Dr. John L. Weining in administration of the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources Cooperative Service and Agricultural Experiment Station programs in the 11 western Nebraska counties. He succeeds Dr. Lloyd Anderson, who moved to Lincoln to become an integrated pest management specialist in the IANR's Department of Entomology.

A native of Mitchell, S.D., Fritschen has served on the Northeast Station staff since Nov. 1, 1965. A professor of animal science, he has had a special appointment in Extension and research.

Fritschen was graduated from South Dakota State University, Brookings, with B.S. and M.S. degrees in 1961 and 1963, respectively. He served as assistant county agent for Scotts Bluff County from July 1, 1963 to July 15, 1964 and as Dawes County

Extension agent from July, 1964 to Oct., 1965.

Fritschen was instrumental in the development of the swine research facilities at Concord. He is a leader in swine housing research and has written many papers, popular articles, and spoken around the country on the results of his research. His work has focused on differences in types of swine housing related to environment and swine performance under seasonal conditions.

He also is credited with early work in identifying differences

in swine performance related to the ratio of slotted floors to solid floors for solid waste disposal. Growing finishing units designed and researched by Fritschen have been adopted by the industry in many states. In addition to Nebraska.

Fritschen has traveled widely, presenting papers at numerous symposia, including one in the Republic of China, and the Soviet Union, as well as addressing many groups and organizations throughout the country. He also served on the Production

Research Committee of the National Pork Producers Council; Environment and Animal Production Committee, Midwest Section American Society Animal Science; North Central Regional Committee on Swine Confinement Management; and others.

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Breaking The Corn Yield Barrier Or, Just How High Is Up?

How they must have whistled when the national average corn shot up to 35.4 bushels per acre! That was in 1942—and it set a record. Eyebrows went up again in 1948 when farmers weighed in with a record shattering 43 bushels per acre.

Not in their wildest dreams would U.S. farmers believe that just 30 years later they'd harvest an average of 100.7 bushels of corn per acre. But that's exactly what they expect to do, according to the crop reporting board of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The board released figures this month which gave that production estimate. While the figures are only estimates that could change, there's not likely to be much difference this late in the season between the estimate and the final harvest.

Most of the increase is due to hybrid corn, which became available in quantity to U.S. farmers in the 1930's following successful experiments in corn crossbreeding. Corn yields

didn't change much from 1886 through the 1930's, running around 24 bushels per acre. When the hybrids hit the furrows, yields began setting records.

The 1948 record held until 1956 when U.S. farmers grew an average of 44 bushels per acre. Since that year, records have been rather commonplace for U.S. corn farmers as they've climbed through yield levels of 80.1 in 1967, and 97.3 in 1972.

What is the yield limit per acre for corn? No one, of course, can be sure. "Genetically, we don't see a ceiling," said Paul H. Harvey, coordinator for corn and sorghum research at the U.S. Department of Agriculture. "Corn is a variable crop. There's plenty to work with. Other factors such as water and temperature will limit corn yields before genetics do."

"The national breeding programs for hybrid corn have given us a 1 percent increase each year over the past about 50 years. We expect that increase

to continue for some time," he said.

"Fertilizer and equipment have been factors in increasing the yield, too. With today's equipment, a farmer can plant his entire crop in a week's time. So a rainy period doesn't create the same problems today as it did when horses pulled the plows and it took two or three weeks to put the crop in."

The high yield per acre means that planting and growing conditions were good over a large portion of our 67.7 million acre

corn plot. Farmers cut back more than two million acres from last year, incidentally, that 100.7 is an average figure. One state (Calif.) reported a high of 120 bushels per acre and another (Miss.) reported only 43 per acre.

"Doubling and tripling our corn yield is important, of course, it not only creates jobs—in fertilizer, farm equipment, transportation, farming and in the hybrid seed industry itself—but the sale of corn overseas puts money in

The Laurence Sprouls' family were hosts to about 65 Holstein breeders Sunday, Oct. 22 at their farm south of Wayne. I wasn't in attendance, but Mrs. Nellie Kittle sent me a report.

Mr. Blake, a Midwest Breeders representative talked about a mating program they have and Sprouls' herd has been on this program for several years.

Vic Kathol, a Harvesiore representative talked about Slurry store and how it works.

The Sprouls then gave the group a tour of their dairy farm. They have an outstanding Holstein herd with yearly production of 17,759 pounds of milk and 626 pounds of fat per cow. Their average is the highest of any in the North Central D.H.I.A. Association. This is quite an achievement for any dairy farmer.

WINTER CARE OF TREES
All home owners who have set out trees last spring are anxious for them to grow as rapidly as possible. These young trees are over a very important hurdle if

they have lived through the summer and particularly so if they have made at least some growth during this period.

These trees need extra attention now. Be sure the soil is well soaked when the ground freezes and water throughout the winter will be helpful. This is especially important this year because we are going into the winter extremely dry.

Rabbits can also cause a lot of damage in the winter to young trees. This is especially true for homeowners living on the edge of town and in the country. The simplest way to do this is by placing chicken netting around each tree.


GARDEN BINDWEED
Now is a good time to control bindweed in the garden. After the frost has killed most of the garden crops and the field bindweed is still growing actively, spray with 2,4-D. Use rate suggested on the label for perennial weed control.

FALL TILLAGE
Should you till your soil in the Fall? According to George Rehm, district agronomist, research at Northeast Station, indicates that fall tillage is not suggested for the silt loam soils found on the hills in Northeast Nebraska.

Three tillage systems have been compared on these soils for 2 years at the Northeast Station at Concord. Yields averaged 118.2 bushels per acre from a fall chisel treatment. Spring plowing produced 120.7 bushels per acre.

The till plant system produced an average of 119.2 bushels per acre for the 2 years. These yields are significantly different from one another.

Soils along rivers and streams which have either a clay loam or silty clay loam texture can be tilled in the fall. Of course no fall tillage should be practiced on sandy soils.

Most areas of Nebraska already have experienced a hard freeze. When forages freeze, dairy farmers should be watchful for prussic acid poisoning as a result of feeding some forages to the animals.

Phil Cole, extension dairyman in the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, said sudans and sorghums can be pastured or fed as green chop following frost if reasonable precautions are observed.

The precautions include: — Don't turn the cows out on frost-damaged crops when they are hungry. — See that the animals have a full feed of hay or pasture grain before going to pasture. — Have an adequate and balanced mineral supplement available. — Be sure there is a good supply of clean water available.

Even so, these precautions probably don't eliminate all possibility of prussic acid poisoning.

Cole said, "Any growing sorghum or sudan plant can contain dangerous levels of prussic acid. Generally, prussic acid content is not increased by freezing, but regrowth following a killing frost may be very high in prussic acid," he said.

It's a good idea to check the pasture before turning the cows out, Cole added. Lightly frosted material is avoided by the cows, but if the plant has been completely killed, sorghums may be grazed safely in about a week.

America's pocket another way. Corn will grab a big chunk of the \$26.5 billion dollar export record sale this country expects to make this year. The total corn crop is expected to be about 6.82 billions bushels — seven percent above last year's.

Harvey noted that earlier in his career when farmers were still averaging 20 or so bushels per acre he started a 100-bushel corn club. It had five members — farmers whose yields reached the magic figure.

Would he be optimistic enough these days of already high yields to start a club for, say, 300 bushel members? "Sure. After all," he said, "several farmers already get 300 bushels and just last year we learned of a Michigan farmer who produced 352 bushels of corn an acre."

Grazing should be safe after the leaves and stalks both have turned brown.

Grazing, rather than making the crop in to hay or silage, probably is the easiest way to harvest the crop if it was quite mature at the time it was frozen. Trampling losses may be high, but labor is low. If the crop was in the heading-out to early bloom stage when frozen, it can be made into good hay. However, if it's too dry it may shatter too badly to bale. If it's too wet, the hay won't keep well. Another possibility is to cut it and feed it as long hay, Cole said.

Frosted sorghums should make excellent silage if the silage is properly packed, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln specialist said. Compared to harvest before frost there will be some loss through loss of leaves. "Otherwise, it will be just as valuable as if harvested the day before frost," he said.

Other crops need special care if frosted. Corn should be put in the silo as quickly as possible to avoid leaf loss. Grain sorghum, if in the hard dough stage, should be left and harvested as silage. If less mature, let it dry down somewhat and put up as silage.

Alfalfa will normally stand a harder freeze than corn or sorghum. If damaged, it can be made into hay or hay crop silage if done promptly. Grazing frosted alfalfa generally doesn't present any special problems, Cole said.

If soybeans can be cut quickly enough to save the leaves, immature soybeans can be salvaged as hay or silage. Small grains such as rye, barley or oats are known to accumulate nitrates and care should be taken to avoid nitrate poisoning, he said.

SPOTLIGHT ON WEEDS

MUSK THISTLE
Description — Musk thistle is also known as nodding thistle. The deep reddist purple flowers are large and attractive. The head is solitary on the end of the stem and noddy or hangs down as it grows in size. The thistle is primarily a biennial.

The deeply cut (segmented) leaves are dark green with a light green midrib. There is a grayish green area at the outer edge of each spine-tipped leaf appearance. The leaf segment. The leaves extend onto the stem, giving it frilled appearance. The plant is relatively free of hairiness. Plant height varies between two and seven feet.

Musk thistle may produce as many as 20,000 seeds and germination may run as high as 95 percent. Blooming starts with late terminal head the first week in June and continues until mid-August. Control—There are two different herbicides that may be used to control musk thistle. You may use 1.5 to 2 quarts of 2,4-D per acre. Treat rossetts in late fall.

A just released herbicide that looks even more promising than 2,4-D is Tordon 22K. Use this chemical at the rate of 6.8 fluid ounces per acre on permanent grass planting in the fall between October to soil freeze-up, —or December 1, whichever is earlier.

Special Remarks
Tordon has just been released for use on musk thistle in rangeland and permanent grass pastures. Tests have that Tordon when used in the fall is more effective than other herbicides. This is especially true when thistles are under stress due to dry or cool weather, when Tordon will be effective, even though other herbicides may fail. Fall is the best time to treat musk thistles regardless of which herbicide you use.
